Roaring Springs Couple Found Slain

According to Motley County Sheriff, Alton Marshall, an apparent Murder/Suicide took place in Roaring Springs on Tuesday, May 8, 1990.

Senaida "Sam" Martinez and David Saenz were found dead in their Roaring Springs home at approximately 2:40 p.m. by her son, David Trevino as he arrived at home from school.

The apparent Murder/Suicide happened at approximately 12:00 noon that day, according to Sheriff Marshall.

Further investigations are being conducted by the Texas Rangers and the District Attorney's office.

Ms. Martinez is survived by one other son, Michael and a daughter-in-law, Angie Trevino, both of the home.

At newstime, funeral services are pending at Seigler Funeral Home in Matador.

Ms. Martinez was an employee of Quail Pipe Company of Roaring Springs and Saenz was a former employee of the City of Roaring Springs.

Turkey Hit With Vandalism After Bob Wills Celebration

Damage was reported at the historical Hotel Turkey early Sunday morning, April 29, as an intoxicated Slaton, Texas man left a trail of overturned furniture, broken antique items, and broken windows.

According to reports, the 32 year old man began his reign of vandalism about 5:30 a.m. when he entered the front door of the 1927 show place, as residents and guests slept.

"He entered through the front lobby and began demolishing anything in his path. He went upstairs knocking over furniture, and disturbing guests, breaking anything in front of him. When the suspect was confronted by owner, Scott Johnson, he ran off," according to Hall County Deputy Sheriff Tim Wiginton.

The vandal later showed up at the home of Arloween Williams, but was run off by her two sons, who were visiting in Turkey for the Bob Wills Celebration.

The man made it to the city park where he reportedly stole a Blazer, but abandoned the vehicle when he discovered two occupants asleep in the rear seat. Law authorities were notified of a pickup being stolen from Allsup's by a man fitting the same description, and was apprehended by Department of Public Safety officer, Dude Speed at Matador about 8:30 a.m. following a high speed chase.

He was arrested and was to be arraigned Tuesday morning in Memphis, on a number of charges. As a man, whose name was not available at press time left the Hotel Turkey, he destroyed the Hotel Turkey sign, and kicked in the door of a vehicle belonging to Bob Wills' daughter, who was a guest of the Hotel.

Estimates of damage to the hotel were set at \$2,500-\$3,000 and to Ms. Wills' automobile at \$1,000, according to deputy Wiginton.

A total of 53 arrests were made during the weekend, when began officially Friday evening, April 27 and ended Sunday morning, April 29.

Shane Jones Elected as Matador's First Woman City Council Member

The City of Matador elected Shane Jones as a new member of the City Council and their first female member in Saturday's Elections. There was a large turnout for the May 5 County Elections, with 405 county residents voting.

Election results are as follows: Motley County ISD Board of Trustees: Coy Franks and Gale Stafford won two places for 3-year terms and Randy Barton for the 2-year term. Total votes were Coy Franks, 218; Gale Stafford,

209; Vann Francis, 190; James Palmer, 184; Randy Barton, 163; Douglas Campbell, 160; Debra Scott, 105.

Matador City Council incumbent, Mayor Gary Lancaster, won with 186 votes to Luther Green, 79. The Matador

City Council added a woman, Shane Jones, with 176 votes. Pete Williams won with 178 votes and Doyle Rose had 105.

The City of Roaring Springs re-elected Mayor Eugene Watson with 61 votes. Harold Parks had 24 write-in votes.

The Council members elected were Mary Webb, 68; Mark Wason, 74; Charlie Long, 65. J. Don Finch had 15 write-in votes.

The Motley County Hospital board filled their Board with incumbent James Stanley, 360 and new members Ruth Lee, 309 and Bob Davis, 201.

Burial was in Roaring Springs Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home of Matador. She died Thursday morning at her residence.

She was born in Kentucky and moved to Roaring Springs in 1938 from Floyd County. She married Ben H. Dillard Jan. 22, 1930 in Hollis, Okla. He died in 1969. She was an Assembly of God Minister for 63 years, and was pastor of Roaring Springs Assembly of God for over 50 years.

She and her husband donated land for the West Texas Assembly of God Youth Camp in Roaring Springs on March 17, 1960. She was camp nurse and filled-in in the Kitchen and anywhere she was

needed during those early years at the Camp.

In recent years, as she visited the camp, she was always welcomed with a standing ovation in appreciation for the land donated to the youth of West Texas.

The Rev. Edna Dillard will be remembered by many for her friendliness to everyone she met and her strong faith in Jesus Christ our Lord.

("Brazos Electric"), a wholesale generation and transmission electric utility, and the following Brazos Electric member retail distribution electric utilities ("Members"), Bartlett Electric Cooperative, Inc., Belfalls Electric Cooperative, Inc., B-K Electric Cooperative, Inc., Comanche County Electric Cooperative Assn., Denton County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc., Erath County Electric Cooperative Assn., Fort Belknap Electric Cooperative, Inc., Gate City Electric Cooperative, Inc., Hamilton County Electric Cooperative Assn., Hill County Electric Cooperative, Inc., J-A-C Electric Cooperative, Inc., Johnson County Electric Cooperative Assn., McLennan County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Mid-South Electric Cooperative Assn., Navarro County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Navasota Valley Electric Cooperative, Inc., Tri-County Electric Cooperative, Inc., and Wise Electric Cooperative, Inc., have filed a Petition for Waiver with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC"). In the petition, assigned Docket No. 9453, Brazos Electric requests waiver of the obligation to sell retail power to qualifying cogeneration and small power production facilities ("QFs") and the Members seek a waiver of their obligations to purchase power directly from QFs. These obligations are contained in PUC Substantive Rule 23.66(d)(1)(A) and 23.66(d)(2), as well as 18 C.F.R. 292.303(a) and (b).

The proposed waivers will not impair the ability of QFs to sell electric capacity and energy or to purchase electric capacity and energy. In the territory served by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members (63 counties throughout Texas), Brazos Electric will assume the obligation for all purchases of QF generated electricity and the Members will assume all obligations for sales to QFs of capacity and energy. Only duplicate obligations which would otherwise be applicable to both Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members are proposed to be eliminated.

Reciprocal waivers of the type requested by Brazos Electric and its above-listed Members have recently been granted by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The proposed waivers will not discourage cogeneration and small power production. Members' avoided cost can never be more than Brazos Electric's avoided cost because the Members purchase all of their wholesale power requirements from Brazos Electric.

The proposed waivers are subject to approval by the PUC. An Original Petition for Waiver specifying in detail each proposed waiver, the reasons waivers are being requested, and the effect of waiver is available at the general offices of Brazos Electric in Waco, Texas, and at an office of each of its above-listed Members.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. The deadline for intervention is June 18, 1990. 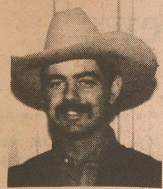

County Agent's Comments

BOLL WEEVIL TRAPS BEING ORDERED

With cotton planting time near, many producers in the county want to use boll weevil traps as a tool to help monitor boll weevil populations. I am currently taking orders for traps. By ordering all the traps at once we can save money as the more traps we buy the less the cost. Also the minimum order is 100.

Anyone wishing to order boll weevil

traps through the County Extension office should call me at 347-2733 by Monday, May 14.

In most cases you would need 4 traps per 100 acres. Depending on the total number ordered, the traps will cost from \$4.70 to \$6.40 per trap including pheromone bait.

Please keep in mind that these traps are only a tool and should not take the place of field inspection.

Social Security Tips

If you earn extra income in self-employment, you should make sure the income is reported for social security purposes when required. The income can make even more of a difference later than it does now.

That's because eligibility for social security retirement, survivors, or disability benefits and the amount of the benefit are based on a worker's annual earnings reported to social security. In general, the higher the earnings reported, the higher the benefit check.

Self-employment income earned in 1989 is reported on income tax returns due by April 16, 1990. In general, you receive credit for self-employment income only if net earnings from self-employment total at least \$400 during a year. The net earnings figure is the result of deducting all business expenses connected with self-employment activity from gross income from that activity.

If you have \$400 in self-employment

income, you must file a federal income tax return and pay any federal taxes due and the social security tax. The tax is reported on Schedule C (Profit or Loss from Business or Profession) or, where appropriate, Schedule F (Farm Income and Expenses) and Schedule SE (Computation of Social Security Self-employment tax).

People who have both wages and self-employment income should first figure the amount of wages on which they have paid social security taxes and then add their self-employment earnings up to the maximum subject to the social security tax. In 1989, the maximum was \$48,000. In 1990, the maximum is \$51,300.

If you paid social security taxes on the maximum wages as an employee, do not pay social security tax on the additional income earned in self-employment.

Odds are that federal crop insurance will continue to be available in one form or another in the 1990 farm bill now being developed in Washington.

That's the opinion expressed by Martin County farmer and ginner Myrl D. Mitchell on returning from Washington where he participated May 1 in a hearing of the conservation, Credit and Rural Development Subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee. Mitchell, a director and past president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, testified in his capacity as Chairman of the National Cotton Council's Producer Task force on Crop Insurance.

"In light of the strong position taken by the Administration, I had been concerned that federal crop insurance might be abandoned after this year in favor of a weak disaster program that wouldn't give the protection we need," he said. "But our statement was very well received by the committee and I came away with the impression that we have a good chance to save Federal Crop."

Mitchell also serves as cotton spokesman on a Federal Crop Insurance Commission created by Congress in 1988, and his statement closely parallels recommendations for insurance program improvements made by that group last year.

The hearing, according to Chairman Glenn English (D-OK), was called to review numerous crop insurance proposals, including a bill he himself has offered and others by Representatives Fred Grandy (R-IA) and Larry Combest (R-TX).

Mitchell's statement stopped short of endorsing any one of the three bills, instead commending the committee for "reviewing proposals to develop a better

program, and not scrap a very useful risk management tool." In addition, as he detailed the Producer Task Force's suggestions for program improvements he noted specific parts of each bill that would achieve Task Force objectives.

Among major Task Force recommendations for crop insurance reform legislation, Mitchell included:

— Better yield coverage by giving producers the option to use ASCS yields or proving actual yields (as would be done by Chairman English's bill);

— Subsidization of 30 percent of premiums on all coverage levels up to and including 75 percent (as proposed by the Combest bill);

— Catastrophic coverage of losses above the 75-percent level (a concept also included in Combest's bill), and

— A provision for a dollar coverage system (as contained in the Grandy bill), with coverage based on cost of production and adequate safeguards against abuse.

On the negative side, Mitchell voiced Task Force criticism of Grandy's proposal to create a "voucher system," and strong objections to all suggestions that federal crop insurance coverage be mandatory as a condition of farm program participation.

About the voucher system, he said "We see this creating another unneeded and wasteful bureaucracy for government and producers without providing any substantial benefit."

On the latter issue, he stressed that "It is imperative that risk management decisions rest in the hands of producers and not be a mandatory requirement for program benefit eligibility."

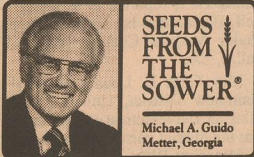

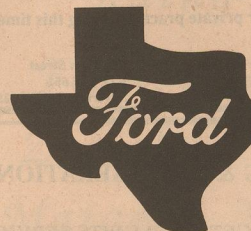

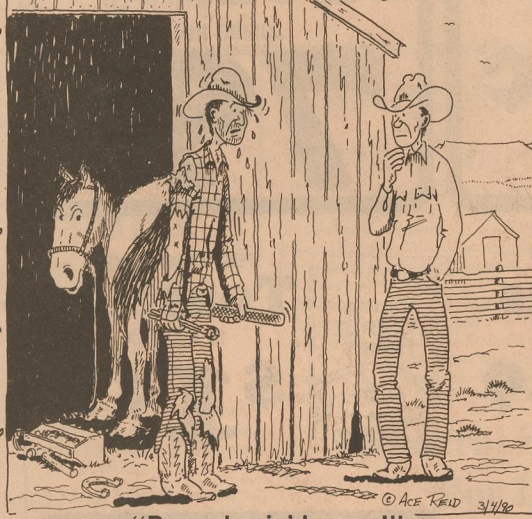
