"Sneaky Snakes" coming to Lynx Homecoming

As Friday's pep rally the three Lynx football captains advanced to the rally microphone and told everyone how they were going to run Fritch's Homecoming. Being present at that rally this reporter has his doubts concerning the confidence with which the three captains spoke. Before Friday night's game Sandoro-Fritch had only played one with Boys Ranch, defeating the Ranchers soundly. Fritch returned a lot of experience from last year -- 16 starters out of 19 lettermen. Having played only one contest, and winning that one handily, they stacked up to be a formidable opponent. But the Lynx captains turned out to be prophets. It seems that whatever curse it may be, it is still haunting Fritch at their home games. (Fritch dropped two conference games at home last year, one to Gruber 6-0 and another to White Deer 19-14) Spearman attended Fritch's homecoming and brought home a 27-0 victory, and I suspect that the only happy person in Fritch Saturday morning was their Homecoming Queen, and I doubt that she was really very happy.

The Lynx offense seemed to stall on their first two drives in the early going but when they finally started rolling they showed that they knew how to move the football, putting two TDs on the scoreboard in less than 10 minutes. The offense was well balanced -- 208 yards rushing and 102 yards passing. Three Lynx backs had over 60 yards in the rushing department: Newton with 64, Sellers with 63, and Bodey with 62. In the passing

department Sherwood completed 3 out of 7 attempts. Those three added up to 102 yards and that's not bad. And the Lynx still have that "big play" threat. Newton took off down the middle on a 49 yard touchdown run. Any doubts that Coach Sherwood and his staff had concerning this year's defense must have almost vanished by now. The "Purple Gang" held the Eagles to only 130 yards total offense. They forced three Eagle fumbles and recovered all three, setting up two TDs in the first half. Tommy Barber hauled down an interception to stop one of Fritch's threatening drives.

It was once again a good night for familiar Lynx names. Scott Sherwood besides throwing for the 102 yards threw two of his tosses for touchdowns. On the other end of those pass-catch combinations were Scot Martin receiving a 24 yard TD pass and a 31 yard TD pass, and Zane Newton receiving a 37 yard toss. Other backs who aided with the ball carrying responsibilities included Sherwood, Snider, Trevino, Barber, and Reid. Reid also returned a kickoff back for 27 yards and quarterbacked the final Lynx touchdown drive, diving into the endzone himself from one yard out for the score. The "Big Bunch" seems to be putting things together in a nice fashion, but they can't let down any at all. They'll face the biggest test so far this year at the Homecoming game here in Spearman this week against a strong Stinnett team. It will be another battle between the two beasts (Spearman 3-0-0, Stinnett 3-0-0) as the Rattlers bring one of the best quarterbacks in the Panhandle to Lynx Stadium Friday night. Stinnett has already beaten two of our I-AA District foes, defeating a tough Chandler Panther team 12-7, and surprising our number one fan favorite, dropping the Dalhart Wolves 18-7. Their third victory came over a tough

Clarendon team 13-8. The Rattlers are proving why they were picked to win the I-AA District title this year, and after their wins over Panhandle and Dalhart they would be only too happy to add another I-AA team to their "fallen foes" list. Stinnett will be super fired up for us and after the Lynx spoiled their neighboring Fritch's homecom-

ing they'll go all out to spoil ours. You can bet that this year's Lynx Homecoming will be one of the best games in the state. If you want to see the best Texas high school football has to offer, be at Lynx Stadium Friday night.

Looking down the line Shamrock (3-0-0) was creamed by Childress 32-0. In Dalhart the

Wolves (2-1-0) romped over Friona 30-7. Boys Ranch (1-2-0) journeyed to Vega and got trampled 12-35. The Panhandle Panthers (2-1-0) went to White Deer and returned home with a 42-8 victory. River Road (0-2-0) was open this week. Canadian (1-2-0) traveled to Sunny where they were handed a 38-0 beating. This coming Friday Sham-

rock will play Chillicothe there. Dalhart will go to Stratford and do battle on the Elks' home ground. Boys Ranch will host Clarendon at home. Panhandle will play Phillips at Phillips. River Road will host Sanford-Fritch. And Canadian will go to White Deer.

In the area the Gruber Greyhounds (2-1-0) coming off of their Homecoming victory over Boise City, Oklahoma, 27-15 will play Texhoma. Oklahoma this week at Texhoma. Peryton (3-0-0) who just won their third straight game defeating Pampa 28-6 will travel to Caprock this week.

Katz FGBMFI Speaker

Arthur Katz will be the speaker for the September 26 meeting of the Fall Gospel Businessmen's Fellowship International meeting at Martin's Steak Garden. The meal will be at 7 p.m. and the speaker will begin at 8 p.m.

Katz was born in Brooklyn, New York in 1929, the product of an American Jewish home. He dropped out of high school at sixteen to have an apprenticeship in the jewelry industry.

He served as an ordinary seaman in the U. S. Merchant Marine. He was drafted into the army in 1952, and served with Army Engineers in Germany until 1954, later participated in communist front activities and was a member of American Youth Democracy.

He attended Santa Monica City College and the University of California at Berkeley, earning B.A. and M.A. degrees in history. He taught history for four years in a California high school prior to becoming an agent to rescue ancient art objects and religious artifacts which were treasures of a Jewish Community in Cairo and Alexandria, Egypt.

As an intellectual, sophisticated atheist he was confronted with a crisis and his need for a personal dynamic faith while in Israel.

He is now engaged as a speaker of numerous colleges, churches, synagogues and civic groups, he shares his life's experiences to the contemporary world.

He ministered for several months with Kathryn Kuhlman. He has been the leading speaker at the Holy Spirit Conference, and other world charismatic conferences.

He has written two books "Ben Israel" and "Reality The

Deadline nears on Flight School in Spearman voter registration

The special election to fill Max Sherman's vacated 31st Senatorial District seat and to consider a number of constitutional amendments has been set for November 8 by Governor Dolph Briscoe and the deadline to register to vote is October 8.

To be eligible to vote in the special election a person must be registered 30 days prior to the election. Registration deadline is October 8.

Persons wishing to sign up may do so at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office at Hansford County Court House. Those persons needing to stop by the office are those that have married and had a name change or those that have moved and changed addresses.

Of course, if you have recently moved into the state of Texas or moved to a new address in Hansford County you need to register.

New voter registration cards will be mailed between November 1 and 15, so an incorrect address would probably result in the card not getting to the owner and it would be difficult for that person to vote in future elections.

The November 8 election should be of great interest to most voters in the county as at least four candidates will be running for Sherman's seat. Declared candidates for the office include Burk Whittenburg, Mel Phillips, James Brandon and Bob Simpson.

Also on the ballot will be the proposed constitutional amendments. A brief listing of these amendments in the order they will appear on the ballot are as follows:

S.J.R. 18 provides for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from five to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

S.J.R. 13 provides for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the state for the Veterans' Land Fund and to

allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

S.J.R. 3 proposes that a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony would result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal.

S.J.R. 5 proposes authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

S.J.R. 19 proposed authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

S.J.R. 49 proposes to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

S.J.R. 30 proposes changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures.

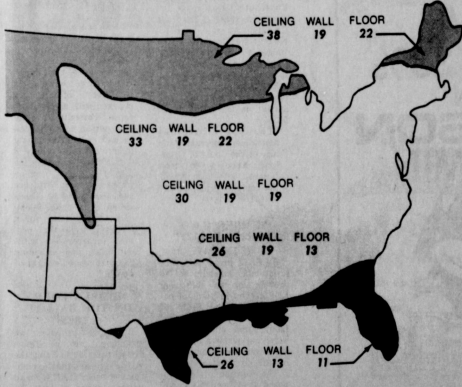

Comptroller Officer To Visit Businesses

Comptroller Bob Bullock alerted Texas businessmen Monday after beginning for a friendly visit from a Comptroller's enforcement officer sometime during the next nine months.

The Comptroller said that the enforcement officers from his 40 field offices will fan out across the state with the goal of offering personal assistance to each and every Texas business.

A testing of the canvassing program in July showed that 19 percent of taxpayers contacted required assistance or needed permits, he said.

"The theme of this project is taxpayer assistance," Bullock said. "We have found that in many instances only personal contact can eliminate errors that eventually prove costly both to the taxpayer and the Comptroller's Office."

He said his employees, armed with smiles and packages of taxpayer information, will be knocking on doors with the hopes of:

- providing education to taxpayers;
-making sure every business is properly permitted;
-establishing personal lines of communication between taxpayers and the individual enforcement officer responsible for the area;
-updating Comptroller's Of-

rice records;
--making certain each taxpayer is filing returns and paying tax properly.

July's sample of 4,702 businesses showed that 97 were operating without needed permits. 766 had changed address or business name without notifying the Comptroller's Office and 37 were not paying tax properly, Bullock said.

"We hope to take care of every little problem on the spot, before it turns into a big problem," he said.

"Above all," Bullock said, "we want people to believe us when we say 'I'm from the Comptroller's Office' and 'I'm here to help you.'"

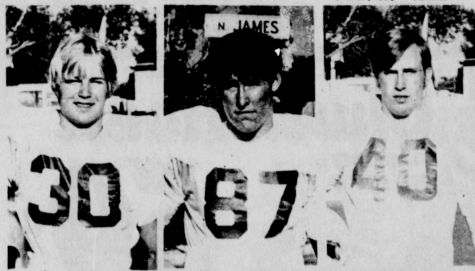

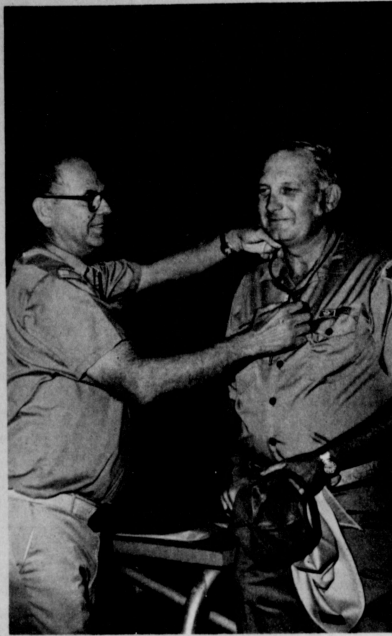

Local Share of National Debt, \$1,277,000

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 - What effect will the recent action of Congress, raising the ceiling on the national debt by \$75 billion, have on Hansford County residents?

How much of the money that the Federal government is collecting this year from the local area, by way of income taxes, excise taxes and the like, is needed to meet the annual interest charges on that debt, which is now in the neighborhood of \$700 billion?

The local share of these carrying charges is approximately \$1,277,000. It is estimated that covers only the interest on the debt. It does not reduce the principal at all.

The debt itself has been growing by leaps and bounds over the years. At one time, going back to 1940, it was only \$42 billion. This was equivalent to \$320 per capita nationally. By 1960 it was up to \$291 billion, or \$1,585 per capita nationally, and by 1970, to \$383 billion, equal to \$1,880.

Now, at \$700 billion, it works out to \$3,240 per every man, woman and child in the country. Were there any plan to pay off that debt, which there isn't, that is how much would be involved.

As for the interest on the current debt, it amounts to some \$40 billion a year. That is just about the total provided for in the budget for health services. Residents of Hansford County, in line with their normal share of the national tax burden, are now paying close to \$610 per family toward the annual interest charges. It is estimated.

This is 118 percent more than was called for in 1970, when the carrying costs were only \$18.3 billion a year.

The recent increase in the debt ceiling, requested by the Administration and approved by Congress, brings the allowable debt limit to \$775 billion. Continued deficit spending has

made it necessary. There is little concern among economists, however, over the rise in the nation's debt. They point out that the economy has also been expanding over the years and that the debt today, relative to the gross national product, is less than it was a decade or two ago.

A representative is available to explain the provisions of the Social Security Act and answer questions at meetings of farm groups, unions, and other interested organizations. There are no charges for any of these services of the Social Security Administration.

REMEMBERING...

PICKIN'S SHELLIN'
We generally planted a couple of long rows of black-eyed peas at the edge of the cotton patch. We really liked to eat them but I've heard that in some parts of the country they are used only for cattle feed. I think those people are missing something. Peas and cornbread were all we had for lots of meals and of course New Years Day just wouldn't be complete without a big pot of black-eyed peas cooked with a silver dollar.

We usually carried a bushel basket down the rows to put the peas in but a brown paper bag, a three gallon pail or a gathered-up apron worked just as well. As I picked I constantly ate raw peas. I loved them. I could have made a meal of them any day, but Mother would say, "Son you're going to get a belly ache if you don't quit eatin them things that-a-way." I don't think I ever got sick from eating peas but I sure lost my stomach from eating green apples once.

You soon learned which peas were ready to pick. Some would not be mature enough, you left these for later. Some would be too mature but they had to be picked so the plants would

keep bearing. These were usually kept and dried for use the next year. A few vines would give you plenty for one family so neighbors were always welcome to pick from your patch — no charge of course.

You had to watch out for wasps and even an occasional snake among the vines but even so I liked picking better than I did

shelling. We'd wait until the cool of the evening then gather around the basket with a big pan or bowl. You'd grab up a double handful, put 'em in your pan and start shelling. If a pea was matured just right you could pull the string on one side all the way down just like a zipper and the peas would tumble right out. But more often than not the string wouldn't pull at all or if it did the peas would stick in one side of the hull. Peas that hadn't matured were called "snaps". You

didn't shell snaps, you just broke them into pieces about an inch long and cooked them that way in an oil. Snapping was easier than shelling so I sought out the snap kind for my pan. But often the ones I snapped were big enough to shell and Mother would make me go back and pick those out and shell them anyway.

It was always easy to see who was the best pea sheller by how many they had in their pan but Mother was usually the winner around our house.



1977 Christmas Stamps To Be Issued October 21

The U.S. Postal Service announced today that the 1977 Christmas stamps will be issued October 21 in separate locations. Both of the Christmas stamps

are being printed in the regular stamp size (100 stamps per pane) rather than the standard commemorative size in order to reduce the cost of the multi-billion stamp printing.

The stamp showing General Washington kneeling in prayer at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777-1778 will be issued at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.

The design by Stevan Dochow is based upon a painting by J.C. Leyendecker which appeared as a Saturday Evening Post cover in 1935. Dochow also is known for Saturday Evening Post covers, having had paintings on more than 100 of them. The first day of issue ceremony will be conducted at the Valley Forge National Historical Park near the restored building which Washington used as his headquarters during the encampment at Valley Forge.

The second Christmas stamp, featuring holiday mail in a rural mailbox against a snowy background, will be issued at Omaha, Nebraska. Designer of this stamp is Doli Tingle, of Westport, Connecticut. She also designed the popular needlepoint Christmas Tree stamp of 1973.

Choice of the Leyendecker painting as the basis for a 1977 stamp reflects the Continental Army having spent Christmas at Valley Forge 200 years ago.

After an unsuccessful effort against the British at Germantown, General Washington and his troops retreated to Valley Forge to spend the winter. Two days before Christmas, 1777, he wrote: "We have this day no less than 2,873 men in camp unfit for duty because they are barefooted or otherwise naked..." It was a winter of severe hardship and semi-starvation.

Now a familiar sight, the rural mailbox was brand new in 1896. It represented an important link with the outside world for farming families who were frequently isolated and lonely. Rural Free Delivery gave stimulus to the great American system of roads and highways and is still a vital link today for rural Americans.

Similar to the Currier & Ives Christmas stamp of 1976, the Washington at Valley Forge stamps will be printed on the gravure portion of the new webbed eight-color combination gravure-intaglio press installed last year at the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (the intaglio portion of the press will not be used for this issue), while the mailbox stamp will be printed on the standard gravure press.

Although both Christmas stamps will be printed via the gravure method, the presses used will give each issue a distinctive appearance when viewed in panes.

The mailbox stamp will be printed in the standard four pane layout with five plate numbers in the usual positions on each of the four panes and "Mr. Zip," "Use ZIP Code" and "Mail Early in the Day" appearing in the usual location on the selvage. The Washington at Valley Forge sheet format will be markedly different, however.

While the new press will produce sheets made up of four panes, the panes will lack selvage on two sides due to there being no horizontal or vertical gutters. The two panes making up the left half of each sheet will be bordered on the left by a vertical selvage strip. The two panes making up the right half of the sheet will be bordered on the right by a vertical selvage strip.

In addition to this difference,

plate numbers on Washington at Valley Forge panes will "float". They will move progressively up and down the selvage from pane-to-pane because each full rotation of the gravure cylinders will print two panes plus three rows of stamps.

Besides "floating" plate numbers and the absence of gutters, Washington at Valley Forge panes will not feature the familiar "Mr. Zip," "Use ZIP Code" and "Mail Early in the Day" on the selvage.

Ronald C. Sharpe, of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, modeled both stamps. The image size of both stamps is .75 X .87 inches or 19.05 X 22.09 millimeters. The colors of the Washington at Valley Forge stamp are yellow, red, blue, black and red line, while the colors of the mailbox stamp are red, brown, gray, green, and black.

Procedures for ordering first day cancellations are as follows: Customers affixing stamps. Customers may purchase their own stamps at their local post offices and affix them to their own envelopes. All envelopes must be addressed and payable return address labels are recommended for this purpose.

Stamps must be affixed in the upper right corner of envelopes approximately one quarter in from the top and one quarter inch from the right edge. Return addresses should be placed on the right side of the envelopes at least 5/8 of an inch up from the bottom. A filler of postal card thickness should be inserted in each cover. Not later than November 5 -- orders must be postmarked by that date -- the envelopes may be forwarded to "First Day Cancellations, Postmaster, Valley Forge, PA 19481" (or "Omaha, NE 68108" for the mailbox stamp) for cancellation and return through the mailstream. No remittance is required. Covers sent to either first day city for cancellation must bear the stamp issued in that city. They may also bear the Christmas stamp issued in the other city, or any other previously issued mint stamp.

Covers sent to either city bearing only the stamp issued in the other city will be returned unsorted.

Postal Service affixing stamps. Except for affixing stamps and addressing orders, follow the procedures listed above. Address order as follows: -- "Valley Forge Stamp, Postmaster, Valley Forge, PA 19481"

-- Mailbox stamp is thirteen cents per stamp to be affixed to covers. The Postal Service will affix only the stamp being issued in the first day city to which orders are addressed. Do not send cash. Personal checks will be accepted as remittance for orders up to the limit of 200 covers. Postage stamps are unacceptable as payment. Orders must be postmarked no later than November 5.

Many Texans on limited incomes are attempting to keep up with their affluent neighbors by buying junk foods. The result is poor nutrition, says the Texas Department of Health.

This problem and many more concerning nutrition will be discussed by international experts at the most comprehensive public health nutrition conference in Texas history September 19-22 at Austin's Sheraton Crest Inn.

The conference offers a unique chance for physicians, nutritionists, nurses and health practitioners to discuss nutrition as key to better health throughout the life cycle. The conference is being sponsored by the Department of Health and the Texas Public Health Association.

"Two main goals will be emphasized," says Dr. P. Cliff Price, Chief of the Bureau of Personal Health Services of the Department. "The first objective is to set the trend for nutrition as a viable part of total health care planning for an individual. The second goal is to develop standards or policies, together with recommendations, for implementing nutritional services in all areas of public health."

One of the programs to be discussed at the conference will be the Supplemental Feeding Program for Women, Infants, and Children, simply called "WIC." For the past three years the Department of Health has operated the special nutri-

tion project, under funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"Lots of people on limited incomes really aren't aware of the right foods to eat. They often to compete with their neighbors who are better off financially by buying snack items. The long range goal of the WIC Program is to educate those on low incomes as to the wiser food choices that will keep them healthier," says Catherine E. Litterer, nutrition consultant with the TDH Maternal and Child Health Services, which administers the program.

The WIC Program serves a limited clientele. Eligible recipients may include pregnant women, infants under one year old and children up to their fifth birthdays. Those within these categories who apply for WIC services get a health assessment by a nurse, doctor or nutritionist to see if they are "a nutritional risk." This means they may not be getting enough food, or the right kinds of food.

Those under the WIC program are not just given advice and counseling, but are given specific food items free. The foods can be picked up at cooperating retail grocery stores, or, in some areas, they can be delivered directly to the recipient's home.

"The food items have been selected according to the nutrients available in them. The supplemental foods include milk products, cheese, eggs, iron fortified cereals, vitamin C enriched fruit and vegetable juices and iron-fortified infant formula," said Ms. Litterer.

The Texas WIC Program has an authorized caseload of 61,521 and provides assistance through 36 local agency projects operating in 63 Texas counties. The average stay on the program for participants is 19 - 22 months.

"Once a woman or child is approved in a clinic for the program, we ask them to return every six months. We want to check the progress they are making," says Ms. Litterer.

"The goal of the program is to have healthier infants, mothers and children, and the nutritional aspects of health are being emphasized. Training nutritionists counseled with all participants. Lack of physical and mental attainments of nutritionally deprived youngsters has drawn the increasing attention of public health officials in the past few years," she said.

Special invitations to the Austin Conference have been extended to people representing agencies with nutrition programs.

"We feel that the time has come to develop cooperation and coordination between agencies in order to utilize personnel more effectively while working together to reach goals developed by the conference," says Dr. Price.

In line with this, representatives of local, state and federal agencies, together with a representative from the public, will organize into teams during the

conference. The teams will listen to speakers, evaluate their presentations and then develop policies and guidelines for implementing nutritional care programs.

Dr. William J. McGanity, professor and chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology, University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston, will coordinate the teams.

Proceedings of the conference will be published within 90 days of the conference containing abstracts of each presentation and recommendations and guidelines for nutritional care. The theme of the conference—"Nutrition Throughout the Life Cycle"—will be carried in speakers topics in such areas as pre-natal nutrition, pediatric nutrition, nutrition for adults, and nutritional needs of aging population.

The importance of nutrition in certain diseases, such as diabetes and cardiovascular ailments, will also be spotlighted, said Dr. Price.

The Miss Aggie Princess pageant will begin at 2 p.m. in the Hughes-Strong Auditorium. Miss Leisha Harris from Laverne was the 1976 Miss Aggie Princess and Mary Hawthorne of Dumas was 1st Runner-up, and Lisa Nelson was 2nd Runner-up.

From 5 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. a candlelight buffet will be held in the Student Union cafeteria.

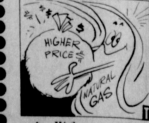

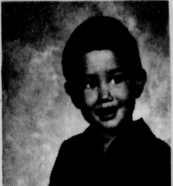

Taxpayers who filed estimated tax on their 1977 income must pay their third quarter installment by Thursday, September 15.

The provision in the law for taxpayers to pay estimated tax in four equal installments that 75% of the tax should be paid by September 15 using declaration voucher 3 from the Form 1040-ES package, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Taxpayers whose anticipated income during 1977 has changed may have to file an amended declaration. Space appears in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate, the IRS said.

For more detailed information, taxpayers can obtain IRS Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," available free from local IRS offices. Supplies of the Form 1040-ES package are also available from these offices.
