George Randolph Hearst, oldest son of William Randolph Hearst, one of America's fore most publishers, and owner of twenty-eight newspapers operating in the United States, was in Big Spring Saturday approxi-

He was enroute to Miami Florida, for a few days' pleasure trip. He was accompanied by his pilot, Ray Crawford, of Los Angeles, Bill Hoettle, formerly an American Airways pilot between El Paso and Los Angeles, and Fred Brown, mechanic. They were traveling in Mr Hearst's private plane. Stinson tri-motored, a beautiful brown-colored 10-place plane.

The party arrived here at 7:15 at Big Spring airport, where the ship was serviced by American Airways. Tanks were replenished with 300 gallons of 87-actane gasoline. Mr. Hearst reported his departure from El Paso was delayed two hours because of inability to get this high-grade gasoline.

Mr. Hearst, who is an aviator of no mean ability, having been flying for some five years, re-ported the trip made from El Paso in two hours and ten minutes. They were favored with a tail wind. The trip from Midland to Big Spring was made is. 13 minutes, he said.

Mr. Hearst has charge of radio and mechanical departments of the Hearst newspapers.






