Fourth Annual 4-H Club Stock Show To Be Saturday

Largest Entry List In History of Hansford County 4-H Club Stock Shows Will Be Featured Here March 4



Here are a few of the baby calves that will be in the 4-H club show Saturday. This picture was taken in October of last year. If you remember these calves at that time, you can estimate the progress that is being made by local 4-H club boys in their work. Look them over Saturday.

What is expected to be the largest fat stock show ever held in Hansford county is planned for the 4th Annual Fat Stock Show to be held in Spearman on Saturday March 4th.

Arrangements have been made to hold the show on main street on the lot between the Wilbanks Beauty Shop and Baggerly Grocery Store.

County Agent Joe Hatton is elated at the interest being manifested in the coming show, and believes that the boys of this county will be in the money at the Amarillo show.

Among the exhibits will be featured the baby calves of some 14 club boys, sheep, and hogs. Several of the boys have made outstanding records with their calves and the show this year will indicate the advancement that is being made in this class of work.

C. P. Archer, club boy of this county has earned outstanding honors not only for Hansford County but for the State of Texas, in fact he was selected out of thousands of club boys to make a trip to Chicago this fall. Recently he was awarded a Gold Star as an award of his being chosen as one of the 100 outstanding club boys in Texas.

One of the features of the Saturday show will be a judging contest open to every one in this area. Cards have been printed and are available at all stores and places of business in Spearman and Gruver. Everyone who wants to take part in the contest simply fill out the judging card when they have seen the show Saturday. The Spearman Chamber of Commerce is awarding \$20.00 in prizes as follows: 1st prize, \$7.00; 2nd prize, \$5.00; 3rd prize, \$4.00; 4th prize, \$2.00; and 5th prize, \$1.00. This contest is open to anyone attending the show except officials of the show. In case of a tie, the awards will be split as directed by show officials.

Farm Security Speaker Is Guest of Lions Club

Pete Holmes, official of the district Farm Security Government organization was guest speaker at the noon day luncheon of the Spearman Lions club Tuesday. Holmes made one of the most thought provoking talks heard in Spearman for many weeks. He outlined the agricultural conditions of the nations and traced the surplus of many commodities such as wheat, cotton, tobacco etc. Holmes outlined the practical plan of his government department to bring the low income farmer into a productive solvent citizen.

In explanation of the low price of wheat, cotton, corn and other crops, Holmes presented statistics showing the greatest overproduction in the history of the world—and this overproduction despite the fact that the real wheat growing area of the United States has been hit with partial failures during the years the surplus has grown beyond logical reason.

Crops Benefited By 6 Inch Snowfall

The high plains area will benefit by snowfall that amounted to a reported 2 feet at Lamar, Colo. to the average of some 4 to 6 inches snowfall over the North Plains area. Hansford county received a little better than 6

inches if the records of F. W. Brandt can be accepted, as the moisture measured. 50 inches. Snow fell again Wednesday, but added only .10 inch moisture to the reported February moisture record.

Over other sections of the Plains the blizzard whipped the whirling snow into drifts that made highways impassable, and in a few remote cases caused some damage to cattle. No cattle damage as result of the blizzard

was reported in Hansford county. Car accidents were reported all over the area, Guymon, Liberal, Kans., and other points reporting accidents without any injuries, in most cases the cars going at slow rate of speed slip-

ping on iced roads and leaving the road bed for the ditches. Telephone and electric connections were damaged over the area.

AAA To Help Finance Well Drilling

Ranchmen hard put to supply range livestock with plenty of drinking water will be able to drill wells this year with financial aid of the AAA, according to a recent announcement.

The drilling or digging of wells as a conservative measure, has been put back into the AAA's range program, George Slaughter, chairman of the Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee, has assured. It had been announced earlier that this practice, which was included in the range program of the Southwest last year for the first time, would be left out in 1939.

This brings to four the number of watering - development practices of the program, which provides payment also for construction of earthen tanks or reservoirs, concrete or rubble masonry dams, and for development of natural watering places such as seeps and springs.

Payment for drilling or digging

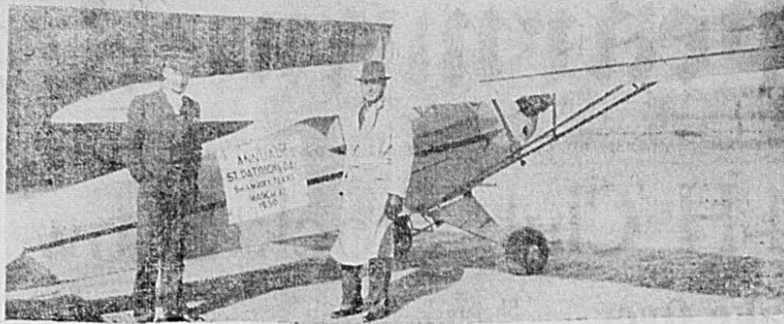
wells is \$2 a linear foot where the casing is not less than 4 in. in diameter, and \$1 where it is less than 4 inches, provided a windmill or power pump is installed and the water is conveyed to a tank or storage reservoir. An artesian well with casing less than 4 inches in diameter will qualify for payment if adequate stock water is made available during the grazing season and the water is conveyed to a tank or trough.

Payment will not be made for a well developed at any ranch headquarters, the regulations state.

Texas Farmers Have Own Market For Production Home Food Needs

No piddling enterprise but big business is the home production of food for the family table. The average person needs more than a ton of food a year, figures compiled by the foods committee of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service show. The estimates are based on the requirements of a safe diet as recommended by nutritional experts.

With some 500,000 farm and ranch families, the No. 1 market of Texas agriculture could account for around 2,390,000 tons or the equivalent of 119,500 carloads of food a year. H. H. Williamson, director of the Extension Service, recently pointed out that this No. 1 market requires no trade agreement no foreign bargaining, no freight rates or distribution adjustments and that if every family engaged in agriculture in the state were provided with a first rate diet with sufficient variety to be conducive to health, this would represent a 'store' value of \$250.

000,000 or the equivalent of six million bales of cotton at eight cents a pound.

Included in the adequate diet needs per person for one year are 91 gallons of milk, 30 dozen eggs, 175 pounds of meat and fat for cooking, 200 pounds of potatoes, 200 pounds of green and yellow vegetables and 200 lbs. of other vegetables, 100 lbs. of citrus or tomatoes, 200 pounds of other fruits, 170 pounds of grain products, 20 pounds of butter, 70 pounds of sweets, including syrup and honey, and 15 pounds of dried peas and beans.

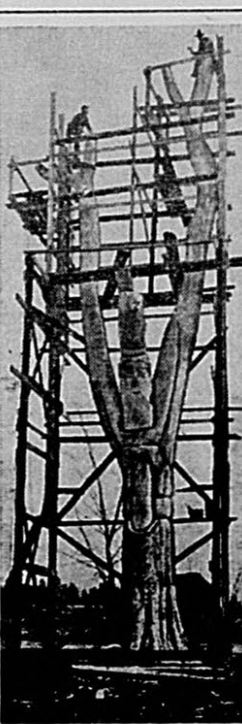

ZANE GREY
He Dreamed of Punching Cows While Yanking Teeth

Zane Grey battled his way up from discouragement and poverty to the position of being one of the most widely read novelists on this planet. And he did it while living in the little village of Lackawaxen, Pennsylvania, on the banks of the Delaware River. Editors have frequently paid Zane Grey \$75,000 for only the magazine rights to a story, even before the story was written; yet he couldn't sell his first few books for seventy-five cents. His publishers tell me that they have sold more than a million copies of Zane Greys books each year, for three successive years; but when he started writing, he was such a failure that he went cold and hungry.

His father insisted that he study dentistry. Zane Grey had no more desire to be a dentist than he had to be a coal miner. But orders were orders; so this man, who was destined to become world-famous as a story teller of two-gun men and cattle thieves, studied dentistry, opened an office in New York, and spent years of his life filling people's teeth. But his heart wasn't in his work.

So, determining to become a writer, he abandoned his profession and moved to Lackawaxen, where he could live economically and hunt and fish while he was learning to write. He devoted all his time, for five long years, to writing stories—and his income during those five years was absolutely zero. He made a little money occasionally by playing professional baseball in the summer time, but he made nothing from his writing. One day, when he was in New York, trying to sell a story, he met Colonel Buffalo Jones. Colonel Jones wanted someone with a flair for words to go out west with him and write about the trip. It was the first encouragement Zane Grey had had. He jumped at the chance, his heart thrilling at the prospect of a real adventure.

After spending six months among the cowboys and wild horses

of the west, he came home and wrote a novel entitled "The Last of the Plainsmen. This time he was positive he had a winner. So he sent his manuscript to the publishing house of Harper—and waited two weeks. Unable to endure the suspense any longer, he hurried to New York and called on the publishers.

They handed him his manuscript and said, "We are sorry; but there is nothing in this story to convince us that you can ever write fiction." He was absolutely crushed. He was dazed. This was the fifth book they had rejected. He couldn't have been more stunned if someone had hit him over the head with a club. Reeling down the stairs, he grabbed the lamp post to keep from falling; and with his manuscript under his arm, he leaned against that lamp post, and wept.

He returned home, beaten and crushed. He had been living on a little money that his wife had. They were desperate. But his wife encouraged him to write still another novel. It was in the dead of winter. The tiny stove wasn't large enough to heat the room, and his fingers grew numb with cold as he wrote.

All through that winter, and far into the next summer, he toiled over that story; and when it was finished, the publishing house of Harper again turned thumbs down. Frantic with despair, Zane Grey pleaded with the editor to take the manuscript home and read it himself. Two days later, Zane Grey returned, and the editor was all smiles. He said, "My wife sat up last night until almost daybreak reading your story. She thinks it's great. And so we're going to publish it."

The title of the book was "Heritage of the Desert." It was an immediate and immense success. At last, after years of poverty and failure, Zane Grey was on his way to become one of the biggest money-making writers, and one of the most popular novelists in America. For, since that time, he has published fifty-four books, and more than fifteen million copies have been sold in the United States alone.

Icelele; Lettuce, Black Seeded Simpson, Grand Rapids; Mustard Tender Green, Giant Curled; Spinach, King of Denmark; Parsley, Doubled Curled Hamburg; Chinese cabbage, Wong Bok; Beets, Detroit Dark Red; Carrots Oxheart for tight soil, Nantes for loose soil; Onions White Bermuda or Silver Skin; Tomato, pepper and cabbage plants.
