Motley County PTA To Sponsor The Golden Years of Country Music

The Motley County PTA will sponsor "The Golden Years of Country Music," the traveling country music road show sponsored each year by South Plains College. The group will appear in Matador on May 30th at 8:00 p.m. on Burleson Field. Tickets will sell for \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children under 12. No admission will be charged for pre-school children.

"Golden Years" will make its 1980 summer debut at 8:30 p.m. May 30 in Matador.

The second half of "Golden Years" will feature music made famous by today's contemporary country artists--Dave and Sugar, Eddie Rabbitt, Tom T. Hall, Crystal Gayle, the Oak Ridge Boys, Larry Gatlin and others.

"It's gonna be the best show we've ever had, no doubt about it, with more of a Nashville-based sound," says the show's pedal steel guitarist, Tim McCasland. He's an instructor in SPC's country/bluegrass music degree program.

"Golden Years" has the same name as last year's road show (this is the fourth road show for SPC), but it has a new

script, some new costumes, songs, skits and cast members.

"We've made an effort, we all feel like, to create a show with more of a professional type atmosphere," said the show's narrator Eddie Trice. This marks his second stint as narrator and his fourth show. He also handles some sound work.

Use of multi-colored lighting, elevated platforms to highlight various performers and costuming should help to make "Golden Years" a sophisticated, beautiful show, one that falls in line with the country music award shows we've seen on television in the past few years," says Helen Roberts, SPC assistant professor of speech and drama who is the show's scriptwriter and choreographer.

She's completing the new script, which will explore the roots of country music in the first half and the contem-

porary country sound in the second half.

"Country music today is so versatile that it picks up the attention and interest of many millions of people. It has much more appeal," she says, "to the masses of people that it did in years past."

SPC's first 1977-78 edition of the road show, "Texas Cradle of Giants," featured Texas artists but quickly expanded to encompass country artists from throughout the nation. "We feel like the growth of country music has progressed, and that requires us to keep up," said John Hartin, lead guitarist for the show and director of SPC's two-year country/bluegrass music program.

"As a result, the second half of 'Golden Years' this summer will sound a lot more like what you hear on your top 40 on country music stations than the material we've used before," he explains.

"We'll be stronger vocally," Hartin added, "there's no question about it; the caliber of the musicians this year is superior due to the fact that as we've grown in the country/bluegrass program, we've been able to recruit more and more outstanding talent from throughout the United States."

Ed Marsh, fiddler with the show and SPC bluegrass instructor, agrees. "I think we were able this year to pick more specialized people... We have a lot of people who can do every kind of music. They feel at ease on any level," he said.

For the first time, "Golden Years" boasts a full string section, and both harmony and lead vocal sections, along with a rhythm section, patterned after professional country music bands of today.

Lead vocals: Natalie Berryhill, Scott Yarbrough, Barry Canter and Jona Valentine.

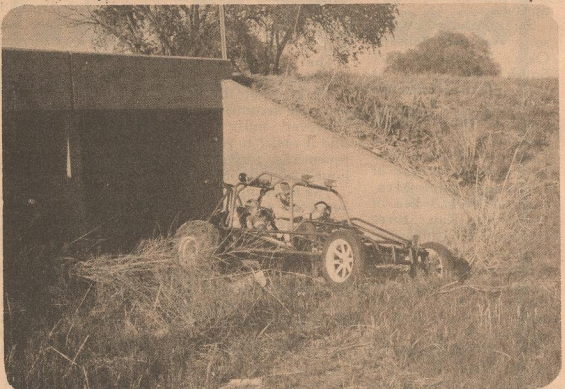

Blood Bank Drive To Be Held Tuesday

A unit from the South Plains Blood service will be in Matador Tuesday, April 29, to accept blood donations from Motley County citizens.

Matador Lions Club is sponsoring the drive, from 2 to 5 p.m. Tuesday at the American Legion Building, and everyone who is qualified to give blood is urged to do so.

The age for blood donor qualifications is 17 through 65 years, with minimum weight of 110

pounds. Persons age 17 must have written permission from their parents. Blood cannot be donated by persons who have, or have had hepatitis, active disease of heart, lung, kidney, liver or stomach; internal cancer; diabetes, epilepsy or convulsions and frequent fainting spells.

There is an urgent need for blood donations for The Lubbock region, according to a spokesman for SPBS.

Daylight Savings Time Scheduled to Start Sunday

Daylight saving time, an idea Benjamin Franklin brought to the United States from Europe, returns to most of the nation next Sunday.

The official change occurs at 2 a.m. local time April 27, when the time instantly becomes 3 a.m. However, most people find it easier to set their timepieces forward an hour Saturday night.

The resetting of clocks every six months -- the hour is regained the last Sunday in October -- is called for by the Uniform Time Act, although daylight saving time has been practiced in Europe for centuries.

A few areas do not observe daylight time: Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and a few counties in Indiana that are in the Eastern Time Zone.

When Benjamin Franklin was United States minister to France, he wrote an article recommending that stores keep earlier hours to save the cost of lighting.

For the nation's first few decades, daylight time was observed by scattered individual communities.

Commerce and communication was so slow, it didn't matter if you had uniformity," said Jack Lusk of the Department of Transportation, which administers the uniform time law. "When it takes you a whole day to get from a plantation in Virginia to Washington, it didn't much matter whether you were an hour late."

Congress first got into the act in 1918 with the passage of "an act to save daylight and to provide standard time for the United States."

She told of frustrations because former salesman whom she knew, (having worked at the store for many years), had been transferred, or quit the companies Mr. Jacobs had bought from, and new salesmen did not have the same concern for customers; of problems with her employees, "I found out that women don't like to work for women--by the end of the first year, all the help had quit who had worked for Jake, even though I tried to treat my employees as I would like to be treated in the same circumstances. I suddenly realized that employees have a life outside of their work, which sometime interferes with their employment and there were many problems related to keeping books and making reports, especially those required by the government."

The change in lifestyles also affected business, she pointed out. People no longer stayed in town late on Saturday, and stores began to close earlier.

with the advent of television. "All this affects the life of small towns and the merchants. If the public, my friends and relatives hadn't continued their patronage, I would have had many more dark days than I did. Being a small town store owner has enabled me to keep my home here, and rear my daughter. I owe a lot to those who have stood beside me and supported me."

As an employee, Mrs. Green first explored the reasons women work outside their homes, and gave timely advice to those who do work.

"A woman should be neatly dressed, always punctual, and congenial with other employees, as well as the employer. She should be loyal to her employer, and above all she should not answer personal questions about her boss. Do not be critical of your work. If you don't approve of the business, you should change jobs."

During the past 15 years Mrs. Green was employed at the Panhandle Bank and Trust Company in Borger, where she and her husband, Phil lived, before returning to Matador where they were both reared. Mr. Green is manager of the Plainview Savings and Loan Bank.

"The job in Borger was almost the perfect job," Mrs. Green said. "I enjoyed every minute of my work and the good public relations which we enjoyed. Although I help out here when needed, it is for free. Now, I need another paying job."

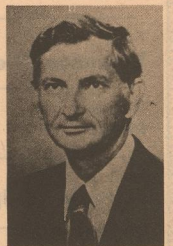

Question: When should I submit my medical insurance bill?

Answer: The Medicare law has a time limit for the submitting of medical insurance claims. For services received between October 1, 1978, and September 30, 1979, you must submit the bills by December 31, 1980. For services between October 1, 1979, and

September 30, 1980, the claim must be submitted by December 31, 1981.

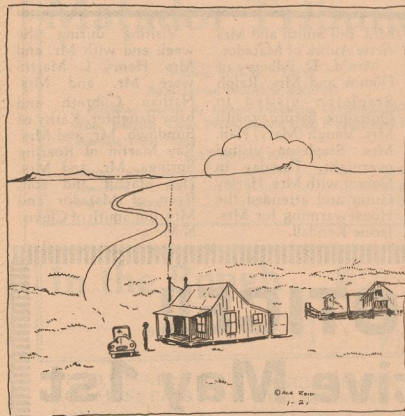
