Cowboys Win Handily When Matadors Fail To Make Shots Count; Hodges Is Best Scorer For Tech

ABILENE, Jan. 22.—In two encounters with the Matadors of Texas Tech, the Simmons Cowboys won handily, taking the first battle 46 to 36, and coming back in the second to smother a 36 to 27 defeat on the Matadors.

Hodges was the leading scorer for the victors with ten points in the opener and six in the final, although Darr also netted six last night. But if Hodges is point getter for the Matadors, Tadlock is the handy man. He was easily the luminary of the Tech club and especially did he shine on breaking up passes...

For a long two minutes the play was scoreless, with the ball changing ends of the court fast in beautiful passing combinations. Jimmy Neely rung the first goal of the game, only to see the lead fade with Fisher making a free throw and a field goal in quick succession.

face lay in a pool of blood. Dr. Thompson testified that the cerebral cavity had been completely gutted of brains by the bullet. No brains were on the floor, he said, and he had carefully scrutinized the wall with a microscope and found them lodged in a tiny crevice.

Ballistic experts testified that the fatal bullet was fired from the gun found beneath Smith. Possibility that the gun had been placed beneath the body by an unknown assassin after murder, was suggested in today's hearing. The gun belongs to Sock and Buskin dramatic club and is used for stage purposes. All except the exploded shell were found to be blank. The gun was last handled, witnesses said, by Frank Herrard, director of the play, who said he had locked it in the room desk after the night's rehearsal. Smith did not have a key to the desk and the lock had not been tampered with.

Smith was said to have had numerous political enemies. Testimony showed that he had been an ardent reformer in politics and had recently backed a movement to overthrow the constitution and substitute one more to his liking.

Theory that robbery may have been the motive was discounted when experts testified that Smith's pocketbook, which contained no money, had held 30 cents for the last six months. His pockets revealed no other clues.

Hinting that unrequited love may have offered a suicide motive, Elizabeth Dryden told of advances the deceased had made her which had been repulsed. A verse allegedly written by Smith was introduced as evidence. It read:

"I guess there's girl's what'd marry me,
And live with me right happily—
It weren't for my poverty."

Authorities pointed out, however, that the verse contained three lines. This, they said, showed plainly Smith was involved in a three-cornered love affair and indicated a motive for murder rather than suicide.

Three suspects have been taken into custody and will face the Pre-Law club court in mock murder trial when that court next convenes.
