fitting, and often at great loss of soil, property and frequently human lives. We must decide who has a right to the available water and we must develop our water resources.

"It is regrettable that a good rain has ruined more water legislation than any number of indifferent people.

"We must consider the impounding of more water to supply the growing demands of Texas industry. For a number of years Texas has had an annual gain of 12% in industry but many cities are now faced with enough water for domestic use."

Rep Saul rapped the federal government intervention into Texas water problems and cited the Brazos River Authority which made an outstanding success without federal aid. He said we should take care of the water that falls in Texas and draw a line in keeping the federal government out of the control.

they believed distribution would be on a fair and impartial basis and they failed to find in the new regulation more than necessary restrictions to prevent speculators getting into the cattle business with cheap feed and at the expense of deserving, hard-pressed ranchers.

On the other hand the Tribune found ranchers who declared the program of drouth relief would be a failure, that a few never-solvent cattle raisers would ride out in good shape while the really bona fide rancher caught in the pinchers of low cattle prices and high feed prices would be excluded. They saw in the regulation cars of low-price feed standing sealed on the railroad tracks because of restrictions which made it unlawful for the products to be delivered unless the rancher was bankrupt.

Combined Mileage Of School Busses Total Impressive

Total mileage of busses used by the Matador Independent School district during the past season is impressive. The total mileage of the four busses would equal two trips around the world or more than 50,000 miles.

In transporting an average of 104 students per day the busses traveled a total of 48,941 miles with a total transportation cost of \$7,761.15, divided as follows: Driver salaries \$2,830; gas, oil and repairs \$2,273.22 and payment and interest on notes \$2,657.93.

Three of the busses are now clear of debt according to a report made by Superintendent Bert Ezzell, with a balance of \$1,200 still owed on one vehicle, to be paid during the 1953-54 school year.

Entire cost of the transportation system was paid for from funds received by the school from the state foundation program under the Gilmer-Aiken plan.

Average cost of operating the busses was 847 cents per mile. No accidents were reported by drivers Ted Steen, Mrs. Virgie Clower, Mrs. Pearl Cartwright, and Mrs. Ray Hopkins.

During the past year the busses transported Matador students a total of 3,740 miles on extra-curricular activities, including team and pep squad football trips, basketball trips, music trips and miscellaneous trips for other school purposes.
