Motley Cattle Free Of Moving Embargo

SCABIES QUARANTINE of six West Texas Counties, Hale, Briscoe, Castro, Swisher, Floyd and Lamb, does not affect the movement of Motley County cattle. The announcement was made Tuesday by Joe Calhoun, livestock inspector for the Texas Animal Health Commission, a guest at the Tuesday meeting of the Matador Lions Club. He said one herd had been quarantined in the county (in the Flomot area) but that it does not affect the remainder of the county. Motley County is not under quarantine. Motley cattle may be moved anywhere and there is no quarantine embargo. Calhoun said ranchers should contact County Agent Bill Palmeyer for further advice. He said other TAHC inspectors in the area are Roy Henderson superintendent and inspector Russell Green, now stationed in Plainview. Dr. S. B. Walker, Executive Director of TAHC says there has been some misunderstanding pertaining to the federal quarantine of cattle in the six infected counties. Cattle going out of state from these counties are required to be visually inspected by a USDA livestock inspector. There is still free movement of cattle within the state other than scabies infected and exposed herds, which were put under quarantine by a representative of TAHC. County agents of the six quarantined counties have been notified by Walker. Dr. John Wilbur Jr., veterinarian in charge of Animal Disease Eradication Division in Austin has explained the situation to the affected counties to avoid any confusion regarding the legal movement of livestock within the state.

Motley County has been invited to join other neighboring counties in participating in the annual Floyd County Fair, held in Luckney each fall, it was announced here this week. At a meeting held here on March 8, Mrs. Larry Norris and Keith Patton were named directors to represent Motley County. Mr. and Mrs. Patton and Mrs. Norris then attended a meeting held in Floydada, March 12, where plans were further submitted. It was pointed out that several counties in the area do not hold a fall fair, and that resources from Motley County could be employed to an advantage at the Floyd County Fair. Flomot community has been entering exhibits in the Floyd Fair and participants have received several first place ribbons.

Culture Of Tonga Islands Found Primitive, And Natives Friendly

The Tonga Islands are sometimes called Friendly Islands, and Jackie and Bob Harp found the natives were indeed friendly, though in many ways still primitive. Here is continued Jackie's account of a missionary trip to Tonga, from their own island home at Pago Pago.

Our friends greeted us in the Tongan manner of touching the right cheek as you shake hands—a very charming greeting. We piled into a small car and took off down the left side of the road, honking vigorously at every crossroad, of which Nuku'alofa has many.

I was amused to see motorcycle-type carts on three wheels used for taxis, tearing around corners, beeping little horns.

There are no lights, or stop signs and when I inquired, was told the people "do as they please" traffic-wise. A strange sight was people dressed in black, wrapped in a large mat, riding a bicycle down the road. When we arrived at Pulu and Lita's house they made us comfortable in their own family house and settled their own large family in a small place nearby.

The house we stayed in was about 15 feet long with closed-in sides and a thatched roof. The walls and ceiling were newly papered with magazines and newspapers, and floors were laid with mats that had a fresh, new fragrance.

The homemade mattress on the floor was covered with the family's finest handwork. When dark closed in about us, a kerosene lamp was lit and netting hung about the bed.

I was delighted to find the shower enclosed in a wooden stall, and enjoyed counting the days with a fat mother hen, as she sat nesting on a shelf nearby! We were both proud when 10 fluffy chicks emerged from their little prisons of shell to brighten the day with their chirping.

The bathroom was the same style as great-grandmother Gullick had in her back yard. The cook house and eating fole was thoughtfully furnished with a table and benches, and a number of ladies busied themselves with food preparation during our visit. Tonga abounds with the lovely fresh fruits and vegetables we see so little of in Samoa.

Drink Made From Roots

Kava is a non-alcoholic drink that plays a very important part in the Polynesian culture and especially so in Tonga. The pounding of the kava root could be heard from the moment we

arrived until the hour of our departure. The natives seem to have no need for uninterrupted sleep as we do, and often we would awaken during the night and hear our friends nearby singing together softly, and the thump, thump, thump of a rock pounding kava roots. This is the way to honor a guest.

Every afternoon I taught the small children to sing Bible school songs in English, and told flannel-graph stories through an interpreter. They loved the pictures and often I would look up to see several grown men thoroughly enjoying the story time.

Each night Bob held services in the thatched roof church building while we sat cross-legged on the mats.

Often the services lasted two hours and I felt my legs would never be the same again.

The Tongan singing has a most impassioned sound and helped dispel my thoughts of discomfort as the people gave themselves wholeheartedly to the worship of God.

Many nights a truck was filled and we drove to a fresh water pond, where in the flickering lantern light we witnessed the beautiful act of baptism. Thirty-nine were added to the church

B. 227, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session, this Commissioners' Court is empowered to initiate the election for the creation of the MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, and it is the opinion and judgment of this Court that said election should be ordered, therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS:

THAT an election be held in said County on the 23rd day of April, 1966, which date is not less than thirty (30) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified property taxing electors for their action thereupon:

"SHALL a Hospital District, with boundaries identical with those of Motley County, Texas, be created and established with the authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed SEVEN-

FIVE CENTS (75c) on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property within such District for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's bonds and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

THE SAID election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article IX of the Constitution, and H. B. 227, Acts of the 59th Legislature, Regular Session 1965, and all persons who are resident qualified property taxing electors of said County (the area of the proposed District) shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS further ordered that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed upon such ballots shall appear the following:

FOR THE CREATION OF THE MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS VALUATION USING MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS VALUES AND THE MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS, TAX ROLL"

"AGAINST THE CREATION OF THE MOTLEY COUNTY HOSPITAL DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS (75c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS VAL-

UATION USING MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS VALUES AND THE MOTLEY COUNTY, TEXAS, TAX ROLL"

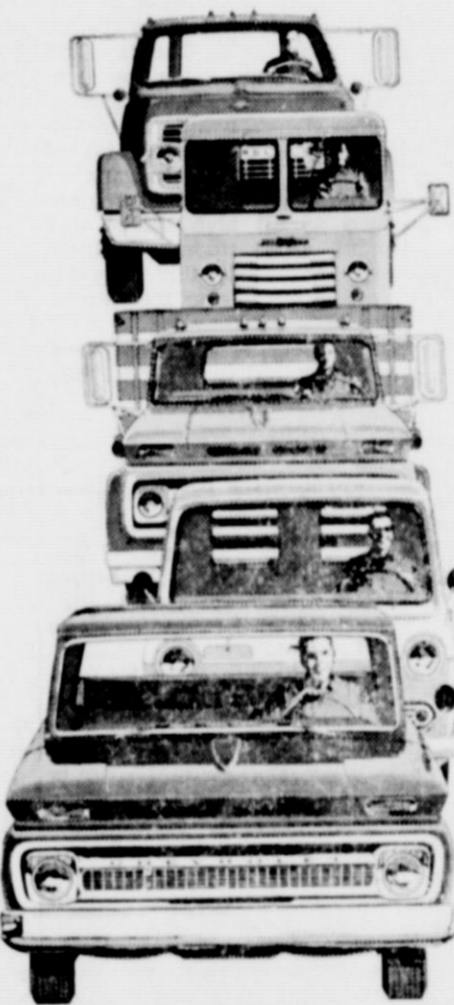

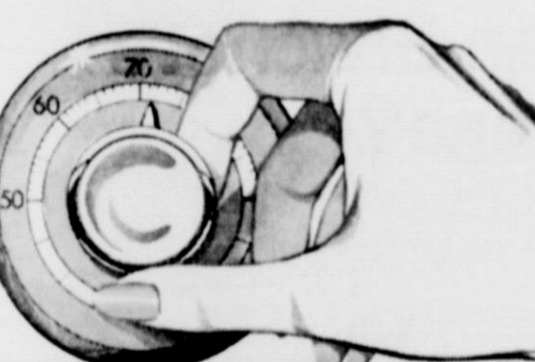
