Program Describes Baptist Mission

Baptist Mission work in foreign countries was given a new meaning Wednesday night of last week, in a special program at the First Baptist Church. Clay Coursey, former missionary to Kenya, now on furlough and residing in Plainview, outlined his work in East Africa, and the progress which is being made. Mrs. Coursey also works in the foreign mission fields with her husband.

Also speaking was Joe Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Pansy. near Crosbyton, who has received an appointment with his wife, to serve in Ghana on the western coast of Africa.

Rev. Perkins told of the extensive preparations necessary to be appointed as missionaries, as required by the Southern Baptist Mission Board. All applicants are carefully screened, he said, and must have a college degree to go as appointed

Lay-persons may serve on a part time basis, going as volunteers for one or two years and paying part of own expenses. The African natives still
