Census Will Affect New Federal For Several States

Every resident of the United States should become a full fledged partner in the 1990 Census, said the head of the Census Bureau for this area, as 106,000,000 questionnaires were mailed to every household in America.

"If the people join in, by answering the questionnaire and encouraging their friends and neighbors to do so, we will have the most complete and accurate census in our 200-year history." according to John E. Bell, Regional Director of the Census for Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, "and we will all be better

"Some people understand the personal benefits as well as the absolute secrecy of answering the Census," he said.

"But some people don't."

Those who don't understand are the principal worry of the Bureau as the Nation's 21st Decennial Census approaches.

"Yet if people will simply help their friends, their neighbors, their employees and co-workers--especially the disadvantaged, the elderly, the illiterate--to fill out the questionnaire and send it in by Census Day, April 1, we have achieved the successful and beneficial nose -counting in all history," Bell said.

He cited the fact that the states of Texas, louisiana Mississippi, and the communities within them, have literally hundreds of millions of dollars in federal funding to gain by encouraging everyone to answer the census questionnaire.

"Conservatively, we estimate that communities could lose about \$150 in federal funds for every individual who fails to complete their census form," Bell said.

He also emphasized the total secrecy of the information people write down on the questionnaire.

"The IRS can't see it," he said. "The immigration people can't see it. The police can't see it. Not even the President of the United States can get a look at that personal data until it is thoroughly de-personalized and combined with the data of millions. That's the law,"

One 'Deathless' Day Recorded In 1989

It's official. On June 13, 1989, no one died in a Texas motor vehicle accident.

That makes for a happy ending to the Texas Coalition for Safety Belt's "One Deathless Day" campaign.

"Final 1989 traffic statistics, released by the Texas Department of Public Safety, confirmed that June 13 was the first deathless day since January 5, 1977," said George R. Gustafson, coalition spokesperson and president of Texas Safety Association.

"Too often, it seems that the only news we hear is bad," Gustafson added. "This is good news, and we want all of Texas to hear it!"

The safety belt coalition, representing 52 public and private sector organizations, led a statewide "One Deathless Day" promotion in the summer months of 1988 and 1989. During the first summer, at least three traffic fatalities were recorded every day.

As a group promoting the use of safety belts and child safety seats, the coalition can't take exclusive credit for the deathless day in 1989. "We're proud to be part of a trend that includes progress in DWI prevention, railroad crossing safety, motorcycle, bicycle, and pedestrian safety," Gustafson said.

"June 13 was just one day in a decade," he added. "But it shows that lives can be saved when Texans work together. It

takes effort on many fronts, and the rewards may not be immediate. However, as we've seen, effort eventually pays off." Gustafson noted that the 1980s had been a landmark decade for

traffic safety.

"Our state child restraint law was enacted in 1984, followed by the safety belt use law in 1985 and the re-enactment of the motorcycle helmet law for all ages in 1989. Laws against driving while intoxicated were strengthened and more vigor-

ously enforced," said Gustafson.

"Grassroots organizations such as Traffic Safety Now Inc., Mothers Against Drunk Driving, and the Safe Kids coalitions, which began in the 1980s, have helped make traffic safety a public issue," he added. The decade also saw the development of many community education programs funded through the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

"And now, this year, we're seeing automatic safety belts or air bags installed in all new cars," said Gustafson. "Our job is not finished by any means, but occupant protection in the 1990s will be a whole new ball game."
