## Old Settlers Parade, Rodeo To Be Dedicated To Sheriff Jinks Wilson

The parade and rodeo which will be features of the 54th reunion of Motley and Dickens Old Settlers Association, August 25, 26 and 27, will be dedicated to the memory of former Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson. Sheriff Wilson was slain last November 12.

The parade is scheduled to start at 10 a.m. Thursday (Aug. 25) in downtown Roaring Springs, according to Don Warren, Parade Chairman. Empty saddles on horses led by family members will be in tribute to various deceased pioneers and cowboys.

Colorful Patton Springs band under the direction of Mrs. Ralph Marshall, is expected to lead the parade. Riding clubs, antique cars and floats will be other features of the parade which will end at the Pioneer Pavilion, where first place ribbons will be awarded. Rodeo performers will vie for spurs, buckles and three saddles. The calf roping

saddle will be made by Alvin Durham of Roaring Springs; Old Men's saddle by John Parker, Paducah and Team Roping saddle by Jimmy Woods, Paducah. Saddle tickets are being sold by Rodeo Queen candidates and the winner will be announced Saturday night. It was also announced by the parade chairman that the parking space in front of the pioneer pavilion is to be reserved for handicapped persons, who have had trouble in the past, in finding a place to park.

## Applicator Workshop And Examination Announced

Commercial and non-commercial applicators interested in training programs for the categories Field Crop Pest Control, Fruit and Vegetable Pest Control and Weed and Brush Control will have an opportunity to participate in a workshop, scheduled for August 23 - 25, at the Texas Electric Service Company, 900 Scott St., Wichita Falls, Tex.

The initial workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, August 23 and include subject matter applicable to all categories of commercial and non-commercial applicators. The afternoon session will cover Field Crop Pest Control, followed by Fruit and Vegetable Pest Control the morning of the 24th and Weed and Brush Control the afternoon of the 24th.

The examination is set for the morning of the 25th. Custom applicators have until Oct. 21 to become certified.

The workshop is not a requisite to certification as a commercial or non-commercial applicator, but is only an aid to pass the test. County Agent Bill Pallmeyer states that persons planning to attend the workshop may preregister by contacting Emory Boring, Area Entomologist, Box 2159, Vernon, Tex. 76384.

A Junior Rodeo Ass'n. Play Day and open show at halter was set for Saturday, September 10, at the Roaring Springs Old Settlers Arena, it was announced following a meeting Friday night of officers and directors of the Motley County 4-H Junior Rodeo Association. The meeting was held in the Commissioners court room at the courthouse.

The open show at halter will feature mares and geldings in several classes, followed by Western Pleasure, reining, barrel racing, pole bending, and flag races.

Competition will be in three age groups in all except halter, it was announced. These will be Pee Wee, 11 years and under; junior 12 through 15; and senior, 16 through 18.

John Stotts will serve as judge of the show. It was ruled that contestants must ride only one horse during the riding events.

The play day events will start at 10 a.m. and entry fees will be \$3.00 for halter and \$4.00 for each event in riding classes.

Buckles will be given for 1st place riding events; plaques for 1st at halter events; 2nd place winners will receive rosettes, and ribbons will be given through 5th places.

The public is invited to attend the rodeo and there will be no admission charge.

A historical marker for the railroad depot at Roaring Springs will be dedicated Thursday afternoon, August 25, following the business session of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association, according to an

announcement from Predicta Study Club this week. The study club, with the cooperation of the Roaring Springs Lions Club will again serve barbecue at the depot at the noon hour, at \$2.50 per serving.

Also sponsored by Predicta Club will be an Arts and Crafts fair in the grade school. Booths for displays may be reserved by contacting Mrs. J. M. (Lavoie) Thacker.

Congressman Jack Hightower indicated earlier that he would make the dedicatory address for the depot marker, according to Mrs. Howard Traweck, Chairman of the Motley County Historical Commission. Efforts to reach him this week, however, had failed, and his appearance had not been confirmed late Wednesday.

The Roaring Springs depot was completed within a year of the laying of the Quanah, Acme and Pacific railroad in 1913, and the town of Roaring Springs was platted in 1912, one year before the tracks reached this point.

The railroad handled passenger and freight traffic until 1971. The depot, Roaring Spring's oldest structure, was purchased by the city in 1972 and has been in use as a museum and community center since that time.

## Fortenberry Gets Death Penalty

Larry Cornell Fortenberry, 29, of Mount Herman, La., Friday received the death penalty for the slaying last November 12, of Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson.

The trial was held in Plainview on a change of venue from Matador. The sentence was reached after a 30-minute deliberation by a jury composed of

eight women and four men, which had issued a verdict of guilty of capital murder on Thursday after they had deliberated about two hours and 10 minutes.

The courtroom was charged with emotion during the final two days of the trial as witnesses testified and both the prosecution and defense presented summations before Dist. Judge George Miller of 110th District Court.

## Boys Ranch Rodeo September 4-5

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, thirty-six miles northwest of Amarillo, 370 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-third annual Boys Ranch Rodeo.

Practice rides on the broncs and bulls have been going on since June with only about 150 riders expected to appear in the Ranch's rodeo arena over the Labor Day week end. They will be competing in bareback bronc riding, Brahma bulls, steers, calves and even stick horses for the

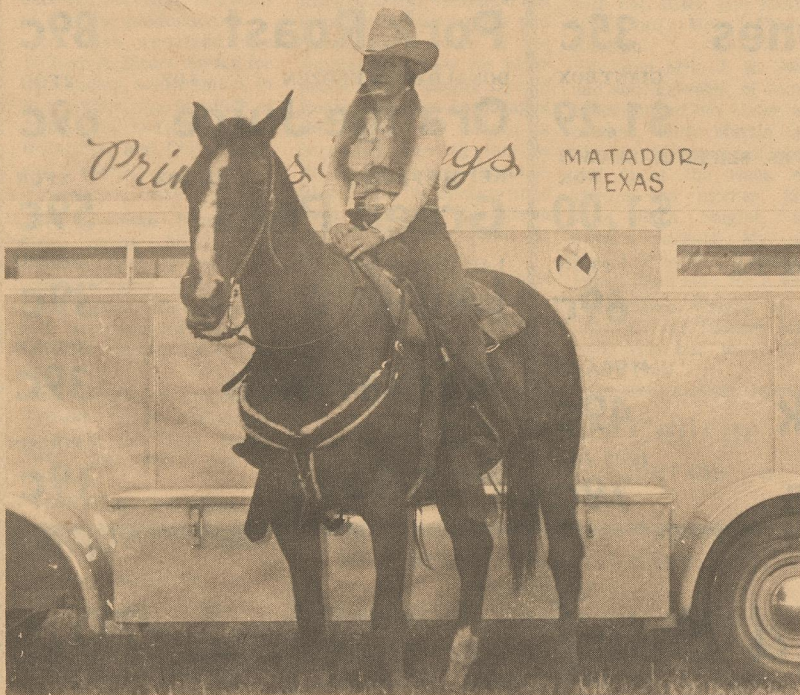
three-to-six-year-olds. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules are the only contestants. About 10,000 people are expected to drive to the Ranch for the event.

Approximately 3,000 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was started in 1939, and the rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. Some of the graduates and their families travel long distances to attend.

An added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.50. Reserve box seats at \$2.50 will be on sale at the Boys Ranch Office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$.75 for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 2:30 p.m. each afternoon, September 4 and 5.

## County Oil Production Vital To Energy Needs

## Food Important In Diabetes Control

Diabetes affects four to five per cent of the population. It can be defined as a condition in which the body does not have enough of the hormone insulin produced by the pancreas.

Food plays an important part in the control of diabetes, state Tina Willmann, Asst. County Extension Agent-at-Large. Diabetes may be treated by diet alone, by diet and insulin administration or by diet and oral drugs.

Diets for treating diabetes are designed to be nutritionally adequate and consist mainly of a reduction of carbohydrates.

Carbohydrates are spaced throughout the day to reduce the strain of impaired carbohydrate metabolism. The nutrient needs and variety of foods are the same for the diabetic and the non-diabetic. The carbohydrate in each meal is distributed according to the type of insulin being used and is modified according to the individual's needs (height, weight, age, sex, and activity) to insure that carbohydrates are used at regular intervals. In the diabetic diet, the carbohydrate is constant in quantity.

The doctor prescribes the diabetic diet to be followed. The most commonly used diabetic diet is the Food Exchange Lists System. This system can add variety to

meal planning. The foods are grouped into six food choice or substitution lists (milk, vegetables, fruits, bread, meat and fats) according to the amounts of carbohydrates, protein and fat. Each list includes a wide selection of foods that can be substituted freely within the list and still supply the same quantities of nutrients. All foods included in the lists are in measured amounts. Most foods are measured after they are cooked.

The person with diabetes should be careful about the kind and amount of food he eats. Concentrated sweets, such as pies, colas, candy, jelly, contain large quantities of sugar. These can be used only as directed by your physicians, Miss Willmann also noted, nutrition information on the label should be read to determine the amounts of carbohydrates, protein and fat in the food. This will help to determine relative amounts of nutrients in some of the new foods and convenience foods. You should also consult your physician or dietitian concerning the use of certain new "sugar free or fat free foods."

A positive attitude toward a diabetic diet helps. Learn to select the allowed foods on food lists whether eating at home, in a restaurant, in a friend's home or when traveling.

The massive energy needs of this nation continue to grow in the face of declining crude oil and natural gas production in Texas and nationwide. Because of this, Motley County's 1976 petroleum production was as important as in any year since production began in 1957.

Economic conditions within the county were improved substantially by the marketing of crude oil and natural gas with an estimated value of \$2,540,500, according to a report prepared by the staff of the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

Jack S. Blanton of Houston, president of the Association, said, "The decline in Texas' oil and gas production makes it imperative that Congress adopt policies which will encourage more exploration and drilling in the nation's No. 1 energy state. This is a facet of the energy supply problem that President Carter has not dealt with in his proposals."

According to figures from the U.S. Bureau of Mines, Texas' crude oil production last year was approximately 1,189,719,000 barrels down from 1,221,929,000 barrels in 1975, and the fourth consecutive year of decline from 1972's all-time high of just over 1.3-billion barrels.

Natural gas production, estimated by the Bureau at 7,192,371 MMcfs, also was

down from the 1975 figure of 7,485,764 MMcfs. Texas gas production also peaked in 1972 -- at 8,657,840 MMcfs -- and has fallen each year since.

Blanton said that drilling starts and expenses reached all-time highs in Texas last year and noted that this was directly attributable to a free market for intrastate natural gas. He also pointed out that a five-year lag time exists between increased drilling activity and increases in proved reserves.

Motley was one of 200 Texas counties last year which produced crude oil and natural gas with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more, the same number as in 1975. The county ranked 171st in the total estimated value of petroleum produced, realizing \$2,509,250 from the sale of 308,639 barrels of crude oil; \$31,250 from the sale of 40,750 Mcf of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county totaled an estimated \$317,560.

## Modified Diets - Following A Diet Plan

Many families have at least one family member following a modified diet that has been prescribed as a part of medical treatment by the family physician, according to Tina Willmann, Asst. County extension Agent-at-Large.

The homemaker must remember when adapting family meals to meet a specific diet that individuals throughout life have a need for the same basic nutrients.

The amount of these nutrients needed is influenced by age, size, activity and state of health. These nutrients are classified into broad groups of carbohydrates, protein, fat, vitamins

and minerals.

Food from the four food groups provide the nutrients required in a wholesome diet; Milk - two or more 8 oz. serving; Meat - two or more servings; Vegetable - Fruit - four or more servings - and Bread-Cereal - four or more servings.

The modified diet is one based on the normal well-planned diet and redesigned to meet the requirements of a given situation. The diet may be modified in various ways.

There may be modification of individual nutrients such as carbohydrates or proteins, or modification of caloric value, of consistency, of

preparation, or number of meals, or of a combination of these, noted Miss Willmann. The family physician prescribes the diet for a particular condition. The duration of the diet may be for a short or long term depending upon the diagnosis. The person assisting with the diet needs to be familiar with the basic diet pattern and general characteristics of the diet.

A modified diet should never be self-prescribed but should be followed only upon the advice of a physician. An effort should be made to plan familiar foods for each individual's special diet.

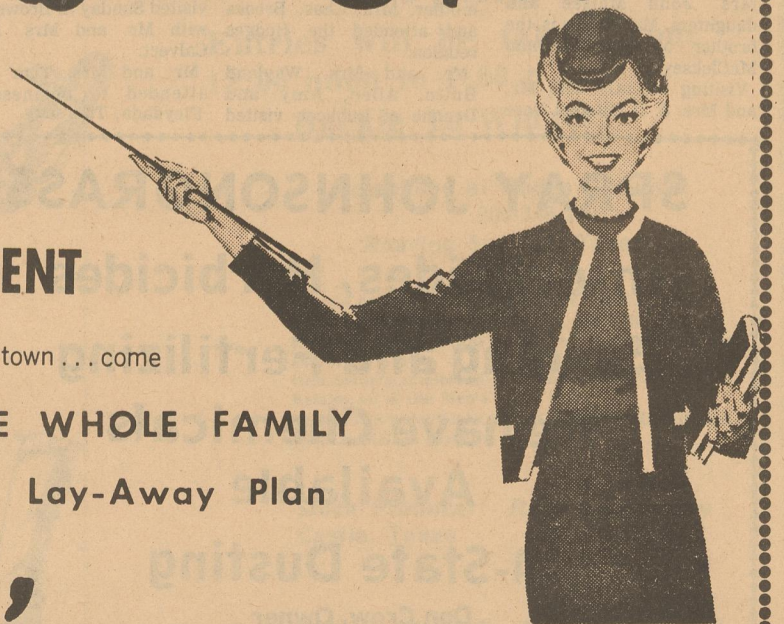

### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

The small grains test planted by Susie Marshall and me has been harvested, and yield information obtained. The old leader, Tascosa, didn't come out on top this year, but the yield was still good. Following are the yields in bu. - ac. and forage yields in lbs. per acre for the varieties included in the 1976-77 test.

**WHEAT** - Trison, 52.0 and 4550; Wichita++ 39.2 & 3400; DeKalb 582, 37.0 and 3220; Yukon, 36.0 and 3810; Sage, 36.0 and 2870; Baca, 35.7 and 3140; Wichita, 34.2 and 2930; Lancota, 33.8 and 3450; Larned, 33.7 and 2620; Kirwin, 33.2 and 3330; TAM 103, 32.7 and 2390; Tascosa, 32.0 and 3580; Triumph, 31.8 and 2730; Osage, 31.0 and 2550; Sturdy, 30.5 and 2620; Wichita+ 29.7 and 2670; Nicoma, 29.3 and 2940; Triumph+ 28.8 & 2650; Palo Duro++ 28.7 & 2680; Harpool 447, 28.3 & 2300; Scout 66, 28.0 & 2610; DeKalb H-20, 27.5 & 2600; Harpool 896 27.2 and 2780; Palo Duro, 27.2 and 2710; Buckskin, 26.8 and 2290; Agent, 26.8 and 2270; Rall, 26.8 and 2010; Russian HPRF 1, 26.5 and 4280; Funk 335, 26.5 and 2560; TAM 101, 26.2 and 2660; Scout, 26.2 and 2380; Fox, 26.0 and 3140; Caddo+ 26.0 & 2600; Agent+, 26.0 and 2300; Improved Triumph, 25.3 and 2250; Funk 332, 25.2 and 2340; Danne, 25.0 and 2050; Harpool 889, 24.7 and 2320; Pronto, 23.8 and 3190; Centurk, 23.8 and 1820; Caddo, 23.7 and 2330; DeKalb 581, 23.7 and 2170; Concho, 22.7 and 2260; Caprock, 21.0 and 2080; Sentinel, 20.5 and 1580; and Egale, 17.7 and 1760.

Wheat was planted at the rate of 49 lbs. per acre, except Wichita and Palo Duro which are marked with ++. It should be noted that both varieties planted at 36 lbs. per acre, marked with ++, outyielded this variety planted at 49 lbs. per acre therefore for the type of year, it appears that 49 lbs. per acre was too much. The varieties with a + (Agent, Caddo, Triumph and Wichita) were treated with Vitavax 200, while the other seed of this variety was not treated. It can be noted that only the treated Caddo out produced the untreated similar seed.

A cross of wheat and wheatgrass 9290 produced 23.5 bu. per acre and 3740 lbs. per acre.

**RYE** - Elbon, 53.0 and 5380; Maton, 35.4 and 4520; Maton grew off a lot faster than any variety in the test, but in the final analysis, it was outproduced by Elbon. Rye was planted at the rate of 45 lbs. per acre.

**OATS** - Cimarron, 95.9 and 3080; Coker 422, 93.8 and 3080; Coker 234, 91.6 and 2590; Checota, 85.9 and 3880; TAM 312, 85.0 and 2810; Walken, 82.8 and 3550;

Arkwin, 80.0 and 4020; and Nora, 79.1 and 2470. It can be noted that Arkwin produced the most forage, and was the only variety of oats that didn't show some winterkill. Oats were planted at the rate of 60 lbs. per acre.

**BARLEY** Will, 55.0 and 3540. Barley was planted at the rate of 48 lbs. per acre. One variety of wheat, Westar, didn't come up.

Is should also be noted that in all cases except oats, the leading grain variety was also the leading forage variety. For oats, Arkwin, was the leader for forage, with Elbon rye producing the most forage of any variety under test.

The purpose of this test is to show what varieties will do when planted on similar land, at the same time, and other conditions the same. As much of the small grain grown in the county is for grazing, both yield and forage information is given with the hopes that producers will try varieties that are beating the variety they are planting. Only this way will producers find which is best for them.

All of the yields are higher than field yields as it is necessary to find solid soils of each variety for comparison, and we all know that fields are not that way.

So far Motley County has been lucky, and no screw worm cases have been confirmed in 1977, but don't let up now, as we still have our most dangerous time ahead.

Screw worm cases over the nation are down from the previous two years, and much of this success is contributed to the hard winter and the opening of a new sterile fly plant in Mexico.

Johnny Stevens, Matador, is Chairman of the local screw worm committee, but neither he nor I can help you get sterile flies dropped on your place unless you help. I am not going to insult your intelligence by telling you how to check for screw worms and treat them, but I am going to remind you of what to do if you find a case. Obtain a mailing kit from my office if you don't have one, and carry it with you when looking at the cattle. If worms are found, don't rely on your judgement as to whether they are maggots or screw worms. Try to collect 10 or more, place in the vial in the kit, fill out the information sheet which is enclosed, and mail to the lab in Mission. No postage is required. Also, dig deep into the wound to collect the worms, as often maggots will be near the surface, and screw worms be deeper and working in the live flesh.

In case screw worms hit in the county, this is the only way we can get some help. Most of you realize that the screw worm is not the problem it was before the start of the program. The only way the program can succeed is for ALL TO COOPERATE. One un-

reported case can result in a local outbreak, so please collect and submit samples even though you may think they are only maggots.

It won't be long before the diapause boll weevil control program starts, but it is possible that some may need to spray before this program takes over. To date there is one area at Roaring Springs that is nearing the economic level for applying controls.

Last year several Motley County producers found it necessary to spray before the start of the program, and one farmer, C. D. Herron in Fisher County found it necessary to start on July 12th when squares were one-third grown.

The treated field produced 412 pounds per acre, and another field 1/4 mile away which was planted the same day and to the same variety was not treated and only produced 192 pounds to the acre, representing a loss of \$129.80 per acre.

I am sure that local producers wouldn't like to

experience a loss like this which is a lot more than two or three applications at 3 to 5 day intervals would cost.

A meeting is scheduled in the Motley County School lunchroom Tuesday night Sept. 13th starting at 8:00 p.m. that should be of benefit to boys and girls who plan to feed calves for the Jr. Livestock Show which is set for March 20, 1978.

Dr. Whitney Rounds, Area Livestock Specialist, Vernon, will present a program on selection, care, training and feeding that should be of interest to cattlemen, parents and leaders as well as 4-H and FFA members.
