Lighting Deadline Hour Set

Deadline hour for the annual Christmas lighting contest is set for 8:30 Saturday evening, December 19, it was announced yesterday by Chairman Mike Hoyle.

It is not necessary to file any form of entry into the contest. At 8:30 p. m., December 19th, out-of-town judges will select the winners. Three valuable prizes for the home lighting display are on display at the First State bank. First prize is a floor lamp, second is a large "Lazy Susan" and third prize is an aluminum coffee percolator.

Only one prize, a special Lion plaque, will be awarded the best lighted and decorated place of business.

Matador is now ablaze with colored Yule lights at night. All the street lights are installed and most places of business, as well as homes, have turned on Christmas lights. Solid blue lights on the city water tower were turned on last night and received much favorable comment because of the unusually beautiful effect.

MERCURY DROPS TO 23 DEGREES

Winter moved back into the Texas Panhandle Tuesday night as a "cold front" swept out of the north, causing residents to "break-out" heavier clothing, check car anti-freeze and heating systems.

Altho the official low mercury reading at Amarillo Wednesday morning was 23 degrees, the government thermometers maintained at the city wells here registered the same, 23 degrees. A few frozen hydrants were repaired in Matador, otherwise the cold snap passed without damage. Warmer weather followed yesterday and continued fair and warmer weather was forecast for today.

Rev. Yeager Is Popular Speaker

Rev. Orville Yeager, who will preach here on Sunday, Dec. 20, at the First Baptist Church, is a popular speaker on current problems. He is professor of social science at Wayland College, Plainview.

Since moving to the Panhandle Plains area, he has appeared before the majority of the luncheon clubs, some of them several times, and also many churches of all denominations.

Rev. Yeager will preach at both morning and evening services on the 20th, during the absence of the pastor, Rev. Bruce Oliver.

Boy Victim Of Gunshot

Wayne Cartwright, 17, Matador high school student, was the victim of an accidental gunshot at his home north of Matador early Tuesday. He had started from the house to the well and decided to take his rifle, anticipating the possibility of shooting a rabbit.

In crossing a fence he leaned the rifle against a fence post and was climbing under when the rifle fell, causing it to discharge. The bullet struck him in the abdomen. He was brought to Stanley hospital here for treatment where attending physicians said the bullet caused only a flesh wound in the abdominal wall. He is the son of Mrs. Pearl Cartwright. The family resides on the L. C. Harp farm north of the river.

Negro Takes Car From Jail Yard

A 1953 Chevrolet automobile "vanished" from in front of the county jail here Monday night and its disappearance brought some uneasy moments to Sheriff John Stotts and Deputy Jinks Wilson, from a "driving-while-intoxicated" Negro, Arthur Nelms of Spur, a short time previous.

Nelms was arrested at the intersection of highways US 70 and State 70, after his car collided with another automobile driven by Mrs. John Davis of Matador. Accompanying Nelms was another Negro, James Garfield. While Nelms was being taken to jail Garfield was released.

The automobile was the property of Caraway Motor company of Spur where Nelms worked. It had been taken without permission from the car by "bright-as-day-light" light. While driving past the jail a short time later the officers noticed the car was gone.

Immediate description of the car was given to the State Highway Patrol and to officers at Spur, Paducah, Floydada and other points. Tuesday morning the Sheriff Stotts called the Caraway Motor Company to disclose the theft. He was told the car was back in Spur under a shed from which it had been taken. Garfield, picked up later, admitted he had driven the automobile away from the front of the jail and back to Spur. He had "covered up" for his friend.

Nelms was fined \$75 and costs and given a 15-day jail term (including automatic suspension of his driver's license for 6 months) on the DWI charge. Garfield was fined \$1 and costs and sentenced to 15 days in jail for driving an automobile without the owner's permission.

Inspections Show Most Cars In Need Of Vital Repairs

Motor vehicle inspection as now required by state law (April 15 is deadline) has brought important facts to light. 58% needed some adjustment or repair. Of the inspected cars, 7% needed brake adjustments or repair while 34% needed headlight correction.

Inspection is progressing extremely well in Motley county's four authorized stations according to Motor Vehicle Inspector J. R. Whitmore, who was here last week. What is probably the cheapest life insurance being sold in Texas today is the cost of having automobiles inspected. Whitmore said the average cost of running a car through inspection is only \$1.77 which includes the price of the inspection service. Law requires the four authorized stations to be open eight hours daily, but most of them are open much longer. The officer urged all car owners to have their vehicles inspected before Christmas if possible.

He pointed out the decline in highway fatalities during the first 11 months of 1953 as being about 100 less than for the same period in 1952. "This decreasing rate may be held," he declared, "and even improved upon altho the 'deadly' holiday season is rapidly approaching. With winter and the holiday travel upon a weather change away, every driver needs the added safety of inspection."

A new source of revenue to Motley county farmers is appearing on the harvest horizon of this almost zero cotton-crop season. The "little life-saver" is quick-maturing milo maize planted after the late July rains.

Kimbell Elevator & Milling Co. plant at Roaring Springs (formerly the Red Ball Elevator) Saturday had shipped 21 cars of milo, with each car having a value of approximately \$2,100. S. J. Braselton, manager for the firm, said the average price for milo is currently \$2.15 per 100 pounds.

Law Nabs Big Stock Of Liquor

One of the largest stocks of alcoholic beverages confiscated in Motley county since prohibition days was stored Saturday in Sheriff John Stotts' basement vault. Invoice of the "haul" was 48 pints of whiskey, 48 1/2 pints of whiskey, 12 quarts of wine, 479 cans of beer, four pints of gin and five 1/2-pints of gin.

Arthur Lynch, Whiteflat store keeper was fined \$350 and costs (\$371.80 total) yesterday in County Judge Vance Gilbreath's court, in connection with the case.

Unusual aspect of the raid was the participation of a crusading preacher, Rev. Bruce Oliver, pastor of the First Baptist church of Matador, who bought a pint of whiskey from Lynch before his arrest. Sheriff Stotts said Rev. Oliver's part in the raid was voluntary and at his (Oliver's) request.

Sheriff Stotts and Deputy Jinks Wilson had made another raid earlier in the day and decided to go by the courthouse and pick up a search warrant for Lynch. "We had known of Lynch's place for some time," the sheriff said, "and were waiting until we felt the raid would warrant our efforts."

At this point Rev. Oliver volunteered to buy a pint of evidence and "cinch" the arrest. While the officers waited for the search warrant Rev. Oliver went to Whiteflat. They met him en route back to Matador. He had the "evidence" and returned with the officers to Whiteflat.

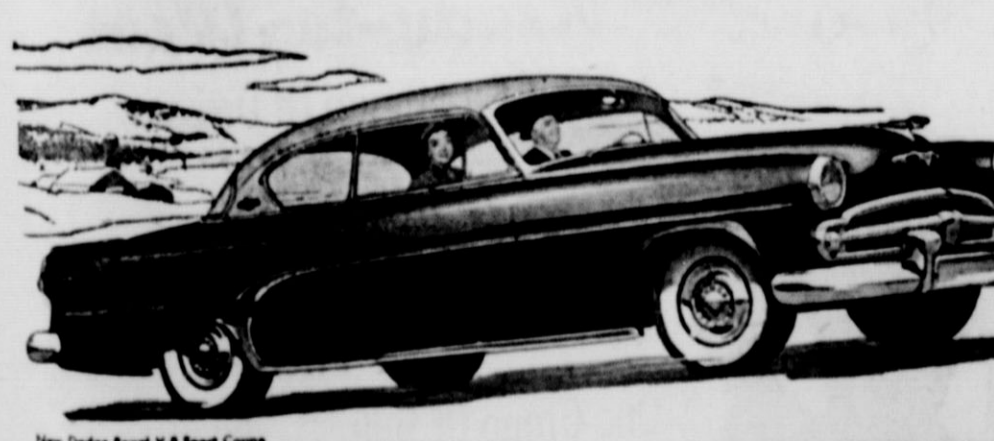

FEATURE A PUNCH

IT'S a wise hostess who plans to have her punch bowl featured at parties. Punch is the easiest drink for the hostess, since it leaves her free to mingle with her guests and eliminates repeated trips to the kitchen for refills. She can appoint someone to be in charge of the bowl, and if she doesn't there'll be sure to be a volunteer.

There are just three hard and fast rules that apply to the making of a good punch—it must be of good flavor, it must be well-iced and it must be attractive in appearance. Fruit juices, fresh, frozen or canned, are used for the base, and to be assured of a sparkle and zest, use pale dry ginger ale as the other ingredient. Fruit juices and ginger ale should be chilled before using.

CRANBERRY-GINGER BOWL

1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon ginger
1 cup boiling water
1 6-oz. can lemonade concentrate
3 cups cranberry juice
4 cups apple juice
2 28-oz. bottles pale dry ginger ale

Combine sugar and ginger. Add boiling water; bring to a boil, stir until sugar dissolves. In punch bowl combine lemonade concentrate, cranberry juice and apple juice. Just before serving add ice and pale dry ginger ale. Garnish with lemon slices. Yield: 25-30 8-oz. cup servings.

Artificial Light Stimulant To Hens

Laying hens need 12 to 14 hours of light daily to maintain top egg production, says County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

While the layers aren't especially concerned with the situation, Pallmeyer explains that light influences a secretion from the pituitary gland. This glandular stimulus makes the birds consume more feed and water. The result is extra eggs and a profit from the lighting system.

One 40-watt bulb for each 200 square feet of floor space is sufficient, Pallmeyer says. Shallow reflectors make the lights more effective. Commence using light now, he adds, and increase the lighting period as the days become shorter. Perches, feeding hoppers and watering troughs should also be lighted.

Pallmeyer recommends early morning lights. All night lights are satisfactory, he concludes, but egg production is not increased after 14 hours.

Relief Programs Declared Aid To Cattle Industry
Drought relief programs being carried out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, under authority from President Eisenhower and Congress, will have a beneficial effect in strengthening livestock markets, says County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Beef consumption is at an all-time high, according to USDA officials, but cattle prices, which have been dropping since April 1951 declined even further this summer owing to increased marketing of animals from drought-stricken areas.

A five-point beef program aimed at bolstering cattle markets includes feed from government stocks provided at low rates in drought areas; emergency credit; reduced freight rates provided by southern and western railroads on feed, hay and livestock; an intensive government-industry beef sales promotion campaign; and direct government purchases of beef.

The first three of these measures were aimed directly at providing relief to individual livestock producers suffering from drought conditions, but the effect in the market, USDA officials stress, is expected to be felt throughout the livestock industry. Because of these relief programs, records high beef consumption, and direct government beef purchases, prices for lower grades of cattle have been strengthened during the past few weeks. The department beef purchase program will have diverted the equivalent of more than 750,000 head of lower grade cattle from markets before December 15.
