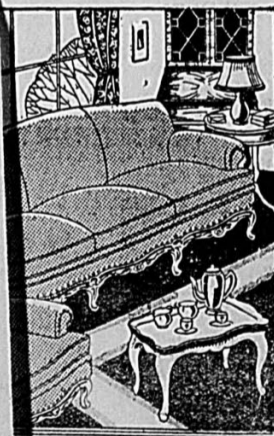

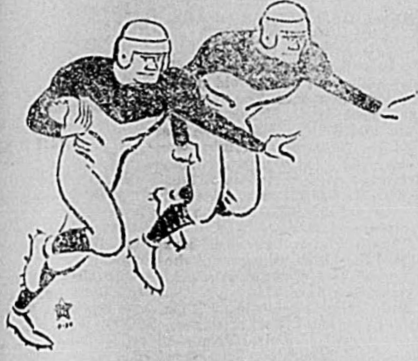
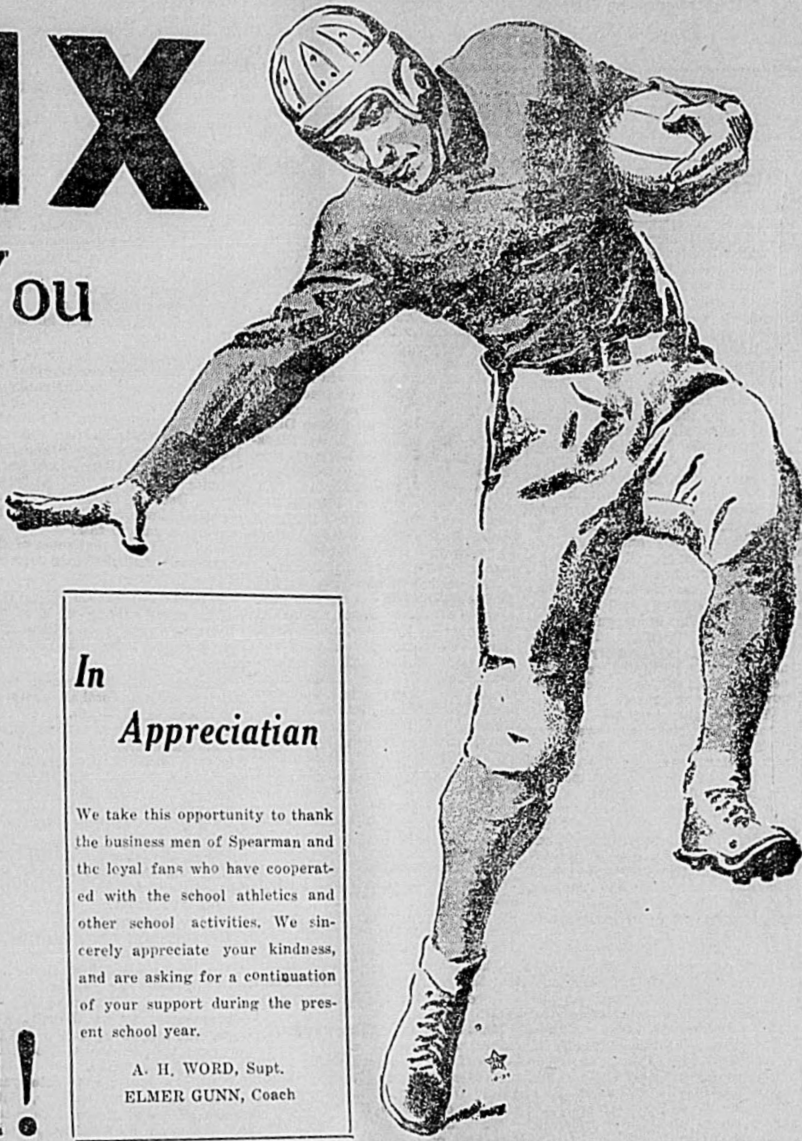

 one thing on which Christian Uni-  
 ty can be had. "Thy Word IS  
 Truth."  
 The New Testament is the last  
 will and testament of our Lord  
 Jesus Christ? and Baptism is an  
 ordinance of the New Testament.  
 But for anyone to say that the  
 Testament was named after one  
 ordinance contained therein and  
 to call it a Baptist's book; is to  
 go beyond that which is revealed.  
 John, the son of Zacharias was  
 the first man who baptized peo-  
 ple. He was thus known as "The  
 Baptist." To state that he was  
 called a baptist before he baptized  
 anyone will require proof not re-  
 vealed in the New Testament, and  
 therefore no proof. See if you can  
 find in your Bible where he was  
 ever called "a" baptist. It is "the"  
 Baptist every time. Furthermore  
 he was the only baptist ever men-  
 tioned in the word of God. Now,  
 Alexander was called the copper-  
 smith because he made things of  
 copper. Everyone who makes  
 things out of copper is a copper-  
 smith. Likewise, everyone who  
 baptizes is a baptist. The words  
 "baptize" and "baptist" are de-  
 rived from the Greek word "bap-  
 tizo," which meant to dip, over-  
 whelm, or immerse. When Jesus  
 spoke of John he called him John  
 the emmerger. Why not continue  
 to do the same today and not mis-  
 use the word?  
 Now, just where is salvation  
 found, in the New Testament  
 Church or outside of it? To those  
 teaching that salvation is not  
 thru the New Testament church  
 lies the burden of proof. Is any  
 such teachings suggested in Eph.  
 5:25, 1 Cor. 15: to 4, or Eph.  
 1:22?  
 Next, let us consider when the  
 church was established. Paul in  
 the fifth chapter of Eph. com-  
 pares Christ and the church with

the marriage relationship. Christ  
 is spoken of as the groom and the  
 Church as the bride. And through  
 this union, people are born into  
 the kingdom of God. Just as  
 Adam was the progenitor of the  
 human race, so is Christ the pro-  
 genitor of the spiritual race. No-  
 tice: As Adam slept an unnatural  
 sleep, from his side was taken the  
 means to form him a bride—so  
 Christ slept the sleep of death,  
 and from his side was taken the  
 means of his spiritual bride—  
 blood and water. Therefore, the  
 church could not have been in ex-  
 istence before the death of Christ.  
 For further proof, let us prayer-  
 fully consider the following:  
 1. If the church was establish-  
 ed before the death of Christ, it  
 was established under the law of  
 Moses. (Jesus took away the first  
 that he might establish the sec-  
 ond.) Read Heb. 10:9, Matt. 23:  
 1-3, Rom. 1:4, Eph 2: 14-15, Col.  
 2:14.  
 2. If it was established before  
 the death of Christ it was estab-  
 lished before the foundation was  
 tried. Isa. 28:16, 1 Cor. 3:10-11.  
 3. If it was established before  
 the death of Christ it was estab-  
 lished before the death of the  
 testator, which is contrary to cus-  
 tom, law and reason. Heb. 9:15-  
 17.  
 4. If it were established be-  
 fore the death of Christ, it was  
 established under a limited com-  
 mission. Math. 10:2-7.  
 5. If it was established before  
 the death of Christ it was estab-  
 lished before the resurrection from  
 the dead became a settled fact  
 and therefore, before any of its  
 members had any certain know-  
 ledge of a future life. Mark. 9:1-  
 10; 1 Cor. 15:12-19.  
 6. If established before Christ's  
 death, it was established before  
 the gift of the Holy Spirit, and if  
 so A Dead Body. "The Body with-  
 out the spirit is dead." Jno. 7:  
 38-39. Jas 2:26.  
 7. If established before the  
 death of Chrst, it was established

before Jesus became priest, there-  
 fore its members having no medi-  
 ator, could not approach the fa-  
 ther. Heb. 7:28 also 8:4.  
 8. If it was established before  
 the death of Christ, it was estab-  
 lished before the gospel could be  
 preached in full. It had no cross

Mrs. Lindbergh is very attractive but there is a sad wistful expression in her eyes, that reminds you of the deep sorrow she has known.

She was dressed in a crocheted wool swaggar suit of navy blue, that her mother had crocheted two years ago. It is the most convenient and servicable garment in her wardrobe she said.

With it she wore a navy blue felt hat, with up turned brim, blue canvas ballet slippers and wool hose. She carried a black and white wooden bead bag.

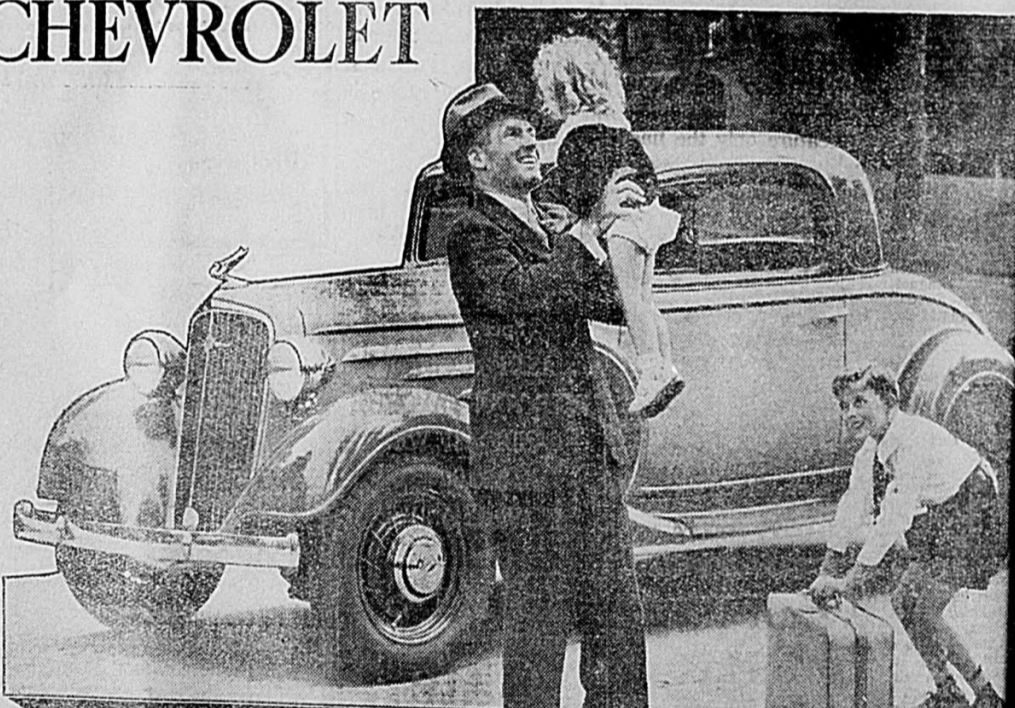
