## East Afton Man Killed In Mishap

Thomas Augustus (Gus) Martin, 61, of East Afton was killed instantly about 3:50 p.m. Friday in a one-vehicle accident, 4.4 miles southwest of Afton on FM 265 in Dickens County. Mr. Martin was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Alma Lee Yeates of Dickens.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Robert Klaus said Martin's 1967 Ford van failed to negotiate a turn and the victim was ejected from his vehicle.

Mr. Martin was born June 16, 1916 at Lingoville, Texas and had been a resident of Afton for the past 55 years. His parents were Augustus Clay and Alice Martin Clay. He was married to the former Jack Powell. A veteran of World War II, Mr. Martin had farmed and managed the East Afton Gym for the last 23 years. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Graveside funeral rites were held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the Afton Cemetery, with burial under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife, Jack; four daughters, Ann Grubb of Grand Prairie, Sue Martin of Dallas, Jan Martin of Afton and Kay Martin of Little Rock Ark.; two sisters, Frances Laymance of Friona and LaNell Kendrick of Hereford; a stepmother, Ina Mae Bennett of Dickens.

## Program Features Crime Prevention

Almost three-fourths of offenders released after serving prison terms are rearrested within four years. Mrs. John Hamilton told members of Matador Lions Club Tuesday at the club's regular semi-monthly luncheon meeting in the United Methodist Church.

Introduced by program chairman Lion John M. (Sonny) Russell, Mrs. Hamilton presented a program on Crime Prevention and cited further that "Seventy-seven percent of persons arrested for robbery were under the age of 25 and that 58 percent were under age 21."

The ordinary citizen must get concerned and involved, Mrs. Hamilton declared. Many communities, she said, have formed a "neighborhood watch" to report any unusual activities in the neighborhood. "If a burglar can't get in within four minutes, he gives up and goes on the next house or building," she said in discussing guides to home and business security, in terms of "Lock Up!"

Windows and doors should be securely locked, Mrs. Hamilton stressed. "Crime Prevention experts recommend deadbolt locks to provide the security needed for exterior doors." For places of business she said that all windows should be barred, and that a safe in full view of the street was less likely to be burglarized than one hidden in the back of the building.

"Operation Identification," is another method of fighting crime, especially the theft of items both large and small. Identification is made with a hand tool which engraves pertinent information on the article. In this connection, it is suggested that the property be marked with the owner's driver's license number and letters TX to designate Texas. M. S. Hamilton has one of these machines which she offers for use, to anyone who wishes to borrow it.

Lion Frank Price, 1st vice president, presided in the absence of Boss Lion Emilio Aguilar. He led the club in an expression of the fine luncheon served by the Methodist Women, and reminded the members of the volleyball tournament which the club is sponsoring during the week end, starting tonight (Thursday) and continuing through Saturday.

He reported that the club has decided that helping to keep the high school building should be the decision of individuals and not taken on as a club project. He also announced that the District Lions meeting will be May 12-14 in Dalhart. Plans are also being discussed for an All Sports Banquet, Lion Price further announced.

## Matador Voters Elect Woman For First Time

Only one newcomer was elected to the Motley County Independent School District board in a large voter turnout Saturday.

Mrs. Kelly (Wilberta) Jackson was the first woman ever to be elected to the school board with 223 votes. Also re-elected to the board were Billy Hand, 284 votes and Bundy Hal Campbell, 210 votes. Don Warren received 177 votes.

Kirby Campbell was re-elected mayor of Matador with 153 votes. He ran unopposed, but six write-in candidates were reported. City council incumbents Algine Groves and Doyle Rose both ran unopposed and were re-elected with small write-in competition. Groves received 146 votes and Rose received 140 votes.

Three Motley County General Hospital Board members were re-elected as unopposed candidates: Ronnie Cox, 28; Ronnie Christian, 28; and Larry Hoyle, 304.

## R.S. City Council Election Results

Alvie Melton and Pearl Palmer were re-elected to the Roaring Springs City Council in Saturday's election, along with Harold Parks, a newcomer to the council. Alvie Melton received 84 votes, Harold Parks, 55; Pearl Palmer, 53; and Tommie Wilson, 45. There was one write-in vote.

Judges were Sherry Parnell, Roberta Whitaker, Sally Truelock and Mittie Gardner, 4-H leaders from Cottle County.

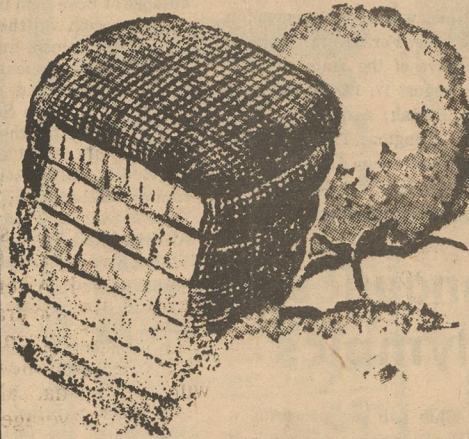

## Your 1978 social security deduction

In addition to the increases in the tax rate and wage base previously scheduled for this year, the social security law recently was amended to provide for additional revenues in later years to insure the financial stability of the social security system well into the next century. Social security provides disability and survivors insurance protection throughout your working years, as well as a monthly income you can depend on when you retire.

The table below shows the tax rate and wage base for 1979 through 1981. After that, the tax rate will increase gradually until it reaches 7.65 percent for 1990 and later years, and the earnings base will rise automatically according to increases in average wage levels.

In	Employers and employees each will pay	On earnings up to
1979	6.13%	\$22,900
1980	6.13%	\$25,900
1981	6.65%	\$29,700

Although the increases in the taxable base mean workers in those higher income brackets will be paying more into social security, they also will be able to count on higher benefits later. Their payments will be higher because benefit amounts are based on earnings credited for social security.

Another change in the law increases the amount people age 65 to 72 can earn and still get full social security payments. People 65-72 who work while they get social security payments can earn up to \$4,000 in 1978 without losing any of their benefits, and that amount will increase in the future. The amount people under 65 can earn in 1978 without losing any social security benefits is \$3,240.

Under present law, there is no limit on earnings for beneficiaries 72 or older. The new law provides that, starting in 1982, there will be no limit on earnings for beneficiaries who are 70 or older.

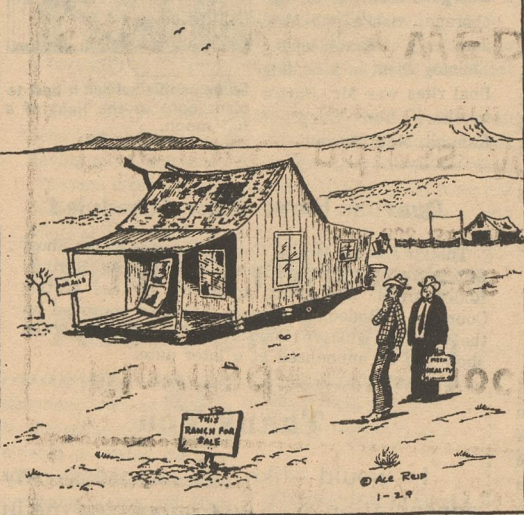
