Because of the newness of the college along with so many strange students in the city since the opening, there has been a considerable amount of criticism as to the behavior of the college students. These criticisms are all placed on the college, giving it a minority of the representation and placing this as the morals of the college as a unit.

In accordance, the college is given more criticism than the schools of the city which part can only be expected and received with a friendly attitude, due to its great flow of students who live in other parts of the state. The acts of the students residing in the city are not noticed as much as those who are as yet strangers.

## THE POWER OF ORATORY

Even in our time, the person who can express himself with eloquence has a better chance of getting over with his ideas; probably not because his ideas are more valuable, but because of the pleasing and impressive manner in which they are presented. The nation is still under the influence of the oratory of the late William Jennings Bryan, yet his convictions are not considered of any more importance in the world of politics today than hundreds of other statesmen. It was not altogether Mr. Bryan's personality that made his oratory so effective. The phonograph reproduction of his presentation of the Lord's Prayer is very impressive.

The advantages to be gained through the art of public speaking are receiving more consideration now than ever, and Tech students have been encouraged in every way possible to cultivate this art. It is understood that the college of engineering is requiring the students in that department to take at least one term of public speaking. The Davidson Scholarship for oratory is an attraction to many, and will strengthen competition in this field. The first contest toward the scholarship will be held next term, with the first try-outs in declamation.

Mr. Davidson is well informed on the power of oratory and no doubt realizes the encouragement his award will be to Tech students.

## Progress Made In Beautification Of Tech Campus

### Matador Quintet Will Start Work Outs Next Week

Coaches Freeland and Higginbotham will put the thinly clad matadors thru their first workout Monday in the new gym at the mule barn. The Matadors are considerably pepped up over the new court and snapped into the first practice with a flash. Coach Freeland says he has good material and expects to put out a winning team.

The court in the mule barn is larger than most of the students thought it to be. It will make a good place for games as it has an excellent seating capacity. The railings were removed from around the court giving a good cut-of-bound. The court is fast and will be the scene of many a good game this season.

While most of the men are unexperienced, they handle the ball well and should develop a squad that will be able to take care of its own. A

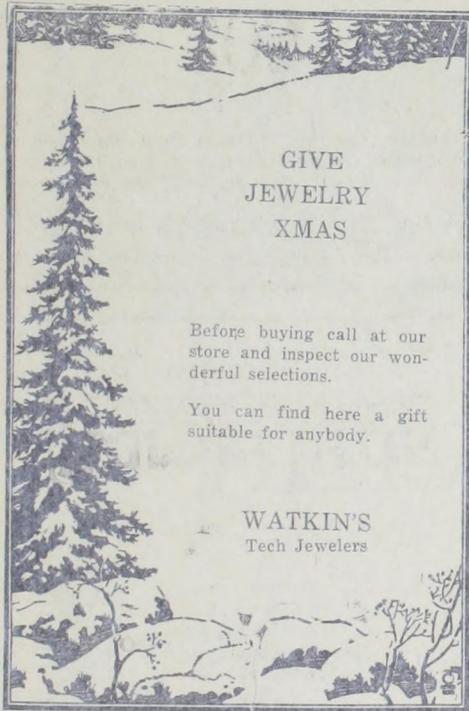
