## SBA's EIDL Loans Available in 16 Counties

LUBBOCK, -- The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has announced that small concerns in sixteen Texas Counties may now be eligible to apply for financial assistance under the Agency's Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) program.

Damages and losses caused by drought conditions prompted the disaster designation in King County (as well as 15 other counties not in the Lubbock District) according to Walter Fronstin, district director of Lubbock's SBA office.

"In addition to the 16 primary declared counties, numerous other counties are contiguous and may also be eligible for EIDL assistance," Fronstin said.

The adjacent or contiguous counties in the Lubbock District are Coke, Cottle, Dickens, Haskell, Knox, Motley, Runnels, and Sterling.

SBA is authorized to accept and process applications for EIDL loans from small business concerns without credit available elsewhere and from agricultural cooperatives without credit from

other sources. In addition to the credit elsewhere factors, Fronstin stressed that the program is available only to small businesses which meet SBA's size standards. "Agricultural enterprises are not eligible to apply for the EIDL loans," Fronstin said.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent.

"The deadline for filing applications under this EIDL declaration is September 11, 1989 subject to requirement changes of the Federal budget," Fronstin said.

The EIDL program is intended to assist agriculture-related businesses -- such as fertilizer and seed dealers or implement dealers, etc. -- who suffer a decrease in sales or other forms of economic injury directly attributable to the crop losses incurred by farmers to whom the dealer usually sells, or to the inability of farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels.

In addition to agri-dependent busi-

nesses, nurseries are also eligible to apply under this disaster declaration.

Small business owners claiming to have been injured by the general causes of the agriculture damages are not eligible for the EIDL loans.

"For example, the Secretary of Agriculture may designate a disaster due to excessive rainfall and flooding. For SBA's EIDL purposes, the object of the Secretary's designation is not the excessive rainfall and flooding; it is the agricultural damages caused by such conditions. Therefore, a home builder who claims economic injury based on his inability to proceed with construction on schedule is not eligible for the EIDL loans -- the delay was not caused by the agricultural losses, but rather by the flood," Fronstin elaborated.

The Sheriff stated they have no definite clue as to the person or persons who is poisoning dogs. There is still great concern for the danger of a child getting the poison instead of a dog.

The Motley County Matadors finished the 1989 season Tuesday night in a game against Paducah. The Matadors went into the Paducah game with a season record of 11-13. On Tuesday, January 31, the Matadors were successful in defeating a strong Jayton team with a score of 64-58, but were unable to hold on to an 8 point first half lead against Spur on Friday, February 3. Final score of the Spur game was 60-71.

Clay Ewing scored a total of 8 points, Buster Steward 6 points, Roy Estrada 5 points and Rusty Willmon 2 points. ## Hospital Board Meeting Report

All Motley County Hospital Board members were present to attend to regular business February 7, 1989.

The minutes and bills were read and approved with concern about the high Clinic Building electricity. The outstanding bills were \$7,770.63 for January leaving a balance of \$38,280.97.

A report on the C.D. earning was given of \$1596.68 interest being earned in 1988.

Larry Hoyle reported on the 9-1-1 advisory committee meeting held last week. He stated there were approximately 788 phone lines in Motley County and that if the County Commissioners and City Council approve the preliminary study, that hopefully they can decide if Motley County could benefit from this program.

Hoyle reported that the museum committee would meet with a state man

this month to apply for a grant. Hoyle stated he had the water turned off in the old Traweck Hospital Building.

Hoyle and Lillie Crouch explained they had been approached by the Texas Welfare Department concerning an abandoned newborn baby with heart problems. In their application, the baby didn't comply for the indigent care program.

Crouch explained the executive director of SPHPO Henry Hawley had introduced some changes for the clinics, but after Crouch and Gerry Jones, R.N., F.N.P. talked to him, they would not apply to the Motley County Clinic.

The Board discussed looking into improving the heating and cooling system in the Clinic Building and trying to cut operating expenses.

Meeting adjourned.



-- assist with income tax preparation  
-- settle inheritance or business matters  
-- protect you from someone else's mistakes


In short, keeping household records can save you time, trouble, and money. Decide how to organize your household records.

The average family handles more than 1,000 bills, checks, receipts, letters, and documents each year. How do you know which ones are important to keep? To be worth keeping, a paper should serve at least one of these purposes:

-- provide legal evidence of a key transaction or event  
-- enable you to check on others' potential errors  
-- prove your ownership of property  
-- define your legal and financial rights  
-- ease management of your home and financial affairs.

Many papers could and should be discarded. Don't become a junk collector, but don't throw away valuable papers either. Know what family records to keep where and why.

Friends of the Library will be meeting here in the Community Room at 7:00 p.m. on February 16. When I called Francis Finch to invite her to the Board



Remember that Library school will meet February 14, Valentine's Day at 10:30.


We thank Shane Jones for giving some lovely books to us. We have several new adult nonfiction books and illustrated, paper back classics for young people: *The Time Machine*, *Captains Courageous*, *Sherlock Holmes*, *The Swiss Family Robinson*, *The Prince and The Pauper*, *Dr. Jeckyll and Mr. Hyde*, *The War of the Worlds*, and *The Man in the Iron Mask*.






points, Mat Linson had 4 and Bradley Jameson put in 3.





