D. H. Giddens Dies; Service Held Here

Funeral services for D.H. (Hub) Giddens, 75, were held Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Victor Crabtree, retired Baptist minister of Dickens and long-time friend of the family officiated.

Mr. Giddens, well-known area cowboy for many years, died about 11:30 p.m. Sunday in the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo. He had been a patient there since April 16. He was a veteran of World War I.

A resident of Matador the past 22 years, Giddens had resided in Dickens County from 1909 until 1944. He was married there to Miss Dressie Pierce, Feb. 22, 1920. He had worked for the Pitchforks, Matadors and other area ranches, and shortly before retiring he had worked for the late Mrs. W. (Aunt Pattie) Moore.

He was born Dallas Herbert Giddens August 4, 1890 in Dixie, Okla., and died May 1, 1966 at the age of 75 years, 8 months and 27 days.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. D. H. Giddens of Matador; two half-sisters, Mrs. Rebecca Ely, Hastings, Okla., and Mrs. Grace Ferguson of Comanche, Okla.; and several nieces and nephews.

Following the service here, the body was taken to Dickens Cemetery for burial. Segler Funeral Home, Matador was in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were Calvin Nimmo, David Keith, W. C. Deaton, Richard Turner, Raby Webb and Cliff Stephens.

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Primary Saturday

THE DAY of the voter is Saturday when Texans vote in the first Democratic primary. County residents will vote in five boxes at Northfield, Flomot, Whiteflat, Matador and Roaring Springs.

County and District Clerk Pat Sheridan said 27 absentee votes had been cast when absentee voting ended at 5 p.m. Tuesday. In the primary two years ago 45 absentee votes were cast. Largest vote getter in the 1964 election was Waggoner Carr, who received 1044 votes for Attorney General. Carr is now a candidate for US Senator.

Interest in the State Senator race is high with Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon pitted against Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, with third candidate James Ray of Hale County. Winner will take the enlarged 30th Sen. District from Wichita Falls to the New Mexico line.

Countywide the race for County Judge and Ex-officio County Superintendent is between Glen Brotherton and Bryan Cammack, both of Matador. At Roaring Springs, Milton Brooks, Omar Parks and Clyde Clifton are candidates for the office of County Commissioner, precinct 4. B. N. Owens is candidate of that precinct for the office of Justice of the Peace with J. D. Mitchell announcing as a "write-in" candidate for re-election to the same office.

W. D. Lipscomb and Furman Vinson are candidates for County Democratic Committeeman. Other candidates on district and county levels are unopposed.

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Hospital Board is Named

FIVE MEN were named Friday by the Commissioners Court as a board of directors of the Motley County Hospital District. They are: John Stevens, chairman, J.M. Hill representing Whiteflat, J.C. Franks representing Flomot, J.N. Fletcher representing Roaring Springs and J. Farris Fish representing Matador. Stevens represents Northfield since that is the area where his ranch is located.

The board will serve until the first Saturday in April, 1967 when all will be subject to reelection. The board has complete authority and the Commissioners Court no longer has any influence in the hospital district.

During the first session Friday the board retained a Lubbock firm of Stiles, Roberts and Messersmith to submit plans and specifications of proposed facilities with the advice of a competent consultant. The action was merely part of extensive comprehensive study of all phases of feasible action, and will include the possibility of federal aid. Any fee the firm may receive will be contingent with approval of the board and subsequent approval of the property owners in a bond election.

The board has no funds and must operate without funds until a plan has been submitted and approved by the voters.

An interesting observation is that the first initial in all of the names of the board members is "J".

The committee charged with the responsibility of producing the observance met Monday night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Woodruff for an informal supper. The committee includes Glenn Woodruff, President of the Matador Lions Club, James Monk,

President of the Flomot Lions Club, Charlie Long, President of the Roaring Springs Lions Club, H. R. (Skeet) Jameson representing Whiteflat and Commissioner Reece Timmons of Northfield.

It was one of a series of meetings by the steering committee, and before it ended Charlie Long had been elected general chairman, with Glenn Woodruff as secretary-treasurer.

As previously announced dates for the observance will be Friday and Saturday, August 5th and 6th. It will consist of two afternoons and two nights of entertainment. Highlight of the observance will be a pageant depicting the history of Motley County, which will start each evening at 8:30 p.m. on Matador Burleson football field.

Mrs. L. M. Winger of Brownfield (Terry County), who is the mother of Mrs. Glenn Woodruff asked to be the first member. She is going to write the script for the pageant. Names of members will be published in the Tribune and it is hoped that at least 200 will buy memberships.

Continuous entertainment is planned for both days and will include tours to points of historical interest in the county, a baseball game, golf match, and music on the courthouse square.

Barbecued chicken will be served at the City Park the second day, but it will not be free. The cost will be \$1 per plate.

The pageant will end at 10 p.m. each night to be followed by a street dance.

It was emphasized that the Jubilee Celebration is not designed to supplant the annual meeting of Old Settlers at Roaring Springs. Dates for that event will be August 25-26-27.

Communist Ideals Offered Club By Student From East Germany

Ideals of Communism were offered to El Progreso Study Club members assembled in the home of Mrs. W. F. Gaede, Thursday afternoon, April 28, for a program featuring "Ideals of Other Nations."

No one was sold on the principles presented by Miss Susi Leuckfeld, a citizen of East Germany and senior student at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview.

"Of course you know that my remarks are really ironical, and these are not the true facts at all," Miss Leuckfeld assured her listeners, after she had first declared that Communism is a Freedom movement.

"O yes, we have a choice... we can stay out of the party... we are not forced to join," she asserted, "BUT those who do not conform, pay a price... I have stood for 8 hours in the snow, just to receive two pounds of horse meat, and it wasn't to feed to pets... many times lines form when supplies are being distributed, and the people do not even know what they are to receive... but so long as it is something, they will stand in line." Farms have been abandoned and agriculture is suffering, and with the shortage of food people are filled with hunger, fear and apathy, she said.

Plans were also discussed for the closing luncheon of the club year, which is scheduled for May 26.

"Many outstanding personalities will appear on all the programs, and I know many of our members will want to attend the convention," she said.

Miss Leuckfeld and her family were among the 3 million people who fled to West Germany before the wall was constructed. Since there are churches in West Germany, she became friends with a young woman who persuaded her to attend. "For two years I refused... it seemed to me that Christianity was just another form of Communism."

Later, after she became converted, Miss Leuckfeld went to Rome, Italy, to attend school, and from there, came to Wayland. She was accompanied here Thursday, by Mrs. A. E. Boyd of Plainview.

Mrs. James Hancock introduced the speaker, and following her talk, Mrs. G. E. Hamilton played "Serenade" by G. Roland Flick, as a piano solo.

England Is Described
Mrs. W. N. Pipkin showed colorful slides made in England last summer when she visited her son and family, Captain and Mrs. Mitchell Neal Pipkin. Her subject was, "Do Americans spread good will abroad?" and her comments were from personal observations.

"There seemed to be a general feeling of good will on all the tours we made," she said.

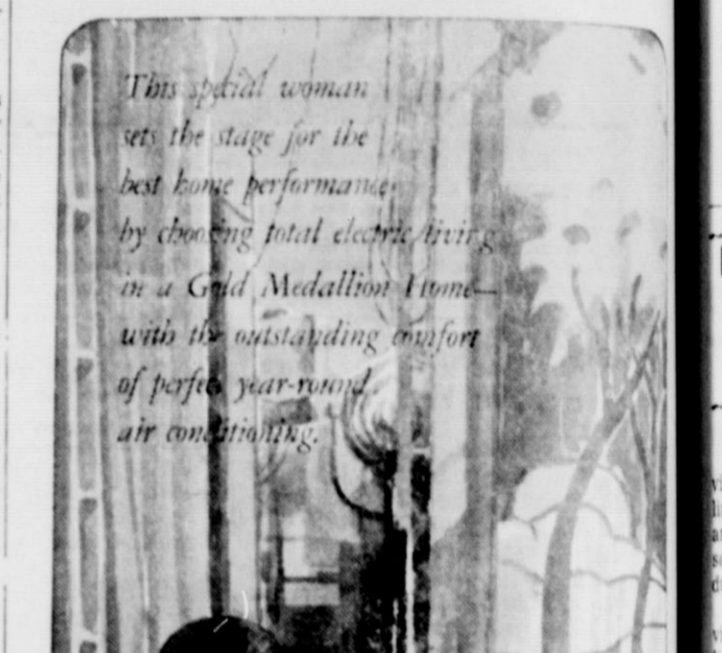

No War Rules For Viet Nam

All the classic concepts of war are out the window in Viet Nam. There are no fronts, no lines. The enemy may be on all sides of you, or he may not be there at all. He will not stand and fight unless the odds of victory are overwhelming on his side.

The war is not an accident, nor is it a civil war. It is a war deliberately fashioned by ruthless insurgents who have invaded the land of a free people. They fight by no rules. They will stop at nothing—even the execution of children—to gain even an advantage.

In spite of all this we are going to win the war, along with the South Vietnamese.

It was a three-war combat officer talking, Lt. Col. John C. Hughes, a man with a price on his head in the jungles of Viet Nam, brought members of the Panhandle Press Association to their feet at the closing convention luncheon, April 23, in the

Coronado Inn with his vivid, first-hand story of the conflict. Col. Hughes has been assigned to the Pentagon since his arrival from Viet Nam late last year. He included the press convention in his current speaking tour.

"I am not bringing you any special message, nor have I been told by anybody what to say," he told the editors. "What I tell you is entirely my own idea."

"A Viet Cong prisoner under interrogation is likely to look you in the eye and say, 'You can't win.'"

"He says, 'You can't win because we have two things you don't have—time and men. We may not win tomorrow. It may be the next generation. But we will win.'"

"That is our enemy in Viet Nam talking. 'But he won't win,' declared Col. Hughes, "because we have friends fighting alongside us that will mean the difference." Thousands of Koreans are in the field, many of them manning hospital stations, he said.

"They are going out on a limb for freedom," he emphasized. "And remember they are Asians fighting Asians. That's more important than you know." Filipinos are there too. And Australians and New Zealanders. "And the people of Thailand are way out on that limb of freedom," said the colonel. "Our air operations from Thai bases were begun at the invitation of Bangkok government—and they are important to our operations."

Col. Hughes served in World War II as a paratrooper, as a helicopter pilot in Korea, and in Viet Nam from 1964-65 with two aviation helicopter units. His decorations include two distinguished service crosses, a purple heart with four oak leaf clusters and three awards from the Viet Nam government.

Col. Hughes challenged the group of newsmen "to take off their American red, white and blue sun glasses and put on a bamboo pair."

"This war is no accident nor is it a civil war conspired by people who are dissatisfied with a cruel central government," he said. "It is an outright invasion by insurgents from the north bent on the destruction of a people in the process of turning from colonialism to a free society. And the intellectuals of the world are on the 50-yard line praying for the right outcome."

The veteran soldier outlined some of the problems of Viet Nam and the tactics the communists use to take advantage of them. "The country is not sophisticated and lacks maturity. It is much like our country was when it first won its freedom. There is an acute shortage of leadership in all areas due to this and due to the fact that the communists are using selective assassination," he explained.

"By selective assassination I mean that the communists will deliberately go into a village and kill all the leadership in it. They may kill the mayor, the teacher, or the guardsmen, and then they will replace him with one of their own men. They do it in public to scare the rest of the village and to show the inadequacy of the government to protect them."

"As an example of the methods they use I'd like to tell you just one story. I visited a town that had failed to pay its rice tax to the Viet Cong. The enemy had taken 40 boys and girls

between the ages of 5 and 15 and either cut off their nose, gouged one eye out, or cut off one ear."

In outlining the strategy of the Viet Cong, he said they "never attack unless they know they can win." He added that they will fight only when firepower, man power, or time is in their favor.

"Whenever a battle is first contacted, and there is some doubt as to its outcome, they'll bounce right off the field. When we go out to find them, we have to box them on our sides and the top and bottom also, before they'll fight," he reiterated.

One of their tricks is to go into a cave or tunnel under a village. The people on top know that if they talk they'll die. One trick they frequently use is to throw their weapon away or hide it, and hide under water near some delta, using a bamboo shoot to breathe through.

Col. Hughes said the United States and its allies were doing "excellent" in the war and were "winning hands down."

He attributed this partly to the present generation of young soldiers.

"I have led troops in three wars now, and have had soldiers die in my arms; but let me tell you as a combat leader, the kids of today are better privates, sergeants, and lieutenants than the generation of their dads. I have had combat correspondents say the same thing."

The colonel also had some comments about Vietnamese politics. "I think it is a bunch of baloney to even consider the Vietnamese forming a coalition government with the Viet Cong. The citizen in the south knows what happened to the Buddhist monk in the north and understands the communist use of selected assassination and knows it could apply to him."

"I also think there is unrest among the religious sects because they are multilingual and multireligion and have been isolated from each other so long by the French. We Americans had better get over our romantic ideas about the French. They left that country in a heck of a mess."

sincerely wanted the Yanks to go home."

He told of a demonstration in a town which was off limits to Americans. Somehow, a U.S. soldier who had gone AWOL found himself in the middle of it. The demonstrators were carrying signs reading, "Yank Go Home."

"The American picked up a sign, rubbed out the words and painted on his own slogan. Then he took his place in the line of marchers, carrying the sign reading, 'Send Me First.'"

"It broke up the demonstration. The kids started laughing, and in a few minutes the whole thing was off."

As for the lone American, "we couldn't make up our minds whether to promote him or court martial him."

AUSTIN, TEX. — Candidates for statewide offices are getting set for the final week of their campaign.

Democrats will vote at their May 7 primary for seven statewide offices.

Spotlight has been on the race for attorney general. Candidates are Galloway Calhoun of Tyler, Crawford Martin of Hillsboro and Franklin Spears of San Antonio.

Spears pledges efforts to improve law enforcement. Martin is emphasizing his 27 years' experience as a lawyer and his long service as state senator and secretary of state. Calhoun identifies himself as the "only real conservative" in the race.

All three candidates are eying the large number of voters who

apparently still are undecided despite their long campaigns.

Gov. John Connally, seeking a third term, virtually has ignored attacks on his administration by Stanley Woods of Houston. The third candidate for governor, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham, has not actively campaigned.

Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline, running as Woods' ticketmate, is opposing Lt. Gov. Preston Smith.

Paul B. Haring of Goliad is waging a spirited campaign against incumbent Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell of Tyler.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is opposed by political newcomer John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Houston for the U. S. Senate nomination.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has opposition from Fred Williams of Del Rio.

Only contested statewide judicial race is between incumbent Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald of Bryan and District Judge John F. Onion of San Antonio.

Light voter interest is expected to be reflected in a predicted 50 per cent voter turnout.

Grass Production Checks Being Made
The Soil Conservation Service has sixteen grass cages out on different places to determine the amount of air dry grass produced per acre per year. Ten of the cages were set up on Blue grama, which had an average production of 255 pounds per acre. The two cages on Little blue-stem average 1100 pounds per acre. Sideoats grama average 475 pounds per acre. Vine mesquite and buffalograss averaged 200 pounds and 250 pounds per acre, respectively.

Although last year was dry and production was low, this points out that a rancher should manage his rangeland for a higher producing grass to get maximum return from his ranch. For further information contact Ervin Willard or Kenneth Eisenhauer of the Matador Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Upper Pease Soil & Water Conservation District.
