## A Second Glance

The battle for the Panama Canal is not over. It has been reopened by the November 7 election results. Six Senators who voted to give the U.S. Canal and zone at Panama were defeated. Seven others did not return to Washington in January. Under the terms of the Senate's action last Spring, the U.S. House of Representatives has until March 31 to use its constitutional authority to stop the final approval of the Canal surrender agreement between Jimmy Carter and Omar Torrijos. If, before March 31, the House exercises its power under Article IV, Section Three, Clause Two of the Constitution, the transfer of American territory and property to the Marxist Panamanian dictatorship will be blocked. It's time to write the Congressmen again.

The House of Delegates met at 8 a.m. Saturday to conduct the business of the association.

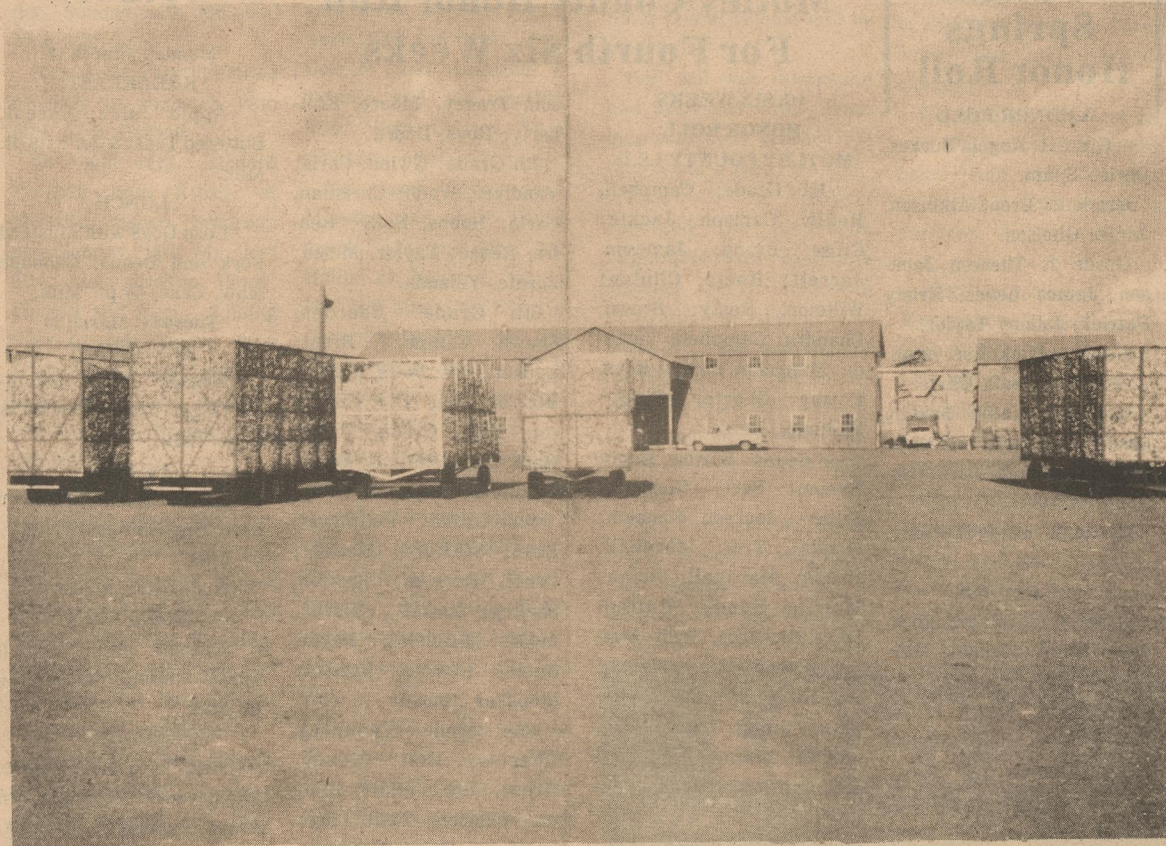
General session was highlighted by a performance of the Area Choirs, the Ima Dee Singers, and the Sharon Singers.

By the time deadlines had been reached to file for the upcoming school board and city elections, a total of eight candidates had filed for the three positions on the school board, two had filed for the Roaring Springs mayor position, five candidates for

Roaring Springs councilmen positions and three had filed for re-election to Matador City Council.

D. A. "Brown" Hinson and Mrs. Pearl Palmer filed as candidates for the position of mayor of Roaring Springs.

Seeking a position on the school board are incumbents Bill Hand and Tom Ross, along with Roger Vinson, Wayne Hunter, Pearl Palmer, Gale Stafford and Bill Durham.

The three persons who filed for councilmen of Matador are L. B. Campbell,

Joe Smith and Lewis Bostick.

To fill the two positions in Roaring Springs City Council three persons have filed: J. D. Mitchell, Vincente Saenz, and incumbent Jeff Thacker for the two two-year positions, and Tommy Wilson and Eugenia Bethard filed for the unexpired term (one year) of city council person, Pearl Palmer.

At five o'clock March 13 only incumbents Larry Hoyle and Algie Groves had filed for the Motley County Hospital board.

## Plans In Final Stages For Jr. Stock Show

The 39th annual Motley County Jr. Livestock Show will be held at the old FFA building in Matador Monday March 26th, according to J. Don Finch Chairman of the Motley County Livestock Association, sponsor of the show for 4-H and FFA members under supervision of local advisors.

Steers, market hogs and market lambs must be weighed and tagged by 9:30 a.m. with weighing starting at 7:30 a.m. Rabbits and heifers must be entered by 9:30 a.m.

Market hogs must weigh 190 to 250 pounds, and can be either barrows or gilts.

Steers must weigh 800 pounds or more, and must not have any permanent teeth that show at time of weighing. Sheep must weigh from 80 to 140 pounds and all milk teeth must be intact. An exhibitor may show up to 6 market hogs, 2 market lambs and 2 rabbits. There is no limit on steers.

The heifer classes are open to anyone living in Motley County, owning land in Motley County, or Jr's. eligible to show in the Jr. Livestock Show. A maximum of 2 heifers, crossbred or straightbred may be shown. They must be from 12 to 18 months of age.

The show starts at 10:00 a.m. and proceeds as follows: Light market hogs,

medium market hogs, heavy market hogs, Grand Champion Market Hog. Light lambs, medium lambs, heavy lambs, Grand Champion Market Lamb. Rabbit bucks, rabbit does, Grand Champion Rabbit. Crossbred heifers, straightbred heifers, Grand Champion Heifer.

The steer show starts at 1:30 p.m., and will be shown as follows: Light steers, medium steers, heavy steers, Grand Champion Steer. The following rule applies to steer, lamb and market hog classes. If 15 or more animals are shown, they will be divided into 3 classes; 9 thru 14 animals, 2 classes; 8 animals or less, 1 class.

Class will be divided approximately equal depending on weights, but the same weight will not be placed into separate classes to allow the same number in each class. If weights of several animals are the same at the division of classes, all of the same weight will be placed in the lighter weight class.

Directors whose term expire are: J. Don Finch, Gale Stafford and Larry Bynum.

Bill Moss and Bill Pallmeyer are show advisors.

As additional support is pledged for the show, recognition will be given.

Chairman of show divisions will be announced after the show meeting scheduled for March 22nd.

The sale of the top 6 animals in the market classes will follow selection of the Grand Champion Steer. After the floor bids are auctioned, sale premium on animals (Dollars over floor bid) will start. All hogs must sell due to health regulations, but steers or lambs may be withheld from the sale if the exhibitor wishes.

Milton Mann, Vocational Agricultural Instructor from Clarendon will serve as judge for the show and Don McCandless, Floydada, will serve as auctioneer.

Billy's Grocery, Matador, will serve breakfast consisting of pancakes and sausage to those associated with the show from 7:00 to 9:30 a.m. A concession stand will be operated by the Motley County 4-H Clubs from 9:30 to conclusion of the show. Sandwiches and drinks will be available.

Showmanship prizes will be provided by Lee's Feed & Seed, Roaring Springs, and trophies by: VFW, American Legion, Ronnies, Matador Auto Co., Stanley Pharmacy, Motley County Abstract Co., W.E. Burleson Estate, Mr. and Mrs. J.C. Cross, Peck and Donna Thompson, Matador; Swiftly Distributors and Floydada Seed and Delinting Co., Floydada; and Lubbock Stockyards, Lubbock.

Ribbons, rosettes and extra prize money will be provided by the Motley County Farm Bureau.

The First State Bank, Matador, will provide \$150 for the Grand Champion Steer, \$100 for the Reserve Champion Steer, \$50 for 1st place steers that are not grand or reserve champions, and \$20 for other steers in the show. Five dollars will be awarded for each hog and lamb not in the sale.

Other officers and directors are: Larry Bynum, Vice-chairman; Gale Stafford, Recorder; Roy Stephens, Secretary; Ros Bearden and Joe Ike Clay, Directors.

Members of the Motley County PTA are reminded of the regular meeting to be held at 7 p.m., Monday, March 19 in the Motley County School cafeteria.

Members are urged to be present for this meeting as the recommendations for new officers by the nominating committee will be presented and voted on.

## Matador Ranch History To Be KCBD TV Feature

The history of the Matador Cattle Company will be broadcast March 28 and 29 on the KCBD television program "People Place", according to Alice French, hostess of the renowned morning show.

"This is our tribute to ranching in West Texas over the last one hundred years, Ms. French said. "And this is the 100th anniversary of the Matador Ranch."

The telecast, which will appear in two thirty minute programs on Channel 11 in Lubbock, will start at 9 a.m.

on both days.

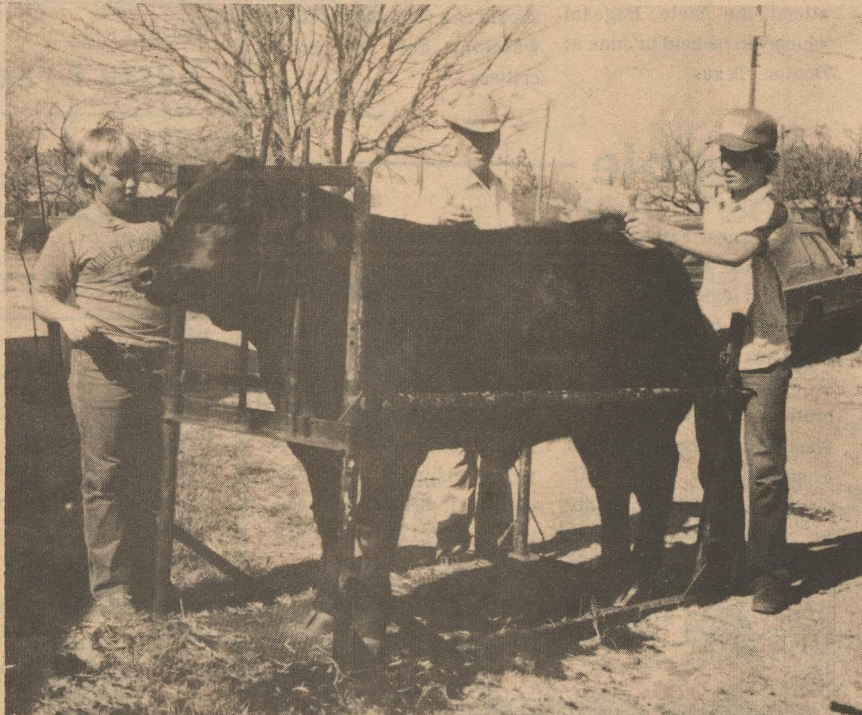
Appearing on the show will be John and Helen Stevens, and the filming was, for the most part, at their home and ranch, which used to be part of the Matador Ranch. Mr. Stevens was superintendent of the ranch when it sold in 1951.

David Murrah, archivist at Southwest Collection at Texas Tech university, will also be a guest on the program. All the papers and records dealing with the ranch since its beginning are recorded and kept at the

University.

The ranch was begun in 1879 when H.H. Campbell selected Ballard Springs for the headquarters for the Matador Cattle Company. The first cattle arrived on the ranch in December 1879, from South Texas and the ranch soon ran 100,000 head.

The television program promises to be informative, entertaining and most enjoyable to the people who live in the foothill country around the ranch, where so much history has been and is being made.

## Farm Roundup

### County Agent Says

By Bill Pallmeyer  
While driving around I have noticed several things that need to be done. For those who have pines or similar trees, or rose bushes, have you placed sulfur around these acid loving plants this year? If not, why not try placing sulfur at the drop line of the plants and see if you are not pleased with the results.

Next it is time to start spraying fruit trees if you want to head off disease and insect problems. If you still don't have your copy of what to use and when to spray, ask for a copy of the fruit and nut homeowners spray schedule. I think many of you have found out that if you don't spray, and the year is right for production, insects and diseases get a lot of the crop, and on the other hand if you spray, a late freeze usually wipes you out. What chance do you want to give your trees?

I have also seen bagworms on several evergreens. Now is the time to control this insect also. Something new is showing up, and even though it is too late to do anything about it this year, look and see if you don't find scale on your fruit and nut trees. If so, keep this in mind. Next January, spray with dormant oil.

Scale is also being found on hedges and similar plants. If you find small cottony white insects on the leaves or stems of these plants, start controls now. You will need a mixture of dormant oil and Malation, and more than one spray may be needed. It's your choice! Kill the insects, or let them kill the plant!

For those who are applying fertilizer, be sure the applicator is properly adjusted. If you are doing the work yourself, I have material that will help you check on either liquid or dry applicators.

Were your heating bills high this winter? Not counting the added on fuel adjustment? If so, you might

think about insulation which will also help to keep the house cooler this summer. I have several publications on this subject that you may be interested in. These deal with R-factors, types of insulation and other ways you can help to make your home more energy efficient.

Thickness is not the entire answer to proper insulation, but the R-value stands for the resistance to heat moving through insulation. Heat always moves from hot to cold, and the longer it takes this to happen, the better the insulation. For example, it takes 11 hours for one BTU of heat to travel through a certain thickness of insulation, and in addition, double thickness does not mean double resistance to this transfer.

I have written this before, but the question keeps popping up. "What is the best buy in fertilizer?"

First, you need to know what your soil needs, and the best way to find out this, is to have your soil tested.

Second, look at the numbers on the fertilizer you are thinking about buying. These three numbers will show the percent of nitrogen, phosphorus and potash in the bag. For example, if this happens to be 16-20-0, you are getting 36 pounds of fertilizer in each 100 lbs. you buy. If the figures happen to be 8-10-0, you are only getting 18 lbs. of fertilizer for each 100 lbs. you buy. Divide the 36 into the price per 100 lbs. of fertilizer and you will see what you are actually paying per pound for fertilizer. Repeat this for the 18, and you will note that to be the same price, the 8-10-0 should be half the price of 16-20-0 per ton to allow you to get the same amount of fertilizer for your dollar.

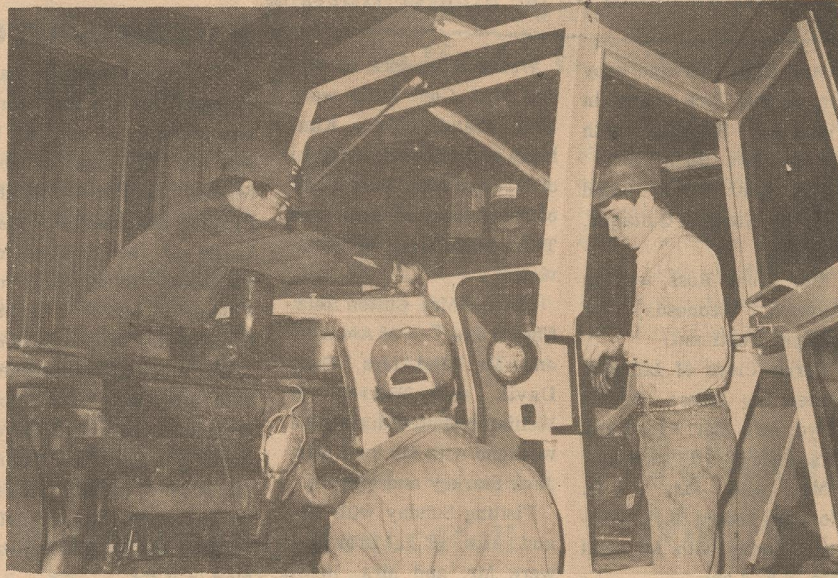

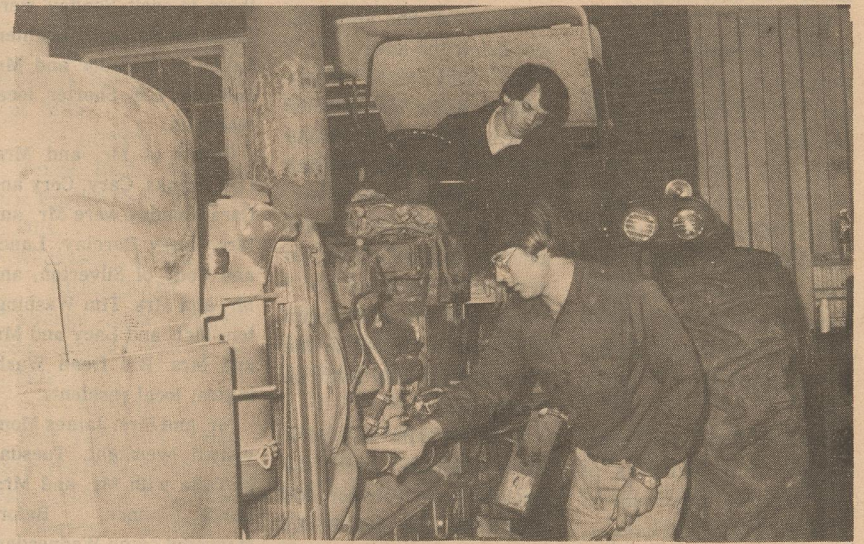


