Mountaineers Open Grid Conference Friday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will open their conference season Friday night at Mountaineer Stadium when they play hosts to the Bangs Dragons. The Dragons lost their conference opener to Wylie last week by a 24-19 count. The Mountaineers had an open date last week after playing three non-conference games at the beginning of the season. Game time is eight o'clock.

The two teams are doped to be very close together, with Santa Anna a slight favorite. However, favorites are not considered when these two teams meet, and from prospects, it will be a good football game from start to finish.

Bangs opened the season by overpowering Richland Springs 18-6, then dropped their second game to the powerful Melvin eleven 0-45, and then upset the dope bucket and beat the May Tigers 19-8 and almost upset the bucket again last week at Wylie. Johnny Pearce, fleet-footed Bangs half-back and James Seegrest are both scoring threats when they have the ball. Their full-back, Dub Jennings is also considered dangerous to the opposing team.

The Mountaineers have some scoring threats also and when Melvin Pollock, Charles Scarborough, Jimmy Lee Robinson or Donald Trull has the ball, behind good blocking, either of them is likely to score. And the boys on the Mountaineer line are the ones who can and do lead the way for the ball carriers. And the boys on defense, such as Aubrey Goodwin, Leonard Johnson, are likely to break up anything Bangs can throw at them.

Fumbles have hurt the Mountaineers in all three of their games thus far this season, but it is hoped that during the past two weeks some of this has been worked out of the boys. Any team is likely to fumble some, for instance the Southwest Conference games for the past week end saw every team fumble apparently when it would hurt them the most, and our boys will continue to do so. However, Coach Behrens has moved Dean Bass back to the quarterback position from the tackle slot and some of the other changes that will be made for the Bangs game are: Royce Melver to left tackle; Aubrey Goodwin may play in two or three positions during the game; Charles McClellan to right guard and also will play defensive half back; and Billy McClellan may see some action from the full back slot. The coach is training a number of boys to fill different positions so that he can change his line up to strengthen weak spots in the line and back field.

He said that next week would probably see some more changes.

In the district game of the week, Wylie came from behind

in the closing minutes of the game with the Bangs Dragons to take 24-19 win for the first conference game of the season. Wylie made 12 first downs and Bangs 15. Eastland mid-way in the second period to win their first game of the season and to give them a 1000 rating in district competition. They won over Rising Star 7-0.

In the top non-conference game of the week the underdog Dublin trounced the Class AA Brady favorites 40-20 in a wild scoring game. Cross Plains managed to edge over a TD in the third period to break a 8-6 deadlock with Early and win their second game of the year, 13-6.

Rising Star is the only District 7-A team that will not play a conference game this week. They will visit the Gorman Panthers on Friday night. Conference games will find undefeated Dublin at Wylie, also undefeated for the top game of the district on Thursday night. Other games will see Bangs at Santa Anna, and DeLeon at Cross Plains.

Christians Differ

Lesson for October 12, 1952

"I WILL GIVE YOU the secret of true happiness." If a man starts talking in that vein he will have listeners at once. Jesus began his famous sermon on the mount with that magic word "happy." It is unfortunate that most of our English translations use the word "blessed" because for most people "blessed" is a church-word. They don't know whether they want to be blessed or not; they have no doubt about wanting to be happy. It is twice unfortunate that Jesus' meaning has been hidden under an even more forbidding word, "Beatitudes." What we have here is a series of one-sentence pictures of truly happy persons.

What Christians Are

In these sentences Jesus sketches the kind of person who "has," that is to say, belongs to, the Kingdom of Heaven. If God were forced to throw away some of the human race and keep others, these are the people he would keep. Jesus in these short sentences is picturing the Christ-like. He is not talking about what they believe but about what they are. There is all the difference in the world between Jesus' idea of a Christian and some of the popular ideas today. For example, many persons think of a Christian as a person who keeps a certain number of rules, or believes a certain number of things, or belongs to a peculiar kind of club called the church. But a club member may be exactly like the people on the outside except that he has paid his dues and they haven't; and some church members are just like non-church members except that they have paid their dues (or at least owe them) while the outsiders have not.

Finding True Happiness

Let us venture to put the meaning of Jesus into simple words of today. The following sentences are meant to suggest only some of the means wrapped in these truths-for-life. . . . Do you want to know the secret of happiness? Jesus asks. I will tell you. The happy are those who know how little they know and how far from good they are. These are the real people, God's people. The happy are not always the gay; the happy are the serious, those who feel a sincere sorrow for their sins and shortcomings, sorry enough to turn away from them. The happy are those who do not insist on their own rights, who carry no chip on their shoulders, who are more interested in justice for others than for themselves. After the proud have destroyed the proud, these are the people to whom the earth belongs. The happy people are those who want to be good more than anything else in the world. This is the one desire that God always fulfills. Happy people are those that find their happiness in helping others; these are the people who will find helpers in their own time of need. Happy people are those who are pure, not in act alone but in inner thoughts and desires. They are the ones who have any eyes for God. Happy people are not only peaceable themselves but help others to live in peace as well. These are the people who are really God-like. Happy people are not always free from trouble; but their troubles have been caused chiefly not by their sins but by the fact that they are good. They have their heaven in their hearts.

Christians Are Different

You are happy yourselves (Jesus concludes) when the hard things said about you are lies. You are happy when you suffer as I suffer, on behalf of others. God will reward you; you belong to the glorious company of the best men of all time, for there never was a good friend of God who was not misunderstood and slandered. Jesus never explained all he meant. ("He who has ears, let him hear," he used to say.) But whatever may be puzzling, one thing is clear: Christians are different. If a man fits these descriptions ever part-way, he is noticeably different from the run-of-mine human being. We cannot water down Jesus' ideas, for they are really radical. We should not try to make it sound easy; he did not. But let us be as frank as he was: If you want to find real happiness, if you want to belong to God's people, if you want to be a real Christian, this is it. CHECK LIST FOR RETURNING SERVICEMEN

Have you put your affairs in order since you were released from military service? Here is a partial list of things to check.

Have you filed the original copy of your discharge papers with your County Clerk? This is important to insure that a record of your discharge papers always will be available. It protects you against future loss from theft, fire or negligence. Should you lose your discharge papers, the government will give you only a certificate stating that you were in service, but giving no other pertinent information. County Clerks throughout the state accept your discharge papers for filing without cost, and thereafter you may obtain certified copies whenever the need arises.

When you entered military service, did you execute a power of attorney so that someone would be able to act for you during your absence? If you now want complete control of all of your affairs, you must cancel any contract which gives certain powers to someone else.

If you have had a will prepared, has it been revised to suit changed conditions? For example, if you have married or if another child has been born to you and your spouse, you will want to check your will to make sure that all of your dependents are provided for. Changes in tax law, judicial decisions and administrative actions by the Treasury Department, too, could affect the provisions in your will, specially is this true if the government has passed a new revenue act since your will was prepared.

Are the beneficiaries named in your life insurance policies now correct? Is the amount adequate now in the light of the present deflated dollar? It is important to note that, unlike World War II veterans, Korean veterans must act within 120 days after release from duty in order to continue their government insurance.

plainspoken man, offered a clue to the reason of honey's popularity when he advised, "Eat thou honey because it is good." Advertising hucksters have been trying to improve on this simple endorsement for years.

But honey doesn't need a press agent to convince people that it is good. Its taste tells the story. It is also regarded as a healthy food since it can be eaten by many diabetics who cannot take sugar. It is a natural food, containing many vitamins and minerals needed in digestion and is recommended by many physicians for babies and aged persons with digestive disorders. During the month of October, a drive is being conducted by the nation's bee-keepers to acquaint the public with the beneficial qualities of honey and to tell the story of the honey bee. The drive is expected to help move this year's quarter billion pounds of honey production across the grocery counter and into the home.

Honey may be regarded as only one of the benefits derived from the bee, however. Perhaps the greatest contribution bees make is not in producing honey or wax, but in pollinating orchards and clover crops. While gathering the nectar for one pound of honey, it is estimated that a bee makes a total distance equal to two trips around the world. It visits millions of blossoms, aiding in the all-important act of pollination. Texas receives its share of benefits from the bee industry, also. Bee colonies are well established in South Texas, the "honey belt" stretching roughly down to the Rio Grande. In addition, it has a firm foothold in the eastern part of the state and

your car was not used for business purposes during your absence, you perhaps were granted a reduced premium. Is the insurance you carry now adequate for the purposes for which you use your car?

Did you take advantage of certain provisions in the Soldiers and Sailors Civil Relief Act to protect you from further liability for leases or contracts after you entered service? This act provides for immunity from court action only during the time you serve in the armed forces. Did you miss any payments on your home while you were in service? You now are liable for interest which accrued on the unpaid balance during the years that payments were postponed. These debts were not forgiven — and now that you are a civilian again, you must take up your postponed responsibilities.

Have you applied for reemployment in your old job? Application must be made within 90 days after you are released from service. If you do not return to your former job, it will be helpful to your former boss if you notify him as to your decision. The 86 local offices of the Texas Employment Commission and the Federal Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights are equipped to protect your rights and assist in returning you to your pre-service employment status. No charge is made for this service. A pamphlet explaining procedures to safeguard your reemployment rights can be obtained by writing the Bureau of Veterans' Reemployment Rights, Room 222 Commercial Building, 1100 Main Street, Dallas 2, Texas.

honey profits now are well over the million mark annually.

No accurate estimate can be had of the value of the honey bee in Texas orchards, however. Studies indicate that during favorable weather, fruit production has been increased 15 times in some areas where bees were employed to pollinate the blooms.

Honey production and the work of the bees cannot be ignored, then, when considering the diversified sources of income available to Texas farmers. The honey bee not only "adds the flavor of flowers to your food", but it also puts money in Texas pockets.

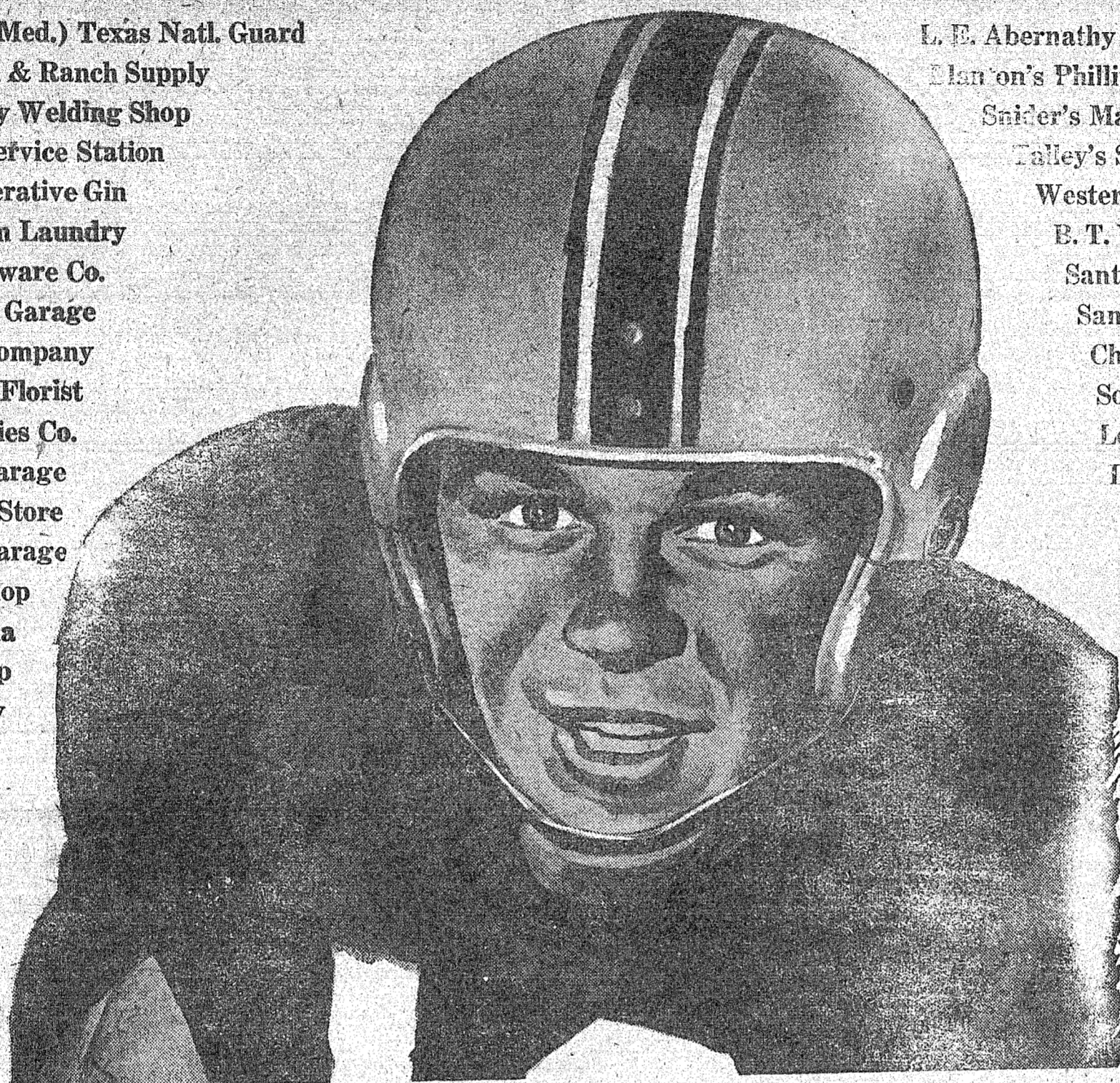

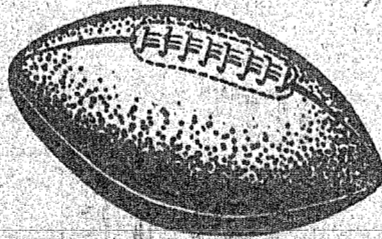
