Rotarians Collecting Auction Items

Two Spearman Rotarians, it's like 30 seconds and counting in the final quarter of the football game with the score tied, third down and the ball in their possession only two yards from paydirt as they gear up for a successful conclusion to their current drive collecting items for auction Sunday.

Starting at 2 p.m. in the old theater building in the 200 block of Main in Spearman, a large assortment of items, expected to range from tires, business machines, air conditioning system filters, some items of automotive equipment will go on the block to raise funds for Rotary-sponsored youth activities.

Merchants and individuals of Spearman and Hansford County already have donated many items of all types and descriptions. All donors will be given a receipt for the cash value of all donations.

The drive is to raise funds for Rotary youth work in the city and county and everyone is urged to contribute items for the sale as well as attend and bid on the items.

Past auctions have been successful, don't let the 1977 Auction turn out otherwise.

County Buys Highway Sweeper

Commissioners Court of Hansford County met in regular session Monday, May 9, at 10 a.m. in the Court-house in Spearman during which arrangements were made for purchase of a new highway sweeper. A Board of Equalization was sworn in and the installation of some underground telephone cable in the county was approved. Action on the Board of Equalization consisted of empowering the Commissioners Court members to sit at the board starting at 10 a.m. on June 6 in the Courthouse in Spearman for the transaction of business. A Larson Model 6300 highway sweeper was purchased on bid from Plains Equipment Co. in Amarillo. Bid price accepted by the county was \$10,632.20. The sweeper is manufactured in Plainville and is equipped with a pressurized cab for one-man operation. The self-propelled unit will be used in all precincts. General Telephone is working on the installation of underground telephone line on county right-of-way along and on a county road southwest of Spearman. Action on other agenda items included approval of minutes of the last regular meeting, payment of claims, approval of the County Treasurer's monthly and quarterly reports and reaching agreement with Phillips Petroleum Co. the lowering of a pipeline under a county road southwest of Gruver.

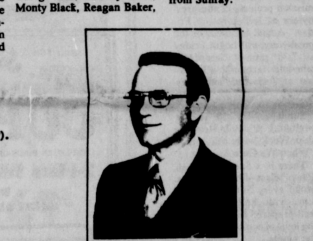

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Slow Pitch Softball Tournament Slated

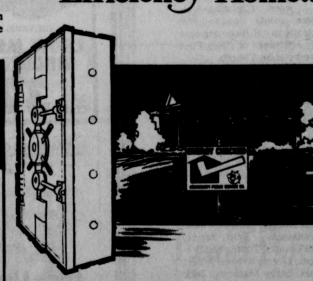

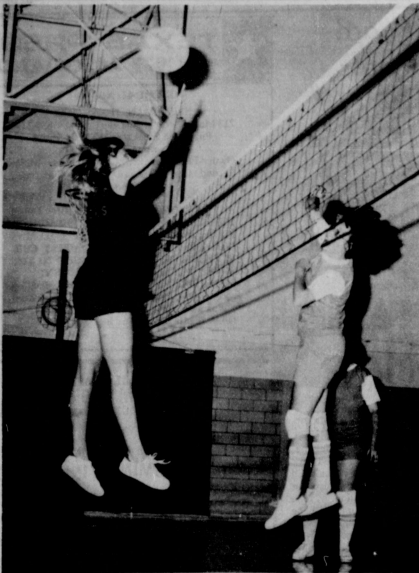

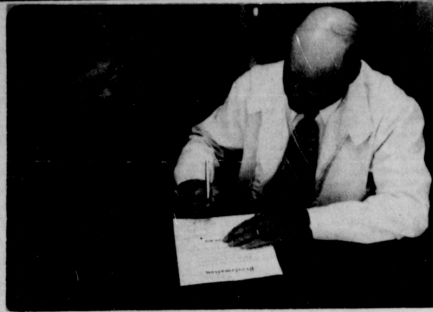

Soil Stewardship Week Is May 15-22

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water, and other natural resources, will be May 15-22 this year, Charles Brillhart, Chairman of the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District, announced today.

"This year's theme, 'When We Care,' will help each to examine his own motives and actions in the conservation of God's manifold gifts," said Mr. Brillhart.

All churches in the district are scheduling special Soil Stewardship services during Soil Stewardship Week.

Local events scheduled for the week include a tour and luncheon for the ministers of Hansford County.

"We hope," said Mr. Brillhart, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, millions

of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and proper care of the Lord's earth."

Members of the Hansford Soil Stewardship Committee, are all directors of the Hansford SWCD including Charles Brillhart, Elmo Dahl, Willard McCloy, Dwayne TeBeest, and Robert Novak.

The District, upon request, will provide local churches with a reference booklet, bulletins, bulletin inserts, and other materials designed for this year's observance.

The material was prepared by the Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of the National Association of Conservation Districts. The advisory committee is composed of churchmen of various faiths.

"This is the 23 consecutive year that the National Asso-

ciation of Conservation Districts, along with almost 3,000 local Districts throughout the nation, has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week. The custom of setting aside special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France, when French peasants prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

WHEREAS, the well-being of our people depends upon the production of ample supplies of food, fiber and other products of the soil; and

WHEREAS, the quality and quantity of these products depend upon the conservation, wise and proper management of the soil and water resources; and

WHEREAS, our people have a mutual interest in the land and share the responsi-

bility of preserving its productivity; and

WHEREAS, conservation districts provide a practical and democratic organization through which landowners are taking the initiative to conserve and make proper use of these resources; and

WHEREAS, the conservation districts are carrying forward a program of soil and water conservation in cooperation with numerous agencies and countless individuals;

NOW, THEREFORE, in full appreciation of the value of the soil to the public welfare, and desiring to honor those who protect it, do hereby proclaim May 15-22, 1977

New WTSU Head Coach to Speak at Banquet

The 1977 Athletic Banquet will be held Monday, May 16, in the high school cafeteria, at 7:30 p.m. Awards will be given for all athletics.

The guest speaker will be Bill Yung, the new head coach of the West Texas State Buffaloes. Bill Yung is a personal friend of Coach Sherwood. Greg Sherwood said the West Texas State did themselves a proud deed when they selected Yung as their new head football coach. In 1960 Yung was an assistant coach at Coleman when Sherwood was an assistant coach at Comanche.

The two teams were opponents; however, this fact did not keep the two opposing assistant coaches from becoming friends. Coach Sherwood said that they have run into each other over the years and have attended FCA conferences together.

Sherwood stated that Yung is a very positive thinking man. When asked to take the coaching responsibilities at WTSU Yung said this of himself, "The first thing that I did when I was offered this job was to get down on my knees and thank the Lord."

That strong Christian faith and the aura of confidence that surrounds the 42 year old Ranger native has made Yung a huge success at every coaching stop. He came to WTSU from Baylor where he helped the Bears to their first Cotton Bowl trip in 1975.

Yung was the offensive

line coach at Baylor under Grant Teaff, and he developed center Aubrey Schultz into an All-American in 1974. His final two years under Teaff, Yung was the Bear's offensive co-ordinator.

Prior to his years at Baylor, Yung was the head coach at Grand Prairie High School with a 48-20-2 record.

The former Ranger High All-District tackle was also a three-year letterman at TCU in 1953-55. He was a guard on the Horned Frogs' 1956 Cotton Bowl team.

Yung started his coaching career as an associate freshman coach at TCU in 1956, and later was head coach at Coleman when the Blue Bats won the regional title in 1960.

From 1964 through 1967, Yung was line coach at Grand Prairie under Chuck Curtis when the team won one state championship. He was named head coach in 1968 and won the district title in 1969.

Then it was on to Baylor and West Texas State. Married to the former Esther Peters, Yung is the father to two children, Martin, 16, and Cindy, 14.

The Athletic Banquet will present everyone a good opportunity to meet the new West Texas State head football coach. Tickets for the banquet will be \$4.50 each, and may be purchased at the Dairy Queen, at Gordon's Drug, from a cheerleader, or

at the high school. Proceeds from these tickets will go toward the expenses of the banquet. 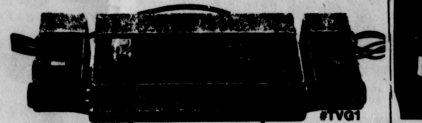
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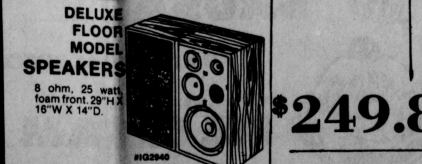


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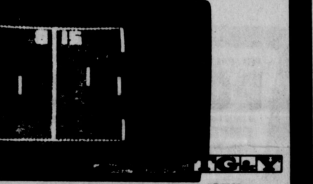
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
