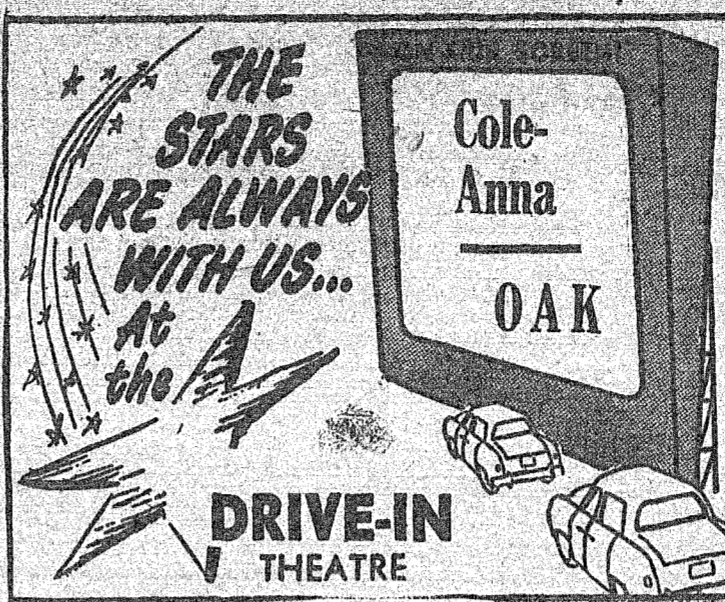

New Turnpike To Cover Four States Proposed In Houston

Houston — Addressing members of the highway committees of the Houston and Dallas Chambers of Commerce July 2 Governor Johnston Murray of Oklahoma projected a thousand mile turnpike which would stretch from Galveston to St. Louis via Houston, Dallas, Ft. Worth, Denton, Oklahoma City, Wichita, Topeka and Kansas City.

He also proposed a cut-off route between Oklahoma City and St. Louis through Tulsa and Joplin. Part of this latter route, Governor Murray pointed out, the 88 miles between Oklahoma City and Tulsa already has such a connecting link in the Turner Turnpike which will be completed next year.

Another section, the 50 miles between Galveston and Houston, have also been spanned, according to Former Governor W. P. Hobby, presiding chairman of the Houston Chamber of Commerce highway group, by the Gulf Freeway, which will be opened to the public August 2.

For the remaining system of four lane turnpike, Governor Murray said the only answer was toll roads. A preliminary survey of cost of the project from St. Louis to Denton, and including the cut-off route from Oklahoma City to St. Louis, conducted by Murray's engineers named a figure of \$600,000,000.

He said although his cost figures did not come any further

south than Denton, he was confident of full cooperation from the Texas Highway Commission and the people of Texas.

"I have already discussed the plan with Texas Governor Allan Shivers, Kansas Governor Edward Arn, and Missouri Governor Forrest Smith," Murray said, "and I am optimistic that the four states can carry the project to a successful conclusion."

He added that building the roads with tax money was out of the question as far as he was

concerned because the people are "near the breaking point".

The Oklahoma Governor said further, "I don't want a dollar of federal money in this project, because I don't want them (the federal government) to take over any more of my roads than they already have."

Governor Murray was in Houston attending the 44th annual governors conference.

A "piece of eight" was worth about a dollar.

IN COLEMAN COUNTY**

Coleman County gained two wildcat locations Thursday.

Saxon Exploration Co., Abilene, will drill No. 1 A. A. Brown Estate as a 3,800-foot wildcat three miles southeast of Glen Cove.

Location is 330 feet from the north and east lines of the south half of Section 2, Block 1, T&NO Survey.

Don L. Choate & Bankline Oil Co., Cisco, will drill No. 2-25 J. Ballard as a 2,600-foot rotary project six miles north of Coleman.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 25, Block 2, GH&H Survey.

Andrew M. Howsley, et al, No. 2-A C. C. Duncan, Section 23, BS&F Survey, one and one-half miles south of Glen Cove, has been completed for a daily flow of 703.36 barrels of 43 gravity oil.

Production was through 20-64 choke with 600 pounds on casing and 275 pounds on tubing from 64 perforations at 3,492-3,500 feet. Casing was set at 3,539 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 350-1.

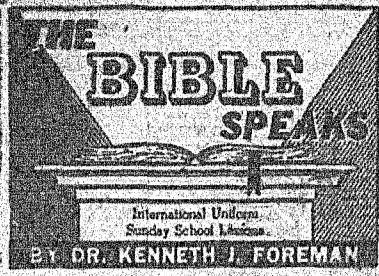

Hero, Artist, Saint

Lesson for July 20, 1952

THE GREAT TRAGEDY of life is that man has three incompatible ideals. So says a famous thinker of our time. These three are the hero, the artist, the saint. The hero's virtue is strength; the artist's is beauty, and the saint's is holiness. A hero, in the course of his heroic acts, does things which would stain the honor of a saint and which are too ugly for a sensitive artist even to think about. Saints on the other hand are often most unheroic; they "wax valiant" in submission, not in fight; and they often care very little for beauty. Artists likewise may be personal cowards and live anything but saintly lives. Yet society needs all three, though the values one cherishes may be just the opposite of what the other prizes. Very rarely, the same man may show traces of artist, saint and hero.

Hero Gideon
THE WORD "judge" in the Book of Judges usually means what we would call a hero, a military man with a successful record. Then, as now, if a man made good in the army he was after thought of as an army man. His title and his rank stuck to him his life long.

We think of General Grant as an army man, and of Lee as another; though one was President of the United States and the other one a distinguished college president.

So Gideon comes down in history as one of the "Judges" who delivered Israel from a powerful enemy. This time the enemy was the Midianites, a roaring nuisance if ever there was one. Midianites were nomads, they lived where they pleased, and they lived off the peaceful farmers wherever they were.

There were so many that their army looked like a swarm of locusts. They were seen only once a year, but that was enough. They would wait out in the wilderness until the crops were ready for harvest; then they would dash into the country, raid every farm from border to border, and skip out again, leaving the Israelites on the edge of starvation for another year.

How Gideon, a small farmer and a timid soul by nature, became the hero who nearly exterminated the Midianites and set his people free, is one of the most fascinating tales in the Old Testament. The people loved him and remembered him for that one thing above all: he could fight!

Gideon the Artist
THERE ARE MORE WAYS than one to be artistic. General Gideon painted no pictures, carved no statues, wrote no poems. But he was an artist all the same. There is something artistic about any good workmanship, and it is as true of military campaigns as of everything else.

Incidentally, generals have a temptation to overlook this. At the Battle of Fredericksburg in the American Civil War, when the northern army was marching into the grinding trap which Lee and his generals had prepared, Lee remarked that it's a good thing war is so terrible, otherwise we should become too fond of it. He was speaking from the general's viewpoint, of course. The private is seldom in danger of being too fond of war.

At all events Gideon's campaigns were just as "beautiful" in all details as anything Napoleon, Lee, Hitler or Hannibal ever invented.

Can a hero be an artist? In his way, yes; like any other craftsman, he can do a necessary, rough and dirty piece of work in a way that calls out the exclamation: Beautiful!

Saint Gideon
CAN A SOLDIER be a saint? If you mean by "saint" the ideal of what a Christian should be, most would say No. General Lee said at the end of his life that if he had to live over again he would not be a soldier.

And still, the writer of the letter to the Hebrews in the New Testament does not hesitate to list Gideon, and even

that half-hero Barak, right along with the rest in his list of high saints, the men and women of Faith.

For fundamentally it is faith that makes the saint. And Gideon was a man of sturdy faith. To paraphrase Tennyson, his strength was as the strength of ten, because his faith was pure. So there have been countless men whose profession is arms who have also been men of faith.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF INDIVIDUAL CITIZEN ENUMERATED

Is there a counterpart of our American "Bill of Rights?" Texas lawyers believe that for every guaranteed RIGHT, there is a corresponding RESPONSIBILITY on the part of every citizen.

Recently the American Citizenship Committee of the State Bar was presented an award by the Freedom Foundation for its work during 1950-51. One of its projects during that time, and one factor in earning the award, was the development of the following "Bill of Responsibilities":

1. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.

2. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citizens.

3. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppress the rights of others.

4. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freedom of the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service when called upon; and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.

5. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and



CONFUSION IN SEED LABELS
Judging from inquiries and complaints which have reached the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin, many farmers are confused as to the purpose of the Tested Seed Label which is required on each bag of seed sold in the state.

There are three tags which can be found on seed bags, all issued by the department — the tested seed label, the Certified seed tag, and the Registered seed tag. Unless the purchaser is familiar with each of them, he can easily become confused and believe he is buying seed guaranteed by the department.

The cream-colored Tested Seed label does not guarantee that the seed is of high quality. The Department of Agriculture issues the tags and requires the dealer to supply information on the tag as to bag contents.

Purpose of this tag is to let the purchaser know exactly what he is buying. The law states that the dealer should include on the tag the commonly accepted name of the seed, its germination qualities, the purity, amount of inert matter, weed seeds, date tested, weight of bag and origin of contents. This is the responsibility of the dealer and if he falsifies this informa-

tion, he violates the Texas Seed Law.

Many farmers are mistaking this tag for the Certified Seed Label and the Registered Seed tag. Both of these do guarantee, to a certain extent, a high quality of contents. The Certified tag is pale blue in color, and the Registered tag, which is backed by even higher test standards, is light purple. They are plainly marked "Certified" and "Registered." They also carry the name of the seed grower, variety of crop, weight per container, year of production, and a serial number. Field inspectors have determined qualities of the seed before either tag is issued.

Some unscrupulous operators have been known to attach these two quality tags to inferior seeds, since it would be impossible for the Texas Department of Agriculture to employ enough men to personally tag each bag. Any such practice is a direct and serious violation of the law and should be reported to the department at once.

It is a good practice for each farmer to save a generous sample of seed from each bag he purchases, and to keep the tag with the sample. If the seed fails to meet his expectations, the sample can be sent along with the tag to the Department of Agriculture for test purposes to be used as a guide in determining if the dealer is mislabeling his seed. Cooperation between purchasers and the Department of Agriculture will go a long way towards elimination of "seed rackets."

Graham B. Smedley Endorsed By Legal Profession July 5

lawyer," but he also has the overwhelming respect of the legal profession.

Judge Smedley is basing his campaign for re-election on his long experience, his outstanding qualifications and his record while on the bench. He has been an associate justice on the court seven years. Before that he served 12 years on the Supreme Court Commission of Appeals. He is considered one of the State's leading authorities on oil, gas, irrigation and title matters.

He is 47 years of age and the father of four children. He was born in Guadalupe County and was educated in the public schools of Luling and San Antonio and at Baylor University.

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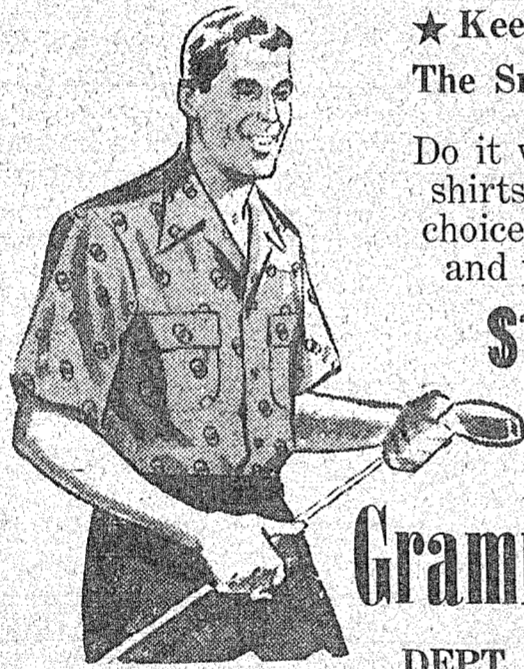
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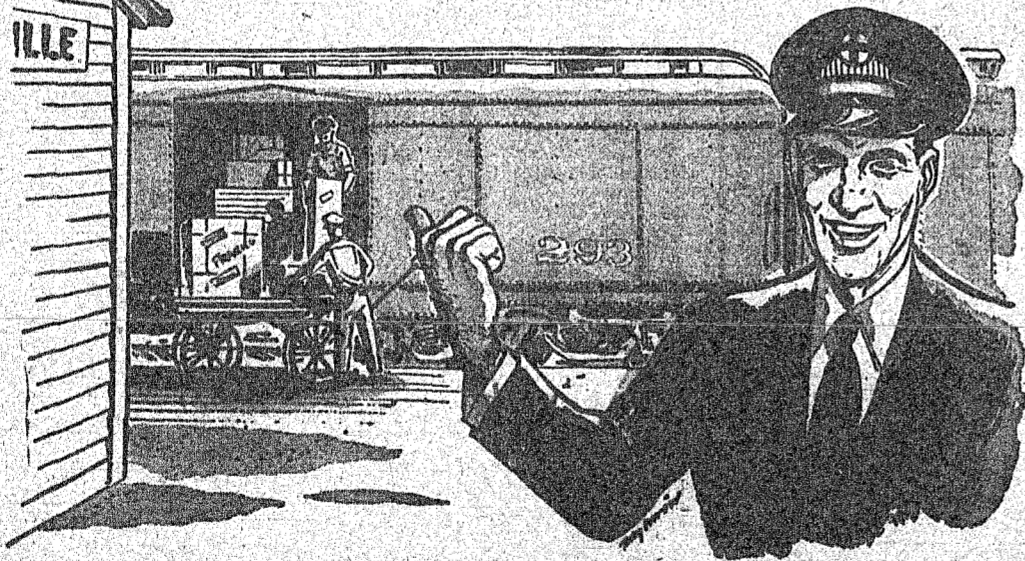
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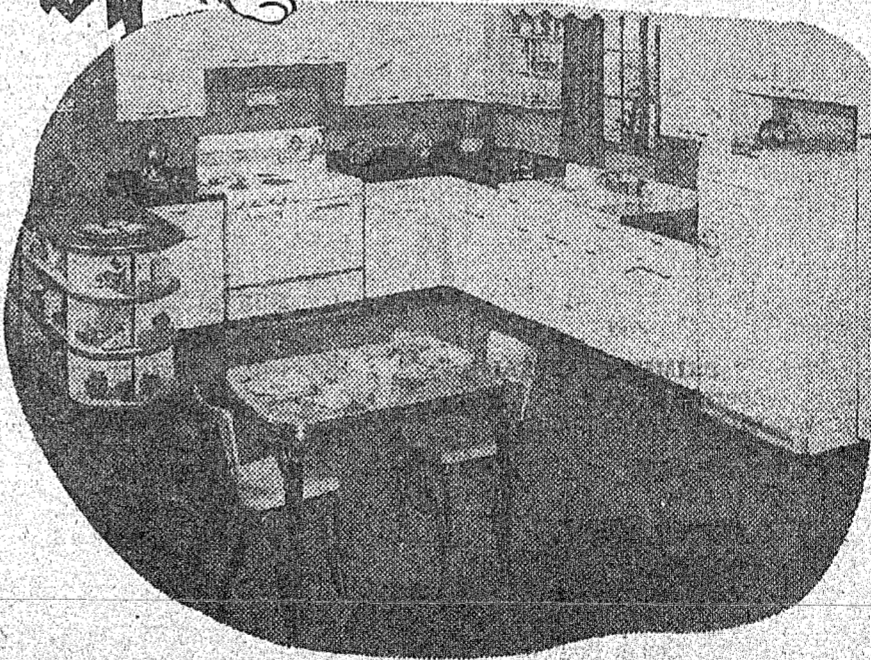

Covered by the Bar poll are candidates for two positions on the Supreme Court, one on the Court of Criminal Appeals, and six on various Courts of Civil Appeals. All are seeking the Democratic nomination in the July 26 primary.

The State Bar's chief reason for conducting the poll was to let the public know how lawyers size up the qualifications of different prospects for high judicial posts.

Texas attorneys were asked to observe these steps in marking their ballots.

In races with two candidates, one choice should be indicated. When three or more persons are running for the same office, both first and second choices should be shown.

Supreme Court and Criminal Appeals Court ballots were mailed state-wide. Candidates for Courts of Civil Appeals were voted on only in the districts where they seek election.

Here are the results on all first-choice votes cast:

Supreme Court, Place 1 — Spurgeon Bell, Houston, 1789 votes; Frank P. Culver, Fort Worth, 1319; Glenn R. Lewis, San Angelo, 968; and A. R. Stout, Waxahatchie, 1405.

Supreme Court, Place 2 — Robert Bruce Keenan, Glade-water, 598 votes, and Associate Justice Graham B. Smedley, Fort Worth, 5177.

Court of Criminal Appeals — Jesse Owens, Vernon, 1776 votes; and Kenneth K. Woodley, Sabinal, 4032.

In addition to the above tabulated first choice votes, there were 478 ballots cast on candidates for Supreme Court, Place 1, which indicated first choice only but no second choice. Results of these ballots (not included in the above figures) are as follows:

Spurgeon Bell 111 votes, Frank P. Culver 112 votes, Glenn R. Lewis 97 votes and A. R. Stout 158 votes.

Second choice ballots were cast in races involving more than two candidates as follows:

Supreme Court, Place No. 1: Spurgeon Bell 1242; Frank Culver 1321; Glenn R. Lewis 1313; and A. R. Stout 1608.

Ft. Worth OPS Office To Close August 15

Ft. Worth — Congressional appropriation for the operation of the Office of Price Stabilization until April 30, 1953 has forced the virtual closing of the Fort Worth District OPS office on August 15.

Ellis H. Boyd, district OPS director, said that reduction in force notices have been given to all Fort Worth employees of the agency and that a staff of from two to four persons would be maintained in Fort Worth to assist businessmen with OPS problems. Boyd said more than 30,000 businesses had filed under price regulations at the Fort Worth office.

News of the reduction in personnel in the district office was released by the Regional OPS office in Dallas. The Dallas District Office will be combined with the Regional Office and the total staff remaining there will be 140 in the combined office as compared with 185 in the Regional Office and 92 in the Dallas Office.

District Offices with about 35 employees will be kept open in San Antonio, New Orleans, Little Rock, Oklahoma City with offices in Fort Worth, Lubbock, Houston, Tulsa, and Shreveport being reduced more drastically in staff.

Boyd stated that he wished to thank businessmen in the 50-county Fort Worth District for their cooperation in the OPS program, and also newspapers, radio stations, and chambers of commerce for their efforts in informing the business community about the price stabilization program.

1952 Polio Precautions

Branches of the federal government are cooperating with the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in assuring widespread distribution of 35,000,000 copies of the 1952 "Polio Pledge" for parents prepared by the March of Dimes organization.

Earl James McGrath, United States Commissioner of Education, as well as the United States Post Office Department, have endorsed this annual project to alert American children and parents to safeguards which may lessen the possibility of contracting paralytic polio.

Mr. McGrath, endorsing the Pledge's distribution through all the schools of the nation, said, "The 1952 message about polio precautions, entitled 'Polio Pledge', has been made available to all the schools in the country. I recommend that administrators and teachers give all possible help to the National Foundation and its Chapters in this school and community health program."

The Pledge, in poster form, will be displayed through October 31 in the nation's 44,500 Post Offices.

This March of Dimes project to safeguard children from the menace of polio was inaugurated in 1945 with a printing of 520,000 copies entitled "When Polio Strikes".

Two years later, in 1947, more than 29,000,000 leaflets called "A Message to Parents", were distributed through the schools in both English and a Spanish edition.

In 1951, so popular was the project, that the original printing was exhausted. Reorders from schools both in the United States and Puerto Rico boosted the total to 32,500,000. This growth has paralleled not only the population growth of public, private and parochial schools, but the increasing recognition of the publication's value by administrators and teachers.

Here, in abbreviated form, are the essential precautions listed in the 1952 "Polio Pledge":

- (1) Avoid fatigue from work or play.
- (2) Don't get chilled. Don't swim too long in cold water nor sit around in wet clothes.
- (3) Don't mix unnecessarily with new groups. Don't take children out of camp where there is good health supervision.
- (4) Watch closely for signs of illness — headache, fever, sore muscles, stiff neck or back,

trouble in breathing or swallowing.

(5) Put a sick person to bed at once, away from others, and call your doctor. Follow his advice.

(6) Contact your local March of Dimes Chapter for whatever assistance or financial help you may need.

Auto Repairs Under Ceiling Price Regulation

Vacationing motorists have been advised by the Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization that OPS ceiling price regulations protect them from overcharges on automobile repairs.

"You can tell that you are paying no more than OPS ceiling prices for automobile repairs", the OPS office said, "because the vast majority of repairmen use OPS-approved flat-rate manuals to figure charges to their customers. The manuals, listing typical labor charges for all types of repairs to your car, must be approved by OPS before they can be used."

"The repairman is required to post in his place of business a notice of the flat-rate manuals he uses for pricing. A customer may ask to look at the particular manual covering repair work on his car. If he feels he may have been overcharged, the customer should check with the local OPS District Office."

Trimming \$9 Billion From Budget Is Major Achievement

Junction — A major achievement of the recent session of Congress was the trimming of \$9 billion from President Truman's budget requests, Rep. O. C. Fisher told a crowd of more than 300 people at the county courthouse here Saturday.

"And there was a lot more fat that could and should have been removed", he added. Fisher was the honored guest of the Kimble County Electric Coop. at its annual 5-county membership meeting. The Congressman is a native of Kimble County and still operates a stock farm here.

"One of the big jobs of the day", Fisher said, "is to eliminate waste, extravagance and non-essential spending on a State and National level. A strong nation must be a solvent nation."

Rep. Fisher pointed to several cuts he said should have been made. He was critical of the \$2 billion foreign economic aid fund voted by Congress — in addition to military assistance.

"The war has been over seven years and we are still asked to build public works and bolster sagging finances of many foreign countries. I voted against this twenty-hundred-million-dollar economic aid because I was convinced it is not essential to our security. We simply cannot afford to finance an international WPA — in Arabia, Israel, and elsewhere — to be paid for, year after year, by hard-pressed American taxpayers", he cautioned.

Turning to the subject of Agriculture, Fisher in a radio address said the House amendment to the military appropriation bill, which requires preference for domestic wool in military procurement orders, should be of help to our growers.

Some foreign wools, he said, have been dumped and sold at abnormally low prices because of subsidies paid to exporters by the governments of certain exporting countries, in order to get American dollars. Thus, he explained the American growers have been competing not only with the world market but also with foreign subsidies.

The House passed a bill to clarify the law and require an import fee to be levied, above the present tariff, to protect our growers against this practice, but the Senate did not reach the bill before the recent recess.

Farm Safety Week July 20-26

Farm and home accidents are creating such a serious problem that President Truman has issued a special proclamation, urging farm residents and all persons interested in farm life to observe National Farm Safety Week, July 20-26. Estimates just released from the National Safety Council show that 14,000 farm people were accidentally killed last year and 1,250,000 others suffered lost time from injuries.

On Monday of National Safety Week, programs on home safety will be stressed. Home accidents are costing Americans over \$600,000,000 annually, in lost wages, medical expense and insurance overhead. The safe home, for family members and for children to grow up in, is one where the parents are safety conscious and where hazards are corrected.

Accidents in the home may happen because the homemaker is tired. The home management specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, say it's a smart thing to plan devices to save strength and energy. Use the head instead of the feet; don't carry heavy clothes baskets to the line; put the wash in a plastic bag over the shoulder or in a basket on a small cart; save lifting loads and save bending by having work surfaces of the right height.

It's a good idea to make Farm Safety Week last all the year according to the National Safety

Council. Remember everyone is important, whether man, woman or child and cannot be replaced. Believe in the dignity of safety. It is worth the time it takes to be safe.

Santa Fe Railway To Award 15 4-H Club Congress Awards

Fifteen Texas boys or girls with top ranking 4-H records will each receive a 1952 National 4-H Club Congress award equivalent to \$175 provided by the Santa Fe Railway System.

In addition, the railway is providing two college scholarships of \$250 each in Texas, one for a 4-H boy and one for a 4-H girl selected from the Santa Fe winners who will attend the Club Congress in Chicago next November.

Other states sharing in awards provided by the railway are Arizona, California, Colorado, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, New Mexico, and Okla-

home. To be eligible for these awards, participants must have passed their 14th birthday and must not have passed their 21st birthday on January 1, 1952. They also must have completed at least three years of 4-H Club work including the current year.

This program is conducted under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service.
