CHARLIE RAINBOLT CLAIMED BY DEATH

Charlie Rainbolt, 63, resident of the Afton and Roaring Springs area for over 30 years, died Wednesday morning following a heart attack. He was stricken while riding a tractor on his farm, but was able to drive to his house before succumbing, about 8:45.

Funeral services will be held at 3 p.m. today (Thursday) at the Church of Christ, Afton, Minister Cardinal of Lubbock will officiate. Burial will be in the Afton Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mr. Rainbolt was born March 10, 1904 at Waltrip, in McCulloch County, Texas. He was married to Miss Bonnie Motley, May 26, 1924 at Anson.

Survivors include his wife, two daughters, Mrs. C. E. Haney of Arlington, Texas and Miss Mae Rainbolt, a senior student at West Texas State University, Canyon, four grandchildren, two brothers, Archie Rainbolt of Roaring Springs and Bill Rainbolt of Spur, and two sisters, Mrs. Ruby Bray of Lubbock and Mrs. Tim Robbins of Anton.

Watson Townsend Dies in Accident

A HIGHWAY MISHAP Tuesday morning claimed the life of Watson Townsend, 35, of El Paso, former Matador resident and son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Townsend.

He left Fort Hood on April 11 for his overseas assignment, after a visit here with his parents.

Funeral services are set for 10 a.m. Friday, at Harding-Orr Funeral Home, 3707 Pershing Drive in El Paso. Burial will be in the Fort Bliss Cemetery.

Townsend, an employee of the State Highway Department, was killed when struck by a passing motorist, while at work.

He was born June 30, 1932 at Rockchita, Bryan County, Okla. His family moved to Motley County when he was young, and he grew up here, graduating from Matador High School in 1952. He worked a year for the Highway Department here, before entering military service in 1953. He attended Sul Ross College in Alpine, and Texas Western University in El Paso. While in El Paso, he was employed with the Texas Highway Dept. Information Bureau.

He was married to Miss Celia Morales, Feb. 2, 1957 at Las Cruces, N.M. and they came to Matador in 1959, living here until Sept. 1965, during which time he was employed by the Highway Dept. After leaving Matador, they lived in Odessa before moving to El Paso. Survivors include his wife, and four children, Larry, Brenda, Jeffrey and Lorie, all of the home, 955 Burgess Drive, El Paso; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Townsend, Matador; two brothers, J. D. Townsend, Matador and Donald Townsend, Lubbock; and a sister, Mrs. Alvin Eisenhauer of San Antonio.

The parents and brothers left Matador about 1:30 a.m. Wednesday, for El Paso, and will return by San Antonio, where a family reunion had previously been planned for this week end, at the Eisenhauer home.

A BILL IN AUSTIN allowing the Motley County Hospital District to issue revenue bonds, passed the house Thursday and was sent to Governor Connally, according to an article appearing in the Amarillo Daily News, Friday issue. The bill has been pending in the legislature for some time.

John V. Stevens, chairman of the hospital board, said Tuesday he had no comment until the bill is passed and becomes law. The board is composed of Stevens, Farris Fish, J. N. Fletcher, J. M. Hill and J. C. Franks.

The article appearing in the Amarillo newspaper, is as follows:

"AUSTIN — The House passed and sent to Gov. John Connally Thursday a bill by Sen. Jack High-tower of Vernon that would allow Motley County Hospital District to issue revenue bonds.

"The bill was carried in the House by Rep. Bill Heatley of Paducah.

"Under existing law the hospital district is empowered to service bonds only through taxation. SB 217 would enable the district to issue revenue or special obligation bonds payable from revenues of the entire hospital system.

"The bill has a record vote in both houses. This means it becomes law immediately after it is signed by the governor."

Rev. James Hancock Resigns as Pastor Of Baptist Church

Rev. James Hancock, Sunday tendered his resignation as pastor of the First Baptist Church. He has served the congregation as pastor since November 1, 1964.

In his statement of resignation, Rev. Hancock stated that he had accepted a call extended him by the First Baptist Church of Ozona, to be effective May 29.

"It is with a deep feeling of compunction that we feel moved to leave this church to go to another. We feel led to go to Ozona, because of the vast opportunities to reach the unsaved, and the challenge which that field offers," he stated.

Rev. Hancock's ministry here has been fruitful, and he and his family will be missed, not only by the Baptist church, but by the entire community.

Sacred Stewardship of the Soil Stressed in Lions Club Address

MANKIND has a sacred obligation to good stewardship of the soil to leave it fertile for posterity.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer explained the ancient code in the principal address made Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

Palmeyer is a member of the club and Lion Howard Traweck was program sponsor. The address had been made previously in the Methodist Church during Soil Stewardship Week.

Using excerpts from the Bible repeatedly, Palmeyer stressed a point that present soil and water conservation regulations were not made at AAM College or in Washington.

"Man is only soil in an advanced state," Palmeyer said, "and generations of the future must look to the heritage left to them today. We wear out the substance of the land without replacing what we have taken.

"It is exactly the same as a bank account on which checks are given but no deposits are made. The land is not ours but to use. Government and state agencies have been set up to preserve natural resources for the future, but also to make fruits of the land more abundant for the present."

He cited Bible quotations in which advice was given to rest the land, and to improve both the soil and cattle. "Much of the hunger in the world today could be dispelled if proper conservation practices were used on all the land."

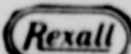

"While tornadoes can occur any time of the year," Garrison said, "April, May, and June are the peak months."

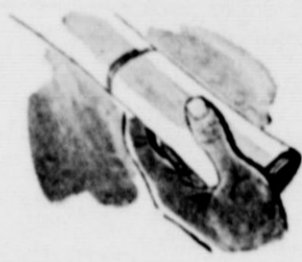
U. S. Weather Bureau records indicate that Texas leads the nation in total number of tornadoes per

Dear Mr. Meador:

Shortly after arriving overseas I began receiving the Matador Tribune each week. After inquiring as to the source of the subscription I was informed that it was the practice of your newspaper to furnish a copy each week to all of the area servicemen serving in a foreign country.

I'm sure that I speak for all servicemen everywhere when I say that news from home is the greatest thing that a serviceman can receive. Few people realize just how much a card, letter, newspaper, or a simple note from home actually means to those of us that are so far away from the "folks at home" unless they have experienced it themselves.

My wife and I look forward each week to receiving our copy of the Tribune as I'm certain that all of those receiving it do. Thank you Mr. Meador for remembering those of us that are serving abroad.

Germany is really a land of enchantment. There is so much to see, so much to do, and so much to learn from its historical past and its fascinating present. Kaiserslautern is located in the lower Rhineland-Pfalz district. It is about 250 miles east of Paris, France and about 90 miles south of Frankfurt, Germany. The city has a population of around 150,000 and lies in a valley surrounded by rolling hills and tall evergreen trees. It once was a favorite recreation spot for kings and noblemen. My wife and I are thoroughly enjoying the tour over here and will be reluctant to leave it behind.

Again, let me thank you for what you are doing. It is a deed that will long be remembered and long appreciated.

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
