### SATURDAY ELECTION

The first Democratic primary will be held Saturday, July 26, at every voting box in Texas. Every eligible voter is urged to go to the polls sometime during the day and cast your ballot for the persons you think are the most capable of running our state and nation for the next two years.

There has been a lot of discussion during the last few days concerning voting in the General Election in November and who a person might vote for in that election. Surely every voter in the nation will want to cast a ballot in November.

The election Saturday is a Democratic Primary and all Democrats are urged to vote. Naturally, Republicans are not eligible to vote in this election. However, Democrats who wish to support Mr. Eisenhower in the General Election may vote in this primary, as they are not pledging themselves to any presidential candidate when they sign the pledge in this primary ballot. The pledge on this ballot only pledges you to support the nominees of the Democratic Party listed on the ballot and no presidential nominee is listed on the ballot.

In discussing this with some voters during the past week, we have unintentionally misled a few people due to our own misunderstandings, but we want to correct that now. When you vote in this primary, you are pledging yourself to support the nominees for the United States Senate and House of Representatives. If, in the General Election in November, you wish to vote for Republican Senators and Congressmen you are not supposed to vote in the Democratic Primary, because of the pledge you sign as you vote. If you want to support the Democratic nominees for the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives and also support Mr. Eisenhower for President, you are eligible to vote in the primary. Another article elsewhere in this issue of The News gives more information concerning both parties precinct convention to be held Saturday afternoon.

We hope every qualified voter will use his authority and go to the polls and cast your vote Saturday.

Mrs. Jack Bostick of Rockwood, President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service (WSCS) of the Brownwood District and Treasurer of the Rockwood WSCS, was the principal speaker at the Rockwood WSCS meeting Monday afternoon.

"One can't appreciate Heaven unless he has visited Mt. Sequoyah," Mrs. Bostick said as she opened her talk. "A great challenge to advance. ### Ike Backers Not Barred In Primary

Folks who want to vote for General Eisenhower for president, but would also like to have a voice in the election of their district attorney and county commissioners, have a date with a polling booth July 26.

That's the day of the first Democratic primary, and in order to vote in the primary — an election set up and financed by the Democratic Party of Texas — each voter must take this pledge:

"I am a Democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

The pledge says nothing about supporting all of the nominees of the Democratic party, and there will be no presidential nominees listed on the primary ballot.

### No Moral Barrier

Thus there is no legal or moral barrier, as far as the party pledge is concerned, to prevent a person from voting in the Democratic primaries in July and August and voting for the Republican candidate for president in the November general election.

However, there is a legal issue to be considered by persons planning to vote in the July 26

### Pct. Conventions To Be Held Sat.

Democratic and Republican Precinct Conventions will be held Saturday in all precincts of Coleman County, the same as they were held for the Presidential Precinct Conventions in May.

At these meetings delegates to the County Convention will be selected. Each Precinct is entitled to select the same number of delegates to the county conventions as they did in May. The conventions will be conducted in the same manner as the May convention, the only difference being that these conventions will set state policies rather than national policies. The State Democratic Convention is to be held in Amarillo in September. The County Convention will be held in Coleman, August 3.

The precinct conventions are the only ones that all qualified voters are allowed to attend. For some reason or other, not very many voters attended these conventions, and their importance has been somewhat overlooked. It is important to every voter to attend their precinct conventions if they would like to have any say so in the policies set for the State officers to follow.

These conventions will be held in the same places as the May conventions were held.

Democratic primary and attend a Republican precinct convention that same afternoon.

Texas Democrats, whose votes are being wooed by the Republicans this year, have this situation staring them in the face:

A new state law provides a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 for anyone convicted of participating in the primary or convention of more than one party on the same day.

At the same time, Texas Democrats who feel no Democratic presidential candidate likely to be nominated will be satisfactory to them and thus are desirous of switching allegiance to the GOP and attending Republican precinct conventions, face the opposition of disenfranchising themselves on the state and county level if they choose to attend a convention July 26.

In Texas, the men chosen as party nominees in the Democratic primaries are as good as elected. At any rate, they have been up to now. Failure to vote in a Democratic primary, therefore, means the voter loses the right to have his say on who will represent him in the Legislature, be the governor or United States senator, sheriff or district clerk.

**Bascom Giles Asks Re-election On Merits And Experience**

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office of Texas, stated that the \$100,000,000 Texas Veterans' Land Program which he sponsored has far exceeded his expectation both in number of applications and accomplishments to date.

As originator and administrator of the Texas Veterans' Land Program, Commissioner Giles has supervised the purchase of thousands of farm and ranch tracts for Texas veterans. Giles proposed the veterans' program in an unprecedented address by a state official before a joint session of legislature.

The personable Giles, a native of Travis County, points out that during his administrations the two Texas school funds have been increased by more than \$260,000,000.

Commissioner Giles' experience in the General Land Office dates back to his graduation from Austin High School; he was employed by the state department almost immediately. With the exception of a two year span, when he was seeking promotion from the ranks by the Texas electorate, he has given

continuous service. His election in 1938 was regarded as the biggest political upset of the election.

Since then he has never had serious opposition and has received the highest vote given any candidate for any office in a Democratic primary.

When Giles first became land commissioner the Permanent Public Free School Fund was \$56,000,000. It is now almost \$200,000,000. The University of Texas and A. & M. Permanent Fund has been increased during his tenure from \$27,000,000 to \$144,000,000.

Giles is active in the Methodist Church, the Lions Club and is an ardent sports fan.

**Shivers Agin Auto Inspection Law; "Shall Change It Or Repeal It" He Says**

Governor Allan Shivers today said that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If the law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)



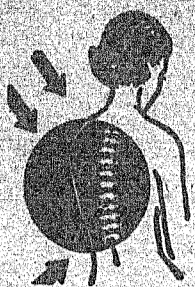

**Graham Smedley Gets Endorsement Of Texas Lawyers**  
Austin, July 23 — (Special) — "I am particularly gratified by the encouragement and support given me by lawyers and business and professional men in the cities where I have lived," said Judge Graham B. Smedley today, in commenting upon his race for the Texas Supreme Court.

Smedley, who has the reputation of a gentle and modest man out of court, and a "scrapper" in court, when aroused, has been accorded a vote of confidence by his fellow lawyers and laymen alike. In a recent poll taken by the State Bar, Judge Smedley received 5,177 votes as against 598 for his opponent.

A statement endorsed by business and professional men read, in part: "Knowing Judge Smedley to be a man of the highest character and a judge of the first rank, we respectfully urge the voters to keep Judge Graham B. Smedley on the Supreme Court."

Smedley began his career on the Court in 1933 when appointed by the Supreme Court to the Commission of Appeals. In 1945, when the court was increased to nine members, Judge Smedley accepted a place as associate justice. He was elected to his first full term in 1946 and is now seeking his second elective term.

Smedley has practiced law in Midland, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth and Austin. In 1913 he was named assistant attorney general by Attorney General Ben F. Looney, and he served in that capacity until 1918. During those years he was in charge of all of the state's legal action involving school lands, oil and gas rights, and irrigation and kindred subjects. He is an acknowledged authority on complex problems of land titles, oil and gas rights and irrigation laws.

**God Prepared Him**

Lesson for July 27, 1932

WHEN A CHRISTIAN looks back, he can see God's hand better than he can see it looking forward. A Christian, even a worrying Christian (though there should be no such people as Christians who worry), can feel very thankful for God's blessings, care and guidance in the past, even while worrying over to-morrow's uncertainties. How foolish this is! God is even now making ready for the future. He is not to be taken by surprise. He knows what he wants and he knows how to get it. While we waste time in worry, God is at work. The story of Samuel is a case in point.

**God's Home**

EVERY ONE KNOWS that the strongest single influence in a person's life is his home. We sometimes take that for granted. On the contrary, a home may wreck a man before he starts. It has been said that many alcoholics get their start, not their start in drinking but their start in the nervous, unsettled disposition which easily slips down into alcoholism and other drug habits, before they are six years old. The wrong kind of parents, lack of harmony between father and mother, ill-treatment or simple neglect, can make a child already abnormal before he is old enough to go to school.

On the other hand, the foundation of a strong man can always be found in the home where he first lived. So it was with the remarkable man, the prophet Samuel.

In later life he became lawgiver, king-maker, preacher and general of the army; no ordinary man! The nation needed him; and when the time came, God produced him. But God produced his mother first.

**God's Church**

AFTER LEAVING HOME, Samuel literally lived in the tabernacle, which served as a church in those far off days. The little boy found there a second home. Old Eli the priest no doubt came to mean much more to him than his own father did, his father whom he so seldom saw.

So it still is, where the church is doing what it should for the children of its people. A child should not be afraid of the minister; he should not feel anything but love for the church. True, a church building is different from other buildings in that it is set apart for a sacred use. A church is the symbol of God's presence among men, and the sanctuary of a church ought to make all who come into it feel that this place is holy ground.

But that does not mean that a child should be afraid of the place, as some children are. If they have been coming there every Sunday since they can remember, sitting with the rest of the family in the family pew (sounds old-fashioned but there are still thousands of them), coming so regularly that no question is ever asked on Sunday morning, "Well, shall we go to church or not?"—then they will feel more at home on the inside of the church, when the Lord's Day comes, than they ever will on the outside.

Now this is not all always true. If children and young people are not attracted by the church, as too often they are not, whose fault is it?

Whoever may be to blame, it is certain that a church which loses its young people is headed for its end.

**The Voice of God**

IT IS MOST INTERESTING to know that when young Samuel heard the voice of God, it sounded just like the voice of Eli the priest. (If you heard the voice of God, whose human voice would it sound like?)

At any rate, God prepared this great prophet Samuel not only by the influence of home and church, but by a personal religious experience. Now there is no real conflict or contradiction between religious education and conversion, between the church and the home, and the

work of the Holy Spirit. God was in Samuel's home, God was in that tabernacle, God was in his religious education. But God also came to him directly and not only through home and church. If we wonder sometimes where the Christian leaders for the next generation are coming from, we may be sure God is preparing them even now, in simple if obscure ways, as he did with Samuel of old.

**HOME PURCHASE INVOLVES SERIOUS LEGAL PROBLEMS**

Thinking of buying a house? Before you sign anything, be sure you know the effects of your action. Many legal problems are involved in such a transaction. This column, and those to follow on this subject, will attempt to point out and explain some of the legal angles connected with your purchase.

For the average person, the buying of a home is the largest single transaction of his life. It is also, in most instances, the most permanent or longest term investment he will ever make. Whether or not he bought wisely will be determined by his ability to resell without difficulty, or to enjoy the use of the premises without annoyance or interruption.

Possibly the first legal problem you will meet will be when you are asked by the seller or his agent to sign a contract of sale or earnest money contract. In connection with the latter, you will be asked to deposit a sum of money which would be forfeited to the seller and agent for damages in event you do not fulfill the contract. Although no forfeit money may be required with the former, you may still be legally liable for damages if you renege. Be sure, therefore, that you know exactly what your obligations are.

The next legal problem would probably be to determine the status of the title to the property. Many persons become confused during this stage, thinking that securing possession of an Abstract or Title Insurance Policy will afford them complete protection against title defects. This is not necessarily true in either case.

Keep in mind that an abstract is merely an outline of public records on the tract. Any person may purchase an abstract covering any piece of land, whether he owns it or not. A Title Insurance Policy indemnifies you only up to a certain maximum sum of money, and contains various exceptions to the specified coverage.

Following this would be the problem of transferring the title from the legal owner to you, as purchaser, in such manner that no legal question might later arise concerning your sole and exclusive ownership.

Incidental to your title problems is that of ascertaining what restrictions exist upon the lot you are buying and upon the neighborhood generally. Municipal zoning ordinances and restrictive covenants placed upon the tract by previous owners or developers of the subdivision may prove protection or a hindrance, according to the plans you may have for the future use or improvement of your property.

Market price information is the keystone to the most profitable and efficient trading in agricultural products.

The farmer should not be dependent on prices quoted to him by his prospective buyer. He should have the advantage of knowing what the products are bringing in other sections of the state and nation.

Until a year ago, the Texas farmer did not have his own "yardstick" for determining the best price he should receive for his goods. He had to rely on quotations from markets which, in many cases, were so far away that they did not reflect the true picture in his own area.

In October, 1931 the Texas Department of Agriculture concluded an agreement with the

United States Department of Agriculture which established a market news service in the state. The expense was to be shared jointly, and the service got underway on a budget of \$20,000.

The poultry industry in Texas was the first to be afforded daily price quotations. Previously, very limited information was available and market prices were based on transactions in the Northwest Arkansas broiler area. Today, the poultryman can compare his prices with those in all areas of the state as well as nationally.

Fruits and vegetables provide a large portion of the income of many farm families and information was also lacking in this field. Only the more intense truck crop areas in the Rio Grande Valley are currently covered in the state, but quotations are also available from Florida, California, and other producing areas.

Other legal questions may arise in arranging the method of payment for the house. The fact that most people need years in which to complete such payment makes this a matter to be considered carefully.

These are some of the major legal problems you are likely to encounter in purchasing a home. Of course, a number of others may arise in some cases due to peculiar individual circumstances.

Subsequent columns on this subject will seek to explain these and other interwoven legal considerations.

Market reporting in these two fields of agriculture is now well advanced and, pending availability of funds during 1933, plans are underway to increase the service to grain sorghums, wheat, rice, and other products important in Texas farm economy. The information is sent out by mail, radio, telephone, and through the state newspapers.

Briefly, the market news contributes to a free, informed, competitive, and hence efficient, marketing of products. The farmer benefits from expanded marketing outlets and increased returns because of lower marketing margins. The consumer also benefits from better buys, steadier supplies and a greater


selection. And finally, the efficient marketing man benefits from a larger and steadier volume of business.

Daily fruits and vegetables and poultry quotations can be obtained by any person in Texas through a request to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, State Land Office Building, Austin, Texas.

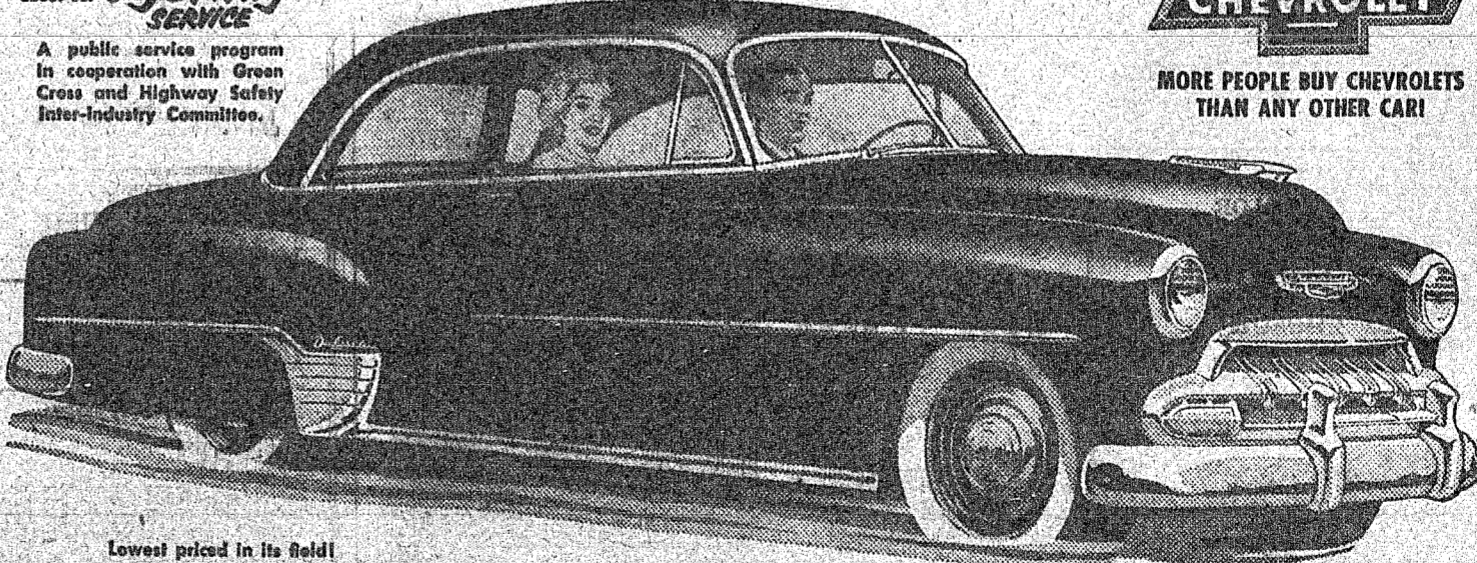
