

Twenty-eight people were killed in traffic accidents across Texas last year over the Christimas weekend -- 12 fewer than the 40 estimated by seferty officials safety officials.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "We're not really trying to demonstrate any great ability in making predictions. All we're trying to do is draw people's attention to traffic safety, and to maybe make them a little more cautious during these critical driving periods."

It's a fact. The week surrounding Christmas is one of the busiest times of the year on the states highways. It can also become one of the most dangerous, if drivers fail to take extra safety precau-

also become one of the most tangerous if drivers fail to take extra safety precautions and heed the rules of the road.

More people are on the highways during the holidays, as they hurry on their way to be with friends and family. Fatigue often sets in on some of the long trips which can deteriorate a drivers ability to remain alert. Since most propale y to remain alert. Since, most people rant to spend as little time on the road as possible, speeding is also a very tempting option that contributes to highway car-

wery dangerous period.

More celebrations occur during the holiday season than at any other time of the year, and the ratio of offenses and

accidents increases proportionately.

Cawthon said patrols will be beefed

any effort to make our roads safer for our citizens. Texas has a statewide emer-gency toll free number. It can be used by motorist to report a drunken driver, to report an accident, or to summon assis-

tance when they encounter other prob-lems. The number is 1-800-525-5555. "This number is not designed to re-place 911," Cawthon said. "But it is appropriate in some cases where 911 is not."

Not all counties in the state have 911 service, and the D.P.S. number ensures a quick response in those areas of the state.

Holidays would be happy times. Don't spoil yours with speed, fatigue, or alcohol. Just follow the rules of the road, be courteous, drive defensively, and most importantly, don't drink and drive.

The Nutcracker — A Colorful Christmas Hero

The nutcracker might be a fierce. brightly decorated soldier peering down from a mantel, standing guard over his stockpile of walnuts. He also might appear as little Clara's gallant hero in Tchaikovsky's Christmas bal-'The Nutcracker Suite

Either way, the nutcracker represents more than 250 years of folklore and history. And he really does crack nuts. But "the real joy of the nutcracker is his colorful presence at the holiday season," says Ken Althoff author of The Legend of the Nut

It all began in the Erzgebirge region of the German Democratic Republic, a mountain range in the Province of Saxony, just north of the Czechoslovakian border.

During the 13th century, the mountains, rich in deposits of silver

and iron, were a lively mining center. Over several centuries, the metals were depleted, and people took up other vocations. Because the mountains had abundant forests, woodworking became popular, and by the

17th century, simple toys and other handmade articles began to appear.

As early as 1725, there were nut-

cracker figures in the homes of Erzgebirge, but no one is certain exactly how they evolved. Legend has it a wealthy farmer whose heart was as hard as the walnuts on his property offered a reward for the easiest method for cracking the walnuts. Some suggestions included shooting the nut or sawing it in half. A veterinarian thought if he put the nut under a chicken, it would hatch.

A puppet carver from the village of Seiffen solved the dilemma. He presented to the old man a brightly colored puppet with a large mouth and jaws strong enough to crack the hard walnuts. It also cracked the old man's misery. He rewarded the entire town with gifts and gave the puppet carver his own special workshop

Traditional nutcrackers depict an authoritarian figure with a somewhat grim, fierce face modeled after the kings, policemen, foresters and military officers who often represented oppression for the villagers. In Germany it is said that one has "a hard nut to crack" when facing a difficult

problem. This especially held true for the miners in Erzgebirge. So the toymakers decided to turn the tables and make these unpopular figures work cracking nuts for the miners.

Other popular figures that evolved during this time were the "smoking men." These hollow figures, with pipe or cigar in hand, held burning incense and appeared as several different characters, including a forester, town crier and Father Christmas

As the nutcracker and the smoking men have increased in popularity, especially as Christmas gifts, other characters have been introduced, including the night watchman, chim-

Making a nutcracker can be very tedious, requiring as many as 130 separate procedures. After the wood is selected and cured, the figure is carved on a lathe, assembled and painted. Some modern technology has been applied to the process, but it remains much the same as it was over 200 years ago. In fact, past attempts to produce nutcrackers in the United States have failed because manufacturers tried to mechanize the process.

Says Althoff, "The tradition of the Erzgebirge has been preserved in each product, and for decades to come, the German nutcracker will enhance homes all around the world

Another legend tells of Joseph of Arimathea. (It was in Joseph's tomb that the body of Jesus was laid to rest, Scripture tells us.)

The legend says that this same Joseph eventually traveled to England, where in his wanderings, he came to rest one day at Glastonbury. He drove his staff into the ground, where it grew to become a thorn tree. That is why the thorn tree blooms at Christmas, says the legend.

Another legend is connected with the yule log. If you want good luck, says the story, the log must not be allowed to burn out during the Christmas season; a part of it must be saved to start the fire next year. The ashes of the yule log are supposed to make land fertile, and in some countries the tradition is to scatter these ashes over the land on New Year's Day.

Santa's habit of coming down the chimney originates with a Norse legend. According to the Norsemen, at the time of the winter solstice, the goddess

Hertha would appear at each fireplace, bringing happiness and good fortune. Sometimes the good fortune arrived in the form of a bewhiskered old man who came down the chimney to meet her.

Another legend, attributed to the English, says the number of mince pies you taste at Christmas will indicate the number of happy months you'll have during the year.
