OHIO FOR MR. BRYAN

STATE CENTRAL COMMITTEE IN-DORSES HIM.

Sets Forth His Ideas on Banking Insurance; Says Big Bariks Oppose

Columbus, Ohlo, Feb. 19. - W. J. Bryan's visit to Columbus was signalized by the Democratic State Central Committee unanimously indorsing his candidacy for President. Mr. Bryan arrived at the Southern Hotel while the committee was still in sessession, and upon being introduced to the members, paused long enough to say that he "found a keen feeling throughout the country that our ef-

forts will not be in vain." While indorsing Mr. Bryan, the State Committee made provision in the call for the State Convention by which the voters of any county in which there is a registration city may express their preference for a candidate for President by having the names of candidates printed on delegate tickets. This action was taken at the request of Hamilton County Democrats, who favor the nomination of Judson Harmon of Cincinnati, former Attorney General of the United States under President Clevelad, for the Presidency.

In an address on the need of a bank inspection and regulation law, before an audiece that filled the hall of the House of Representatives yesterday afternoon, William Jennings Bryan charged that the big banks of the country are opposing the enactment of adequate State and National laws for bank inspection, regulation and de-

posit guarantees? Bryan referred to his unsuccessful attempts to get through theh National Congress and his own State Legislature bills for the regulation of banks. He disclaimed credit for originating the plan of guaranteeing bank deposits. He said that the big banks of the country caused their defeat on the plea that such a law would place small banks and all banks on an equalfooting as to the safety of depositors. He decried the distrust of banks as unjust and unfounded, and said the banks of this country are, in the main,

safe, but they need regulation.

He said if deposits were guaranteed the people would replace their money. too often hoarded, in the banks, whereupon business confidence would be restored. He compared the conditions of 1893 and the recent financial troubles. The first, he said, had been preceded by a drop in values and the increase in the purchase power of the dollar.

Judge J. A. Eldson Dead.

Hamilton: After an illness that extended over a period of several days past, Judge Eidson passed away at his home in this city at 3:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. Formerly Associate Justice in the Third Court of Appeals, Judge Eidson was well known, especially to the legal fraternity of the State, and was regarded generally as one of the most learned jurists in Texas.

Fever on Quarantined Vessel.

Galveston: T. E. Pritchard, third officer on the steamer Crispin, and a victim of yellow fever, died Tuesday afternoon, making the second victim of the disease since the vessel went into quarantine Sunday. The body was buried in Lakeview Cemetery, Dr. Florence, officer in charge of the State quarantine station, reported that no new cases have developed. The ship body of Pritchard was removed.

Havana, Feb. 18,-The Darlo E panole, the organ of the ultra Spania element, in a leading editorial, referring to the special celebration by Americans of the tenth anniversary of MAKES ADDRESS TO PEOPLE the blowing up of the battleship Main

"They commemorate the blackes spot in American history, the world including honest Americans, believing that the ship was blown up by direct orders from the War Department for the purpose of justification in the plan

to despoil Spain of Cuba." The paper adduces as "convincing proof" that the officers of the Main attended the funeral of the victims in full dress uniform, which showed that they must have sent their uniforms ashore "in anticipation of an explosion," and alleges that the reason the wreck has never been raised is that it would conclusively demonstrate that the explosion was in the magazine.

AND THE FLOODS CAME

MILES OF PITTSBURG'S TERRI-TORY UNDER WATER.

People Driven Upstairs by Floods Rooms. Difficult to Get Food and Fuel. 5

Pittaburg, Pa., Feb. 17 .- After reachng thirty and seven-tenths feet at oon yesterday, and remaining at that stage for three house, the high water in the rivers is now slowly receding. The danger mark in this city is twen ty-two feet. The damage and suffer ing caused by the annual flood is wide-spread. As far as is known, there was no loss of life, and this is attributed to the early warning of the local United States Weather Bureau. Live stock have perished in considerable numbers and there are many reports of persons having narrowly escaped death in an endeavor to save their property.

Miles of territory in Greater Pittsourg and vicinity are submerged, and it will be some time today before the water will be back in the channels of the rivers and the numerous small streams. Thousands of busine and Pittsburg shops. Extensive rall- in the downtown portion of Pittsburg are attempting to clear the cellars of their buildings of water. Every few feet along the sidewalks men are pumping water, and hundreds of these little streams can be seen spurting

Electric light plants in these buildings, and other valuable machinesy, is practically a total loss.

The actual monetary damage can not be ascertained at this time, but from all accounts it will run up into several million dollars

The suffering caused by the high water is intense, Thousands of persons are living in the upper floors of their homes, using skiffs as a means of transportation. The lower portions of their homes are filled with water. In many instances the household goods were not removed, owing to a lack of time, and chairs, tables, planes and brice-brac are floating about the rooms. To add to the suffering of the victims the weather grow cold yester day and know fell. 





Recipes Given in Recent Popular Book on Cookery.

From "One Hundred Desserts" we take the following recipes: Niege.—Peel and core eight large

apples and cook whole in a rich sirup until soft; remove carefully and ar range on the dish for serving. Fill the core cavities with quince jelly and cover completely with a meringue made of the whites of four eggs and a half-cupful of powdered sugar, flavored with a little lemon juice. Stick blanched and shredded almonds over the meringue; put on the upper rack in a quick oven and brown

Frozen Figs.-Melt four tablespoon fuls of brown sugar without any water; pour in quickly a cupful of boiling water and boil to a sirup. Heat a quart of milk; add 14 ounces pour on the beaten volks of eight eggs. Strain the carameled sugar into this and put into a freezer. Chop a pound of figs, soak until soft in a little brandy, and when the custard is partly frozen, stir them in and finish freezing.

A cup of chocolate is much improved by a dash of cinnamon, or by adding a third of a pint of coffee to each pint of milk, Very rich chocolate may be made by pouring a quart over the yolks of two eggs, beating constantly to prevent curdling. Some prefer a few drops of vanilla, either in the whipped cream or chocolate.

of the Bodice.

At the present moment we have ample opportunities of altering the appearance of our bodices and making one play the part of many, says a writer in the Montreal Herald. Some of these take the form of fichus made of folds of thin or thick material, which are thrown over the shoulders and fasten at the waistband. Then there is a new form of bolero which is attached to a waistband that forms an accentuated point on the front from which a couple of straps is attached to the bolero, that opens wide in front and falls over the point of the shoul-der. Both the band and the bolero are generally covered with embroidery, and the many gold embroidered bodices which come from the east can be adapted to them. Then there is the pinafore effect which completely changes the whole aspect of the dress if attached to the skirt, and with a good pattern costs a mere song. Many of the present winter dresses are made of rough fabrics intermixed with black, and with these a plain colored pinafore would have an excellent effect. Monogram fobs are worn with many such gowns now.

Vegetable Steve

Parboil two pared potatoes, one turnip, one onion, and one carrot. Drain and cut into half-inch dice. Chop fine two square inches of fat. salt pork, put into a kettle, and cook slowly until well tried out. Skim out the pork fragments, stir in one teaspoonful of four and brown slightly, then gradually add one pint of good beef, or, failing that, good boiling water. Season well with salt and pepper and the diced vegetables and a cupful each of shelled peas. lima beans, and corn cut from the cob Simmer together until all are tender, add some chopped parsley and serve.

Beef Loaf.

Take two pounds of round steak and half a pound of suet, both chopped fine. Add two eggs, one cup of bread crumbs that have been softened in cold water, one small onion chopped fine, one-half cup of sweet milk, three teaspoonfuls of salt and one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper. Mix all to-gether and shape into a loaf. Bake in a moderate oven an hour or more,
