POLL TAX SALE LOW

With only two days remaining in which to qualify in 1954 elections, sale of poll tax receipts here remains far lower than recent election years. Miss Rachel Patton, deputy clerk in the office of Sheriff and Tax Assessor John Stotts told the Tribune this morning that only 746 poll taxes had been issued at closing time yesterday as compared with 981 receipts issued on the same date in 1952.

Because of the slow sale of poll taxes throughout West Texas, political observers believe the 1954 elections may be subject to drastic changes.

Citizens are urged to pay their poll taxes before the Saturday night deadline and exercise their rights in the important elections scheduled during the year.

T. B. Alsop Files For Councilman

T. B. Alsop this week filed with City Secretary L. M. Cox, to have his name placed on the city ballot, Tuesday, April 6, for the place of councilman. Matador voters will elect a mayor and two councilmen in the April balloting.

Two councilmen whose terms expire this year are Jack Norman and Andy Hurst. Applications for places on the city ballot must be filed before March 6.

Club Leaders Selected In 4-H Community Work

Community leaders in 4-H Club work were selected early this month at a meeting of the county's five clubs, according to a report made by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

Mr. Pallmeyer said approximately 15 members are feeding calves for the annual Junior Livestock show. During the county meeting picture projection slides were shown club members, designating the desirable and undesirable points in beef cattle. The slides also showed how cattle with undesirable characteristics would fail to bring returns assured with cattle of a better type. Members were also given an opportunity to place classes of calves, using the reasons stressed in the slides.

Lubbock Editor On AF Assignment

Charlie Guy, editor of the Lubbock Avalanche left this week on a coast-to-coast writing trip, covering visits to various points in the Atlantic and Pacific oceans and between New York and Arizona.

The USAF assignment, made at the invitation of the Secretary of Air, will encompass something like 8,500 miles of air travel, plus on-the-ground inspections of various installations and will result in a series of articles largely based upon the various economics now in force service-wide—not only in dollars, but also in the use of manpower.

The series will be written for The Avalanche-Journal and other newspapers over the country following The Plainsman's return to home base.

NEW LICENSE TAGS TRANSPOSE COLORS

New Texas motor vehicle tags which go on sale February 1, have the same colors (black and gold) as the 1953 license, except the colors are transposed. The gold background of the 1953 tags is transposed to the numerals of the 1954 license which has a black background. Motley county automobile 1954 series will change letter from AP to AN, and the numbers will start at 7700.

Special attention is called to motor vehicle owners by the Texas Highway Department regarding registration in the county of owner residence. A placard notice posted in the courthouse, reads as follows: "Texas registration laws require that you register your vehicle in the county of your residence. Operation of a vehicle registered elsewhere subjects you to a fine up to \$200 and registration in your own county. Do not ask the tax collector to be a party to a violation of the law."

New license tags may be placed on vehicles as soon as purchased according to present regulations and must be on all vehicles by April 1.

Texas vehicles are registered from April 1 to April 1, so new car owners are obliged to pay 1953 license fees to April 1, although they may also buy 1954 licenses at the same time (after February 1) and never place the 1953 tags on their car.

Time Catching Up With Owners Of Uninspected Cars

Captain E. L. Posey, commanding officer of District 6 of the Texas Highway Patrol, Lubbock, has announced that Highway Patrolmen would begin issuing tickets to persons who operate an auto on the streets and highways after April 15 without a current inspection sticker.

The Patrol Captain said that the men in his command have all received orders to that effect as the result of a directive issued at Austin by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Posey said Garrison's order was made following definite instructions from the State Public Safety Commission that enforcement of the modified motor vehicle inspection law which was enacted by the last Legislature would definitely begin following the April 15 inspection deadline.

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Fire Alarm Signal Will Launch Polio Porchlight Drive

MOTHERHOOD, the mighty and sublime influence which has remained constant even in the world's darkest hours, is again marching to protect the young and helpless. Mothers of Motley county will defend pain-tortured children and crippled adult victims, and help provide a painless world for future children Friday night in a one-hour polio fund campaign. The drive will start at 7 p. m. at a signal with the fire alarms in Matador and Roaring Springs.

County fund chairman Judge Vance Gilbreath announced last week at a meeting of the Matador Lions club that the drive would be conducted on a voluntary contribution basis because of present economic conditions. Mothers in this and the Roaring Springs community felt, however, that an intense solicitation should be conducted because of the urgent need for funds to fight polio this year.

Jack Norman, manager of the West Texas Utilities Company here, who has for several years served as polio fund chairman (amount raised last year in county exceeded \$2800) was petitioned to organize a mothers porchlight drive Friday night for Matador and Roaring Springs. The drive here is sponsored by the Matador Garden club and in Roaring Springs by a group of civic-minded mothers. Judge Gilbreath has been conducting a drive this week in soliciting contributions from business and professional firms.

FHA HAS MILLION TO AID COUNTY AS DISASTER RELIEF

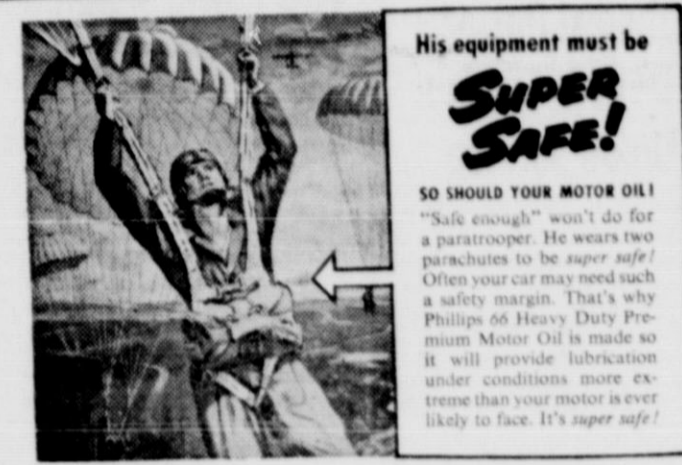

forever banish the disease from the earth. The process is slow and expensive. Funds must be provided to push the scientific research which will mean freedom from pain for thousands of innocent victims and protect only to the porchlights shining in this nation's darkness."

"And when the lights are turned off an hour later, the traditional generosity of the residents of Motley county will have been demonstrated by a record total contribution. I feel that we cannot and will not fail the thousands of hopeless victims of polio... who can look only to the porchlights shining in this nation's darkness."

Residents in the two communities are asked to have their contributions ready so that the drive may be made as rapidly as possible. A candle or light in the window will suffice in homes without porchlights. Workers will solicit every home since the intense one-hour campaign will conclude the drive.
