Merchants Schedule Meeting

Merchants and businessmen of Matador will hold a meeting Friday (tomorrow) night at the Fleming Post, American Legion building, in an effort to decide on a plan designed to improve trade relations here.

A preliminary meeting was held Tuesday following the regular Lions luncheon meeting. Several plans were suggested without any progress being made. Lions President Bill Moss accepted a suggestion that a second meeting be called. Specific purpose of the meeting is to make trading in Matador more attractive, in effort to channel back into local business some of the money that is being spent elsewhere.

PLANTER INVENTION IMPROVES STAND IN ROW CROP FARMING

A recently perfected invention, the press wheel planter attachment, currently being manufactured by a Lubbock firm, is removing some of the hazard and replanting expense out of row crop farming.

The new device, which is sold locally by Thompson Feed and Seed, has the stamp of approval of Elmer Hudspeth, agricultural engineer for the Lubbock experimental station. The planter has been tested for four years by the station.

Harris & Thrush Manufacturing company (builders of "Sally Dog" farm machinery), and manufacturers of the new planter, declared extra production on their first nine acres planted will pay for a set of the attachments (through better stand, increased yield and virtually eliminating replanting). The press wheel planter will fit any tool bar planter attachment.

Outline of the process is as follows: A narrow opening plow, equipped with a narrow shield, guides the seed into moist, undisturbed soil. The soft, hollow rubber-tired wheel presses the seed firmly into place, so that the soil will dry out much sooner than undisturbed soil. Pressure is easily adjusted. Adjustable covering drags that raise and lower with planter, cover seed to a uniform depth with loose soil.

All row crop farmers are invited to see the new planter and investigate its many advantages over the conventional type now being used in this area.

Northfield School Continues Program To Improve Plant

With the installation recently of 40 ultra-modern desks (with matching chairs), Northfield school continues its long-range program of plant improvement started in 1951. A total of approximately \$10,000 has been invested in the school property since the program was started, according to Gerald Yeates, principal.

"It was decided three years ago to build our plant and advance our educational program to match those of large elementary schools throughout the state", Mr. Yeates declared. The following improvements have been made since the program was started: remodeled school gymnasium and built new teacherage, improved lunchroom and built new five-room teacherage, extensive plant repair and improvement and installation of new desks.

"We are proud of our plant and the program Northfield school has made in the educational field", Mr. Yeates said. "Our board hired an instructor for our new music department at the beginning of this school year. Students attending classes now have the advantage of music and voice, both group and private lessons", the principal pointed out.

Trustees at the beginning of the improvement program were A. C. Nimmo, Theodore Bain and A. B. Simpson. The present board includes E. M. Timmons, Nolan Thomas and Simpson.

Governor Shivers Asks Third Term

Allan Shivers announced Monday for an unprecedented third term as Governor of Texas. "I will be a candidate for reelection as Governor of Texas subject to the action of the Democratic primary on July 24, 1954," was the text of a press release announcing Shivers' decision.

Last week the Governor told a press conference that he was thinking seriously of quitting, because of family considerations. Shivers and his wife have extensive business interests in the Rio Grande Valley, East Texas and elsewhere.

When his present term ends, Shivers will have served five years and five months as governor—longer by a month than the previous record set by Gov. Coke Stevenson.

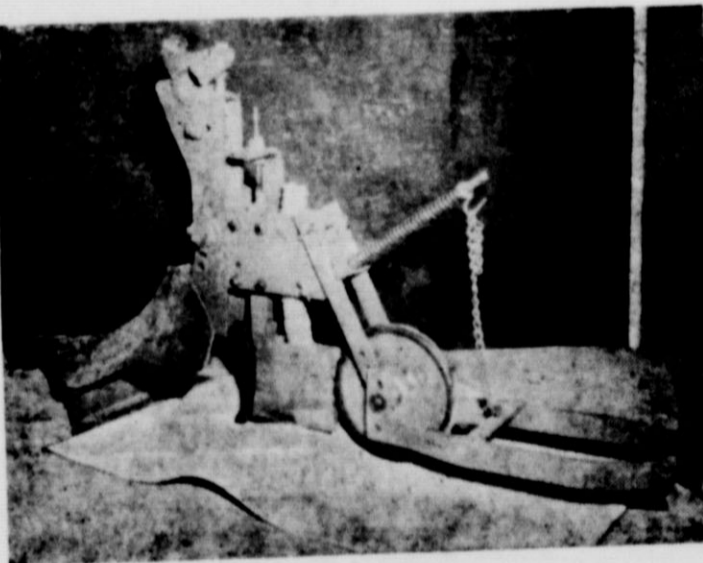
