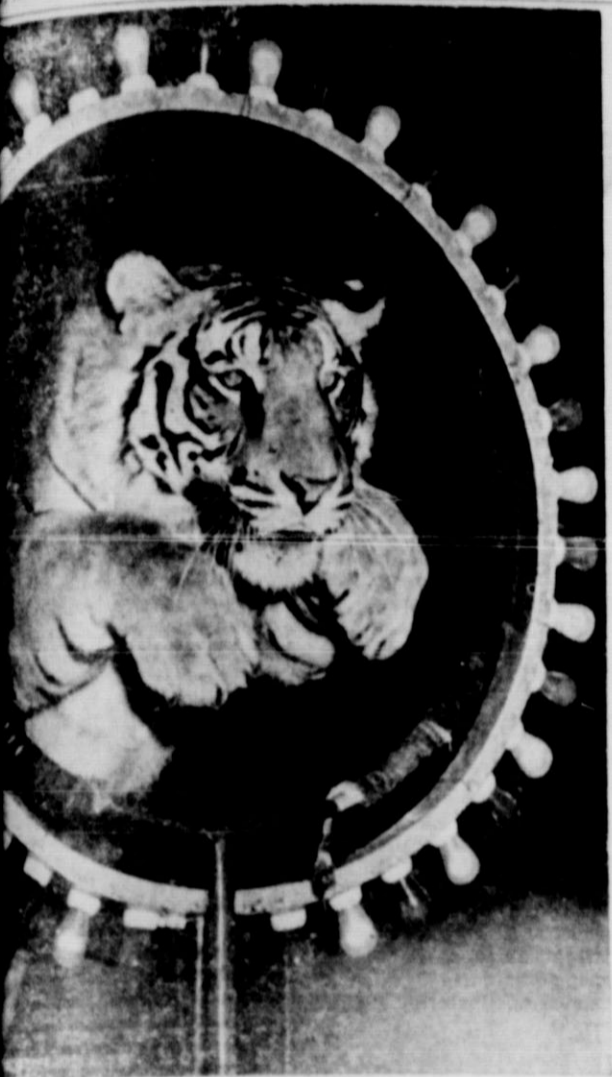

### Soil Group Seeks Dealer-Dist. Plan

O. Hutchinson, representative of the John Deere Implement company, meeting Tuesday with the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District board in Paducah, explained a dealer-district program which has been operating in Texas for about two years.

He said the program brought

the implement dealers in closer contact with the soil districts and made it possible to build equipment best suited to overcome the problems which the districts face. He said the program had met with approval where it has been tried. The board approved a motion to seek a dealer-district program for the Upper Pease district.

Chairman Varner McWilliams reported that a Matador implement dealer, Preston Spray, had made available to the district a set of five stubble mulching sweeps with coulters, for trial in this area.

James Wilcox of Paducah reported that 30-inch stubble mulch sweeps tried on wheat stubble in the Paducah area, had met with much satisfaction.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

**VALUE OF SILAGE**

Do you have a trench silo? Did your feed burn up this summer? If the answer to both of the questions is yes, evidently you were one of the persons who were hoping that it would rain in the next two or three days, but as usual, it didn't.

One advantage of having trench silos is that when the feed starts to burn, it can be cut while still partly green, and save a lot of the plant for food for

livestock that will burn entirely up and leave only a burned field for livestock to graze. By cutting the feed green, more of the plant is utilized for feed, and it is more nutritious and higher in food value. Many acres in Matley county and other West Texas counties could be saved each year if a silage program was followed. Labor can be kept at a minimum where the crop is chopped and put in a properly constructed silo. Self-feeder gates may also be used to further reduce the labor requirements.

Matley county farmers are encouraged to check with County Agent Palmmeier on silage problems and plans in an effort to realize more money from the feed crop which pays an important role in the economy of the county as long as cotton allotments are in effect.

### TREES AND SHRUBS DIE FROM COTTON ROOT ROT

Many shrubs and trees are dying at this time of the year as a result of cotton root rot. Where this occurs, it is not wise to replant the same kind of shrub or tree, according to County Agent Palmmeier. Select varieties resistant to the disease.

Trees resistant to root rot include: liveoak, hackberry, sycamore, Osage Orange or bolt d'ore, hickory, mesquite, mountain cedar and red cedar, anacard cedar elm, holly, wild black cherry, wild plum retama and palms. Recent tests indicate that the silk tree or mimosa tree is also resistant, although observations on this are not yet complete.

Shrubs and hedge plants that survive in root-rot areas are: pomegranate, Pfitzer juniper, yaupon, Douglas pyramidal arbutus, coralberry and snowberry, huisache, clematis, Texas

### BLUEJACKET UNDESIRABLE ON WHEAT VARIETY LIST

Because of its inferior milling or baking qualities, bluejacket wheat has been added by the USDA to the previously announced list of undesirable wheat varieties. This brings to 24 the varieties designated for a 20-cent-per-bushel discount in 1956 wheat price support rates.

The USDA announcement said the variety was added to the list as a result of strong recommendations from state agricultural leaders. It is in the Hard Red Winter Class and is grown in Texas and 12 other states.

The 20-cent-per-bushel discount is designed to discourage the planting of the 24 varieties of US wheat of inferior quality finding its way into domestic and export channels. The 24 varieties listed as undesirable accounted for an estimated 45 million bushels of 1954 production or about 5% of the 1954 acreage.

He seemed to enjoy farm life all right—but like most city kids it took him some time to get used to a farmer's schedule.

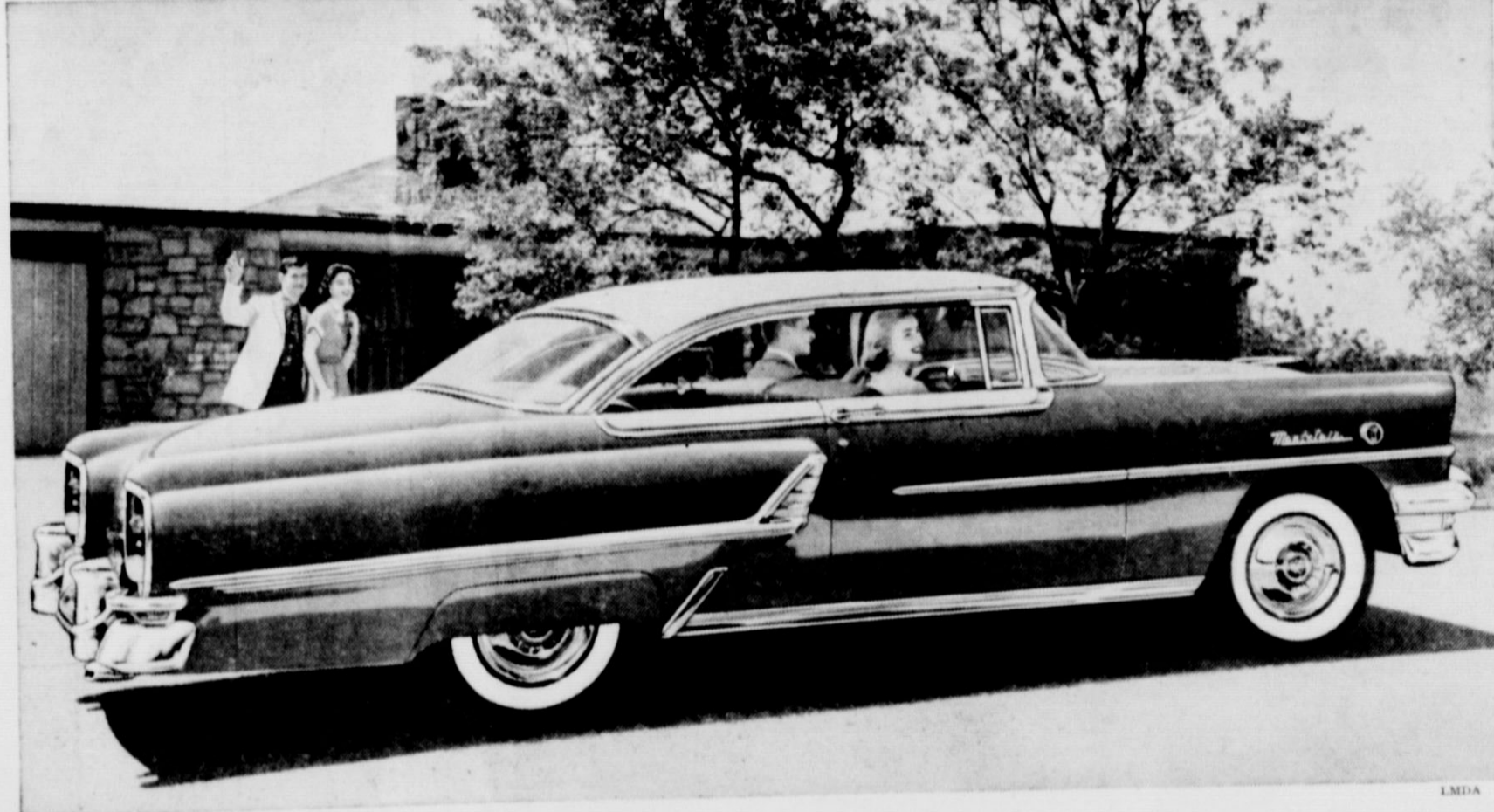

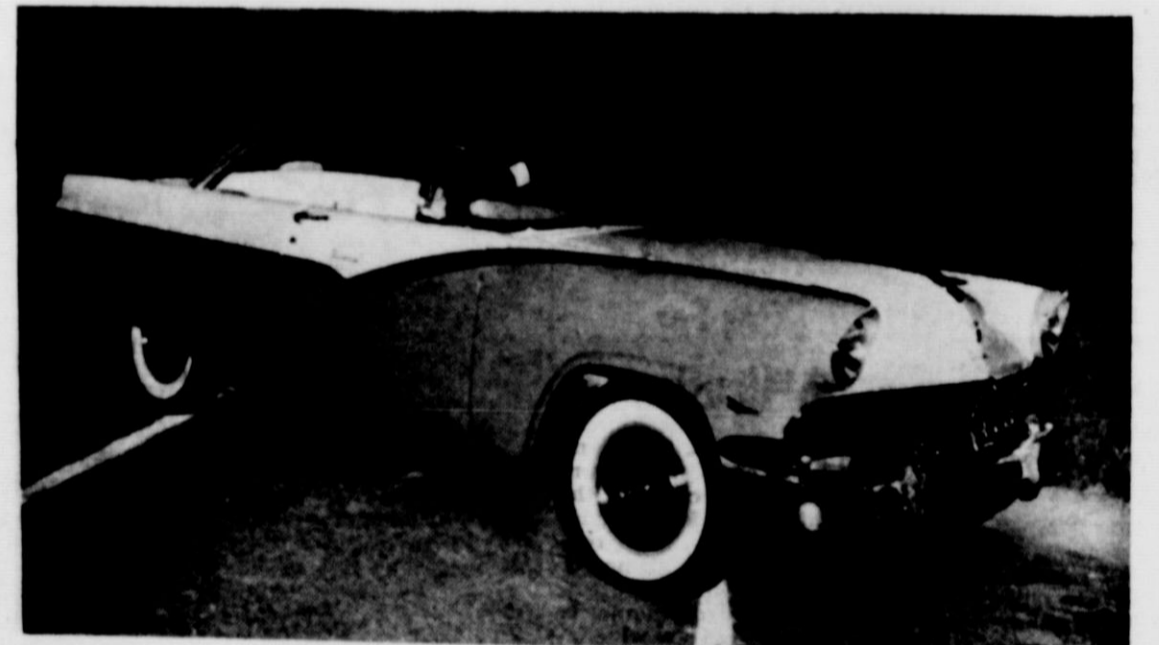

# SEASON FOR FAIRS AT HAND IN TEXAS

In many a city and town of Texas today, community leaders are making plans for an important annual event which many folks have been eagerly looking forward to all year. During the next several months it will be fair-time throughout Texas—with county and regional fairs and festivals taking place in every section of the state, culminating in the State Fair in Dallas, October 7-23.

There is no doubt that Texas possibly has a bigger percentage of large, widely patronized fairs than any other state. Several of Texas' regional fairs attract more visitors than any other state fairs in some other sections of the nation.

The State Fair of Texas is, of course, the largest annual fair in the United States in terms of attendance, with over 25 million visitors from all parts of America, and a magnificent fairground with facilities valued at \$35 million.

As with most fairs the country over, Texas events carry a heavy emphasis on livestock and agriculture. Entertainment covers a wide range, from carnival sideshows, rodeos, folk songs to the Broadway musicals presented at the State Fair. Competitions in making jams and jellies, succulent cakes and pies and other examples of traditional homemaking skills still occupy a big place in the program of Texas fairs.

Fairs in Texas date back over 100 years. The first fair to be held in the state was in 1852, which featured bullfights, a circus, cockfights and fireworks. During the same decade Dallas became the first county in the state to organize a fair. The State Fair was founded in 1886.

A good fair regardless of size can be a valuable asset to its community, in the opinion of James H. Stewart, general manager of the State Fair and vice president of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

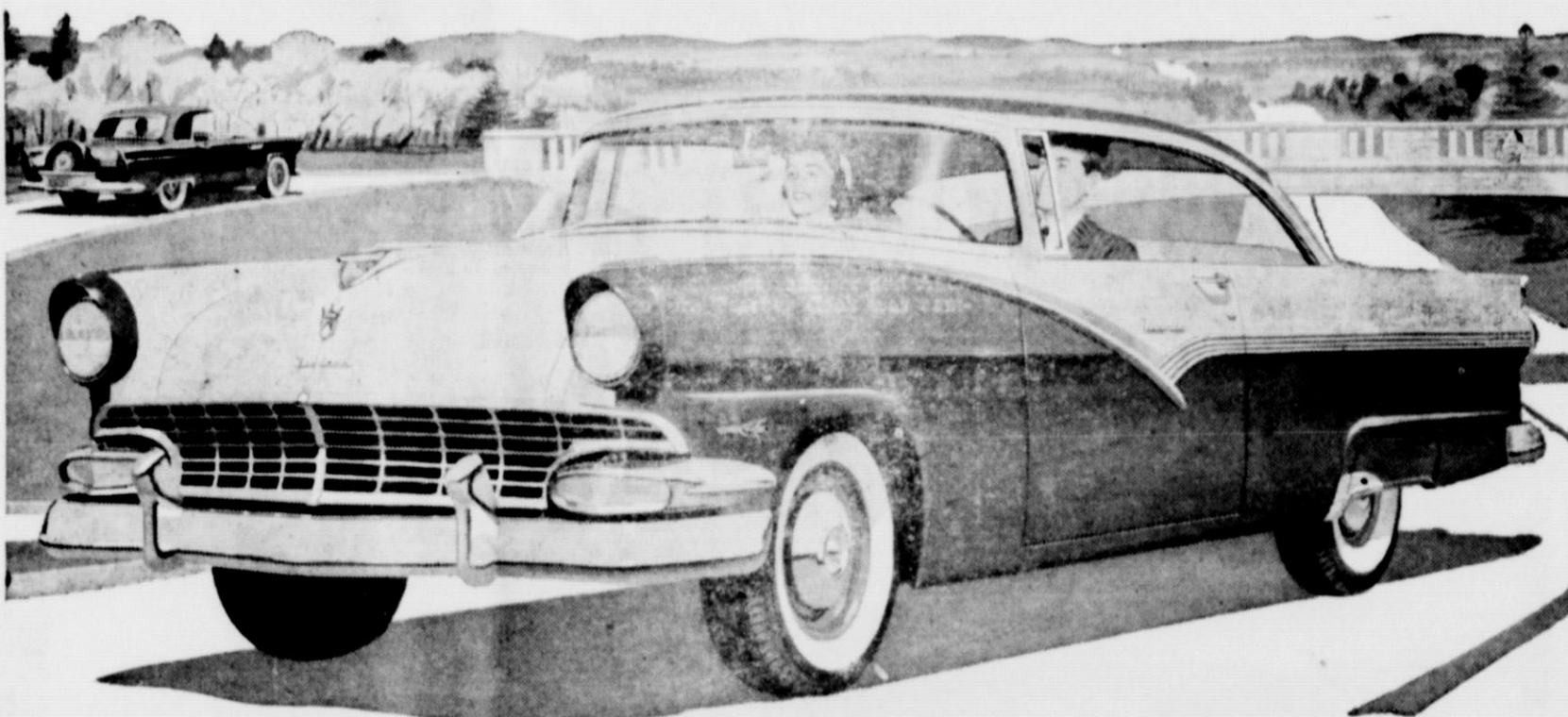

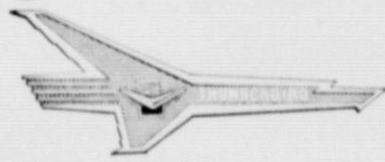

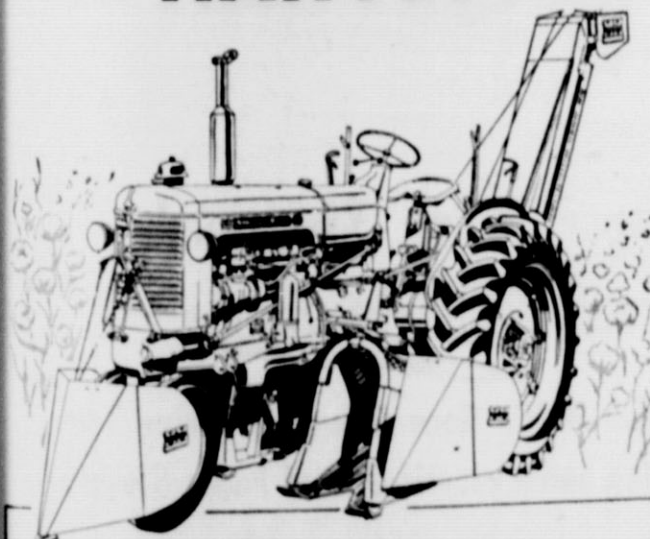

In many a city and town of Texas today, community leaders are making plans for an important annual event which many folks have been eagerly looking forward to all year. During the next several months it will be fair-time throughout Texas—with county and regional fairs and festivals taking place in every section of the state, culminating in the State Fair in Dallas, October 7-23.

Texas possibly has a bigger percentage of large, widely patronized fairs than any other state. Several of Texas' regional fairs attract more visitors than state fairs in some other sections of the nation.

The State Fair of Texas is, of course, the largest annual fair in the United States in terms of attendance, with over 25 million visitors from all parts of America, and a magnificent fairground with facilities valued at \$35 million.

As with most fairs the country over, Texas events carry a heavy emphasis on livestock and agriculture. Entertainment usually covers a wide range, from carnival rides, to folk dancing, to the Broadway musical "Tajana Cane" which will be presented at the State Fair. Competitions in making jams and jellies, succulent cakes and pies and other examples of traditional homemaking skills still occupy a big place in the program of Texas fairs.

Fairs in Texas date back over 100 years. The first fair to be held in the state may well have been one in Corpus Christi in 1852, which featured bull-fights, a circus, cockfights and fireworks. During the same decade Dallas County became the first county in the state to organize a fair. The State Fair was founded in 1886.

A good fair regardless of size can be a valuable asset to its community, in the opinion of James H. Stewart, general manager of the State Fair and vice president of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions.
