Some memories remain on the canvas of youth as if painted by the brush of years, while the scenes of yesterday are distorted by the changes of today.

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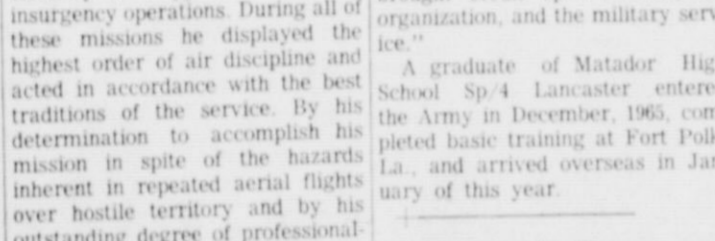

Gary Lancaster is Presented with Air Medal For Vietnam Missions

Sp/4 Gary L. Lancaster, Crew Chief with the 213th Assault Support Helicopter Company (Black Cats) in Vietnam has received the Air Medal and Citation for combat service. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther B. Lancaster of Matador.

The Citation, "by Direction of the President" reads: "The Air Medal is presented to Specialist Four E4 Gary L. Lancaster US4370840, United States Army for distinguishing himself by meritorious achievement while participating in sustained aerial flight in support of combat ground forces of the Republic of Vietnam during the period 4 February 1967 to 22 February 1967.

"During this time he actively participated in more than twenty-five aerial missions over hostile territory in support of counter-insurgency operations. During all of these missions he displayed the highest order of air discipline and acted in accordance with the best traditions of the service. By his determination to accomplish his mission in spite of the hazards inherent in repeated aerial flights over hostile territory and by his outstanding degree of professional-

ism and devotion to duty, he has brought credit upon himself, his organization, and the military service.

A graduate of Matador High School Sp/4 Lancaster entered the Army in December, 1965, completed basic training at Fort Polk, La., and arrived overseas in January of this year.

Orders For Book Exceed Estimate

Orders for reprints of the book "Trail Dust," from the column by the same name in the Tribune, have exceeded earlier estimates, according to Douglas Meador, publisher of the weekly newspaper in which his column has appeared for more than 30 years.

"I had hoped that advance orders would reach a point where I could place an order for the reprinting of the book by late summer," Meador said, "however, if advance sales continue at the present pace, it will be much sooner than my earlier estimates."

The book was originally published by Naylor Company of San Antonio in 1940 under a regular royalty contract. It was out of print by the end of World War II.

When Naylor did not enter into a second publishing, Meador purchased the copyright and had it reprinted in his own name.

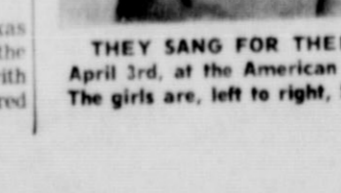
The reprinted copy of the book will contain the same material as published in 1940, with the addition of some photographs and later material from the column.

"My plan was to secure enough orders to insure a margin of safety," Meador said, "so I could increase the printing. If I am able to pay for the original order, I can increase it and perhaps make a profit on the larger number."

"I am grateful for the many orders (some as many as 10). Some have sent money which was not sought, but appreciated. It will be kept in escrow until the book is delivered. Autographs are free to any purchaser who makes a free request. It seems a long time in advance but many say they are buying for Christmas presents."

Registered Horses Die In Truck Fire

SEVEN REGISTERED HORSES, two stallions and five fillies burned to death Friday afternoon in a flaming truck about seven miles east of Matador on US Highway 70.

James Luther Reece of Temple, Oklahoma, driver of the truck and owner of the horses, told Deputy Bobby Williams that he happened to look back and the hay in the floor of the open truck was burning.

Bill Jameson of Matador, going east on the highway about the same time stopped and attempted to render aid, as did the driver of a large truck.

Matador Volunteer Fire Department arrived as soon as possible after word of the tragedy was received here, but all the horses were dead when the fire truck arrived. The firemen extinguished the still burning truck. When rescue efforts failed, some of the suffering horses were shot before the firemen arrived.

Reece said he does not smoke and has not had a match in his pockets in ten years. He said he pulled off the road on his side straight into a borrow ditch when he discovered the fire, in hopes of opening the endgate of the truck. The fire was too intense to get close enough. A large butane fuel tank on the left side of the truck was a menace to rescue attempts but did not explode.

The truck load of five registered horses was en route to Clovis auction sales where Reece said he hoped to sell them for \$35,000. Each of the seven animals was covered with only \$300 insurance. Stud fees on one of the stallions was \$1,000. A large bolt holding the back endgate made it impossible to open because of the intense heat.

Another similar incident occurred about a month ago within about a mile of Friday's fire, when a pickup pulling a race horse in a trailer caught fire. The horse was saved but the pickup sustained heavy damage. Both fires were about the same time of day and both vehicles were traveling the same direction.

Manager Mike L. Hoyle says others who registered to see the new automobile may have lucky cards, but have failed to bring them into the automobile agency.

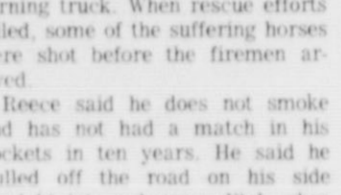

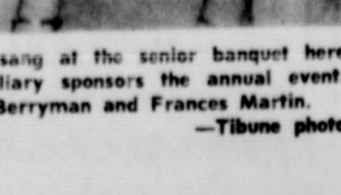

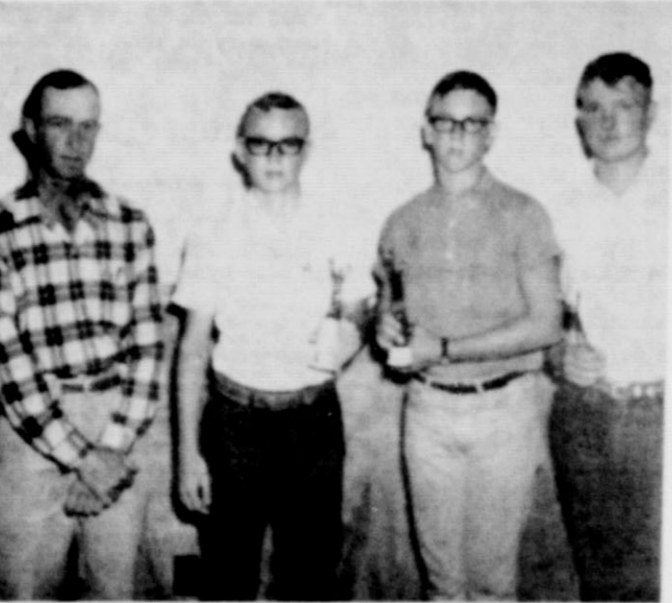
