Roaring Springs Ranch Club Now Open For Memberships

On a clear night you can hear the waterfall roar for miles. The cool, pure water calls wild life, birds and humans in to enjoy the most peaceful recreation area in the great Foothill Country.

It's the Roaring Springs Ranch, and artifacts show it has been used by humans as a recreation site for centuries. The Wichitas and the Comanches camped and hunted here. The buffalo hunters moved in and stayed until the big game was gone and then ranchers came.

Hydrological studies done on the water show the mineral content and the temperature doesn't match the water normally found in this area. There are indications that the water comes from New Mexico, surfaces here and then again in South Texas. More than one million gallons of water each day flows from the underground spring and down the rocks, then eastward down the South Pease River.

The Ranch is now owned by developer Jerrell Jennings, who has turned it into a private ranch club. With the help of ecology planners and assistance from Texas Tech University, Jennings said they were designing the springs to be forever as nature intended it to be . . . a recreation area.

As a private family recreation and camping area, the ranch will be owned and operated by the members. There will be a limited number of charter memberships sold for Motley County and surrounding area residents.

Along with the swimming pool, members will enjoy fishing lakes, over 450 improved campsites with water and electric hook-ups, and wilderness campsites with over 10 miles of wilderness trails. There will be a golf course complete with a driving range, miniature golf, amphitheater, hayrides, cookout trail rides, a chapel, baseball fields, motor cycle riding areas and a museum.

A new community center will have a post office, laundry mat, country store, game room, and a fire place lounge area.

A total of five lakes will be stocked with catfish, bass and crappie. A small pool will have bream in it for children with cane fishing poles.

Birdwatchers can find more varieties of their feathered friends here than any other location in West Texas. In the stands of cottonwood, black walnut, oak, elm and large mesquite you can see dove, quail and

turkey. In December and January of the camp's second season, the dove and quail will be available for hunting in a special 500-acre area adjacent to the camping resort. The hunting will be on a limited basis; lots will be drawn by club members to keep the area from being over-hunted.

When construction is completed the ranch will employ about 22 local people, with several management positions open.

Already members are bringing campers to the ranch for a relaxing week end. A limit on the number of

memberships and campsites will keep the ranch free of wall-to-wall tents, mobile homes and vans. The improved campsites will have comfort stations with showers, rest rooms and security lighting.

The ranch, as a whole, offers a camper privacy and security, with varied recreation for the entire family. The operation is master-planned and will be kept in its natural setting.

Roaring Springs Ranch Club is a member of Camp Coast-to-Coast with camping resorts across the U.S. Members enjoy reciprocal

rights to stay at any of the resorts without having to pay for camping space hookups.

Membership in the local club is designed for the life of the member and can be passed on to his or her children. FIFTH GRADE NEWS

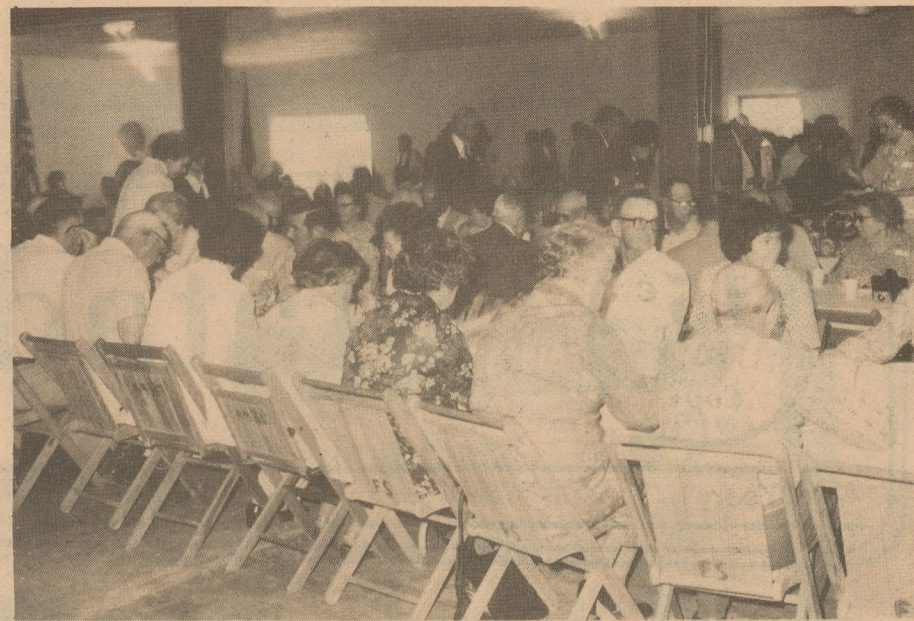
