General Phone To Cut Rates

Reduced long distance rates for most station-to-station calls within Texas will become effective January 1, 1967 for customers of General Telephone Company of the Southwest according to E. H. Danner, president.

State-wide reductions on three minute calls vary from five to fifteen cents on most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance within Texas. Reductions for calls over three minutes are even greater, according to Danner. The reductions apply to calls made during the time when "day rates" are in effect as well as to all intrastate (within Texas) station-to-station calls made during the "night rate" hours after 8 p.m. and all day Sunday.

The new tariffs reflecting the reduced rates will be distributed to all offices handling long distance calls at the earliest possible date, Danner said.

Resident's Nephew In Freak Accident

Price, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bunyan Price of Andrews, formerly of Matador, was a passenger in and owner of the car driven by Noel King, 23, also of Andrews, which smashed through a home at the end of a dead-end street in Seagraves, killing Mrs. Grady Loyd, in her bed.

Also injured in the mishap were Ronnie Loyd, 18, son of the dead woman, and King, driver of the car, who was in fair condition with internal injuries at Permian General Hospital, Andrews. Price was treated first at Seagraves, then transferred to Methodist Hospital. His head was described as "completely scalped."

Price and King, both of Andrews, had accompanied a third friend Nixon Neas, 23, to his home in Seagraves following a bidistrict football game at Andrews, Saturday night. Neas lives about four blocks from the Loyd home.

According to the investigating officer, the vehicle hopped the curb and smashed into the Loyd home, lacking only about four feet of traveling completely through the frame dwelling.

It first crunched through the bedroom of the dead woman's son, knocking him into his mother's bedroom. Observers said he was "rolled up in a mattress," which possibly saved him from serious injury.

Humble To Release Matadors Contract

AFTER 29 YEARS Humble Oil & Refining Company is releasing the Matador Land & Cattle Co. lease which has been in effect since December 1, 1937. Announcement was made this week by Toreador Royalty Corporation, Dallas, which owns an undivided 1/2 of the minerals under the approximately 500,000 acres, and an undivided 3/4 of the minerals under some portions of it.

Approximately 50 wells have been drilled on the ranch in the 29 years which Humble has had it leased. Effective date of the release is today, December 1, 1966.

The land is located in Motley, Floyd, Cottle, Crosby and Dickens Counties. Humble has advised that releases are being placed on record in Matador, Paducah, Crosbyton, Floydada and Dickens. Earl E. Westmoreland, President of Toreador Royalty Corporation has announced a meeting of the landowners of the

former Matador Ranch at the courthouse here, December 10th, (Saturday). The meeting will be held in the District Court room, starting at 11 a.m. Purpose of the meeting is to discuss future leasing possibilities.

Release of the half-million acres of land will possibly have no immediate reaction locally. It is believed, however, that leasing will increase, especially when the oil industry returns to normal.

Unconfirmed reports are that at least one company is considering portions of the area at the present time, with possible interests in leasing.

The one-half mineral interests of the Toreador Royalty Corporation is owned largely by the original Scottish owners of stock in the Matador Land & Cattle Company.

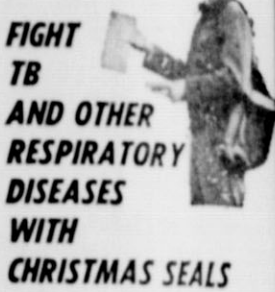

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

I am sure that farmers and ranchers are wondering how they will be affected by the minimum wage law. This information was recently included in a news letter mailed out by the ASCS. If you failed to receive a copy, let me know.

More farm trailers are usually on the public roads during this season than during any other period of the year. A few simple precautions can prevent accidents. These are: use a safety pin in hitch, distribute the weight in the trailer, especially two-wheeled trailers. Placing the load near the rear can cause the trailer to "whip."

With deer season underway, you might like a copy of "Field Dressing A Deer". Quality of venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of kill until it is placed in the freezer, therefore the importance of field dressing.

Another publication that you may want is "Wild Game Care and Cooking". This offers many suggestions for preparing delicious dishes of venison as well as other wild game meats. If you would like a copy of these publications, let me know.

Texas A&M's soil testing service for farmers, gardeners and homeowners is being expanded to include micronutrient tests. The new testing equipment can measure magnesium, zinc, iron, manganese and copper in plant and soil extracts. Previously, soil tests measured only phosphorus, potassium, organic matter for nitrogen, soil acidity and salinity hazards.

If you're between 9 and 19 and hope to attend college, a trade or technical school perhaps you can move your hopes toward reality with financial aid by way of 4-H. Over 300 scholarships valued at nearly 150 thousand dollars are presented annually to achievement-minded young people through the National 4-H Service Committee in Chicago. These scholarships are awarded to individuals who have outstanding records in one or more of the various 4-H programs. Scholarships are sponsored by 61 business organizations, representing virtually every type of major business and industrial enterprise. Three thousand grants have been given during the last 15 years, and have done much to enlarge educational and career opportunities of older 4-H members.

To provide an added incentive for Motley County 4-H members to keep a good record book, a watch is provided by the Gasoline Farmers Union for the Senior 4-H record from the county that grades the highest, and another watch is provided by the Motley County Farm Bureau for the Junior 4-H record that grades the highest. Some 4-H members submit

their records for judging more than once a year, thereby increasing their chance of becoming a winner.

Farm demonstrations have proved the value of cotton burs for maintaining soil productivity and soil conditions. A four year study at the South Plains Research & Extension Center at Lubbock has shown the value of burs in cotton production. Research showed that lint yields were highest when burs were applied to the soil and plowed under at the rate of 3 tons per acre, but where burs were limited, the greatest profit per ton of burs applied was where only two tons were used. Burs were effective on dryland and irrigated fields.

A ton of burs contains from 14.6 to 21.6 lbs. of nitrogen; from 7.9 to 9.5 lbs. of phosphorus and from 53.4 to 100.4 lbs. of potassium, with amounts calculated on the basis of dryweight. The greatest contribution to soil improvement from bur application appears to be the increase in the supply of energy which is used by soil microorganisms in breaking down the material and later release of plant food nutrients contained in the burs.

All this information is contained in "Cotton Burs for Soil Improvement", which is available for the asking.

Don't let evergreen plants dry out during the winter. They need adequate moisture all winter long and once the grass turns brown, we often forget to water the evergreens. It is especially important to provide adequate moisture just prior to a cold norther to reduce cold injury to plants.

Cows that give more milk wean bigger calves. Researchers report that the amount of milk produced by a cow has the single most important effect on the weaning weight of the calf. In A&M tests, Hereford cows bred by Hereford bulls gave just over 7 lbs. of milk a day and weaned calves averaging 408 lbs. Brahman cows bred to Brahman bulls gave nearly 9 lbs. of milk a day and weaned calves at 370 lbs. Santa Gertrudis cows bred to Santa Gertrudis bulls gave over 13 lbs. of milk a day and weaned calves over 500 lbs., with these calves slightly younger than the other calves at weaning.

On the crossbred side, Hereford-Brahman cows were bred to a Brahman bull, cows gave over 13 lbs. of milk a day and weaned calves at 422 lbs. Where the Hereford-Brahman cows were bred or crossed of cow age of cow gave nearly 13 lbs. of milk, and weaned calves that averaged 489 lbs.

According to J. K. Riggs, professor in the Dept. of Animal Science at A&M, this proves milk yield is significantly affected by breed or cross of cow, age of cow and sex of the calf nursing the cow. Mature cows produce the most milk and wean the heaviest calves. Bull and steer calves are heavier than heifer calves at weaning time.

4-H club members are going to find it harder to win a trip to the State 4-H Contests at Texas A&M in 1967. For the past few years, the first and second senior teams in district contests have been eligible for state competition, but in 1967, only the 1st place team will enter the state contests.

A few other changes for 1967 are: 4-H record books will be required in the Favorite Foods show while they were not required in past years. A horse demonstration, consisting of a team of two members will be added. Subjects that can be included in this demonstration are: Feeding; Training; Safety; Breeding; Management; Selection & Evaluation; Fitting; Showmanship Health or any items related to horse science, husbandry, or horsemanship.

The Soil, Water & Range Conservation Demonstration has been changed to Natural Resources Demonstration, with a separate contest for an individual and a team of two.
