New Civic Organization Seeks Progress Formula

A new community organization was formed here Friday night. Its purpose is directed to community progress and welfare and one of its prerequisite aims is a membership to include every business and professional firm here.

Membership fee was set at \$1, with monthly or annual dues to be established through the action of a committee, and equalized according to the size of the firm or establishment.

Forrest Campbell was named president of the new organization formed by a small group of business and professional men meeting in the American Legion lobby. Frank Pohl was elected secretary-treasurer and W. F. Jacobs was named vice-president. Further election of officers was deferred until Friday night, May 28, the date set for the next meeting. Name of the organization has not been selected but a committee has been instructed to submit one or more names at the May 28 meeting. The organization will not be called a chamber of commerce although its functions will be similar. Membership will be open to all business and professional men and women.

Tentative plans include a continuing campaign to improve relations with the trade area, improve services offered here, to solicit the loyalty of the community in trading at home, to make an immediate attempt in inducing a competent dentist to open office here.

Within the scope of the group's activities will be a concentrated effort to attract some kind of industry, general community progress, and the development of the natural resources. During the Friday night meeting the organization included the need for abundant supply of cheap water, improved publicity program and other essentials in the building of a strong, progressive community.

It is believed that in the co-operation of a large group of members, and a policy open to new ideas, community advancement is inevitable. The May 28 meeting is open and a large representative group is expected to attend.

Attendance was high at Roaring Springs Tuesday night at the first session of the 4-H and FFA tractor maintenance schooling. Approximately 50 farmers and members attended the first of the series of instructions being supervised by County Agent Bill Palmeyer and N. L. McKibbin, Roaring Springs agriculture teacher.

Instructors for the school are Boyd Long and Sut Braselton, who recently attended a tractor maintenance school at Childress designed for 4-H Club and FFA members. Second meeting will be held on the evening of May 24 (8 PM) at the Roaring Springs agricultural building.

Purpose of the school is to promote safety and to increase the years of usefulness of farm tractors. The meetings are open to the public.

Car Sales Reflect Improved Business

REJOICING is general in West Texas with the best general rainfall in a decade. Motley county was in the pattern of precipitation, and County Agent Bill Palmeyer said late yesterday that reports indicate the average is five to six inches. Total recorded here was 5.57 inches since Thursday evening.

Flood conditions prevailed east of Matador Monday morning when approximately six inches fell in the Fairview area in four hours. Some gauges in the area caught approximately ten inches since Thursday.

Flood waters from terraced fields and prairie areas caused creeks to become raging torrents and crossed the paving on US Highway 70 in half-a-dozen places between Matador and Teepee creek. Brush from dragged range land clogged a large culvert west of Teepee creek and for a time it appeared that a section of the highway might be lost. Working desperately, Highway Department crews restored the flow and traffic was not interrupted. Teepee creek carried the largest flow of water in the memory of many old-timers.

Stock tanks throughout West Texas are filled to overflowing. Terraces in many fields were slim, curved islands in a sea of water, in some instances the lower terraces were completely submerged.

Hailstorm Thursday The phenomenal "rainy spell" started here with a severe hailstorm late Thursday, which littered trees and young gardens, and caused extensive damage to a few wheat fields which might have been good enough to harvest. The rainfall Thursday was light. No rain fell here Friday or Saturday, but a severe electrical storm struck shortly after midnight Saturday which disabled electrical service for about two hours. Current was disrupted on both the north and east lines into Matador and Roaring Springs. Rains accompanying the (Continued on back page)

storm measured in the neighborhood of half an inch. Sunday the entire area below the Cap Rock was blanketed in heavy fog and drizzle which continued into the night. About 7 o'clock Monday morning a series of heavy rain storms emerged out of the fog and drizzle, which again disrupted electrical service on both lines into Matador. During one of the storms some hail fell here accompanied by heavy rain. East of town in the Fairview and Teepee creek areas the hail covered the ground to a depth of two inches. Slow rains fell most of Monday night and heavier precipitation started again Tuesday which lasted into the afternoon. Ballard creek here in Matador flowed almost continuously for 48 hours.

Records in the office of Sheriff and Tax Collector John Stotts show a total of 18 car sales (new and used) since Thursday. Total rainfall for 1954, as compiled by County Agent Palmeser, is 8.41-inches, as compared with 2.66 on the same date last year. The 30-year average (including all of May) is 7.46-inches. A trace of snow in January recorded 10-inch moisture here. February zero. March a light snow which produced 14-inch moisture and April 2.80 inches. By comparison with 1953, January 23-inch, February 48-inch, March 64-inch, April 1.18-inches and May to this date, none. The 30-year average is January 31, February 63, March 89, April 1.72 and May 3.41-inches (for entire month).

Rains have been reported general over West Texas with the precipitation lighter on the plains areas. Much of the drought stricken areas south and southwest, have had abundant rains, with showers reported in other sections.
