Death Tuesday night claimed the life of Mrs. Noble M. (Maggie A.) Groves, 75, after a brief illness of several days. She was conveyed to Stanley Hospital about 8 p. m. and died about 9:30 p. m.

Funeral services were held today at 3:00 p. m. in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Chester O'Brien, pastor of First Baptist Church of Wellington, officiating. Rev. W. B. Vaughn of Matador assisted.

Maggie Lipham was born Sept. 17, 1878 at Montgomery, Alabama. She came with her father to Texas in early girlhood and they lived first in Grayson county, later moving to Jones county.

She was married January 27, 1904 to Noble M. Groves, in Jones county, and they moved to Motley county in 1910. They lived here a number of years.

## Wallace Rattan In Ft. Worth Hospital, Victim Of Slugging

Wallace Rattan, about 58, is unconscious in a Ft. Worth hospital where he has undergone two brain operations, apparently the victim of slugging, although mystery surrounds his condition.

He is the brother of local residents, Virgil, Littleton and Ward Rattan and Mrs. Eldred Seigler; Mrs. J. L. Huey of Afton and Fred Rattan of Amarillo. Fred and Ward Rattan left yesterday to be at their brother's bedside.

No details are known of what caused Mr. Rattan's condition, although he appears to be the victim of footpads. Local officers received notice that he was a patient in the hospital. When information was sought from the Ft. Worth police department, a desk sergeant declared the police had been unable to find any clues.

He said Mr. Rattan had undergone surgery for skull fracture and brain injury and that he was still unconscious. The sergeant said the police could not even trace the means by which Mr. Rattan had been delivered to the hospital, and no record was available of who brought him.

## Ward Rattan out of Sheriff Race

County politics stirred slightly in their lethargy Saturday when Sheriff Candidate Ward Rattan asked that his name not be printed on the July 24 primary ballot.

The withdrawal was announced late Friday, less than an hour before a Tribune press started printing the ballots. County Democratic Chairman W. L. McWilliams called the Tribune after the usual closing time and requested that Rattan's name be taken from the printing form.

The change in the race leaves incumbent Sheriff John Stotts and Sterling Price and eliminates the possibility of a runoff.

Mr. Rattan withdrew from the sheriff's race to accept a place as office manager for the Memphis Production Credit Association, replacing Elworth Jones who has accepted a position in the local PMA office.

"I want to thank everyone for the courtesy and favors I received during my campaign," Mr. Rattan declared, "and I especially want to thank those who worked in my interest."

Absentee voting started here Tuesday (advanced two days because of Sunday and Monday as legal holidays). Tickets have been printed for each of the four precincts and are available for those who will not be in the county on election day and wish to vote in advance.

## Flomot Homecoming Shatters Estimates

### GEESE BROUGHT TO COTTON FIELDS AT ROARING SPRINGS

Most recent innovation introduced to the cotton raising industry of Motley county is large flocks of geese being used by two Roaring Springs farmers to rid their fields of obnoxious growth.

Billy Hand and Charles Long returned last week from Los Cruces, New Mexico with approximately 300 head of geese which have been turned into their cotton fields.

The geese eat Colorado grass, goat-heads and young Johnson grass but do not bother the cotton. The fowls consume vast quantities of the offending growth, and their work is entirely satisfactory.

The geese remain in water tanks and around shade until about 4 p. m. daily when they start to feeding in the fields. The owners of the "hands" may keep them or resell to the New Mexico owner at a discount after they have finished their "work."

### Frances Jones Is Crowned As Queen

TIME has changed the scene in the Flomot community since the first public school was opened in 1893, but the friendly spirit of the Flomot people is the same as it was in the pioneer days. They enjoyed meeting and visiting.

The ex-teachers and students homecoming Saturday and Sunday brought former residents from seven states beside Texas, and the crowds exceeded estimates of the most optimistic sponsors of the meeting. The large gymnasium was filled for all programs while as many more visited on the school campus or in the school building. Estimates of the crowd at the basket lunch and barbecue Sunday was between 1,200 and 1,500.

One former student, Costell Clements, flew 2,500 miles to visit for the first time in 20 years, the small community in which he was reared. Also recognized was Mrs. F. S. Bourland, earliest ex-teacher present, who taught there in 1907.

## County Roads Get Over Half Million Past 5 Years

During the last five years, 28 miles of roads have been built in Motley county. It was the greatest period of road construction history. Highway department files show.

The breakdown by counties as a state totals prepared by the department showed that \$1,300,61 was spent in the period covered cost \$75,158, \$32 more money spent for construction than in any other comparable period.

Figures also showed that Farm Market roads came in for a share of the total. The roads were named a priority because they give farmers needed routes to markets and access to towns surrounding rural areas, a highway official said.

Shivers, who said he was very proud of the excellent way Texas roads have improved in the last half-decade, listed dollars and time saved as two prime benefits to Texas motorists.

"State drivers have been able to save countless hours and money through good roads that provide the ultimate in safety and design," he remarked.

"A road system worthy of its name must provide its motorists with swift, safe routes," he said.
