## Candidate Profile

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following is a profile on some of our Candidates for City Council, Mayor, Hospital Board and School Board. Comment was not available from all Candidates. We hope that you read each one of these and remember to Vote on Saturday, May 5.

Gale Stafford, 47, is seeking a place on the Matley County School Board of Trustees.

He was born in Matador and attended Elementary School in Roaring Springs and High School in Matador. He received a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration with a major in Accounting from Texas Christian University in Ft. Worth. He and his wife, Lindy, have two sons, Wesley and David.

He is a self-employed Farmer and Rancher and has recently sold his business Stafford Farm Store, which he owned and operated for approximately 10 years.

"I am running for this position for several reasons. I was born and raised in Matley County and graduated from our school system. I chose to return here to raise my family because I believe our school is a quality educational facility. Because of my accounting background, I have an expertise to offer in financial concerns of the school board. I have run a business in Matley County successfully for the past 10 years, which should be of benefit in running the largest business in our community, our school. I served on the board beginning in the spring of 1979. I enjoyed being a part of a board which has as its basic concern the welfare of Matley County children. As an individual who shares this concern, I would like the opportunity to serve again to insure our children of a quality education."

"It is my belief that in a community the size of Matley County, a school and its community are one and the same. I would like to be in a position to insure that the people of Matley County and their school work closely together to meet the needs of our children. I feel that a successful school operation must include parental and professional cooperation to guarantee that a child's educational, social, and moral values are strong. I would work to make the School Board a link between those concerned that will provide future success for all of our students. The air of professionalism which enhances our faculty, administration, and staff is something which I would encourage in order to meet the needs not only of the children but the parents and the community as well.

Gary Luther Lancaster, 45, is seeking re-election for Mayor for the city of Matador.

He was born in Matador and graduated from Matador High School. He received BBA from Midwestern State University with an accounting major. He and his wife, Carolyn, have two children, Shanna and Wendy. He is a veteran and a member of the Matador Lions Club and various professional organizations.

Mr. Lancaster is a self-employed Certified Public Accountant and his wife is also self-employed, owning Guy's & Gal's Department Store in Matador.

Mr. Lancaster stated, "There are two critical events that will be taking place in the next term - the administration of the sewer grant of \$250,000 awarded by the Texas Department of Commerce, and the issue of how to best comply with the new solid waste regulations which are scheduled to be released by the Environmental Protection Agency this summer. I realize that all city ad valorem taxpayers (including myself) want to keep the taxes on their residences as low as possible and also keep the water, sewer, and garbage rates as reasonable as possible. Certainly this is a requirement for local businesses to be able to compete with Lubbock and Plainview. I have been involved in the discussion and review of these items for several years both as a mayor and as an auditor for several area counties, school districts, and cities. I believe I am qualified to help complete and solve these problems in the best interests of the City of Matador and its residents."

When asked if he had any plans or ideas to help better our present system, Mr. Lancaster stated, "If you define system as the city's policies and procedures, I don't have any new plans or proposals to attempt to impose on the citizens of Matador. Most of the City's policies have evolved over a period of many years, city councils, and mayors. As a group, they have stood the test of time quite well, and I would be reluctant to make any frivolous changes. That is not to say that new

circumstances might make changes desirable. If so, the benefits and costs of these new policies should be examined and a decision made by the city government whether or not to implement the new policies. New changes should benefit the most citizens possible at the least possible cost to the taxpayers."

"During my 8 years as Mayor I believe I have been responsive to all legitimate complaints or suggestions. At the same time, I realize a public official can't please all of the citizens all of the time, and there are a few that a public official can't please any of the time.

I certainly don't think I, as Mayor, have been entirely responsible for all improvements the City has made over the past few years. These improvements have been the result of the efforts of many individuals including private citizens, city employees, the City Council, and the Mayor. These improvements include: 1) The acquisition of federal grants in the amount of \$1,286,200 which have been used for water, sewer, and street improvements and recovery from the tornado, 2) The installation and use of accounting controls and the budgeting process by the City, 3) Improvements to City Hall, 4) Relining the city water tower, 5) General upgrading of all City equipment, 6) Increased allocations to the Matley County Library and the Matador Fire Department, 7) Acquisition and subsequent demolition of the old theater and the old apartment buildings, 8) Purchase and use of computer equipment for financial records and water billings, and 9) The use of dumpsters maintained by the City instead of burning barrels maintained by each resident.

Most importantly, these items were accomplished without incurring any debt, and in fact, increasing cash reserves over 100%."

When asked what his feelings on Economic Development for Matador and Matley County, Mr. Lancaster stated, "As far as the City's role in development, I believe the most important thing the City can do is offer good water, sewer, garbage collection, and living conditions at the lowest possible cost to the taxpayer and get out of the way. I know it is quite popular for some city governments to subsidize new businesses (at the expense of the present taxpayers), however I do not personally think that is a proper function of city government. I believe this need could be best served by some type of citizen's group, such as an Industrial Development Board or a Chamber of Commerce which could be assisted as much as possible by the City. These private organizations also have an advantage in that they are less incumbered by government regulations (such as competitive bidding requirements, nepotism, etc). The big problem, as always, is getting enough people interested and involved.

Vann Francis, 47, is seeking a position on the Matley County School Board of Trustees.

He was born in Wichita Falls and attended school in Wichita Falls and Texas Tech in Lubbock.

He is married to the former Sandra Stevens and has lived in Matley County for 29 years.

He is a self-employed rancher and farmer.

Mr. Francis stated, "I feel that our school board could benefit from a member(s) that does not have school age children. As a former board member (with school age children), I have come to the conclusion that an unbiased viewpoint could be advantageous for all concerned, and as taxpayers, we should all be involved in giving our students the best possible education for our tax monies."

According to Texas Association of School Board guidelines, school board functions include:

Setting annual educational and financial goals for the school system.

Adopting and evaluating educational policies.

Hiring and evaluating at least annually a superintendent and delegating all administrative duties to this chief executive officer.

Serving as a bridge between the community and the school.

Developing and practicing characteristics of effective service, statesmanship and leadership skills.

If I am elected to serve as your school board member, I will do my best to see that the above guidelines are followed, and decisions that are made are in the best

interest of our students, teachers, and community, as the school board represents you as a community and the decisions made will affect each of us.

Debra (Garrison) Scott, 37, is seeking a place on the Matley County School Board of Trustees.

She was born in Matador to C.D. and Evelyn Garrison. She attended school in Matley County, graduating in 1971. She then attended a Business College in Lubbock.

She is married to Johnny Scott and they have two sons, Jody 13, and Scotty 11. She is the owner and operator of Matador Floral.

When asked her reason for running for this position, Mrs. Scott stated, "I am interested in seeing that our children get the best education our community has to offer and I feel that a woman's view is beneficial in the decision making process."

"Since our school is in transition, I feel we need to stress a positive attitude and to develop communication and cooperation among personnel."

"After being in business in the community and serving in leadership positions in several youth activities, I feel I am aware of the needs of both groups and can promote growth that is beneficial to both."

Shane Stevens Jones, 35, is seeking a position on the Matador City Council.

She was born and raised in Matador. She is the daughter of John Stevens and the late Helen Stevens. She graduated from Matador High School in 1972. She and her husband, Jerry, have two children, a daughter, Lisa, 15 and a son, Lee, 12.

Mrs. Jones has been owner and operator of Matador V&S Variety since 1984.

When asked her reason for running for this position, Mrs. Jones stated, "I would like to see our community spruced up and to bring business back to Matley County."

"As a business owner, I have realized how many travelers like to browse in small towns. We have a lot of unique features in our town that we can all be proud of - so let's see what we can do to enhance what we already have - a little love, a little labor and a lot of pride can go a long ways toward a great community. Let's advertise what we have to offer - others will like it too! Clean air, low crime rate, safe place for our children and retirees, low cost of living, lots of friendly people. These people browsing in our town may want to move or possibly locate a business here, let's revive Matador!"

Randy Barton, 33, is seeking a position on the Matley County School Board of Trustees.

He was born in Magnolia, Arkansas. He attended Iowa Park High School, U.S.C. in Los Angeles, California, Midwestern in Wichita Falls.

He and his wife, Bonita have two children, Lanie, a 5th grader and Jason, 3rd grader.

Mr. Barton is the Vice President of Quail Pipe Corporation in Roaring Springs.

When asked what his feelings on Economic Development for Matador and Matley County, Mr. Green stated, "We need to take an inventory to see what we can offer a potential investor, and have a package ready. ## Fire Takes The Life Of Matador Woman

A house was partially destroyed and one woman died in a fire which began at approximately 10:00 a.m. Monday, April 30 in Matador.

Fernanda Martinez, 18, was succumbed by fire while she slept in her bedroom on the back of the house.

The Martinez family were renting the house from Bill Dunning.

According to Rodney Williams, Fire Chief, the Fire Department received a call about 10:30 a.m. for a house on West Dundee Street. The fire was fully enveloped in the back of the house. The Fire Department had the fire under control within 5 minutes. "The fire apparently

was started by an electrical short," stated Fire Chief Williams, "while three women and two small children slept." One of the small children woke up two of the ladies and they got out. Apparently the children's mother, Fernanda Martinez was unable to get out and died of smoke inhalation.

According to Fire Chief, Rodney Williams, this is the first fire death in 16 years.

## El Progreso Club Enjoys Christian Music And Poetry

The El Progreso Club met April 27, 1990 in the home of Mrs. Harold (Grace) Campbell where Springtime was showing its colors to all who attended. The air was clear, the grass was green, the wildflowers were blooming and the trees beginning to leaf out letting us know Spring was here and inviting us to enjoy God's wonders.

The meeting was called to order by the club president, Mrs. Joe (Loys) Campbell written care of the usual business. She then presented Rachel Patton who was program leader for the day. She, in turn, introduced club member, Mrs. Robert (Joan) Dickson who presented a program on "Christian Hymns and Poetry."

Mrs. Dickson opened the program with the thought, "We cannot study Christian writing and music without walking the paths of God." She prepared the audience by playing an excerpt of a tape of beautiful religious music, then, after her declaration of what Christian music and poetry is, one of George Beverly Shea's to set the mood of the afternoon. Mrs. Dickson told of a meeting in Portsmouth, VA in 1957 of the Ministerial Association of the Methodist Church which began its meeting with a Hymn Festival. The director, Ernest K. Emunian, who wrote a book entitled "Forty True Stories of Famous Gospel Songs" chose the topic for the festival "Hymns of All Churches." He related to the group assembled how we are indebted to all denominations for our hymns. For example: from the Baptist Church - "He Leadeth Me"; from the Presbyterian - "This Is My Father's World" and "O Love That Wilt Not Let Me Go"; from the Episcopalian, "Abide With Me" and "Holy, Holy, Holy"; from the Lutheran, "A Mighty Fortress is Our God"; from the Jewish religion we have "The Lord Is My Shepherd" which was enhanced by a tape, making it much more impressive; from the Catholic, "Jesus, the Very Thought of Thee"; the Unitarian, "Nearer My God to Thee"; Quaker, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind"; and the Salvation Army Worker the famous "Old Rugged Cross" with a beautiful taped arrangement of that. The speaker at this meeting, a Christian Church minister, could not think of one from his denomination until late in the evening when he happened to recall "The Way of the Cross Leads Home" written by Jessis Brown Pounds. Another of her reknown hymns is "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere."

An interesting point was rather humorous when Mrs. Dickson spoke of Margaret McKay who, in 1832, with a group of her friends visited a cemetery and read on one tombstone: "Here Lies My Wife, Smanatha Proctor; She had a cold and wouldn't doctor; She couldn't stay, she had to go. Praise God from whom all blessings flow." Another time Margaret McKay saw a statement of three words which sum up more than the writers had said: The words were "Sleep

in Jesus." To her mind that was all that was necessary for when believers in the Lord die, they go to sleep in Him and when they awaken over on the other side they awaken in Him. She then recalled I Cor. 15:18, "fallen asleep in Jesus." She then penned "Asleep in Jesus" and the group was privileged to hear, by tape, a verse.

Not every hymn is written because of a dramatic experience. Some authors have written many, many poems and only a very few are worthy of publishing.

The hymn "Great Is Thy Faithfulness" is told by Bill Graham's book, "Crusader Hymn and Hymn Stories." George Brittain in 1954 at a Billy Graham Crusade.

Another incidence from the book of the Graham team comes from Tedd Smith relating the origin of "In My Heart There Rings a Melody" written by Elton M. Roth. During an evangelistic meeting in Texas Mr. Roth was walking on a hot summer afternoon near a cotton mill. The heat was oppressive and a church loomed into view. The door being open he went in to the empty building. It was quiet and upon entering this serene place he began singing "In My Heart There Rings a Melody," hurried to find paper and pencil, finished the song, both words and music. This tape was certainly enjoyed by all.

Billy Graham tells of the story of Ivory Palaces being written near his home in North Carolina. During a retreat at Montreat a famous evangelist spoke on the forty-fifth Psalm believing it a prophetic one which speaks of the relationship of Christ, the bridegroom, to His bride, the Church. The pianist, for the conference, a Brütsher, Henry Barraclough, while driving with friends one evening during the meeting thought about the four short phrases of a refrain that were taking shape in his mind. Taking a card from his pocket he wrote the first three stanzas using the evangelist's message. The tape of this inspirational hymn stirred all who hear it done by George Beverly Shea.

The last hymn Mrs. Dickson related was by Julia Ward who was born in N.Y. in 1819, married Dr. Samuel G. Howe, a wealthy philanthropist. They traveled over Europe, hobnobbing with such writers as Charles Dickens. During the Civil War she heard soldiers singing "John Brown's Body." Her pastor suggested she write different words and she did. During a quiet night she stayed up until it was finished. The verse was published in 1862 and we know it as "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory". The tape played proved a fitting end to a very thoughtful afternoon of remembered, loved hymns and poetry.

Rachel Patton closed with a timely thought by Helen Steiner Rice.

## TEXAS SENATE WEEK IN REVIEW

AUSTIN - After passing a wide-ranging \$555 million education reform bill last week, Texas lawmakers return to the Capitol Monday (April 30) to face the Governor's threatened veto and a court-imposed deadline to equalize funding in the state's public schools.

The education reform package, which includes the half-cent sales tax hike opposed by Governor Bill Clements, won easy passage last week in both legislative houses.

The Senate last week approved the joint conference committee's report on Senate Bill 1, the measure that spells out the education reforms, by a vote of 26-5. The reform bill cleared the House earlier by a vote of 80-57.

To fund the \$555 million reform bill, both legislative houses also passed last week the half-cent tax hike and measures to shift already-budgeted funds to education reform.

The controversial tax bill, which raises the state's sales tax rate from 6 to 6 1/2 cents per dollar, would bring in \$443 million. The budget transfer measures would add another \$114 million.

If Clements follows through on his threat to veto the bills, he will likely call lawmakers back immediately for a third special session on education reform this week.

Clements maintains that funds to finance court-ordered reforms can be found in his state budget. Last week, he said lawmakers might consider a state lottery to raise additional money.

Clements' promised veto will put the Legislature on a collision course with Tuesday's (May 1) court deadline.

Last year, the State Supreme Court gave the Legislature until May 1 to devise a plan to more evenly distribute education funding among rich and poor school districts. Failure to do so could result in a cutoff of money to the state's 1,068 school districts, and the possible closing of schools before the end of the school year in May.

To forestall that possibility, the House last week passed a bill that would allow schools immediate access to enough money to finish the school year if the governor and the Legislature fail to reach an accord on education reform.

The Senate has not yet acted on that bill, but may do so before the session ends at midnight Tuesday (May 1).

In other Senate action last week, Senator Bob McFarland (R-Arlington) was elected President Pro Tempore of the Senate. McFarland has announced plans not to seek re-election to a third Senate term.

the rain. I took him home, it took seven or ten minutes to do this.




