Littlejohn, Graham, Cochran and Slater received instruction in Fire Fighting II activities.

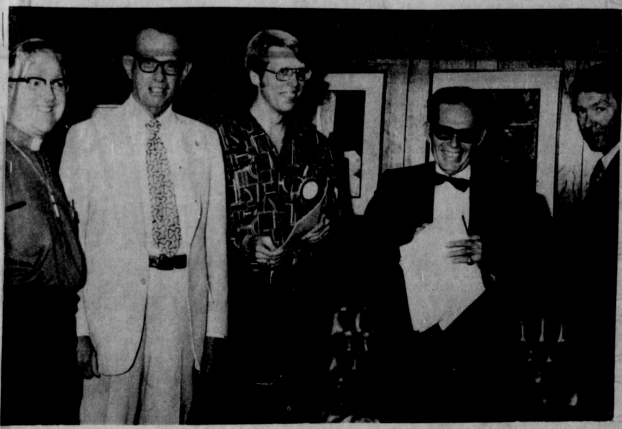

Rotary Dedicated To Serve

Rotary International is a unique organization dedicated to and based on the principle of service.

"We Rotarians believe in service to others."

These remarks were the opening ones, setting the basis of his talk, made by Rotary International District 573 Governor A.B. (Duke) Martin of Amarillo Monday at the Spearman Rotary Club luncheon at Martin's Steak Garden to wind up his official visit to the local club.

His talk was directed primarily to Rotarians and spouses present, detailing the service concept of the international organization.

Some ideas developing today are bankrupt, he mentioned, in touching on the manner in which Rotary and Rotarians help change things and improve the quality of life in a community, locally or internationally.

Rotarians are to put service above self and to always exercise self-control.

Noting that everyone will be a victim of a terminal case of old age, Martin went on to mention that life is best with trials and tribulations.

He mentioned that W. Jack Davis, president of Rotary International, has adopted the

slogan of "serve to unite people" for Rotary International during his 1977-78 term of office.

Martin brought out that Rotary International is active in 152 countries throughout the world with over 17,000 clubs.

He offered local Rotarians some ideas to develop in community service areas.

There are four avenues Rotarians travel in carrying out the service principle: club service, vocational service, community service and international service.

In the latter category, Martin noted that Rotary International is involved in world service fellowship and international youth fellowship. Rotary Foundation, over the next three years, will spend \$22 million for its exchange student program, providing in-service training throughout the world.

He concluded by noting Rotary is a total program with the men to serve their community and the women to support their men in Rotary work.

Martin, a native of Weslaco, Texas, and graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, until 1974 when he retired, had served 14 years as president of Amarillo College. In addition to

his Rotary work, he also is a member of the board of directors of a savings and loan association in Amarillo.

The first day of his two-day visit to Spearman included meeting with John Hutchinson, president of the Spearman club, and Don Wirsdorfer, club secretary-treasurer, followed by a club assembly. The sessions Sunday were at the First State Bank.

During his swing through this area of the Panhandle, Martin will visit clubs in Berger, Dumas and elsewhere before continuing his swing around the district

which eventually will take him to every one of the 46 clubs in District 573 which includes clubs from Daltart to Midland and from Canadian to Muleshoe. Martin has served as president of the Amarillo Rotary Club. As a prerequisite to becoming district president, he spent a week at the Rotary International School in Florida. Martin was accompanied on his Spearman trip by his wife.

Hutchinson introduced Martin at the Monday meeting. Junior Lesty led the Pledge of Allegiance and Elzey Vandenberg gave the invocation.

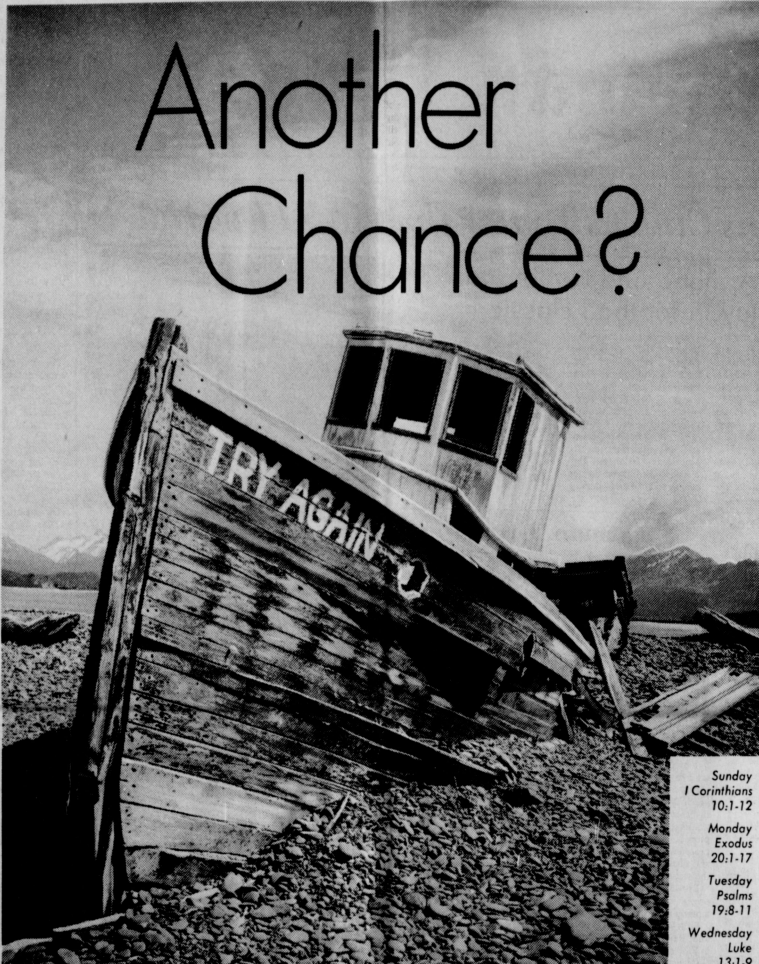

Dr. Walter K. Long says an obstruction does not have to be very large to block an artery. A common block is the formation of plaque, a complex growth of smooth muscle tissue and other constituents. 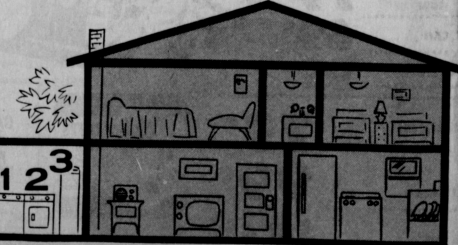

1 WASHER. One of the best ways to save energy while washing clothes is to use as much cold water as possible. Try to run full loads through your washer rather than just a few pieces of clothing.
2 DRYER. Locate your dryer where it can be vented to the outside. Clean the lint filter after each load. Fill your dryer to capacity without overloading and don't over-dry your clothes. In addition to using more electricity, it makes clothes harsh and stiff. Put your dryer in a heated portion of your home if possible — it helps during cold weather as the dryer would have to work harder if located in a cold area.
3 WATER HEATER. Try to locate water heaters close to points of use (such as laundry rooms). Check the thermostat on the water heater — generally 140° is sufficient for most needs. Insulate the pipes to help your water heater work at top efficiency.

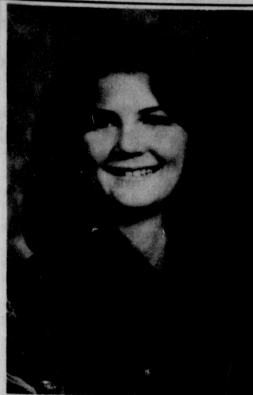

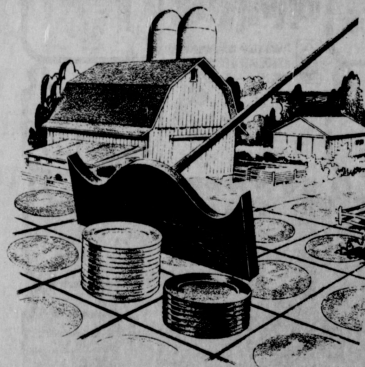

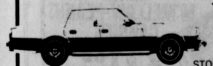

Congress Passes Lower Fee For Fertilizer Trucks

Fertilizer spreader trucks in Texas can be registered for a new, lower fee of \$50, beginning August 20. Legislation to lower the registration fee was requested by the Texas Aglime and Fertilizer Association (TALFA), whose state headquarters are in Bryan. The request was based on the fact that these trucks spend only 25 percent of their running time on the highways and the remaining 75 percent in the fields and pastures.

The current registration fee for fertilizer spreader trucks ranges from \$150 to \$200, depending on weight. Mrs. Howard S. Mitchell, executive secretary of TALFA, said the lower registration fee will benefit the agricultural industry of Texas by making more operating capital available to the industry. She also noted that this legislation was one of many projects that TALFA is working on to help make Texas No. 1 in agricultural income.

State Rep. Joe Hubenak of Rosenberg, chairman of the House Agriculture and Livestock Committee, who sponsored the legislation, noted in a letter to TALFA: "It was rewarding to me to see some relief giving to your industry which plays such a vital role in Texas agriculture." State Rep. Bill Prenal of Bryan, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, co-sponsored the bill. State Sen. Bill Moore, also of Bryan, chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, sponsored the bill in the Senate.

Gov. Briscoe signed the bill on May 20, and it will go into effect 90 days from that date - August 20.

Hightower emphasized this to the members of Congress in a floor speech during the first day of debate on the farm bill. He referred to a report released in April of this year predicting over 3,000 Texas farmers would declare bankruptcy before the year was over.

Peggy's Pointers

Immunization for the whole family is the goal of "August-Immunization Action Month", as public and volunteer groups promote that campaign across Texas.

The danger is that immunizations are often delayed or forgotten. Childhood diseases don't seem threatening now. However, it is only by immunizing that we prevent epidemics. Here's what "immunity" is about: The body's immune mechanism—once activated—is a defense system of antibodies that fight infection. When the body first meets a certain type of infection, it may be slow to respond in developing antibodies. But at the second meeting, the body has learned and is able to respond to the invasion more efficiently. Immunization, then, is artificial activation of this defense mechanism.

Once the body has produced the antibodies, it is ready for an invasion of the real thing. Check with the doctor. Bring family immunization records up to date and keep them that way. POLIO-A CONSTANT THREAT

True or false? - Texas has wiped out polio. FALSE! Although only one case has been reported in the past four years, the possibility is always present. There is no excuse for polio, because vaccine is available to prevent it. Oral vaccine provides immunity to all three known polio viruses—within two to three weeks after the series is completed.

Check your children's immunization records. Be sure they are fully protected against polio and other communicable diseases.
