The purpose of the Upper Pease SWCD, with headquarters in Matador is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

CARAVAN TO FOLLOW TEAM

A caravan of football fans will again follow the Motley Matadors when they leave tomorrow for Valley High School and a contest with the Patriots. The caravan will form at the courthouse ready to leave at 6:15.

In Friday night's game against the Silverton Owls, Jerry Lee slashed for 251 yards to lead a punishing Motley County attack, defeating the Owls 41-3.

The impressive District 2-B North victory should enable the Matadors to retain a lofty rating in area and state listings.

Going into the mismatch, Motley County was billed as the No. 2 squad in area B ball, and ranked sixth in the state. The Matadors are 7-0, while Silverton lost its seventh consecutive game without a victory.

Lee scored on runs of 58, 4 and 5 yards, and kicked three extra points.

Silverton got on the board first with its only points on a field goal by Jace Francis.

Lee then tallied on his 58-yard jaunt, and quarterback Harold Dempsey scored on a 1-yard run.

Along with Lee's other two TDs, Todd McCandless recovered a fumble in the end zone for six points, and Mike Green scored on a 25-yard run.

Hospital Receives Additional Grants

Grants totaling approximately \$20,000 for continuation of hospital support through December 31 have been assured Motley County Hospital District, it was announced this week by Sut Braselton, hospital administrator.

Mr. Braselton last week met in Austin with the Texas Hospital Association and with the Department of Community Affairs, at which time the grants were appropriated by the DCA.

The funds will augment those received during the summer from the Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) in maintenance of hospital operations. The grants received from the Department of Community Affairs, however, will be used in an area apart from the CETA training program.

The approval of the hospital for Medicare reimbursements has further assured the continuance of the facility, with the cooperation of patients in paying the deductibles. The hospital administration has received the first Medicare claims for May services. It had been assured when Medicare was approved, that claims would be covered retroactive to May 2.

In announcing the grants received last week in Austin, Braselton, in behalf of the hospital staff, expressed appreciation to Ben F. McDonald Jr., and Betty Libbie of the Department of Community Affairs and special thanks to Senator Ray Farabee for their assistance in securing the additional funds for the continuation of the hospital support.

The number of hospital and clinic patients is accelerating daily, coming from surrounding counties for medical attention and emergency treatment. The services of an additional physician have been provided to cover for Dr. Y Hoang Do during the week ends, and negotiations are underway for a full time physician to practice with Dr. Do.

Matador; Hall County Electric, Memphis; Dickens Electric, Spur; Lighthouse Electric, Floydada; Mrs. Ike Reed, Flomot; Spur Milk and Ice Cream, Spur; Mrs. Baird's Bread (Doyle Rose), Matador, and The Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District, Matador.

Douglas Campbell, Matador, President of the Motley County 4-H Clubs will serve as Master of Ceremonies, and Mrs. J. M. (Sonny) Russell, Chairman of Motley County 4-H subcommittee is in charge of overall arrangements.

Receiving recognition for their work in the 1976-77 club year, will be one hundred and one club members, with presentations made by leaders and sponsors.

Those in attendance will include 4-H winners and their parents, 4-H leaders, 4-H sponsors and program backers and special guests.

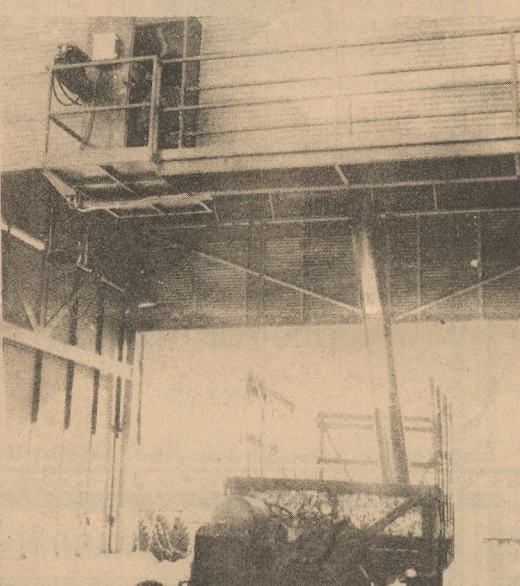
Teachers Spotlight

The Motley County School Board met in regular session, Tuesday, October 11 at the Motley County School with the following on the agenda:

Bills were paid and a new 19 passenger school bus was ordered. They also renewed membership in "Texans for Equitable Taxation."

Policies were set on Procedures for Waiving Fee or Deposit, which states: Upon receipt by the District of reliable proof that a pupil and his or her parents or guardian are unable to pay a deposit or fee required by the school, such deposit or fee shall be waived. Such pupil and his parent or guardian must present evidence of their disability to the pupil's principal, who shall pass upon the fact of ability to pay. This policy shall be posted in a central location in each school facility, in the school policy manual and in the student handbook.

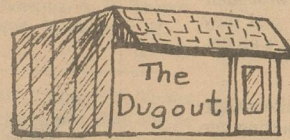

Program Presented Club On Graphology

Handwriting Analysis, or graphology was the subject of an interesting program presented by Mrs. Frank Pohl at regular meeting of El Progreso Study Club Thursday, Oct. 13, at the home of Mrs. W. N. Pipkin. Mrs. Frank Price, president, served as leader in the absence of Mrs. Ben Keltz, who was ill.

"Graphology is an interesting and valuable short cut toward understanding the inner personality of others as well as your self," Mrs. Pohl explained in her introduction. "Knowing the clues to character through handwriting formations provides a basis for adapting yourself to others' personalities and making life happier for you as well as your companions."

Graphology as it is known today, is more than 300 years old, Mrs. Pohl said, and the first book on the subject was written in 1630 by an Italian. However, references on the subject date back to Nero, "I fear this man because his writing shows him to be treacherous," and Confucius, who said, "Beware of a man whose writing sways as the reed in the wind."

Mrs. Pohl pointed out that "Graphology is quickly gaining recognition as a science in this country. Graphologists are retained by many business firms to aid them in screening applicants for specific jobs."

She used charts to illustrate the characteristics revealed in various signatures, including several sets of twins, both identical and unidentical, and of famous persons such as Walt Disney, Eleanor Roosevelt, Jacqueline Kennedy, Lowell Thomas, Tom Landry and actresses Norma Shearer, Clara Bow and Marie Dressler.

The slant of the lines, size and shape of various letters, how an "i" is formed, whether letters are bold or light, and the things people draw while "doodling" or just scribbling reveal many facets of character.

"Handwriting is acutely brain writing -- a direct visible manifestation of the brain's impulses to the hand telling the writer not only what to write, but how to write," Mrs. Pohl said. "Handwriting mirrors the mind."

As a final illustration, she displayed signatures of Larry Carnell Fortenberry, convicted killer of Sheriff Jinks Wilson, and Stacy Albert Carter, who is serving time for attempted murder.

"Fortenberry's signature discloses a very hard character, while that of Carter reveals weakness of character," Mrs. Pohl pointed out, traits which also had been noted by the prosecuting attorneys.

Inspirational Thought by Mrs. Douglas Meador was a quotation on "Character," by Helen Keller.

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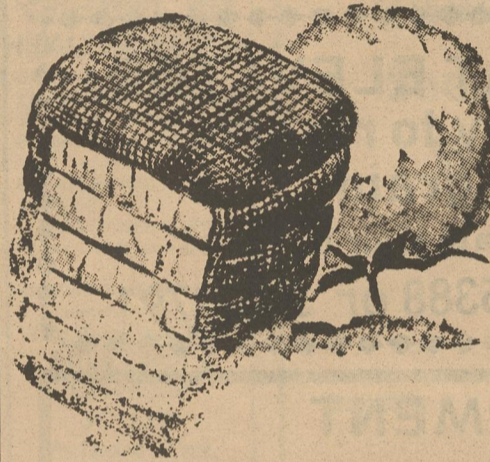

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Bearden will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law. Other members of the Board include H. R. Jameson, W. D. Lipscomb, Tom Ross and W. H. Marshall.

In Texas there are 198 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Policy was also set regarding administering medication to pupils. The following employees of the district are authorized to administer medication to pupils in accordance with the rules hereinafter stated:

(1) Principals, (2) Nurses, (3) Teachers, (4) Counselors and (5) aides. No employee shall administer any medication to a pupil unless the district has received a written request to administer the same from the parents, legal guardians or other person having control of the pupil.

No prescription medication shall be administered to a pupil unless written request of the parent has been received by the district as well as a written request from a licensed physician or dentist to administer the medication.



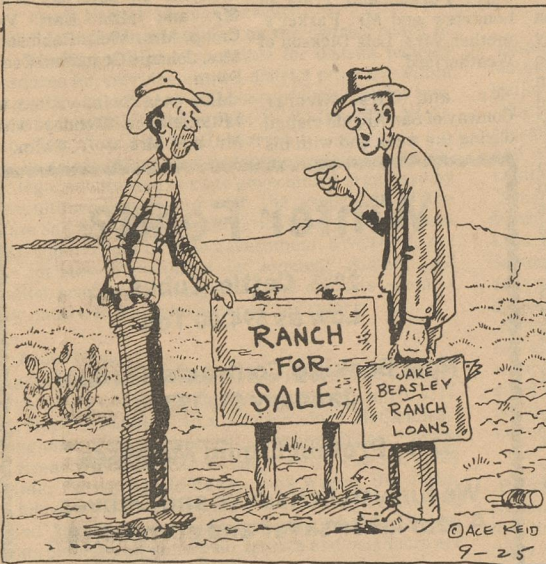
