Thin Sliver Sliced In Lower Tax Move

COUNTY IRON LUNG ON MERCY ERRAND

Motley county's iron lung is absent from its place in the east wing of the courthouse hall, on another errand of mercy. This time it is in Abilene to treat another case of infantile paralysis—perhaps to save a life.

Commissioner James Taylor delivered the machine Friday at the request of Mike Hyres, who is state representative of the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation.

The Motley county iron lung is registered in a state pool, available in an emergency. In event a machine should be needed here, another unit in the pool would be provided on short notice. The distribution of use of all iron lungs has proved very successful and is credited with saving many lives.

County Cuts Away 2c In New Budget

MUSIC to the ears of taxpayers is the announcement by the Commissioners Court that county taxes will be reduced 2c on the \$100 valuation in the new budget now awaiting approval.

Property-owners are more impressed by the reversed trend established by the county than the thin sliver that will be pared from their tax payments.

Announcement of the lowered taxes was made Tuesday by County Judge Vance H. Gilbreath, who said the county has been required to buy \$15,500 worth of farm to market road right of ways and fences and expects to spend a total of \$21,500 on these projects by the end of the year.

"In addition," Judge Gilbreath declared, "we will pay about \$3,000 on right of ways, fences, damages, etc." for the improvements contracted on US Highway 70.

"In the past two years we have spent approximately \$45,000 for right of ways and fences for farm to market roads in the county. Cost to the county is approximately \$1,000 per mile for fences alone (\$500 per mile on each side of the road).

"This money is in addition to normal county operation costs," Judge Gilbreath said, "and we have plenty of funds to keep the county on a cash basis, except in the event of some unforeseen emergency.

Costs Spread Thin

"We have spread county operation costs as thinly as possible in effort to achieve the tax reduction. We are aware the reduction is slight, but we have at least achieved a reverse in the trend of taxes. It is possible, however, that conditions over which we have no control might force us to restore the 2c next year."

In explaining the county's plan of economies, Judge Gilbreath said some county roads have not been repaired immediately because of extra labor cost involved.

"We are attempting to effect maintenance with the county's regular employees (five men)," Gilbreath said, "and without the added expense of extra labor. All county roads will be restored although a little more time may be needed in some instances."

SHOWERS!

Welcome showers swept across the southeast area of the county late yesterday and brought relief to some of the parched feed crops. Part of Teepee Flat Community received a good shower according to reports. Rainfall here measured .25-inch by the West Texas Utilities Company-Matador Tribune gauge.

Rainfall of flood proportions fell between Turkey and Quitaque yesterday morning, according to reports with one area receiving as much as six inches. At one time state Highway 70 north of Turkey was reported under water in several places. One unconfirmed report said Flomot had received beneficial showers.

Two Escape Injury When Cars Collide

Two Negro men escaped injury when their automobiles collided in northeast Matador about 12:45 Monday. Hubert Fluellen, teacher in Matador colored school, driving a 1951 Ford coupe, collided at an intersection near the colored Baptist church.

Deputy Sheriff Jinks Wilson said the Fluellen car turned over twice and was damaged in an amount estimated at \$1,000. Damage to the Ford was estimated at \$200. Both of the men escaped serious injury.

Mercury Hits Summer Peak

Peak mercury reading for the current summer was reached Tuesday when 104 degrees were recorded on the government thermometer at the city wells, maintained by City Water Superintendent Lee Burns. Children reported 105 degrees and other points in West Texas reached over 100 degrees with Seymour, Texas reaching 112, the hottest spot in the United States.

Beneficial showers fell over the south and west areas of the county Friday but the precipitation here was only .10-inch. Roaring Springs reported one inch and parts of the Whiteflat community received one inch or more. A light shower fell here Sunday afternoon but reached only a limited area.

Feed in the county's tight lands is suffering but cotton is reported to be standing the hot weather without appreciable damage.

Estimates are that sufficient water is available to irrigate 80 acres without any rainfall and approximately 125 acres with moderate rainfall. Constant development of irrigation in the county is causing land-owners to seek profitable water sands beneath fields long devoted to dry land farming. The above well is approximately 11 miles southwest of Matador.

John Lewis Dies Of Heart Attack

Funeral services for John Fielding Lewis, 60, were held in Floydada, Wednesday at 3 p. m. at the First Baptist Church, with Dr. R. Earl Allen pastor, and the Rev. G. C. Tiner of Dougherty officiating.

Mr. Lewis, well-known rancher of this section, died from a heart attack about 9:30 p. m. Monday at his ranch home 23 miles northeast of Floydada, the same ranch on which he was born in a dug-out. Except for six years, when he was in business in Silverton, he had lived on the ranch all of his life. A veteran of World War I, Lewis operated the Lewis ranch estate for many years.

He was married in 1925 to Miss Dora Elnora Seipp of Plainview, who died in 1940. Later he married Miss Ethel Crane of Amarillo, and to this union four children were born.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ethel Lewis, two sons, Lawrence and John Jr., two daughters, Edna and Marilyn, all of the home, a foster son, Lane Decker of Floydada; a brother, Charlie of Floydada; and five sisters, Mrs. G. B. Bostick of Matador; Mrs. Virginia Conner of Lubbock; Mrs. A. T. Swepston and Mrs. Minnie L. Smart of Floydada, and Mrs. Henry Salyers of Abilene.

Pallbearers were W. E. Burleson of Floydada; W. E. Schmitt of Silverton; L. H. Dirickson of Matador; Fred Miller and Bill Romaine, Crosbyton and Howe Hines of Dougherty.

Burial was in Floydada Cemetery under direction of Harmon Funeral Home.

Funeral services were attended by many friends from this community.

Uranium Find In Silverton Area Is Believed 'Rich'

QUITAQUE, Texas, August 9—Uranium find labeled the richest yet in Texas is being investigated to see if it is extensive enough to justify mining.

Four samples taken from veins on the Doyle and Clyde Saul ranch in West Texas have tested 62 per cent, "the best I've seen in Texas," according to Jim Allison of Albuquerque, field man for the Atomic Energy Commission. He said 15 per cent is considered profitable.

The Sauls are now trying to learn whether the deposits are extensive as well as rich. Core samples were being taken to see how deep into the hillside the veins reached.

The Saul Brothers ranch is about halfway between Quitaque and Silverton in West Texas and the uranium find itself is in very rough country—Lubbock Avallanche.

Pied 'Pinions' BY MRS. J. M.

A request this week from a former resident, for a recipe for authentic sourdough biscuits sent this reporter scurrying about searching through files for an article published several years ago, containing this information.

It is an accepted fact in this establishment that the sundry and too numerous items "saved" through the years would be of no avail, once needed. It just wouldn't be possible to locate any one item, due to our unsystematic filing system.

While we did not find the special feature for which we were searching, we did run across a clipping containing a sourdough bread recipe used by one Pedro, or John H. Reed, a chuck wagon cook for many years, up in the Panhandle. However, the ingredients included yeast, and since that commodity was not available to local ranchers in the very early days, we weren't entirely satisfied that this was an "authentic" recipe.

After a bit of inquiring as to the logical person to contact, we were steered to Tom King, who cooked for the Matador Ranch for nine years. He came here to work for the Matadors in 1902, became chuck wagon cook in 1907 and after a year on the range, became cook at ranch headquarters.

Tom was a little reluctant to give any definite instructions in making this famous western bread, because, he said, the last two or three times he attempted it, the batter didn't sour just right and the bread wasn't too satisfactory.

However, this is the way he did it back in the early days of his career as ranch cook.

Boil 2 or 3 small potatoes. Using the potato water, add about a teaspoon of salt, one-half cup of sugar and about a quart of water and stir in enough flour for a batter, a little stiffer than pan-cake batter. Let stand overnight to sour. Make a hollow in a bowl of flour, spoon out a portion of the batter, add about the same amount of shortening you would for a "batch" of biscuits, also about 2 teaspoons baking powder and a pinch of soda. Knead the flour into the batter to make a soft dough, and shape into biscuits.

The remaining "sourdough" is kept indefinitely by adding water and flour to the batter and letting it stand. It will rise, and may spill over the top of the container, but you stir it down.

Refrigeration is not necessary. In fact, it would probably "kill" the self-rising effect of the batter.

Back in the early days when the range chuck-wagon was visited by many friends, it was unusual to feed as many as a hundred or more people besides the cowboys. Mr. King usually kept his sourdough batter in a 3-gallon crock and made up four or five Dutch ovens of bread for a single meal.

Here is Pedro's sourdough:

"Start it by dissolving one yeast cake (choose your brand) in warm water. Add flour and water, making a light batter. When you're ready to make the biscuits add flour and water until you have the size roll of dough you want. Give it a shot of baking powder and a pinch of soda. Add shortening and salt about as you would for regular biscuits. Let the mixture rise a little if you're not in a hurry. Get the pan hot; dip both sides of the biscuit in the melted grease in the pan. Put them in the oven; they cook about like biscuits. Mrs. Mel Armstrong says it's best to let the biscuits rise a little before placing them in the oven. That eliminates the possibility of sogginess in the center. You can leave a dab of your batter and keep it in the ice box for the next time."

We are wondering if any of our readers would like to contribute other sourdough recipes from their family cookbooks? Now would be a good time to start a collection, so let us know if you have one.

Our letter was from Mrs. Ray Stilwell of Palisades, Idaho. She and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Haskins, lived in Matador in 1935-36 and the late Jimmie Murrell of Plainview was her cousin. She writes, "We live on the Snake River in Idaho, 90 miles south of the south entrance to Yellowstone National Park, just 40 miles from the Jackson Hole Country. Ray and our son are employed on the Palisades Dam and we are planning a company barbecue soon, and I surely want to get the cowboy sourdough bread recipe for this occasion."

State Fair Slates Photo Exhibition Of "Family of Man"

"The Family of Man", a gigantic assemblage of photographs from all over the world—depicting the entire sweep of man's whole existence—will be shown at the 1955 State Fair of Texas, October 7-23.

The collection has been described as "the greatest photographic exhibition of all time". The unique exhibition will occupy virtually all of the gallery space in the Museum of Fine Arts on the Dallas fairgrounds. Admission to the show will be free.

The exhibit was created by Edward Steichen, dean of American photographers, for the Museum of Modern Art in New York, where it has been seen by over 300,000 people.

Mr. Steichen and his assistant, Wayne Miller, spent 21 years assembling the tremendous exhibition. They examined 4 million pictures taken in all corners of the world by photographers of every nationality. It required five months to go through the

LIFE magazine collection alone. Finally, they selected the 503 pictures which comprise the exhibit—representing 273 photographers, amateurs and professionals, famous and unknown, in 68 countries.

Tremendous in Scope
"The Family of Man" is tremendous in scope as well as size, and is said to have a tremendous emotional impact on its viewers. Its message is the universality of human life everywhere—the basic oneness of the human race, in spite of wars, language barriers, differences of religion, culture and race.

Each photograph shows some aspect of an experience or an emotion which is common to the whole "family of man". For example, there are 18 separate studies of happy children playing "ring around the rosy"—in 12 different countries.

Carl Sandburg, noted poet and author and Mr. Steichen's brother-in-law, has written the intro-

duction to the exhibition, including with a poem. The only one man in the world whose name is All Men, and the only one woman in the world whose name is All Women. There is only one child in the world and the child's name is All Children.

The United States Information Agency has announced it will send two copies of the complete show on overseas to one to Europe and the other to the Far East.
