## Court Ruling Draws Local Fire

The Court of Criminal Appeals decision to overturn the death sentence and order a new trial of convicted murder Larry Carnell Fortenberry last week brought cries of outrage among Motley County citizens.

Fortenberry, a 30-year-old Mount Herman, La. native, was tried and convicted in August 1977 in Hale County for the shooting death of long time Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson.

Expenses of the trials of Fortenberry and Stacy Albert Carter, an accomplice, have been placed a \$57,500, and Motley County was liable for the trial expense since Wilson's death occurred within the county. However, a Criminal Justice Council grant was secured to pay expenses. The county must now seek another grant for a new trial.

The appeals court struck down the death sentence because, it claimed, the presiding judge failed to instruct the jurors properly on the corroboration needed to convict a suspect on the basis of an accomplice's testimony.

Carter plead guilty to murder and testified against Fortenberry, his companion on the day of Wilson's death. He told the jury that Sheriff Wilson had identified himself before the defendant shot him twice at close range with a shotgun.

The appeals court agreed with defense attorneys that the judge should have instructed jurors that Carter's testimony alone was insufficient evidence to prove that Fortenberry realized Wilson was a lawman before he fired at him. Wilson was unarmed and was not wearing a uniform. He and John D. Rogers were out checking on some stray cattle.

Rogers, a Matador farmer at the time of the shooting, Nov. 12, 1976, was also injured during the shooting but managed to escape into the countryside. He was riding with Wilson when they

came upon the two Louisiana prison escapees removing license plates from Rogers car about three miles east of Matador. Wilson was shot after questioning the men. Rogers was unable to relate any conversation which transpired between Fortenberry and the Sheriff, prior to the shooting.

Muleshoe Lawman Buddy Black topped the hill in his car "in time to see Wilson fall." He stopped and called for assistance, but the two fugitives escaped.

Highway Patrolman Kenneth Witt captured the two less than two hours after the murder five miles east of Crosbyton.

Motley County officials have stated they want to read the appeals court "advance sheet" opinion on the case before making

statements. However, county residents have made numerous comments concerning the order for a retrial.

"The criminal has all the rights. They do their best to protect the criminal." "There is no justice here. He was convicted of killing a man. It don't matter if he was a lawman or a preacher or what." "It's good that we have a Court of Criminal Appeals, but sometime they step a little beyond reason. There were eyewitnesses to the shooting. What more do they want?"

## Emergency Warning Signals

When turbulent weather threatens residents of the Matador, local officials will blow emergency warning signals on the siren located on the Central Watertower.

A looping sound (rising and falling or a warple sound) for two to ten minutes means for residents to seek immediate shelter. One blast of the siren, lasting for only seconds, indicates an all clear signal, safe for residents to return to their homes.

One long blast indicates a fire, and signals firemen to

report for duty. Each Monday evening residents can hear three intermittent blast which signals fire practice.

Residents may find shelter in the basement of the Motley County Courthouse, however, officials caution people not to drive reckless or panic during such times. With weather watchers placed in strategic locations around Matador residents should be able to reach their places of shelter in plenty of time without a mad rush.

## Many Western Items Found In Home of France Baker

The old west can be found in the home of France Baker at 1902, 33rd St. in Lubbock. Saddles, Mercantile store ledgers, wagon and riding gear as well as other western historical items used before the turn of the century have been collected by Mr. Baker who is 89 years old.

He has 236 saddles on display that include silver mounted, antique and modern day styles. Some of the saddles and riding gear show long hours of riding in the big ranch country. Mr. Baker can tell you the name of the former owner and history of each article he owns, such as the western gear of Sherrill "Red"

Payne, a well known pioneer Motley County cowboy.

Mr. Baker grew up as a boy east of Lockney where his parents began operating a Mercantile Store in 1864. He has life long friends in Motley County whose pioneer families traveled for miles in buckboards, wagon and by horseback to get their needed supplies at the store. He has the ledger books of his parents that listed the accounts of customers in the early 1900's. He noted the pioneer families carried their accounts by the year but paid these annual debts so his family did not suffer a financial loss with this type of business arrangement. Among their early day Motley County customers

were Al Barton, H. C. Kell, Tom Turner, Kirk Gunn, J. R. Whitworth (Postmaster in Flomot), R. L. Pritchett, Van Martin, Alec Merrell, G. A. Tibbets and Fred C. Bourland. France Baker Barton of Matador, grandson of Al Martin, is France Baker's Namesake.

As he reached manhood, Mr. Baker was associated with the bank in Lockney and later with the Citizens National Bank in Lubbock. When working with his farming operations, he developed a strain of cotton seed under the name of the Empire Brand that proved to be a good staple of cotton for our area of agriculture.

A long time subscriber of the Matador Tribune, Mr.

Baker enjoys reading about his friends. He is under medical care for a cardiac condition following hospitalization in February.

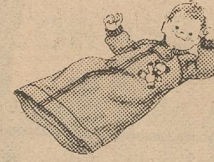



If no deficiency payment is made on wheat, no payment will be made on wheat acres grazed or cut for hay.
