Total Lunar Eclipse Visible Here Early Next Month

Early-bird Motley Countians will get to watch what promises to be a spectacular sight in the sky early next month. The first total lunar eclipse visible from this hemisphere since May, 1975 will occur Thursday morning, Sept. 6, according to Arthur Schneider, director of the Don Harrington Discovery Center in Amarillo. The celestial show begins at 4:18 a.m., when the moon passes into the darkest part of the earth's shadow, called the umbra, Schneider said.

By 5:31 a.m., the moon will be completely immersed in the shadow. At this time, the moon will still be dimly visible. Depending on how much sunlight is refracted into the earth's shadow by its atmosphere the moon will appear dark grey brown, deep red or rust-colored, brick red and possible a light orange or coppery color. Forest fires and volcanic eruptions can intensify the reddish hue, Schneider said.

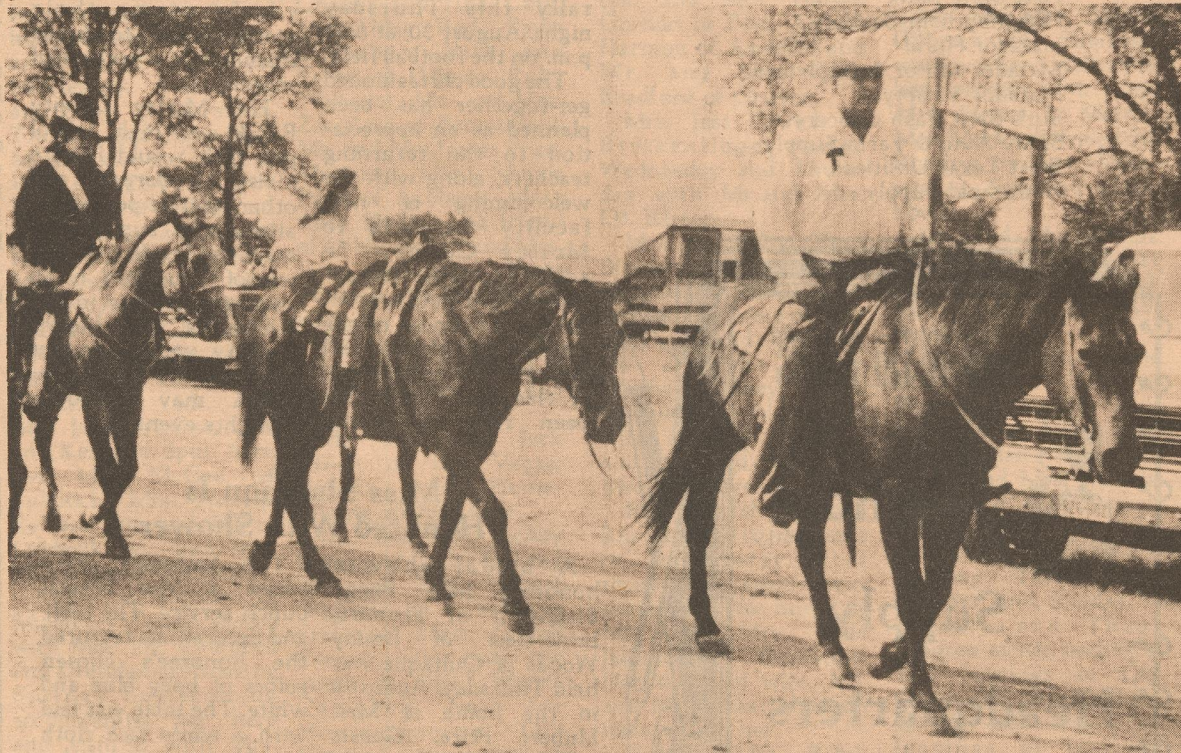
In a telephone interview with the Hesperian, Schneider explained that the lunar eclipse would be visible to most portions of the northern hemisphere, unlike a solar eclipse, which is visible only to a small area. "In a solar eclipse, the moon's shadow is being cast on the earth in a 170-mile-wide path and it's (the shadow) moving across the face of the

earth at several thousand miles an hour," Schneider said. "However," he continued, "when the moon moves into the 8,000-mile-wide earth's shadow practically all you have to do to see it is be a resident of planet Earth."

"On the east coast, for instance, the moon will have set by the time the eclipse occurs," Scheider said. "We just barely squeaked by since the moon will set shortly after the eclipse ends." Area viewers will have the extra attraction of seeing the breathtaking sight of a totally eclipsed moon low in the west during morning twilight, climaxing the sky display for South Plains watchers.

For camera Enthusiasts, Schneider suggested mounting cameras on tripods to prevent motion at slow shutter speeds and focussing the cameras at the "infinity" setting. To ensure a good picture, Schneider suggested taking a wide range of exposures, going from 1/4 sec. to several minutes.

As the eclipse begins, the moon will enter the earth's shadow at 4:18 a.m. The total eclipse will begin at 5:31 a.m., with mid-eclipse at 5:54 a.m. The total eclipse will end at 6:17 a.m. and the moon will leave the earth's umbra at 7:30 a.m.

Although his opening

remarks were sparked with humor, Rev. Williams closed with the somber and thought-provoking question, "Where is the life we've lost, in living?"

Music by the Kent Parks band from Afton entertained as the crowd gathered after viewing the parade from downtown Roaring Springs. Welcome was extended by Roaring Springs Mayor Brown Hinson, and special music was a solo by Kenneth Marvel. Mrs. Grady Webb, the former Mary Green, read the lists of those who had passed away in both counties, since last year. The Dickens County list contained 96 names and the Motley County list, 81.

Corsages were presented to the man and woman present, who had lived in the two counties the longest. These went to Mrs. Esther Clifton of

Roaring Springs and Marvin Patton, Matador, for Motley County, and to A.J. Richey of Dickens County. Mr. Richey was also the oldest person registered. He is 93. Dianna, 7, received the corsage for traveling the farthest to attend Old Settlers. She was accompanied from Stuttgart, Germany by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Gary Marshall, who are Oklahoma City, where they joined his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R.L. (Cotton) Marshall to come to Roaring Springs

for Old Settlers. During an afternoon business session, all officers of the Old Settlers Association were re-elected. They are, Jerry Slaton, president; Bob Forbis, vice president and Billy Joe Whitaker, secretary. Victor Arrington of Dickens was named a director to replace Gary Bridge, who resigned. James Pevehouse Joins 110th District Staff

District Judge George W. Miller has announced the appointment of James L. Pevehouse, a native of Spur, to the position of Adult Probation Officer for the 110th Judicial District, effective August 1, 1979.

Mr. Pevehouse will work with present Chief Probation Officer Lynn Buzbee and will have his office in the Buzbee Building at 407 N. Burlington in Spur. He will supervise felony and misdemeanor adult probationers in the four county district, including Briscoe, Dickens, Floyd and Motley.

"The Adult Probation Department, with the addition of another probation officer, will provide greater service to probationers in this area and will be of greater benefit to the district, at no additional cost to the public, as the four counties only provide office space, equipment and local phone for the Adult Probation Department," Judge Miller said.

Buzbee was appointed Adult Probation Officer on January 1, 1968, by the late Judge L.D. Ratliff and has served in that capacity since that date. He plans on retiring on December 31, 1979, and has made no definite plans for the future.

Mrs. Fay McArthur,

secretary for the Spur office, will continue her work in that capacity.

Judge Miller and Mr. Buzbee state that they are fortunate in having an experienced and qualified officer as Mr. Pevehouse with the Adult Probation Department, and wish for him much success and happiness in his new position.

James Pevehouse is a graduate of Spur High School. He attended South Plains College and served as president of the Gamma Delta Nu, law enforcement fraternity. He graduated in 1976 with an associate degree in Law Enforcement.

Pevehouse then attended the University of Texas at the Permian Basin in Odessa and was active in the internship programs and campus activities there. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice in May, 1978.

After graduation he worked for the Texas Youth Council at the West Texas Childrens Home in Pyote for 9 months. Pevehouse left the Youth Council and started work for the Adult Probation Office in Lubbock as a probation officer, prior to his resignation to accept his appointment in Spur.

Afternoon recess, the visitors gathered in the assembly room where Ted Kingery of Silverton gave the invocation, then Caldwell Smith, speaking for the host community expressed pleasure at the enthusiastic response to their invitation and gratification at the spirit shown during the day.
