Thoughts

OF A COUNTRY EDITOR

CITY GOVERNMENT

During the past few days we have heard and had several discussions concerning the article in last week's paper entitled "It Has Happened". Some we agree with and others we do not agree with. However, this is a democratic nation and all public offices are supposed to be operated under the democratic form of government. On this point we will go along with anyone.

However, we favor the present type of city government, over any previous city government we can remember. In order that more citizens might better understand the operation of the city under the Aldermanic form of government with the City Manager we are going to attempt to clarify some of the operations under the two forms of government.

Under the city manager plan, a person is hired by the governing body of a city to take care of all the responsibilities of the city. This person is directly responsible to the governing body, which in this case is the Aldermen, and at any time he does not measure up to expectations, he can be relieved of his duties (fired). Under our present form of government six men act as the governing body. These six men represent a fairly good cross-section of our town and they are doing a good job.

Under the old commission type government, only three men served on the commission, a mayor and two commissioners. These men had no one to be responsible for the operation of the city other than themselves. They had to take time from their businesses or what ever profession they followed to care for the city operation. It took a lot of their time that they needed to be taking care of their business to attend to the city business. While under our present form of government a city manager is hired to take care of the city business and the aldermen can go about their businesses without so much interruption to care for a job that very few people want.

It is doubtful that the operation of the city could be any cheaper than it is now. A working crew has to be maintained under either form of government. Under the present form, a city manager is ready to oversee all works and is answerable to the aldermen for his actions. Under the old form of government crews had to be sent out to do jobs without a responsible person to oversee the work. Sometimes numerous complaints had to be seen about over and over again. Under the city manager plan, this city manager has the authority of hiring and firing of all employees except himself.

Our town has reached the point where it would be hard to get a capable person to serve as either mayor or commissioner under the old form of government. Every person we have had a discussion with over last weeks article, has flatly refused to offer his services to the city under either form of government. They all want "Joe" to do it but do not apparently even have a good suggestion as to how he should do it.

It is the opinion of this writer that capable men can be secured to seek these offices under the alderman form of government, but is rather doubtful as to whether any of them would have the extra time to donate their services under the commission type government.

Do You Know How To Drain A Hot Water Heater?

Rex Golston, after reading of a disaster in Brady recently that resulted from the explosion of a water heater, suggested that very few people know the correct procedure to use in draining a water heater. He suggests the following procedure:

Connect garden hose to drain, cut off main burner, leave pilot on, cut off water, open drain valve, then disconnect union on hot water line back of heater, as water will not drain until it can get air at union. When completely drained, turn on cold water for one-half minute and then let it drain. If not clean, repeat until water is clean. Then close drain valve, connect the union on the hot water line, open a hot water faucet then turn on cold water. When tank is full close faucet and check union for leaks. After all this is completed turn main burner back on. If you do not have tools to do the job with, it is suggested that you call a plumber.

Mr. Golston also suggests that while you are working around the heater, that you check to see if you have a safety pressure plug. Its duty is to take care of pressure built up in case a thermostat does not work properly. Golston states that a pressure plug can be installed at a cost of from \$7.50 to about \$10.00 and it is a wise investment.

R. K. Green Attends National Assn. Of School Administrators

Superintendent of the Santa Anna Schools, R. K. Green, is this week in Atlantic City, New Jersey, attending the National Association of School Administrators meeting. Green departed from Santa Anna last Thursday and in Ft. Worth joined the other school officials from over the state and all of them went together on a special train to the meeting.

The Wylie Bulldogs were declared winners of the District 7-A basketball tournament at Brownwood Saturday night when the Bangs Dragons forfeited at the half of the final game. Santa Anna had beat Wylie in the district round-robin and in the district tournament were beaten by Wylie in a three-minute extra play period, after tying at the end of the regular game.

The tourney began on Wednesday afternoon in the Howard Payne gym with Santa Anna defeating Rising Star in the second game of the tourney.

In the Wylie-Santa Anna game, the Mountaineers lost 51-48 in the overtime play-off. Wylie jumped to a quick 22-7 lead at the end of the first period and at half-time the score had been narrowed down to a 28-23 lead for Wylie. At the end of the third period Wylie was leading 37-27 and the game ended with a 44-44 tie. In the three-minute overtime Santa Anna could only manage to score 2 points while Wylie scored 7. Royce McIver and Charles Scarborough were high point men for Santa Anna with 13 points each.

On Friday the Dublin Lions edged the Mountaineers by a 44-42 score to drop them from the tourney.

The girls basketball tourney will begin Thursday evening at Bangs.

Girls Win Over Wylie

The District 7-A girls basketball tourney will get underway at Bangs Thursday afternoon at 4:30 with the Santa Anna girls playing the Dublin girls. The tourney will continue through Saturday night to determine the winner. If Santa Anna can win this tourney they will go into a three game playoff with Cross Plains, winner of the district round-robin.

On Tuesday night the girls won over Wylie by a 32-24 score to end the district round-robin. Santa Anna was trailing at the half by a 14-17 score.

On Saturday night the girls won over Bangs by a 44-32 score with the quarter scores being: first, Santa Anna 9, Bangs 11; half, Santa Anna 17, Bangs 20; third, Santa Anna 28, Bangs 22; final Santa Anna 44, Bangs 32. Jo Ann Dunn was high point girl with 37 points and Shirley Simmons of Bangs scored 26 points.

The "B" team also won over Wylie on Tuesday night by a 27-14 score with Patsy Scott scoring 9 points, Liz Smith 8, Ruth Milligan 7 and Patsy Bryan 3.

City Election To Be Held Tuesday, April 7

The regular city election will be held at the City Hall in Santa Anna on Tuesday, April 7, with a mayor and five aldermen to be elected. The men serving in these positions at present are: Mayor, C. E. Flint; and Aldermen, Vernon Parker, Cliff Herndon, Harry Crews, Charles Wristen and Leland Thompson. Mayor Flint said he was not going to seek re-election and some of the aldermen have indicated they would not seek re-election.

Filing deadline for places on the printed ballot is Saturday, March 7, 30 days before the election. In order for a person to file for a place on the ballot, he must go to the city hall and get an application blank from the city secretary and have his application notarized.

March 7 is only a little over two weeks from now. Those who plan to file their application should do so before that time.

Clean Up Survey To Be Held Week After Exams

Dr. Charles M. Henner, chairman of the Community Chamber of Commerce Sanitation Committee, spoke to students and adults at the high school auditorium Monday and told them of the need for a clean-up campaign and survey to be held in Santa Anna. Dr. Henner stressed the need for covered garbage cans in the city and also stated it was the theory now that polio is carried by flies and their breeding places need to be controlled.

Members of the student body have agreed to take a survey of the entire town, including the business district, and to make written reports as to their findings. This survey is to be taken the week beginning Feb. 23, but it is planned for the survey to be completed in one day. Just what day it will be taken has not been announced.

This survey will be similar to one taken last year. It will include comments from students as to what their recommendations for correction would be.

Dick Bass, City Manager, reports the city has about 8 covered cans that are 30-gallon size and the exact cost on them is \$3.28. They will be sold for that amount and if you want one before the survey starts they will deliver it to you free of charge. They are trying to get some 20-gallon cans that will sell for less than \$3.00.

It has been suggested that those who do not have covered garbage cans get them before the survey starts. In that manner you will be credited with using a covered can. At present it is not mandatory, but unless every resident starts using in the near future it will be made so.

We in Santa Anna are proud of the school system that has been developed in our town. We like to believe that the opportunities afforded our children for sound education are not excelled anywhere. If we are justified in this conclusion it is only because the people of our town have shown a personal interest in education and because public spirited men and women have been willing to devote their lives to the teaching of youth.

This kind of understanding can best be developed by the intimate knowledge that comes from inspecting the schoolhouses, knowing the teachers and seeing the work of the pupils.

Native Missionary In Philippines Writes Thanks For Help

Rev. Jack Payne this week received a letter from Rev. Felix Grospe, a native missionary in San Mateo, Isabela, Philippines thanking him for a recent gift of seeds and supplies sent by the Men's Bible Class of the church. The local group sent nearly \$100 in seed, clothing, supplies and cash.

Rev. Grospe, who was a scholarship student at SMU at the time Rev. Payne and his wife were students there wrote that he had kept a small amount of the seed and clothing and had given the rest to needy families in his parish. He mentioned the greatest need was for Christian Books and farm seed. Many of his people are ignorant of modern methods of farming and he is aware of the vast field for the missionary in teaching them to be self supporting.

The American Legion came to the aid of the missionary just before Christmas and sent twenty-five dollars for a bicycle for the oldest son of the family who was having to walk fifteen miles to school, but because our government sends money orders only by ordinary mail, the money has been several months getting to the islands and no word has been received from Rev. Grospe concerning it.

Rev. Grospe has six children ranging in age from 10 1/2 to 8 years old who need clothing should anyone desire to help by sending used items. Rev. Payne will be glad to accept the clothing and speak with anyone interested.

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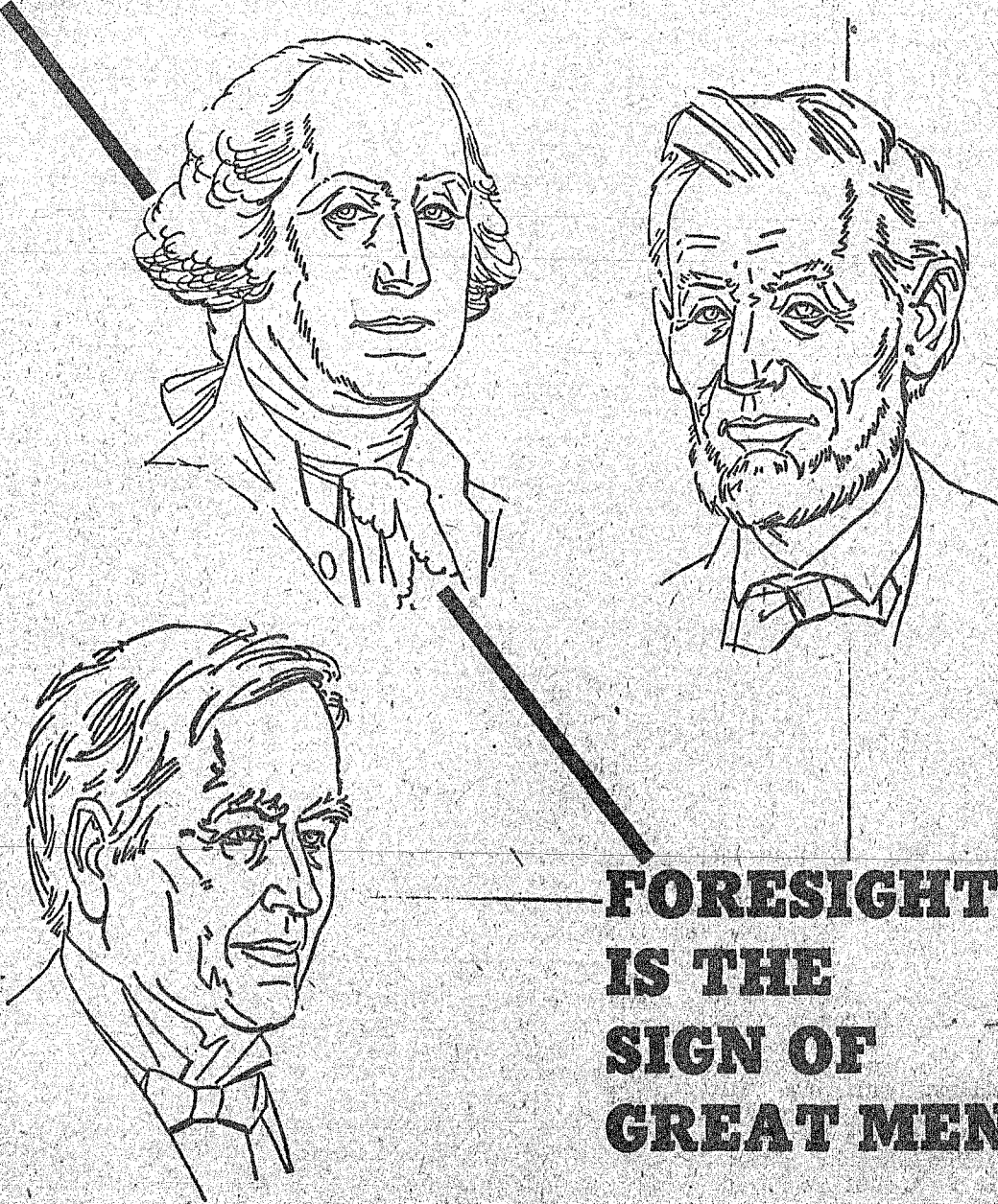

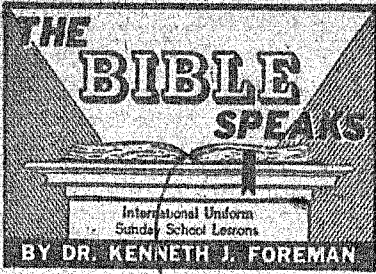

Answers—Plus!

Lesson for February 22, 1953

ON February 22 we celebrate the birthday of a man who (it is said) claimed he could not tell a lie. That is an exaggeration. Almost any man can tell a lie if he tries hard enough. But even if this were such a wonderful world that literally nobody could tell a lie, it might still not be the ideal world. For what is most important is not choking back the falsehoods, important as that is. The big thing is to tell the truth. And it is even harder to tell the truth and tell it right, than to keep from lying. Truth can be told in a dull way so that no one listens to it. If truth is worth telling it ought to be pointed, and when we say "pointed" we mean that three ways.

Pointed At—

For one thing, truth may as well not be told at all if it is not pointed at somebody. There's no use telling your deaf old grandmother about the circus; she's not going. There is no use telling a small baby to keep his face clean. There's no use giving a lecture on space-heating to an audience of Hottentots; they're hot enough already. You're talking to the wrong people.

Truth ought to be fitted for, and pointed toward, the people who need it. The Master-Teacher himself showed how this is done. Much of Jesus' most vital teaching was directed to what we would call "hecklers." Sometimes their questions were meant to trip him up (like the three recorded in Matthew 22). Sometime they were asked from mere curiosity, sometimes they were desperate gropings for light. But whatever the motive, Jesus always gave them answers—plus. He would take advantage of the moment to push in a pointed truth. If only preachers and Sunday school teachers—and

politicians too—would spend more time answering the questions people do ask, instead of questions they don't ask!

Sharp Enough To Stick

There is another sense in which truth, to be effective must be pointed. It has to be the opposite of dull. Now there are situations where truth can be dull, and welcome. If you are looking up in the encyclopaedia the population of North Dakota, or trying to find out what niacin is, you don't want to be amused, startled or entertained. You just want plain fact, plainly stated. Professors and other studious people are trained to absorb truth no matter how dull it is presented. It's a poor student who can't learn as much from a dry professor as from a witty one.

But most human situations are not in class-rooms. Truth that is not dry, ought not to sound dry. Truth that's worth remembering ought to be told in such a way that it can't be forgotten. Again, our Lord's teaching was of this sort. He never told a dull truth, and he never told his bright truth in a dull way. His sayings are all pointed; they have a way of sticking in the mind. What he says flashes in the eye like sunlight on steel. There was no one around taking notes when Jesus spoke. His sayings are remembered not because somebody had a good notebook but because what he said, stuck.

"To The Point"

What do we mean by a pointless joke or a pointless remark? We mean, of course, that the thing was not worth saying, however true it may have been. We want people to speak to the point. If we are going to listen to them we want them to be saying something that is worth saying, something we'll be worse off for not knowing. Now again Jesus' teaching was pointed truth in this sense. It was relevant truth, it was truth dealing with specific situations. He came "down to brass tacks" as we say. His teachings did not float away up in the clouds, they came down to earth and walked there. They had to do with people's real problems. And what we shall find out, if we study Jesus' teachings faithfully, is they deal with our problems today too. The problem of the demands—sometimes seeming to conflict—of church and state, of country and conscience; the problems of death and of the life beyond; the problem of how best to serve and obey God; these concerned the men of ancient Judea, they concern us no less. Jesus' words are just as pointed today as they were nineteen centuries ago.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

STUDY AND EXPERIENCE ARE BASIS FOR LAWYER'S ADVICE

When a lawyer saves a client from trouble or financial difficulty, the client knows only that he has been charged for "advice"—a commodity oftentimes too freely given by us all. Often overlooked is the study, work, and time the attorney has spent in order that he be in a position to give advice that can be relied upon.

A lawyer bases his fee upon the benefits received from the services he has rendered and the time and effort he has expended. In addition, he stakes his professional reputation upon the soundness of the counselling given each client.

First, a practicing lawyer must have had six or seven years of academic education. In Texas this means at least three years of college work and three years in a recognized law school. Because the community at large has an interest in the qualifications and conduct of members of the bar, these minimum educational requirements must be met before examination for admission to the bar may be taken.

During the three years of formal legal education, the law student attempts to read, digest, reconcile and understand from 10,000 to 20,000 separate cases, statutes, and monographs. He must draw from these an understanding of basic legal principles, of processes of legal reasoning, of methods of fact and legal investigation, and of court procedures which bring relief to clients.

From the standpoint of court proceedings, the community then expects the work of a lawyer to be a prompt and efficient trial of their causes at a fair cost. From a counselling standpoint, it expects reasonable promptness and efficiency with above all, the utmost of sound judgment.

In both counselling and litigation, a lawyer must draw upon a wealth of precedent which he has attempted to store in his memory in order to apply one or more principles of law to the fact situation presented by his client. Ordinarily, many legal principles and rules of statute or decision are involved in even the simplest situation. Too, the problems raised by various clients, like fingerprints, are never exactly the same.

After searching his memory, the lawyer will usually check the pertinent rules and precedents. These are found in an ever-increasing volume of statutes with which modern legislation seeks to regulate many aspects of our life, and in the decisions of the courts, boards and bureaus.

Almost every problem presented to a lawyer requires research in the statutes and law books before a proper answer can be

VALUE OF GRASSLAND FARMING

If you were going to put a price on Texas' tremendous acreage of grassland, how would you determine its value? It would be impossible—for our grass is a priceless commodity. Without improved grasslands, this nation would have a less total amount of food. Our diets would include less milk, butter, cheese and meat. Our overall production of all farm commodities would experience an alarming drop.

The term "grassland farming" is not a new one, but it is a factor often neglected when compiling statistics on the agricultural wealth of Texas. This state has more than 100 million acres of grass, forest and pastureland and much of it is unimproved. The farmer who is a good manager can double or triple production on hundreds of thousands of these acres through liming, fertilization and reseeded with more productive grasses and legumes.

These improved grasslands can be invaluable when made a part of the crop rotation system. Tests show that land planted to legumes and grasses for a year help assure a longer period of maximum production on cultivated crops. No schemes have yet been devised for agriculture that will maintain soil organic matter better than plans based on adequate proportions of grasses in crop rotations.

Experiments have shown that on much land, improved forage crops can produce as much livestock feed per acre, at lower cost and with less labor, than corn and other feed grains. In North Carolina, for example, on land capable of producing 50 bushels of corn per acre, improved pastures produced the feed equivalent of 87 bushels of corn. Wheat yielded the feed equivalent of 30 bushels of corn. Oats and barley yielded the feed equivalent of 24 bushels of corn. Even more conclusive evidence of the worth of grassland crops is the fact that returns per man hour of labor were calculated at \$23.09 from improved pastures, as compared with only \$5.81 from wheat, \$3.69 from corn and \$2.79 from oats. Studies in the middlewestern states have shown similar results.

Grassland agriculture can make enormous contributions to increased food production dur-

ing times of national emergency. The idea that farmers must plow up good grasses and plant more row crops because of crisis is a false concept. When we achieve a better and more productive balance between crops and grasses, we can look forward to greater production for longer periods of time.
