A Second Glance

(Here are a few quotes from President George Washington on Sept. 17, 1796. His address that day is rich with good advice to the U.S., but I have chosen only a few of his lines.)
"Observe good faith and justice toward all nations. Cultivate peace and harmony with all. Religion and morality enjoin this conduct."

(Remember what we did to Free China? And look at our morality today.)

"Against the insidious wiles of foreign influence, I conjure you to believe me, fellow citizens, the jealousy of a free people ought to be constantly awake, since history and experience prove that foreign influence is one of the most blameable of a republican government."

"The great rule of conduct for us in regard to foreign nations is, in extending our commercial relations to have as little political connections as possible."

"It is our true policy to steer clear of permanent alliances with any portion of the foreign world, so far, I mean, as we are now at liberty to do it; for let me not be understood as capable of patronizing infidelity to existing engagements. I hold the maxim no less applicable to public than to private affairs that honesty is always the best policy. I repeat, therefore, let those engagements be observed in their genuine sense. But in my opinion it is unnecessary and would be unwise to extend them."

"Taking care always to keep ourselves by suitable establishments on a respectable defensive posture, we may safely trust to temporary alliances for extraordinary emergencies."

Carter, the Trilateral Commission and the Council on Foreign Relations must have missed the words of our founding Fathers somewhere down the line. Watch out for the Trilateral Commission -- it's dangerous.

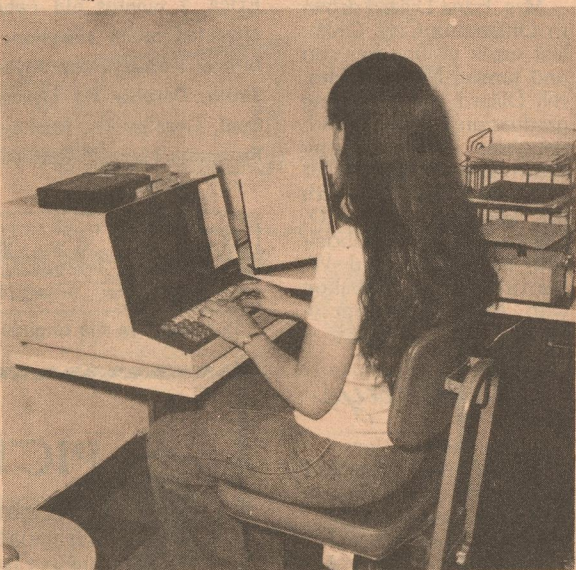

Between The Lines

Radicals of Carter

Radicals who are for the overthrow of our government are appointed by the President to high position in our government.

Sam Brown, director of ACTION VISTA and the Peace Corps, uses this means to propagate staging areas for confrontation politics against ourselves.

He was ringleader of the "Chicago 7", who disrupted the National Convention of the Democratic Party in Chicago a few years ago and spoke on campuses across country favoring Viet Cong victory in the Viet Nam War.

Lately, he gave \$432,000 in ACTION money to the Midwest Academy of Chicago which is dedicated to teaching "...how to use tactics that range from confrontation to negotiation" in forcing social change upon the American people.

John Froines, hired as director of the office of toxic substances by Carter, was one of the anti-American "Chicago 7", demonstrated with Communists and left-wingers outside the Justice Department in 1971 shouting; "I have not come to

surrender...I have come to tear down the government." Salary, \$36,000 paid by us.

Lee Weiner, gets \$130 a day as adviser to Sam Brown, proposing radical change. In 1972, he attended Black Panther leader, Bobby Seale's birthday party and discussed with him plans of a new Communist Party in New Jersey.

Hendrick Hertzberg, totalitarian speechwriter of President Carter, called the Communists good guys in the Viet Nam War. He said, "As a pacifist, I take comfort in the fact that the Communist victory was not a military victory but a moral victory. Most people will be far better off than they were under Saigon." (It's better to be Red than dead.)

Stoney Cooks, Carter appointed deputy to Carter's Andrew Young, "our" Ambassador to the United Nations; sponsored the Communist controlled 10th World Youth Festival (1973) in East Berlin along with self-declared Communist, Angela Davis.

The evidence is overwhelming that Washington is not only infiltrated but is infested with Reds. By hiring these satanic Reds, can one say Carter sympathizes with their order and objectives? Even though these Communist sympathizers are working from within, Carter nor anyone in Washington have demanded their resignations. (From the Christian Crusade and National Enquirer.)

The bride's table was laid with a blue and white lace tablecloth. A two tiered blue cake decorated with daisies and fruit punch was served.

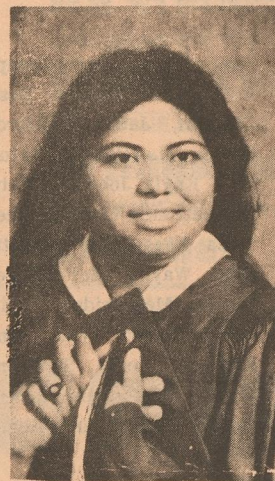
The groom's table was laid with a white lace tablecloth and a chocolate sheet layer cake and mints and nuts were served.

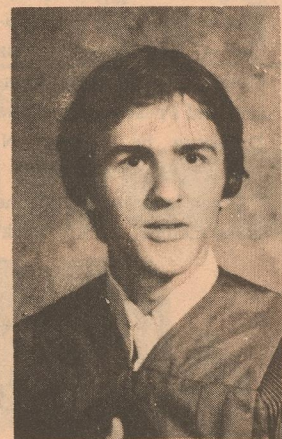

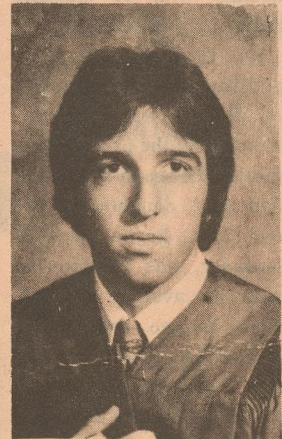

La Voe and Nell played in second flight -- and tied for first place -- low net. But were beat on first hole in the play off.

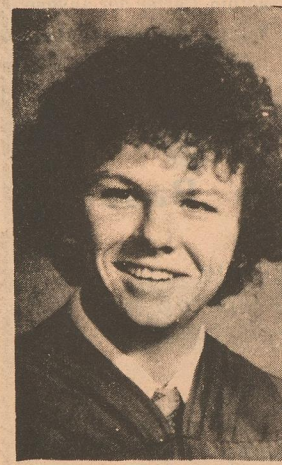

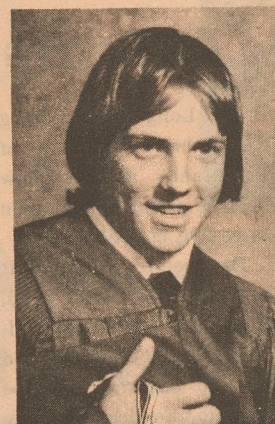

El Progreso Club Has Guest Luncheon

El Progreso Club concluded its current year May 24 with a guest luncheon in the basement fellowship hall of First Baptist Church. Honored guest was Mrs. Earl F. Watson of Iowa Park, president of Santa Rosa District of Texas Federation of Women's Club.

Members and guests assembled in the church auditorium where Mrs. Frank Pohl presented organ music. Mrs. Franklin Price, president, welcomed the group, and Invocation was by Mrs. Harold Campbell.

The program, "Federation Heritage Day" was led by Mrs. L. B. Campbell, a past-president of Santa Rosa District, who introduced Mrs. Watson, after reading the yearbook quotation: "Do not look back, and do not dream about the future. It will neither give you back the past nor satisfy your daydreams. Your Duty, your Reward, your Destiny are HERE and NOW" (Dag Hammarskjöld).

As guest speaker, Mrs. Watson gave highlights of Federation, General, Texas and District, from 1889 when General Federation of Women's Clubs was formed, to the present.

"Women's clubs have been responsible for 75% of the libraries across the country," she said, with reference to various projects supported by federation. Community Improvement is another federation-sponsored project. "This state," she said, "was 100% in community improvement participation." She told of various movements supported by the Santa Rosa District during its 20-year existence, and reviewed the state convention, April 26-29 in Houston.

A tour of M. D. Anderson Hospital was

one of the highlights of the convention, according to Mrs. Watson, because various facilities receive contributions from federated clubs.

Mrs. Watson presented certificates of award to Mrs. Price, which this club had earned at the district convention held in March, in Seymour. These included a certificate for 100 percent subscription to Texas Clubwoman; a first place award for programs in the Safety division and an Appreciation Award for 50 years in federation.

Mrs. Price presented Mrs. Watson with a floral arrangement in appreciation for her visit here.

A brief history of El Progreso Club was given by Mrs. Campbell, telling of its organization 52 years ago following a bridge party, where the idea for a study club was discussed. She thanked Miss Mary Keith for use of her material on the subject, and presented highlights from the club's activities, including a library which the club sponsored, with Miss Keith as librarian, during the 1930's.

The club was organized in 1927 with 16 members, with Mrs. J. K. Crews as its first president. During the years, the club has sponsored youth organizations such as Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and more recently, Girl's Town. It also contributes funds in sending delegates to Boys State, Girls State and 4-H Congress in Washington, D.C., to name only a few of the activities.

Mrs. U. L. Willie, who was State Treasurer of TFWC in 1957, served the club as president three times, two terms being consecutive. Another member, Mrs. A. J. Daffern also served

as president for two consecutive terms. Under the leadership of Mrs. Harold Campbell, the club participated in a county-wide bi-centennial celebration, with outstanding success.

Inspirational Thought by Mrs. Douglas Meador concluded the program.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL PRODUCERS:

You are now being reminded that wheat cover on turnrows, and any where else that you have wheat planted for just a cover crop **MUST NOT REACH THE DOUGH STAGE.**

If this wheat does reach this stage, it will be counted as wheat. Also, any wheat used for set-aside cover should have already been clipped, mowed, disced or destroyed by some mechanical means. If you have not done this, then you must do so immediately or it will be an ineligible set-aside cover.

Let's not find ourselves in a situation where we have wheat maturing where we did not report it as wheat for grain. So, let's get that shredder or disc and destroy all wheat that will not be mechanically harvested and was not reported as wheat for grain.

FINAL PLANTING DATES: June 10 is the final date required to plant cotton and corn. June 20 is the final date required to plant grain sorghum.

If for reasons beyond your control you cannot

get your crop planted by the above dates, you have 5 days from these dates to come in and apply for prevented planting credit.

FARM FUEL SHORT—SGE: If you are having difficulty in obtaining 100 percent of your fuel needed for your farming operation, come by the ASCS office. We have the necessary forms to be used in requesting allocation of additional fuel from the State Energy Office.

PEANUTS: Transfer by lease or sale within the county must be completed by June 14, 1979.

Producers must file a report to account for the acquisition of seed peanuts at the time the report of planted acres is filed. A receipt for purchase will be required. The receipt must include: The name and address of the handler or person from whom the seed peanuts were purchased; the pounds (by type) of seed peanuts acquired (indicate whether farmer stock or shelled basis); and date of acquisition.

1978 LOANS: May 31, 1979 is the final date for producers to request price support on eligible 1978 crops corn, sorghum and cotton.
