Roosevelt Administration Upheld in Tuesday's Election

The New Deal under the Roosevelt administration was upheld in the United States Tuesday, in the general election held over the country.

The republicans waged a severe campaign of criticism in several states, and predicted the defeat of several democratic senators and congressmen in many states that went overwhelmingly democratic. There were 150 democratic congressmen elected to 25 republicans, and 70 democratic senators to 24 republicans.

This is a thorough vindication of the New Deal President Roosevelt and his aids are trying to carry on.

In Texas the democratic ticket was elected by about ten to one over the republican nominees.

All the eight proposed constitutional amendments were defeated by decisive majorities. The main amendment, which had the support of Governor-elect James V. Alford, numbered third on the list, regarding the classification of taxes, carried the highest vote probably of any amendment, but went down by a two to one vote.

Coleman county remains in the dry column insofar as 3-2 beer is concerned. However, the vote was much closer than was predicted, being only about 100 majority for the dries. This gives the bootleggers a continued paradise in this section, and considerable trade will go to McCulloch, Runnels, Eastland and Callahan counties, adjoining Coleman, where the amber colored beverage is sold.

The most thrilling game that has ever been played on Hurford Field, Coleman, was played last Friday night by the Santa Anna Mountaineers and the Winters Blizzards.

Playing scoreless for the first half, the Blizzards came back in the third quarter with a substantial drive of about 50 yards to a score, with Fields making the score and falling to convert because Hall blocked the kick.

After an exchange of punts in the fourth quarter, Santa Anna started their drive of about 60 yards. Santa Anna hammered at the Winters line for a first down on the one yard line. From there it took Price four tries to score. Price failed to convert; the kick was blocked.

Besides these two drives and threat of Winters in the 1st quarter, the ball was outside the thirty yard strips most of the time.

J. H. HICKS MEETS SUDDEN DEATH

Friends and loved ones were grieved last Saturday to learn of the sudden death of J. H. Hicks, who died at his place of business, the Hamburger Palace, early Saturday morning.

Mr. Hicks underwent a serious operation a few months back, and never had fully regained his strength, however he was back on the job at his lunch counter and enjoying a fair business. He arose early Saturday morning, at four o'clock, went to his place of business, spoke of feeling badly, and sent for the night watchman, Grady Adams. Soon after Mr. Adams arrived Mr. Hicks died of heart failure.

The remains were prepared for burial by Hesch Brothers and carried to Evant, in the eastern part of Mills county for burial Sunday.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Charley Carroll of Brownwood, Mrs. Georgia Routh of Santa Anna, and Mrs. Linnie Bowden of Brownwood, and two sons, Vess Hicks of Brownwood and Hillary Hicks of San Bonita, Texas, and several grandchildren.

Mr. Hicks was 70 years old last January. He was born January 24, 1864. He was preceded in death by his companion, who also died of heart failure, in April, 1920, while the family lived in Brownwood. Mr. Hicks had been in business here the greater part of the time since 1916. He was what is usually termed a big hearted man, he did not live for himself alone, but was always doing something for some unfortunate fellow man. Never did a day pass but what J. H. Hicks did a good deed for someone. He will be greatly missed by his children, grandchildren and friends.

TWO REMAIN IN HARDIN-SIMMONS QUEEN RACE

Miss Mildred Richeson of Mankins and Miss Irene McCreary of Santa Anna were the two leading candidates in the race for university queen at Hardin-Simmons university, when votes were counted Tuesday after a popular election.

R. V. CUPPS FUNERAL IS HELD FRIDAY

The remains of R. V. Cupps, 76, were laid to rest in the Cleveland cemetery last Friday afternoon, following funeral services at the Cupps home at 3 p. m. conducted by Rev. Sidney Smith of Abilene, minister of the Church of Christ.

According to data at hand, Mr. Cupps was born in May, 1858 in the state of Missouri. He and his young wife came to Texas 45 years ago, four years after their marriage, and settled on Hay Creek, in the Cleveland community, where they lived, reared a fine family of children, accumulated a good farm and gained the friendship of a splendid neighborhood.

Coleman county was in the pioneer stage when Mr. and Mrs. Cupps came here, and they went thru the ordeals, incident to helping build the community where they lived and developing it into a splendid place in which to live and rear a family.

Mr. and Mrs. Cupps were married September 21st, 1883. Eight children were born to them, seven of whom and the wife still survive. His body was found lifeless in bed early last Thursday morning when Mrs. Cupps called to wake him for breakfast. The survivors are: Mrs. Cupps, at home; Mrs. Porter Clark, Santa Anna; Mrs. Forrest Battles, San Angelo; William Cupps and Elmer Cupps of Santa Anna; Mrs. Theo. Spencer, San Angelo; Mrs. Erni Williams, White Deer; Mrs. Bill Rice, Santa Anna; thirty grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. All were present for the funeral.

Five brothers and four sisters also survive. Twin brothers, Sol and Ben Cupps of Coleman county, and three sisters also were present for the funeral.

Weldon Clark, Rachel Cupps, Gordon Battles, Jay Williams, Charles Westbrook and early Herring were pall bearers.

Hesch Brothers were in charge and directed the funeral. Mr. Cupps was a loyal companion, a kind and loving father, a Christian gentleman, and a good citizen. He will be greatly missed in the home and community where he reared his family and lived so long.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE prohibiting Fishing, boating, hunting or recreations on the City Lakes or adjacent property to the lakes of the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

1. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to fish, boat, hunt or picnic on the City Lakes of Santa Anna, Texas or any adjacent property to the lakes.

2. That any person found guilty of the violation of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any amount not exceeding \$100.00.

The fact that there is no adequate provisions in the City ordinances protecting the Lakes of Santa Anna, Texas from debris and trash, and thereby endangering the public health creates an emergency requiring that the rules prohibiting the passage of an ordinance at the same meeting when first read and requiring same to be referred to a committee, be suspended and the same is accordingly done and this ordinance shall be in effect from and after its passage.
