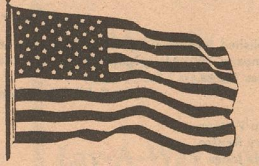

Jean Mize Tucker of Amarillo was elected Homecoming Queen and Don Wason of Plainview was elected Homecoming King. Recognized for having traveled the farthest to attend was Marcia Gilbert Middlebrooks of Washington Court House, Ohio. Mrs. Virgie Sparks Hunter

was recognized as the earliest graduate (1921) from out of the county and three from the class of 1924, Gertrude Groves Smith, Bertha Patton Stearns and Hazel Walton Donovan, were the earliest graduates present, still living in Motley County. Ruth Simpson Cooper and Virgie Hunter were recognized as the earliest teachers present.

Two choral groups entertained with songs for the occasion. Deadline Near For Quarterly Return

October 31, 1979, is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's

Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can obtain one

from local IRS offices. IRS Publication 15, "Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide," is also available at local offices.

Childrens Photo Contest To Begin October 25th

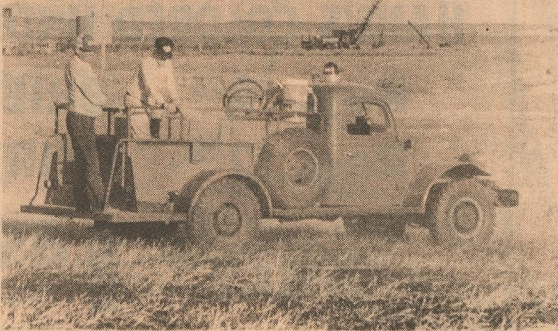

"Fall Weather is here and along with Fall comes very dry conditions and the danger of fires," says Alton Marshall, Fire Chief for the Matador Volunteer Fire Department. Conditions are becoming dry and many areas such as Pastures, Vaccant Lots, and areas around trash barrels are very easily set fire if

caution is not used when in these areas.

"Residents should be extremely careful when burning trash on windy days," adds Chief Marshall. Also remember that a cigarette or match thrown out the car window could start a very dangerous and costly range fire.

Matadors Battle to Double Zero Tie

The Matadors battled Claude to a 0-0 tie Friday night before a packed homecoming stadium. The game was the third 0-0 tie for Claude this year.

Defensive teams looked good as both offensive squads seemed to stall on each drive. After each team had the ball once Claude got the first break of the game when they blocked a Motley County punt on the Matador 44 yard line. In 12 plays the Mustangs had driven to the MC six, but fumbled back on the eight and a Matador fell on the ball.

Three plays later MC lost the ball on a fumble but had moved the ball out to the 21. Claude advanced the ball only six yards and gave up the ball on downs on the Matador 14 yard line. Before the half ended the Matadors punched the ball into Mustang territory and drove to the 38, but on the last play of the first half Mustang, Jason Cartwright picked off a Matador pass to end the drive.

With 2:51 left in the third quarter Claude again blocked a MC punt and got the ball on the 25 yard line of the Matadors. The Matadors defense rose to the occasion again and the Mustang drive stalled on the 10 yard line, where the Matadors took over again.

With 6:43 left in the game, Motley County

got a big break when a 15 yard penalty on a punt moved the ball on a fumble on the 12.

Four plays later Claude had to punt the ball out and the Matadors tried to mount one last drive before the game ended. After 12 plays they had the ball inside the Claude 20 and with four seconds left in the game called time-out to try a field goal. As the ball was snapped and the last second ticked off the clock, Mustangs broke through the offensive line and blocked the field-goal attempt, ending the game at 0-0.

Charlie Campbell had 47 yards on 14 carries, Harvey Lee had 41 in seven carries, Randy Meredith had 35 in 10 and Dewight Campbell caught one pass for 10 yards. Shawn Bearden carried six times for 12 yards and attempted three passes with no completions. The offensive teams rushed for 135 yards and Julian had one pass completion for 10 yards, making the total yardage 145.

Meredith led the defensive team in tackles with 11, Lee had nine, Steven Zarate, Glen Calvert, and Bill Palmer each had seven and Zabielski had six.

The Matadors will face the Happy Cowboys, Friday night at Happy. Happy has a 0-6 record, but has played a tough schedule.

Mr. Ferguson passed away on Thursday in the Plains Convalescent Home in Plainview after a lengthy illness.

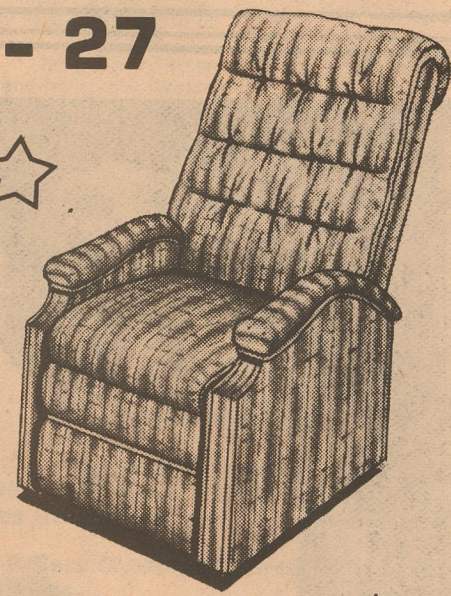
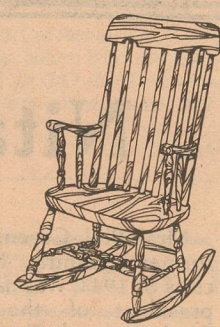
A native of Avalon, Ellis County, Texas, he had lived in the Roaring Springs area since 1918. He was a retired farmer

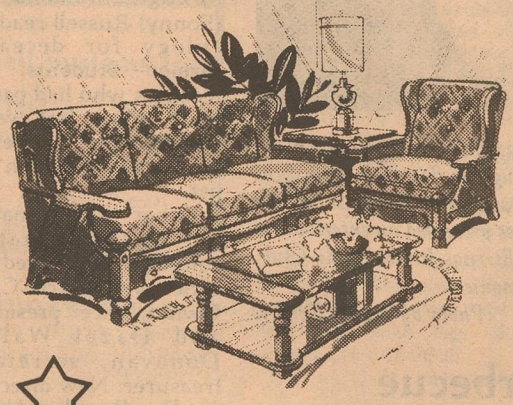

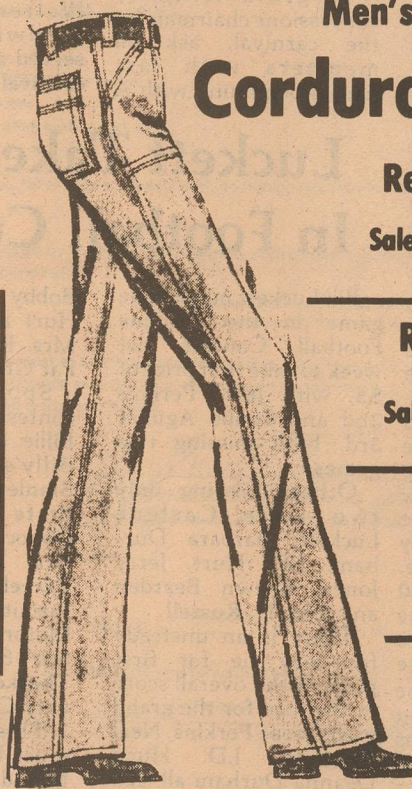

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SBA Declares Motley Among Disaster Conties

Motley County is among fifteen west Texas Counties which have been declared a disaster area by the Small Business Administration Vernon Weaver.

Farmers, Ranchers and Crop Producers who had crop losses due to the recent hailstorms and severe weather are eligible for low interest loan assistance from the Agency. These loans are at either 5% or 7 3/8% interest, depending upon the applicants ability to obtain credit from other sources, and are repayable on terms in line with the repayment ability of the applicant. Up to half of the loan proceeds may be used for 1979 operating debt repayment with the balance to be used for crop production next year.

Applicants may borrow only up to the amount of actual loss as verified by the County ASCS Committee and the SBA cannot duplicate insurance, ASCS, FmHA

or other assistance received. The SBA in determining eligibility uses the following formula: Acres planted X established normal yield X percentage of loss X market price - recoveries equals loss amount. Loan applications must be submitted by April 10, 1980, on physical loss, and July 10, 1980 on Economic Injury disaster loans to agricultural related businesses suffering losses due to the disaster.

1980 Cotton Program
The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service invited farmers and other interested persons to submit recommendations on the 1980 Upland Cotton Program.

Program provisions under consideration includes the upland cotton target price, the National program acreage and allocation factor, and the voluntary reduction from 1979 upland cotton acreage to guarantee target price protection on total 1980 planted acreage.

Farmers should also express their opinion on whether there should be a set-aside requirement, and if so, how much? If a set-aside is in effect, whether there should be acreage limitation and additional diversion.

The deadline for receiving comments is November 19, 1979.

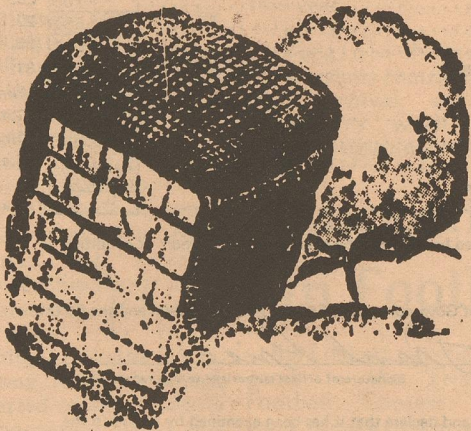

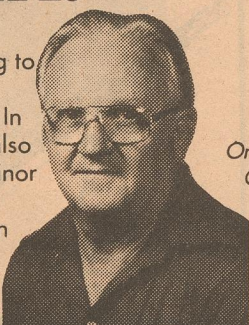
