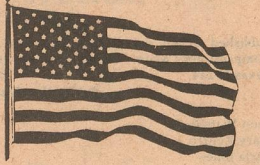

## A Second Glance

You know the story of "Mary Had A Little Lamb," and how the lamb followed her to school one day. Well, someone at Motley County School had a white goat that followed them to school Tuesday.

On many occasions, just after school begins in the morning, dogs can be seen around the school ground, after following their little masters to school. But soon the dogs drift back home and do not reappear until the next morning.

Tuesday the white goat showed up about the same time as the dogs, and a few minutes was playing with the dogs. According to eye-witnesses the goat played just as if he was a dog; running, jumping and doing mock-battle.

Before I found out about it and could get down there to take a picture the goat and dogs all had gone. So I missed another big, exclusive scoop.

What was the news of this area 100 years ago. There was a Newspaper at Clarendon, one at Henrietta and one at Dodge City. On Sept. 20, 1879 the Dodge City Times said, "The Pan Handle (of Texas) has been suffering for the want of rain, as several weeks have elapsed since rain has fallen; and if we don't soon get rain we will have a long dry spell."

The Times also reported: "A party of gentleman have inaugurated a new mode of hunting the imps of the water in this vicinity. Yesterday morning, they started out with a six-pound howitzer to shoot ducks in one of the lakes near by. Up to present writing they had not returned; therefore cannot tell how the new departure succeeded."

## HEW Officials Meet With Local Board

Ronald D. Warner of Lubbock, president of the South Plains Health Systems, Inc., accompanied Department of Health, Education and Welfare officials, Doctor Leonard Krystynak and Dean Stevens of Dallas to Matador, Monday morning where they met with members of the Motley County Hospital board of directors, local government officials and civic leaders.

Mr. Warner, in behalf of the Motley County Hospital District, arranged the meeting because it is believed that the Motley General Hospital would make an excellent national rural demonstration project for the DHEW Region VI under the closure and conversion section of PL 93-641 as amended, extended, and to be renewed.

They first met at the Motley County Courthouse to get acquainted, share information and discuss the special most pressing health, medical needs of people in this area and the unique characteristics and circumage distribution. An on-site visit of the Motley General Hospital, Clinic and ambulance service followed the meeting at the courthouse.

DHEW officials who are well aware of the potential controversial nature of closing and converting hospitals to

other uses, had an opportunity to see local community support for the possible closure and conversion of Motley General Hospital towards the goal of health care cost containment and availability and accessibility of needed health services and facilities that the community can utilize and support. The SPHS and Motley County Hospital board are also working with South Plains Providers, Inc., Plainview to explore providing primary care and related emergency clinics coverage for Matador and Motley County.

The hospital board members and Mrs. H.R. Jameson, Motley County SPHS board member, stresses that Motley County will have an opportunity to examine the investigate conversion plans concerning the Motley County Hospital and are under no obligations to the DHEW. If the citizens of Motley County decide that a Nursing Home, Retirement Home or some other medical facility will be a benefit to the area without causing unnecessary financial problems, the DHEW officials after their on-site visit, will give priority attention to Motley County's health needs and actions.

## Fumbles and Rain Add to Misery During 29-0 Loss to Crosbyton

Friday night was a night of frustration for the Motley County Matadors as they lost to the Crosbyton Chiefs 29-0.

Playing for at least three quarters in a chilly and heavy drizzle, the Matadors found the pigskin hard to hang on to. Motley County lost six of nine fumbles, ending almost every M.C. drive.

It started early for MC. After receiving the opening kick-off the Matadors lost the ball on the first play from scrimmage on their own 39 yard line.

On the fourth play of the second quarter, Crosbyton returned a MC punt 95 yards for a TD, but the play was called back because of a penalty. On the very next play Lavance Coppage ran in for the Touchdown. After a busted extra point play turned into a two point conversion the Chiefs led 8-0.

The Chiefs had an equally hard time hanging onto the ball. They fumbled one punt

on the MC 40 yard line, then after the Matadors had to punt again, the Chiefs fumbled on their own 35 yard line. But two plays later the Matadors fumbled back to them.

Motley County got another couple of breaks when another TD was called back and when Dwight Campbell intercepted a pass on the MC 11 yard line. But again the Matadors fumbled the ball back to the Chiefs. This time it was on the MC nine yard line, and three plays later Crosbyton scored again. When the PAT failed the score stood 14-0.

The Matadors fumbled again on the first play after the next kick-off, but held the Chiefs and the first half ended with the score 14-0.

The Chiefs first three possessions of the third quarter ended with fumbles and Motley County fumbled on the 14 yard line on the first play of their second possession. Seven plays later Chief Paul Williams went in from the two, and after a successful PAT

Motley High was behind 21-0, with 1:40 left in the third period.

On the first play of the next MC drive Crosbyton recovered another mishandled Matador football. As the third quarter ended Dewight Campbell picked off his second interception of the night. MC was unable to move the ball and punted. The Chiefs threw one incomplete pass then fumbled to the

Matadors again.

Two plays after MC had to punt on fourth down, Paul Williams again found open ground and ran 66 yards for another Crosbyton score. A two point PAT made the score 29-0.

On defense, Charlie Campbell had one interception and Dewight Campbell had two. Harvey Lee led in tackles with 10, followed by Randy Meredith with

eight.

Leading MC rusher was Lee with 42 yards in 13 carries. Shawn Bearden, playing quarterback in place of the injured Julian Zabielski, had 24 yards on six carries.

The Matadors will meet the Sudan Hornets here Friday night. Sudan, said to be one of the fast teams in class B football, have a 1-2 record, losing to two class A schools.

## New Grant Awarded To Pay Defendants' Lawyers

Governor William P. Clements, Jr., has approved a criminal justice grant affecting Motley County.

Supplemental funding of \$5,482 to provide legal counsel for two indigent defendants who were tried for the slaying of the Motley County Sheriff has been approved.

The original grant for \$51,500 to the county was awarded in June, 1977.

This local grant was among 194 approved by Governor Clements statewide from Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) funds under the Crime Control Act of 1976.

## Farmers and Ranchers To Meet With Secretary of Agriculture

Farmers and Ranchers in Motley County are invited to take part in a meeting with Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland on the "structure of agriculture."

The meeting will be Dec. 6 in Wichita Falls and is one of 10 regional meetings designed to obtain comments and suggestions on the economic and social issues affecting the structure of American agriculture and rural life. Major purpose will be to determine the overall impact of all the different problems, policies and conditions that interact to influence farm structure, according to

Jerry Cummins, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System.

Individuals interested in making a brief presentation at the meeting must request to do so. More details on how to submit the request are available at the local county Extension and ASCS offices. Written comments may also be submitted to be included in a final document to be published following the series of meetings.

According to Cummins, the meeting will provide, for a re-examination of the

structure of American agriculture so that a comprehensive package of factual information and recommendations can be developed for use in proposing future policies, especially new farm legislation for 1981.

This meeting provides an opportunity for everyone interested in the future of agriculture to make his voice heard, points out Cummins.

### Sales Tax Rebates Set New Record

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said rebates to Texas cities of the local option one-percent sales tax set a record in the tax's 11-year history.

Bullock said more than 900 cities shared in \$124.2 million during July, August and September--passing the state's previous high three-month allocation in the final quarter of 1978 by more than \$6 million.

Bullock also announced that his office was sending September sales tax rebate checks totaling \$73.4 million.

"This month's allocations are just under the record payments of \$73.9 million made in December of 1978," Bullock said.

"I think the state's strong economy and our ability to rapidly process tax returns helped to produce these peak rebates," he said.

Matador will receive a check for \$2,304.89, bringing the city's total for the year to \$11,106.25, an increase of seven per cent over last year's total to date.

Roaring Springs will get a check for \$500.13, raising its yearly total to \$3,863.11, up five per cent.

The city and MTA sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

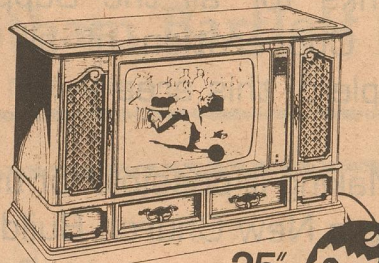

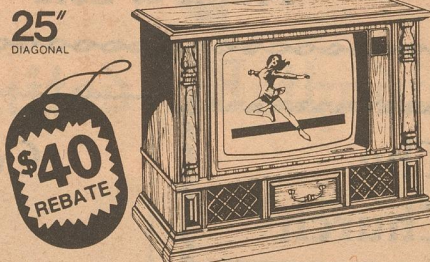

# Much Progress Made Since '92 By Methodists

Organization of the Matador Methodist Church was made under a group of cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek northeast of town. The church later became the First Methodist Church, and eventually, the First United Methodist Church. The following article was written by the late G.E. Hamilton and was published in the Matador Tribune's pioneer issue, August 31, 1939.

(By G.E. Hamilton)  
In the minutes of an old Quarterly conference record found among the archives of the local Methodist church, Rev. R.M. Morris, pastor of the Guthrie missin, Vernon district, reported to the 4th Quarterly conference, held at Dickens on October 13, 1892, that during the preceding quarter he took into the church by letter:

Thomas N. Edmondson, Mary Edmondson, Fannie and Ida Edmondson, J.A. Jones, R.J. Jones, Mary Jones, R.E. Jones, and "by ritual" Wm. Wason and Sister Wason.

Rev. Morris held a revival meeting during the summer of 1892 under a group of cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek near the Reeves home. At that meeting, the persons named above were organized into the church. Three of the six charter members, Mrs. F.M. Jinkins (Fannie Edmondson), Mrs. C.D. Pipkin (Ida Edmondson) and Mrs. Mollie T. Wason are yet members of this church. Thus, after 47 years, 30 percent of the charter members are still living.

**No Church Building**  
At that time Matador was only a small hamlet, and even house room essential for actual shelter was not plentiful; therefore, there were no church buildings in the vicinity, and this church was forced to find shelter in schoolhouses.

courthouse, or just any place where room could be found to worship.

The Guthrie mission was composed of Guthrie, Paducah, Matador, Whiteflat, Cottonwood (now Afton), Dickens and Emma. In the first Quarterly conference, it was shown that only \$1.50 was raised for the quarter and applied to the pastor's income. Rev. Morris, in his written report, stated that he had preached 13 times and made about 35 pastoral visits. The second conference was held in April 1892, at Guthrie, and the records then showed that nothing was collected.

We wondered as we read, how he fed himself, his family, and his team, but decided that the problem was solved by those 65 pastoral visits.

In his second report, the preacher wrote that he had preached nine times, made about 25 pastoral visits, and baptized one adult and one infant in the interim of 35 days since the preceding conference.

**Traveled By Buggy**  
When it is recalled that houses were from five to 40 miles apart in his territory at that time, and the swiftest method of travel was by buggy, and that roads were mere trails with no bridges or even culverts spanning the streams, we naturally assume that this worthy servant of the Gospel obtained his hire by boarding with his family around and among the faithful.

At the fourth conference, Wm. Wason was elected Sunday School superintendent. Tradition tells us he organized the first Sunday School at Matador and guided its destinies for many years, but whether it was conducted as a strictly Methodist school or not, this writer has been unable to learn.

In 1899, Mr. Wason was still superintendent, and non-sectarian literature was being used

in Sunday School. People of all denominations attended, and officers and teachers were members of both the Baptist and Methodist churches.

Everything was harmonious, although the school would run on for two or three hours sometimes before the spirit would move us to break up. Several times we recall that we were forcibly reminded of that good old song, "How Tedious and Tasteless the Hours."

**Church Is Built**  
In 1900 a new church was built, under the supervision of T.N. Edmondson, with Rev. C.A. Clark as pastor. It was a frame structure about 30 x 50 feet, and in later years a shed room was added, running entirely across the west end, which was utilized as a Sunday School room.

Although this building was built as a Methodist church, all denominations contributed to it liberally, especially our Baptist friends. It was the first and for several years the only house of worship in town and was used a year or two by the Baptists, Rev. W. H. Rattan being their pastor at that time.

The Sunday School remained non-sectarian until 1901, when Brother A. Kansler, a German blacksmith, was elected Methodist superintendent by the conference. He began organizing the Sunday school into a strictly Methodist institution, with Teutonic thoroughness, very much as the Kaiser would have re-organized his army--without loss of time.

**Brick Building Erected**  
Many grumblings and considerable criticism met his efforts, but he paid them no mind. The Baptists soon withdrew and organized their own school at the schoolhouse. The old Methodist church was used until 1926, when it was sold, and the present brick building was erected.

Much credit is due the efforts of Mr. Edmondson, who was the moving spirit in the building of the first church building. The people generally over the county were liberal in subscribing both money and labor towards its construction. Since Quarterly conference records have

not been preserved, we are indebted to the late F.M. Jenkins and his wife and to Mrs. Wason and others for much information bearing on early church activities here.

Hamilton and W.F. Jacobs.

The imposing brick structure (still quoting Judge Hamilton) that is now the Methodist church is a monument to the integrity and courage of those pioneer citizens who organized the church so many years ago.

Almost 2,000 people are, or have been members of the local church, and more than \$55,000 has been raised towards paying preachers' salaries since 1897. About \$12,000 has been raised for other benevolences.

**Additional Pastors**  
Since 1939, when the above history was compiled by Judge Hamilton, other pastors who have served since Brother Vaughn include W.B. Swain, Geo. E. Turrentine, Oscar Bruce, Marvin Brotherton, W.V. O'Kelly, C. Woodrow Williams, L.W. Tucker, Roy Patterson, W.F. Gaede, John Fitzgerald, Douglas Gossett, Lloyd Hearn and Kenny Kirk.

Forty pastors have served the church since it was organized. Two of the early pastors, R.M. Morris and D.B. Doak served two different appointments.

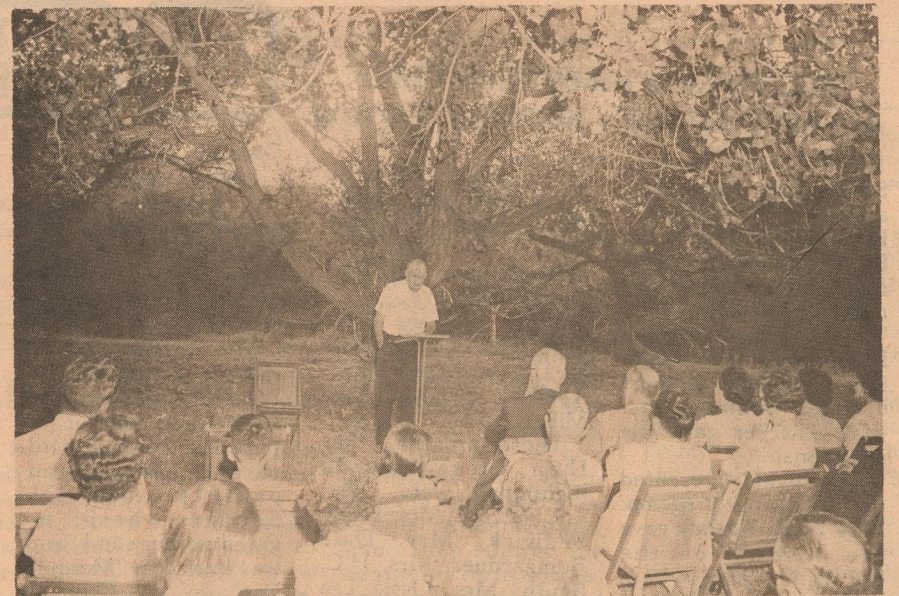

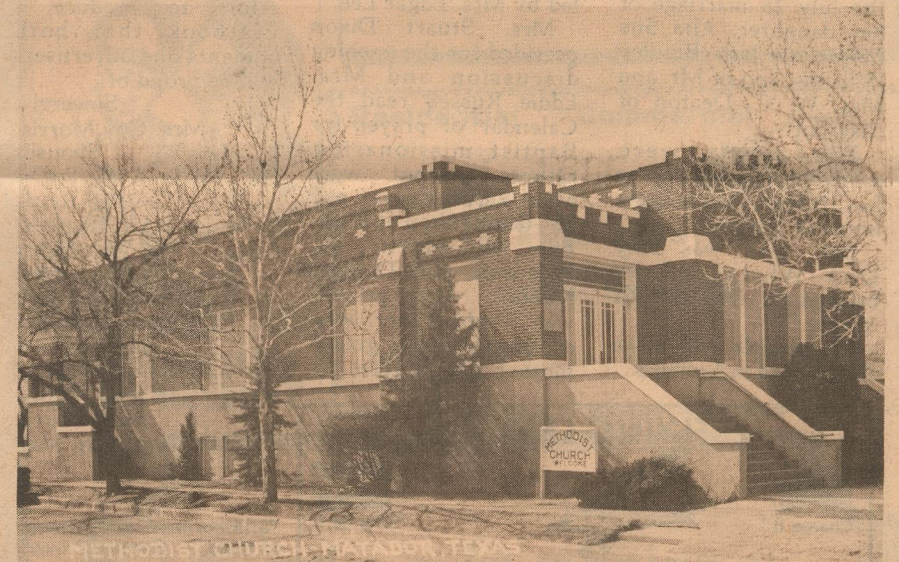

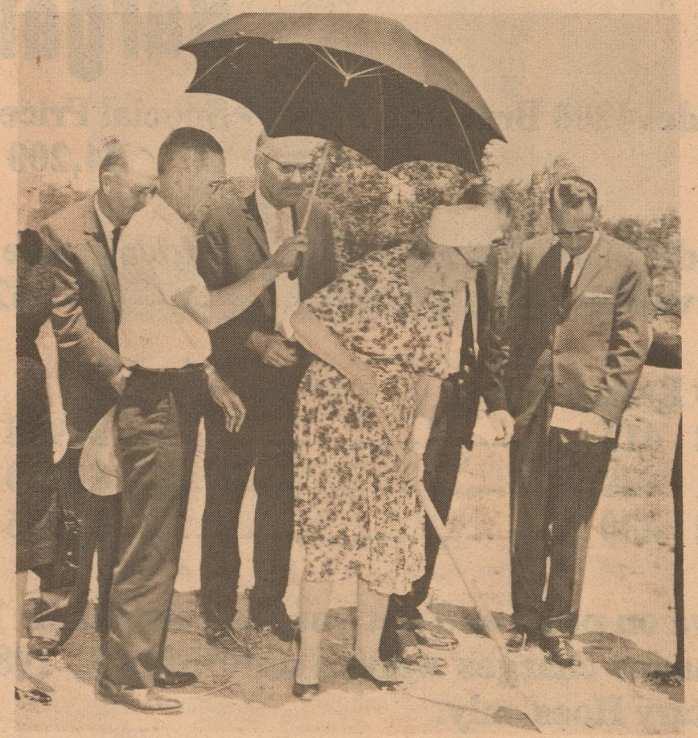

# New Church Building Is Monument to Progress

The new United Methodist Church building, occupied for the first time, September 15 for a concert by Bill and Melanie Beachey, and for its first service, Sunday, September 16 stands as a monument to progress.

The new building replaces the brick structure built in 1926, which was damaged beyond repair in June, 1978 when the sanctuary roof caved in and the west wall collapsed. At that time the church was in the process of making needed repairs, including a new roof.

Following the disaster the church membership met in the adjoining educational building, which was constructed in 1962.

Although the church voted last fall to proceed with a program of clearing the grounds and razing the old building, severe weather conditions during the winter months prevented the start of the work, and it was April before it was begun. A contract was signed December 22 with Tusha Building Contractor of Lubbock, who has constructed the 60 x 95 foot steel superstructure with brick exterior.

outside entry is located farther north with direct access into the sanctuary.

There are no windows. Illumination is by electricity. However, on the north wall is a narrow, decorative panel which contains a stained-glass window, with room for other similar windows to be added.

Two rooms, just off the sanctuary and at each side of the choir area can be used as classrooms. Another, multi-purpose room is located at the rear of the sanctuary and is equipped with a picture window, which will be louvered for privacy.

Red carpeting throughout the sanctuary and these rooms match the pew cushions and the choir chairs. The pews were all salvaged from the damaged building and were restored by one of the Sunday School classes. The piano was also saved, and undamaged, but a new organ has replaced the old instrument. Also carpeted in red are the entry hall and balcony at the rear of the sanctuary.

The interior of the sanctuary is finished in walnut paneling, with a lighter finish used for the altar and choir area, located in the north end of the building.

Saddle tan vinyl clad gypsum paneling covers the walls of the fellowship hall and kitchen. Carpeting in these areas is patterned in colors of red, yellow and orange. A work "island" centers the large kitchen, which is equipped with two new electric stoves, refrigerator, dishwasher and

stainless steel double sinks. Walnut cabinets and storage closets line all four walls. Cabinet tops are finished in gold colored formica.

A vestibule just outside the entry hall contains, on the inside north wall, the cornerstone of the 1926 building committee. Rev. L.B. Smallwood was pastor at that time, and the committee was composed of T.T. Jameson, Chairman; B.M. Sudduth, Secretary, and G.E. Hamilton, A.C. Traweek, Homer Sheats, C.B. Whitten, D.E. Pitts, J.E. Jameson and B.F. Moore.

Cornerstone for the new building has been placed opposite the old one, on the south wall of the vestibule. The inscription reads: First United Methodist Church 1979. "I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go into the house of the Lord. - Psalm 122:1" - Kenney Kirk, Pastor.

The new church building, with a seating capacity of approximately 275, was constructed and equipped at an estimated cost of \$150,000. Members of the building committee for the new edifice were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Moss, Mr. and Mrs. Furman Vinson, Algie Groves, Frank Price, Mrs. Glenn Woodruff, L.B. Campbell and Mrs. Mike Hoyle.

## Growth of Methodist Church Noted In Building Program

With the construction this year, of a new church building which contains the sanctuary and fellowship hall and kitchen, the First United Methodist Church of Matador has completed one of the most modern church plants in this area.

Expansion of the church facilities began in 1962 when ground was broken on April 16, for an Educational Building adjoining the church on the south, which was completed and occupied in October of the same year. However, formal opening was delayed until January 20, 1963, for consecration services conducted by Bishop Paul V. Galloway of San Antonio. Rev. Roy Patterson was pastor and members of the finance committee for this undertaking were Bill

Moss, Glen Brotherton, Algie Groves, Furman Vinson, J. Tom Hamilton and W.D. Lipscomb.

The brick addition to the church houses the pastor's office, a prayer room, the church parlor, library, nursery and rest rooms in addition to Sunday School classrooms.

Another dream of the church became a reality on July 11, 1965, when ground-breaking ceremonies for a new parsonage were held, at which Dr. J.E. Shevbert, district superintendent of Plainview, lifted the first spade of dirt. Also lifting a spade of soil with the golden (painted) spade was Mrs. C.D. Mary and Thomas N. Edmondson organized the congregation, with members of the J. A. Jones family and Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Wason.

Others who took part in the ground-breaking included the pastor, Rev. W.F. Gaede, and members of the building committee: C.T. Jinkins, Homer T. Jinkins, W.D. Lipscomb, Mrs. Melvin Meason, Mrs. W.N. (Bill) Pipkin and Mrs. Furman Vinson.

The modern, three-bedroom home, located across Dundee Street, immediately north of the

church was completed in October of that year, and open house was held November 1, with Rev. and Mrs. Gaede as the first occupants.

Rev. John Fitzgerald was serving as pastor when the parsonage was dedicated December 3, 1967 by Bishop Eugene Slater of San Antonio.

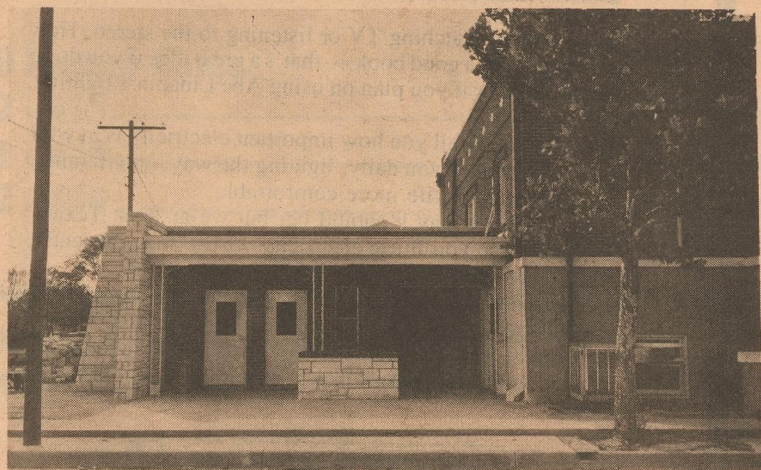

## Social Security Tips

Question: My wife's doctor has admitted her to a psychiatric hospital for treatment of a severe mental depression. Will our Medicare insurance pay for her care?

Answer: Medicare hospital insurance can help pay for no more than 190 days of care in a participating hospital in a patient's lifetime. Once a person has used these 190 days, hospital insurance cannot pay for any more care in a psychiatric hospital, even if some or all of the person's reserve days are left. There is a special rule that applies if a person is in a participating psychiatric hospital at the time his or her hospital insurance starts. For more information, contact any social security office.

Question: I haven't decided exactly when I'm going to stop work, so I haven't applied for social security retirement payments yet. A friend told me I should apply

now, though, because there's a limit on back benefits. Is this true?

Answer: Before 1978, a person could elect to receive benefits for up to 12 months before the month of application if all requirements were met during that period. Now, back benefits generally are not payable if they would result in permanent benefit reduction. For more information, call any social security office.

Question: What do you mean when you say I don't have to retire to get Medicare?

Answer: People age 65 who have worked under social security long enough to qualify for retirement benefits may sign up for Medicare without stopping work. You should be sure to check with your social security office before making a decision.

## GET INTO A PLUM JAM

If feasting on Plum Jam year 'round appeals to you, it's easy enough to ensure the eating enjoyment. On your next market trip, select fully colored ripe plums, making sure they are firm, except for a slightly soft tip end—a good indication of ripeness. 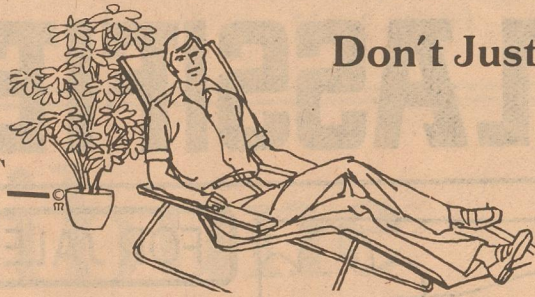

6 cups prepared fruit (about 4 lb. fully ripe plums and 1/2 cup water)  
8 cups (3-1/2 lb.) sugar  
1 box (1-3/4 oz.) powdered fruit pectin

First prepare the fruit. Pit (do not peel) about 4 pounds plums. Cut in small pieces and chop. Add 1/2 cup water; bring to a boil and simmer, covered, 5 minutes.

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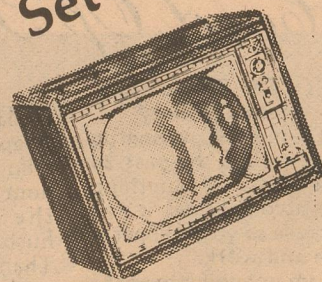
