Raymond L. Speer Promoted Recently

The promotion of Lieutenant Raymond L. Speer, 31, of Flomot to Lieutenant Commander in its commissioned corps has been announced by the Environmental Science Services Administration (ESSA).
Speer, who completed flight training at the U.S. Army Aviation School at Fort Rucker, Ala., in September 1965, is currently serving as copilot and navigator on an air photo mission of the Photogrammetry Division of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, an ESSA agency.

He was appointed in the commissioned corps in April 1959 following graduation from Texas Technological College with a degree in civil engineering. Following his first assignment with the Airport Surveys Branch of Photogrammetry Division, he was a junior officer aboard the Hydrographer, one of the agency's 13 ships.
In January 1963 he was transferred to the Geodesy Division, serving as chief of various triangulation field parties until June 1964 when he was made supervisor of geodetic operations in the Alaskan surveys which followed the Good Friday earthquake.

Funeral services will be held here at 10 a.m. Friday for Matthew Leander Barkley, 39, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Barkley, who died about 10:00 a.m. Tuesday in the hospital at Macon, Georgia.
A Civil Service commission supervisor at Warner Robins Air Base, Barkley had been ill for about a week and entered the base hospital April 12. He was transferred to the Macon Hospital on Monday. Death, on April 19, was attributed to a cerebral hemorrhage.
Services were held in Macon, Wednesday, under direction of Lamar Christopher, funeral home. The body will be flown to Lubbock and brought here by Seigler Funeral Home, who is in charge of the local arrangements. Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery.
Services here will be at the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. James Hancock officiating.
Math, as he was known by friends here, was born February 16, 1927, at Matador. He graduated from Matador High School in 1944, and the following year he enlisted in the U. S. Navy, serving in the Pacific during 1945-46. Following his separation from the Navy, he attended Texas Technological College, Lubbock, receiving his degree in textile engineering in 1950. For several years he was employed by the Atlantic Cotton Mill in Macon. He was married there to Miss Johnnie Gilchrist, October 2, 1953. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

HOSPITAL VOTE IS SET SATURDAY

FOR THE SECOND TIME in less than a year, Motley County voters are going to the polls Saturday to vote on the creation of a hospital district. In addition to absentees (which closed Tuesday night) five polling places will be open. They are Northfield, Whiteflat, Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador. Seven absentee votes have been cast in the election. Second in a series of community meetings was held Tuesday night in the District court room, to explain the hospital district. County Judge Elbert Reeves explained the position of the Commissioners Court, which was required to call an election with as many as 100 names of property-owning voters on a petition. Between 400 and 500 requested the election.
Judge Reeves said the Commissioners had no interest in the election except to abide by the wishes of the people. "Our position is neutral," he said, "and if the hospital district is approved Saturday, we will appoint a five-man hospital board and thus end our involvement in the issue."
Reeves explained that it required a special act of the Legislature to provide the voting privilege (because the county has less than 10,000 population). He said also that in voting the district the people were in no way obligated to pay any additional taxes until a bond issue has been approved in a second election.
He said the district could be voted and lay dormant for any number of years unless a hospital bond issue is approved.
In the audience was Dr. J. S. Stanley, who has announced that he will close Stanley Hospital here on July 1. Talking briefly, he said:
"The privately owned hospital has passed from the scene. Lawyers do not build courthouses and preachers do not (Continued on back page)

Harp's Departure Home Delayed Five Days when Hurricane Hits

(Continuing the newsletters by Jackie and Bob Harp, from American Samoa, begun several weeks ago, and telling of a missionary journey to Tonga and their return to Samoa in the wake of a hurricane.)

It would be hard to match the hospitality of the Tongan people, and we enjoyed several outings that were carefully planned by our friends.

On one occasion we had tea with the daughter of a nobleman in her new home on a large coconut plantation. She is married to a doctor, who is the brother of Latu, one of our fine young men in the church.

Another day we had lunch with the uncle of Pulu, and it was a day to be remembered. He was once the boxing champion of Tonga and one of the men who was shipwrecked on Minerva Reef for 101 days. He showed us pictures and told the heartbreaking story of how his son died only minutes before the rescue.

Following a kava ceremony we were served a most sumptuous feast of roast pig, chicken, fish, palamas, taro, yam, sweet potato, giant taro and coconut, cool coconut milk.

As words of thanks faded, everyone began to eat the delicious food with great gusto, using their fingers.

The day of our departure came, and with it the news of the storm and flight cancellations, and we were crestfallen.

Bob explains: This occurred the day that Jackie was to fly back to Pago Pago. I had planned to stay one more week in Tonga to continue to teach and encourage the brethren. I decided to return with Jackie, but all flights to Tonga from Samoa were cancelled for one week. We took a ship to Apia, and had to wait 36 hours for the next flight. It took from Sunday to Friday night to get home.

The next three days seemed endless (Jackie continues) and finally the Matua steamed into the harbor. We booked passage on the freighter that transports bananas to W. Samoa and New Zealand and left that evening. The trip took two nights and a day and then we were delayed in Western Samoa for 36 hours, during which time our anxiety increased.

We had no idea if the children were safe, the conditions on the island, our house and many other questions entered our mind. Following a five day delay we arrived home to find the children well, but the island in an appalling state of devastation which I mentioned earlier.

From Bob's newsletter: There was, and still is a shortage of food and housing. Food is available in the stores, but the Samoan people will be very short of their native foods, such as breadfruit, taro, and bananas for a long time. Foods are being distributed, rice, flour and powdered milk, but to the Samoans this is not like having their native foods. Also, the money that they are now having to spend for food, really should be spent for shelter.

Milestones In March
March marks two milestones in our life. Bob has a birthday the 13th and the 14th begins our third year in Samoa.

On occasions we feel that we haven't accomplished much here, but then we're reminded that success can't always be measured in numbers. Our little church building was destroyed and we stand in need of our own meeting place. There are certain forces that oppose us here, and we pray that God will give us certain victories in this third year in Samoa.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Stockmen should be interested in watching some fertilizer tests that were applied on March 18th through the cooperation of Best Fertilizer Co., Plainview, Joe Collier of Rhone Flying Service, Roaring Springs, and J. C. Cross, Best Fertilizer dealer in Matador, aerial application of fertilizer was made on small tracts on the Harold Campbell Ranch and Birnie (John Barnhill) Ranch.

Recommendations for Barnhill was 30-0-0 and for Campbell, 20-40-0. Unfertilized area on the Campbell place will be checked against 10-20-0 and 20-40-0, while on Barnhill, untreated areas will be checked against 21-0-0 and 42-0-0.

The purpose behind these tests is to determine if it is economically practical to fertilize range land in this area. Tests have shown that it will pay in other areas, but no tests have been run in this area.

Clipping tests will be made to determine if there is any increase in grass production, and

forage analyses will be made to determine the quality of the grass. Signs will be erected to show the exact location of the demonstrations, and the public is invited to observe the visual results.

Dave Birnie, Bruce Marrs and I attended a meeting on brush control in Jayton on March 17th, so why not ask one of them about some of the things presented.

These items were some of the things discussed, and I think of your interest: 82% of digested beans sprout, while only 26% of those that drop on the ground sprout. 90% of the beans will pass through an animal within 42 to 60 hours, but week is required for all to pass. Rats, birds and winds also help spread beans to unfertilized areas.

Large drops are better for brush control than small, and mesquite plants should be left undisturbed at least 3 years to obtain maximum kill. Normally the best kills are obtained when the plant is dark green, and when moisture conditions are good. Rapid leaf drop may result in low percentage kills.

Most commissioned officers serve with Coast and Geodetic Survey, whose "white fleet" of 13 ships surveys coastal waters, searches for underwater hazards to navigation, makes gravity and magnetic measurements, conducts tidal and tidal current surveys, and engages in deep sea oceanographic research.
