Murder Trial Underway

The capital murder trial of Larry C. Fortenberry for the shotgun slaying last Nov. 12 of Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson, is underway in Plainview. It was believed the state could rest its case against the defendant, yesterday according to Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reporter Frank Patrick, who has been covering the trial, which started Monday. A partial report of the trial, taken from Patrick's story in Wednesday's Avalanche-

Journal is as follows:

After a chilling account of Sheriff Jalmor "Jinks" Wilson's murder by a confessed participant, prosecutors Tuesday began to introduce physical evidence and corroborative testimony which they hope will cinch the capital murder conviction of Larry C. Fortenberry. It was believed the state could rest its case against the flame-haired defendant today.

In the first two days of testimony, three persons have made courtroom identifications of Fortenberry, a lean 29-year-old six-footer, as a man they saw use, or threaten to use, a sawed-off shotgun. Fortenberry, accused of the Nov. 12, 1976 shotgun slaying of Wilson, veteran Motley County sheriff, is on trial here (Plainview) after a change of venue from Matador before 110th Dist.

Judge George Miller and an eight-woman, four-man jury. If the jury convicts him of the capital murder charge, it will assess Fortenberry either the death penalty or life imprisonment.

Both Matador resident John Rogers, who was shot while with the sheriff, and an Amarillo service station operator, A. H. Jackson, have pointed at Fortenberry as a man who carried a shotgun, with Rogers also identifying him as the person who shot Wilson.

But the most dramatic testimony in the trial has come during a six-hour stint on the witness stand by Stacy Albert Carter, Fortenberry's reputed former companion, who agreed to turn state's evidence in return for a 40-year sentence on the reduced charge of murdering Wilson. As a part of the deal, Carter also pleaded guilty in exchange for a 20-year term to the attempted murder of Rogers, with the two terms to be served concurrently.

Carter said he and Fortenberry had robbed an Amarillo service station in the early morning hours of Nov. 12 and were looking for license tags to steal because they felt attendants had noted the license number on their car. The witness said they were in the process of switching plates from Rogers' car, parked by the side of U.S. 70 about three miles east of Matador, when Wilson, accompanied by Rogers, drove up. The sheriff identified himself as a peace officer, according to Carter and started questions. According to Carter, Fortenberry suddenly said, "I've had enough of your (deleted) questions." He said Fortenberry reached inside the car and came up with a shotgun. He said Fortenberry shot the sheriff in the chest from a distance of two or three feet. With the eyes of jurors, Fortenberry and Wilson's widow, who has been present throughout proceedings, riveted on him, Carter said Fortenberry then moved in to finish off the 61-year-old lawman.

"The sheriff tried to get toward his car. Larry followed behind him and shot him in the lower back," Carter said.

Many friends of the late sheriff and his family have been attending the trial with Mrs. Wilson, her children and other relatives. A number of Matador residents were called as witnesses when the trial opened Monday.

Wheat Target Price Set
Congressman Jack Hightower announced the increase in the target price for wheat passed by the Congress last week will mean additional payments to wheat farmers of approximately \$95,560.96 in Motley County. This figure is an estimate based on the county allotment and the historical yield.

The House passed the 1977 Agricultural Act Thursday with the 1977 target price for wheat set at \$2.90 per bushel. The corn target and loan were raised to \$2.00 per bushel for the 1977 crop. The current wheat target is \$2.47 per bushel and the House committee had approved a \$2.65 per bushel level.

"When you consider that 'new money' in our local economy will turn over an estimated seven times, it is clear what this 43c per bushel increase means in dollars and cents to this county and the entire Northwest Texas area," stated Hightower. He went on to point out that although during consideration of the farm bill in the Livestock and Grain Subcommittee he had worked for a \$3.20 per bushel figure, the

State Representative Phil Cates has officially announced his intention not to seek reelection.

Cates is completing his fourth term as State Representative from the 66th Legislative District composed of Armstrong, Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Floyd, Gray, Hall, Motley, and Wheeler Counties.

"Landslide Cates," as he is referred to because of having

won his first primary election by having only two won his first primary election by only two votes, expressed his heartfelt appreciation to those who enthusiastically supported his throughout the eight years that he will have served as state representative.

"The one person who deserves more credit than anyone else for these years of service," Cates explained, "is my gifted wife, Nancy,

who is the mother of our three-year-old son Andy and our nine-month-old son John David. Even now," Cates continued, "Nancy encourages me to run for reelection for the House seat or for another higher office. Many have expressed disappointment that I would choose to leave the position of service that I have held for four legislative terms, and for their trust and this high compliment that they have given me, I am very grateful."

compromise figure will mean a good number of both farmers and local businesses will be able to continue to operate. "With every penny added to that target price," said Hightower, "fewer and fewer of our people will be forced to leave the farm."

Hightower has been one of several farm state Congressmen fighting for higher target and loan rates. Depressed prices in commodities like wheat and corn have created severe financial crisis in the farm sector. Hightower emphasized this to the members of Congress in a floor speech during the first day of debate on the farm bill. He referred to a report released in April of this year predicting over 3,000 Texas farmers would declare bankruptcy before the year was over.

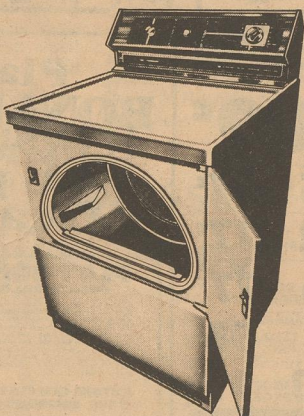
