

Graham Smedley Gets Endorsement Of Texas Lawyers

Austin, July 22 — (Special) — "I am particularly gratified by the encouragement and support given me by lawyers and business and professional men in the cities where I have lived," said Judge Graham B. Smedley today, in commenting upon his race for the Texas Supreme

Smedley began his career on the Court in 1933 when appointed by the Supreme Court to the Commission of Appeals. In 1945, when the court was increased to nine members, Judge Smedley accepted a place as associate justice. He was elected to his first full term in 1946 and is now seeking his second elective

Smedley has practiced law in Midland, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Austin. In 1913 he was named assistant attorney general by Attorney General Ben F. Looney, and he served in that capacity until 1918. During those years he was in charge of all of the state's legal action involving school lands, oil and gas rights, and irrigation and kindred subjects. He is an acknowledged authority on complex problems of land titles, oil and gas rights and irrigation laws.







The next legal problem would robably be to determine the tatus of the title to the propery. Many persons become conused during this stage, thinkng that securing possession of an Abstract or Title Insurance olicy will afford them complete rotection against title defects. his is not necessarily true in ither case.

Keep in mind that an abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract. Any person nay purchase an abstract covring any piece of land, whether he owns it or not. A Title Insurance Policy indemnifies you only up to a certain maximum sum of money, and contains various exceptions to the specified coverage.
