END OF THE TRAIL for "Boy", playmate of the above children, killed by a mystery bullet at the east edge of Matador two weeks ago. Three families enroute to California from Washington, D. C. stopped at a windmill for water to cool a heating automobile. The bullet struck the dog in the spine while he played close to the above children and seven other members of the three families. Sheriff John Stotts investigated the entire area and was unable to find tracks or other evidence that anyone had been in the vicinity. His conclusion was that the dog may have been killed by a ricocheting bullet fired from a distance. The travelers did not see anyone but heard a rifle shot. FOLLOWING the traditional pattern of West Texas, Motley county has made an abrupt turn in the general outlook during the past three weeks. Almost every trace of the drought has vanished beneath a sea of abundant vegetation following general rains. Crops prospects have been further enhanced by more rainfall which reached most county areas Thursday.

Motley county was fortunate in escaping a thundering hail and windstorm which struck Spur and Dickens Friday afternoon. Damage was estimated in the thousands of dollars. Rainfall here last week was 1.35 inch as recorded by the cooperative West Texas Utilities Company and Tribune gauge. Similar precipitation was reported in other areas of the county. In a recent letter from our friends, the A. J. Bradfords of Wellington, New Zealand, they tell of a trip to the west coast of the South Island, which means a night journey by sea and all of the next day by rail, and included a mountain ride through a 5-mile tunnel at Arthur's Pass, through Otira Gorge for some miles over fast flowing rivers and deep ravines, across level land, to Greymouth.

"During our stay there we visited the Pancake Rocks and Blow-holes" the letter reads. "These are reached after a 25-mile drive along a coastal road. The Tasman Sea pounds the coast. Even on the calmest of days there are big seas running. We happened to strike the tide just right for the working of the blow-holes. The waves rushing through underground channels shoot up through rents thirty to forty feet into the air. In a real storm it is a wonderful sight we are told. The Pancake Rocks are so-called because of their striking resemblance to stacks of pancakes. They are shaped so by the elements."

"Norfolk Island, out in the Pacific Ocean, four hours flying from Auckland, is our most northern city. The island's past history is rather grim for it was a convict settlement. Today it is a pleasure resort visited by many. It is only three miles by five. The climate is wonderful. Temperatures around 85 in the summer and 60 in the winter. The Natives are mostly descendants of the mutineers of the BOUNTY. They are very friendly, and one is made very welcome."

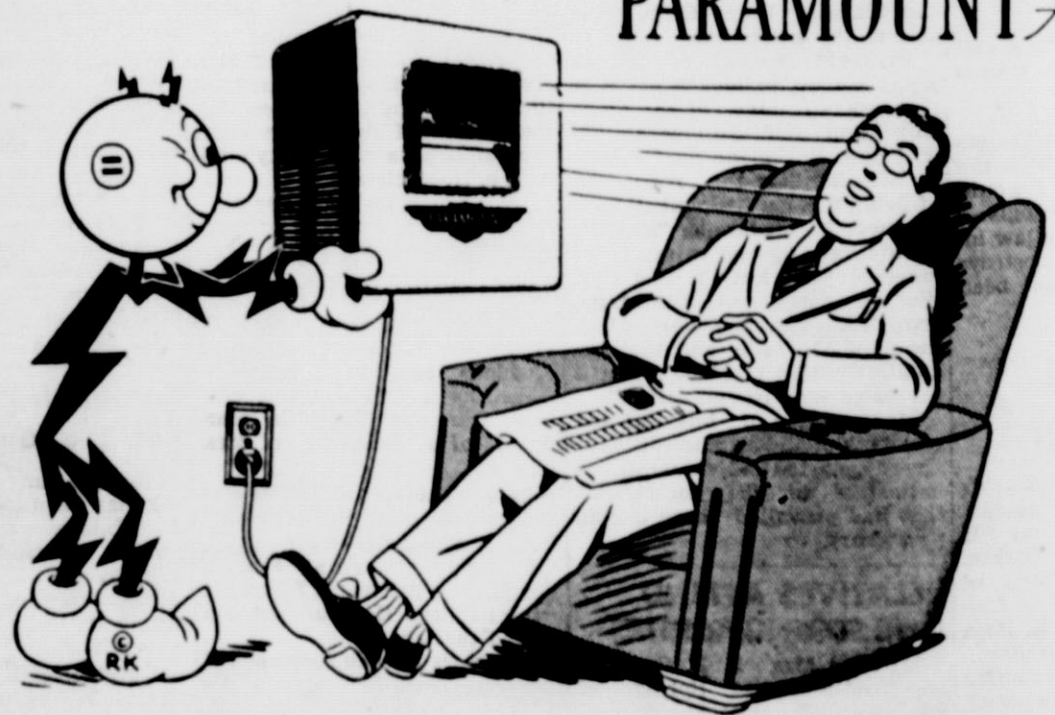
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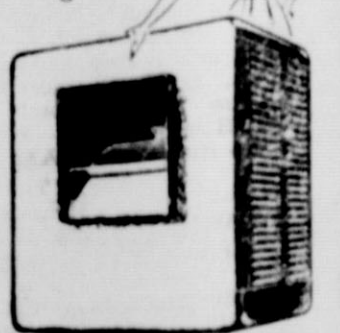


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Roaring Springs Eastern Star Chapter Elects Officers In Recent Meeting


