3rd OIL PRODUCER IN COTLE COUNTY

Third producer has been indicated in the Willie (Flippin) field of southwest Cottle county at the General Crude Oil Company's No. 39-A-B Swenson Development Company, west offset to an indicated half-mile south extension of the pool. Two-hour drillstem tests from 3,220 to 3,241 feet surfaced gas in 59 minutes. Recovery was 210 feet of oil and 90 feet of heavy oil and gas cut mud. Electrical logs were being run. Location is in section 39, Block B, John H. Stephens survey, 11 miles southwest of Paducah (about 20 miles southeast of Matador).

FREAK WIND HURLS FARM WOMAN INTO COTTON TRAILER

Tornadoes which brought death and destruction to Blackwell, Oklahoma and Udall, Kansas last week may have had their inception in this area. Mr. and Mrs. Paul Patton who live on a farm in the Fairview community about four miles southeast of Matador experienced a small twister on the fateful Wednesday evening. The freak wind struck without warning and hurled Mrs. Patton into the back of a low farm trailer half-filled with cottonseed.

James Renfro who had driven his tractor into the same area kept from being blown over by holding to a post. Mr. Patton managed to get "Batch" Renfro, age 10, into his pickup. Almost at the same instant the savage winds caused the Patton's sheet-iron chicken house to disintegrate and fly away into the air. After the wind had passed they witnessed pieces of sheet-iron drifting earthward across the field where it was later collected. The chicken house was rebuilt this week.

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Highlights and Sidelights FROM THE CAPITOL

In this, the sixth main version of a money bill, the Senate swung back to the House's proposal of one cent on gasoline and cigarettes. But the Senate substituted a whopping \$16,000,000 a year additional tax on beer for the House's \$1,000,000 a year increase on beer and wine dealers' license fees.

Final passage was voted 18-13. Stripped out of the Senate passed tax bill were House proposals for a levy on cigars, snuff and tobacco. Added was a token one-twentieth of a cent levy on "dedicated" natural gas—long-term exclusive contracts, payable by the long pipelines—and expected to produce \$2,000,000. Gas pipelines were put under the intangible assets tax.

Dropped were Senate proposals for manufacturing taxes and gross receipts taxes on department stores, hotels and motels. Rejected by the Senate was a gross receipt tax on the metals and chemicals industries. Sen. Grady Hazlewood, slender, graying member from Amarillo, emerged with the winning combination to unblock the long and confused Senate fight for new revenues.

At Friday's session, Sen. Otis Lock of Lufkin, who termed himself the "coerced sponsor" of the tax measure, offered a new "in between" plan which salvaged part of Governor Allan Shivers' original recommendations and made concessions to an obdurate House.

Lock proposed a 14 cent increase on gasoline, halfway between the two cents the Governor wanted and the one cent the House voted; and 1 1/2 cents on cigarettes, along with a 25c per \$1,000 franchise tax levy on corporate stocks. It would bring in the needed \$56,000,000 to the general revenue fund, he said.

But Senator Hazlewood came up with his substitute and it was favored, 22 to 9 over the Lock plan. The final vote put both House and Senate on record for a one-cent-only increase on gasoline, making the entire bill more palatable for House concurrence.

Beer industry leaders, who had successfully fought off a proposed \$1.30 per barrel increase in the House and also in Senate committee (which would have raised the total rate to \$3.30, or 1c per bottle) suddenly found their industry saddled with a tax of \$5.30 a barrel—or an additional 1c per bottle tax.

sioner Bascom Giles were returned in Travis County. Five indictments charging theft linked B. R. Sheffield of Brady with Giles. Eight charges of forgery were made against Sheffield. Then five more indictments against Giles and Sheffield charged theft and conspiracy of theft.

A court of inquiry on Land Office affairs dromed on, questioning all employees of the land office. Giles' scheduled first trial at San Antonio, on a bribe charge, was postponed until August. Postponement was granted on an affidavit that a House member, Rep. Cecil Storey of Longview, had been employed as one of his lawyers. This was statutory grounds for postponement until 30 days after the end of a session.

Both the trial judge and the district attorney criticized the law forcing such postponement. Rep. Dolph Briscoe, Jr., of Uvalde, author of a series of bills to clean up the veterans' land administration, immediately put in a bill to restrict employment of legislators. Briscoe's bill would limit the automatic postponement privilege to legislators hired within one week after a case or indictment was filed—or to cases where the Legislature was the only attorney representing a defendant.

Short Snorts
Governor Shivers vetoed a bill raising speed limits on all highways from 60 to 65 miles an hour and to 70 miles on four-lane divided highways. It would

increase traffic deaths and accidents, he ruled.

In all the turmoil of the tax deadlock the House took time out to pass a constitutional amendment resolution to create mosquito tax districts.

A badly slashed Trinity River Authority bill passed the Senate. A feature was inserted to allow downriver users additional water above their old "normal flow" rights, without paying for it.

Rep. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield won House passage of his bill to raise college registration fees from \$25 to \$50 a semester. But it was modified to exempt students working 20 hours or more a week. Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton promised to fight it until adjournment if taken up in the Senate.

Sen. William H. Shireman of Corpus Christi abandoned his bill requiring lobbyists to register. Opponents amended it until he said it affected public officials more than lobbyists.

Rep. J. E. Cox's "unfair sales" bill passed the Senate after it had been watered down until opponents said it was unconstitutional—but meaningless even if valid. The Conroe representative's bill was restricted to grocery stores. Its prohibition against selling below cost also prohibited a merchant from limiting sales or refusing to sell his entire stock to competitors at the advertised price. This would enable competitors to buy the bargain merchandise before housewives had an opportunity to take advantage of the advertiser's specials.

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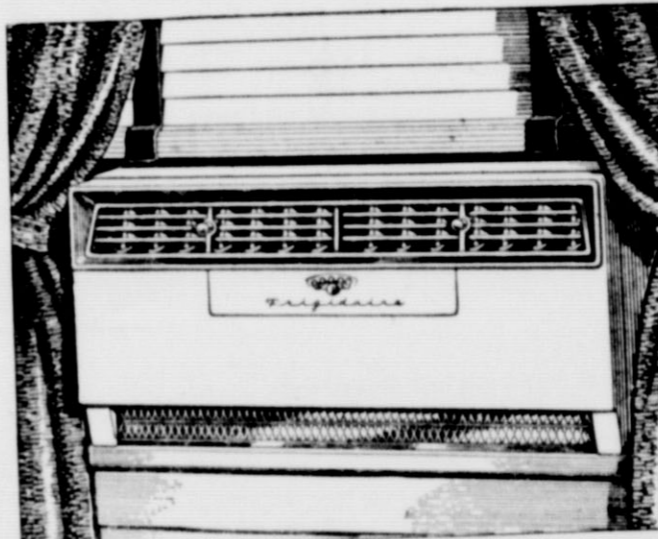

The picture, "Land of Fury", shown at Rogue Theatre last week, held special interest for us, since it was filmed in New Zealand, and we have a special interest in that country.

For over ten years we have sent the Tribune to friends in the land "down under", and at intervals we receive interesting letters from them, and only recently, a number of copies of the New Zealand Free Lance and The Weekly News from Auckland.

The picture, a J. Arthur Rank Production, was filmed by Pine-wood Studios from the book, "The Seekers" by John Gutherie, telling of the early settlers from England in New Zealand about the beginning of the eighteenth century, their reception by the natives, and tribal customs of the Maori.

In olden days it was a custom in some areas of Polynesia, to lay the body of a dead chief in a canoe and to set the vessel and its dead passenger sailing westward on a last, lonely voyage. Only recently, an ancient Maori canoe has been acquired by the Dominion Museum at Wellington, and is believed to be such a funerary vessel. An incident of this nature was included in the "Land of Fury" film.

The scenery was beautiful, and we were familiar with much of it, from the perfect reproductions appearing in the pictorial section of the papers we have been receiving.

Descendants of the ancient Maori still live on the Islands and still have tribal dance celebrations, such as our North American Indians, who are keeping old traditions alive in this country. (More about New Zealand next week).

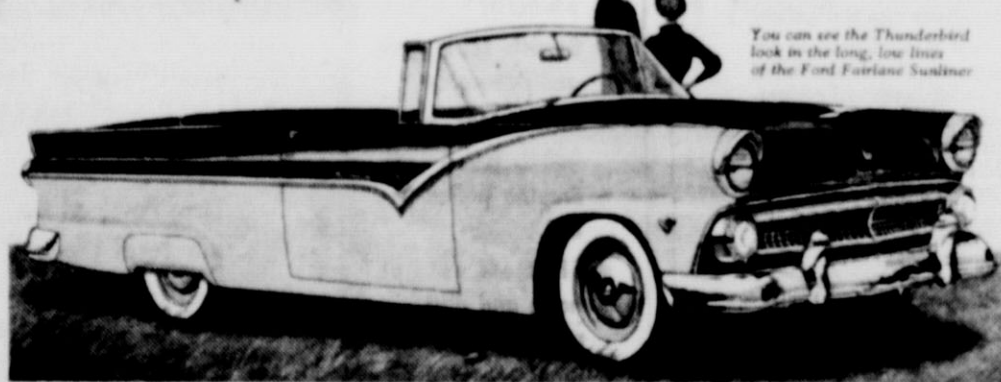

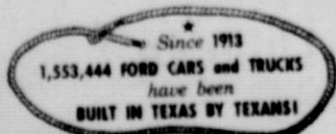
