Kiddies Kite Contest Set For Saturday

The Lions Club Kiddies Kite Contest will begin at 2:00 p. m. Saturday on the grounds of the old Grade School. Boys and girls below high school ages are eligible to enter and compete for the thirty prizes which will be awarded for skill and construction, according to age groups. There is no restriction upon entrants other than they must not be in a higher grade than the 3th in school and all kites must be home constructed.

Prizes for the best constructed kite will be awarded in both the regular and box type with children in the pre-school age in one group, the first three grades in the second group, 4th and 5th grades in the third group and the 6th, 7th and 8th grades in the fourth group. Competition in flying will also be divided in these groups. Parents are urged to help youngsters construct the kites and each contestant may have an assistant to help him get his kite in the air by holding the kite.

Mr. W. B. Griffin, general chairman for the event, has appointed Harry Crews, Cullen Perry and A. D. Pettit judges for the contests.

The Lions Club will furnish free of charge to each contestant, the kite twine. This will be available at the site of the contest. Each child is to bring his or her kite to the contest ready for the twine to be attached to the harness. Free kite sticks are available at the South Texas Lumber Co., in Santa Anna. Contest rules sheets may be secured from the Santa Anna News office, Phillips Drug and Piggly Wiggly in Santa Anna and The Book Store in Coleman.

Communist Pamphlet Received Here

Last week all the daily newspapers were full of articles about the Communist Party mailing pamphlets over the south. During the latter part of the week one was received by The News. We have not heard of anyone else here in town receiving one, but most likely several were received here.

We did not read all of it, but did glance through it. As best we could tell, the pamphlet was attempting to stir up more trouble so far as racial problems are concerned. The pamphlet was mailed from a Houston, Texas, address and also urged people to subscribe and read "The Worker", a Communist publication.

Title of the pamphlet was "The Southern People's Common Program for Democracy, Prosperity and Peace" and it listed 10 points that the Communist would like for the South to rally around, all of them attempting to stir up trouble for the South, as best as we could understand it.

The FBI has been notified of the pamphlets being distributed and we are sure they will take what necessary action should be taken.

Newspapers Are Top Advertising Mediums of Nation

Again, for the year 1952, newspapers were the top advertising medium of the nation. Figures show that more money was spent on advertising in 1952 than in any previous year and of the \$7,219,600,000 spent the last year 34 percent of it was spent for newspaper advertising. Direct mail advertising was second with 18 percent, radio was third with 10 percent, magazines were fourth with 8.5 percent and television was last with about 8 percent. The remaining percentages went for a various number of small advertising projects.

Local advertising running in all newspapers of the nation increased 12.3 percent over the previous year and National Advertising increased 10.6 percent.

A complete change in the operation of the City of Santa Anna will be the result of the City Election held on Tuesday, April 7. Dr. Charles M. Henner was elected without opposition as Mayor and Tom Hays, Robert L. Markland, Hardy Blue. Claude Hodges and Preston Bailey were elected as Aldermen for the next two years.

More votes were cast in the Tuesday election than has been cast in any city election in recent years. It was estimated that practically every older citizen of the town voted during the day when 309 votes were cast. Very light voting was noted among the younger citizens of the town, indicating that a lot of them failed to pay their poll taxes at the first of the year.

Votes polled by each man in the races are as follows: For Mayor, Dr. Charles M. Henner, 295; Ben Yarborough, 3; H. L. Markland, 2; and Ford Barnes, L. A. Welch, Bob Garrett and Dick Bass each received one vote. All the votes except Dr. Henner were write-ins.

In the Alderman race Tom Hays led the ticket with 216 votes. Following in order were Robert L. Markland, 214; Hardy Blue, 201; Claude Hodges, 192; Preston Bailey, 173; Cliff Herndon, 134; Leland Thompson, 133; Charles Wristen, 125 and John Gregg, 96.

This group will take office within the next few days.

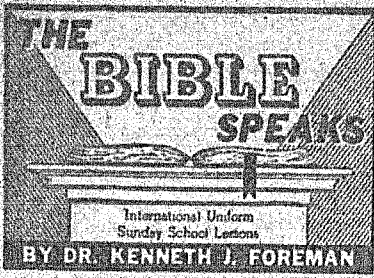

A Man New-Born

Lesson for April 12, 1953

THE most important convert Christianity ever made was one of the very first ones. He was important not only for his own times but for ours too. His thinking set the pattern for Christian thought ever since. His writings, or rather the truths he brought out in his writings, have been at the heart of most of the revivals from early times to now.

Sometimes the Christian church has gone too far in admiration of this man. Because his conversion was spectacular, some have thought (mistakenly) that all true conversions are spectacular. Because he always thought like a lawyer, some have thought (again mistakenly) that all true Christian thought must be legalistic. In short, some Christians have put this man ahead of Jesus Christ. Such mistakes should not blind us to the man's real and tremendous importance. Those who plan these Bible studies have set aside the next three months for a review of this one man's life and some of his writings.

Outside the City

His name is Paul, though the church very respectfully usually calls him "Saint" Paul. He was a city-born, city-bred man. But as Providence would have it, the most important thing that ever happened to him came to pass in the open country, on a windswept road that is still traveled, the Highway from the city of Jerusalem to the city of Damascus, in Syria. Born in the city, re-born in the country; it has happened since. The story of his conversion has been often told; indeed in the book of Acts it is told three separate times (chapters 9, 22, 26), once in Luke's words, twice in

Paul's. There was no church, no preacher, no personal workers; no hymns were sung. There was no meeting at all, no visitation evangelism. It happened like a stroke of lightning. Inside of five minutes or less, Paul (or Saul as he was then called) had been changed from an anti-Christian to a Christian—Not to a saint! He was only, so to speak, a baby Christian. Being new-born into the Christian life is a little like being newborn into the human life; there is a period of babyhood first, when the newborn soul hardly knows what to do and needs much guidance and help. But in those few minutes on the Damascus Road, the whole direction of his life was changed.

In the City

Paul's conversion had some unique features, startling and extraordinary. But the story of it (in Acts 22) reports two questions that belong in every Christian conversion. "Who are you, Lord?" and "What shall I do, Lord?" A true conversion is a turning toward Christ. Turning away from one's old life is not the whole of it and not the most important part of it. When a driver on a country road realizes he has taken the wrong fork, and turns around to go in the other direction, which is the more important, that he now has his back to the wrong direction or that he has his face in the right direction? Conversion is from, but more importantly, conversion is to. To Christ first of all. True conversions are not produced by coming face to face with one's better self but with Jesus. And yet, this is only a start. What next? That was what Saul went into, Damascus to find out. That was what Ananias came to tell him. Saul needed what all new-born Christians need, a Christian friend, Christian fellowship.

The New City

Paul was and remained a city man. Most of the great experiences of his life were connected with cities. But from that day at Damascus to the end of his life, there was one city above all that claimed Paul's allegiance. It is the City of God, the New City. Conversion can be looked at and described in many ways. But one good way is to compare it to taking out citizenship papers in the Kingdom of Heaven. Paul said once, as Moffatt translates Phil. 3:20, "We are a colony of heaven." That was not a figure of speech with him. Paul would have passed any loyalty test.

ustrates how America has tackled the problem of attaining justice. Plato long ago showed that the idea of justice is difficult to come by. It is perhaps even more difficult to translate into human conduct and apply in the settlement of individual cases.

How does a case come before an appellate court. If you and your neighbor have a dispute over the property line between your two lots, you would be foolish to go to court for a settlement if you did not believe that right was on your side. Therefore, practically every civil action that comes before a trial court originates in an honest difference of opinion as to what

the law or the facts of that case are.

But right cannot be on both sides; so one or the other of the litigants must be mistaken. When you seek legal counsel on such a question, it frequently happens that your lawyer will advise you not to go to court. Only a relatively small percentage of cases reach trial. The law is clear enough so that among the millions of transactions taking place in the country only a relatively few ever result in lawsuit.

But suppose you and your lawyer have decided that your case has enough merit to warrant going to court. The facts on both sides are presented, the lawyers on both sides argue the merits of their clients' cases and the court is then called upon to render a decision. In some cases this decision will be based on findings of a jury. The vast majority of the cases are settled then and there with the decision of the trial judge.

But judges, like all of us, are human, and the law is complicated and subject to varied interpretation. At times the trial judge may err in admitting or evaluating the facts, or in interpreting the law applicable to the facts. Under such circumstances your case may be appealed to an appellate court.

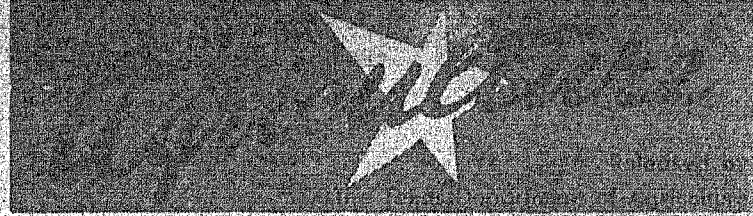
Some states have no intermediate courts between the trial court and the state Supreme Court. In such states a case from District Court is appealed directly to the Supreme Court, the highest court of appeal in the state.

In Texas, cases are appealed from a District Court to one of eleven Courts of Civil Appeals. Sometimes the judgment of the latter court is final, as in ordinary divorce cases not involving property. But if the case meets certain requirements it may be further appealed to the Supreme Court of Texas. Criminal cases are appealed directly from the District Court to the Court of Criminal Appeals, which is the highest state court in criminal matters.

Federal cases are appealed from a U. S. District Court to a Circuit Court of Appeals and from there to the Supreme Court of the United States, provided the latter will assume jurisdiction of the matter.

When you appeal your case, you ask that the error you believe you have found be corrected. If it was an error, that is what will happen—the trial judge's decision will be reversed.

Sometimes the courts are compelled to decide a question one way because the law says so, but the results bring to light



SEED TESTING PROCEDURE

There is an old farm maxim which states, "The harvest is no better than the seed."

You don't have to be a Biblical scholar to recognize the origin and wisdom of that saying. And right now is the time to prepare for sowing good seed in order to reap a high production harvest this fall.

When you buy your seed from a dealer, the Tester Seed Tag required by law on all bags, tells you what to expect in germination quality and seed purity. Yet, what about that last year's crop of seed stored in the bin on your farm? Wouldn't it be a good idea to know as much about the qualities of your farm-grown seed as that which you buy at the store?

If you plan to sell some of that stored seed, the Texas Seed Act says it must be state inspected and tested. But whether you intend to sell it or plant it, a comprehensive test of the seed will pay dividends at harvest time.

Two laboratories are operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture for purity and germination tests. No charge is made for testing field seed of Texas residents but a fee of 25 cents per sample is levied for all vegetable and flower seed.

To expedite testing operations, a few suggestions are offered to the sender:

1. How to take samples. Only samples of re-cleaned seeds can be accepted. When you have five bags or less of seed, take a sample from each bag. If there are more than five bags, send samples from at least every fifth bag, but never less than five bags should be sampled. In sampling bulk seed, thrust your hand or a long probe into the bin in at least seven uniformly distributed spots.

2. Sizes of samples. Send 2 ounces of small seed like white or alsike clover and most grasses; 5 ounces of red or crimson clover, alfalfa, lespedeza, ryegrass, brome, millet, flax, rape or seeds of similar size; 1 pound of sudan grass, sorghum, proso and like sizes; 2 ounces of corn, cotton, cereals, vetches, cowpeas or larger seeds.

grass, brome, millet, flax, rape or seeds of similar size; 1 pound of sudan grass, sorghum, proso and like sizes; 2 ounces of corn, cotton, cereals, vetches, cowpeas or larger seeds.

3. Information needed. Print your name and address, include the kind and variety of seed (the lab does not make varietal identification); the lot number or stock identification; the month and year of harvest and where grown; the test desired (whether purity, germination or both). If the seed has been

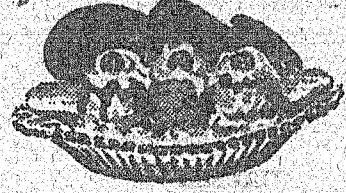
treated, give name of material and rate of application.

4. Forwarding samples. Samples should be mailed in cloth bags or strong cardboard containers. Paper bags and ice cream cartons are unsatisfactory since they usually burst in transit. Depending on your location samples may be sent to either of the following addresses: Seed Laboratory, Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Austin, or Seed Laboratory, 116 Agriculture Bldg., Texas Tech College, Lubbock.

5. Tested Seed Labels. Labels are 1 cent each and one tag must be attached to each bag of seed offered for sale, showing the complete analysis and other information. Tags cannot be issued for seed tested for germination only. Include your order for tags along with the samples.

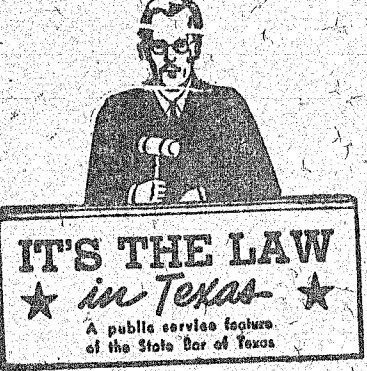

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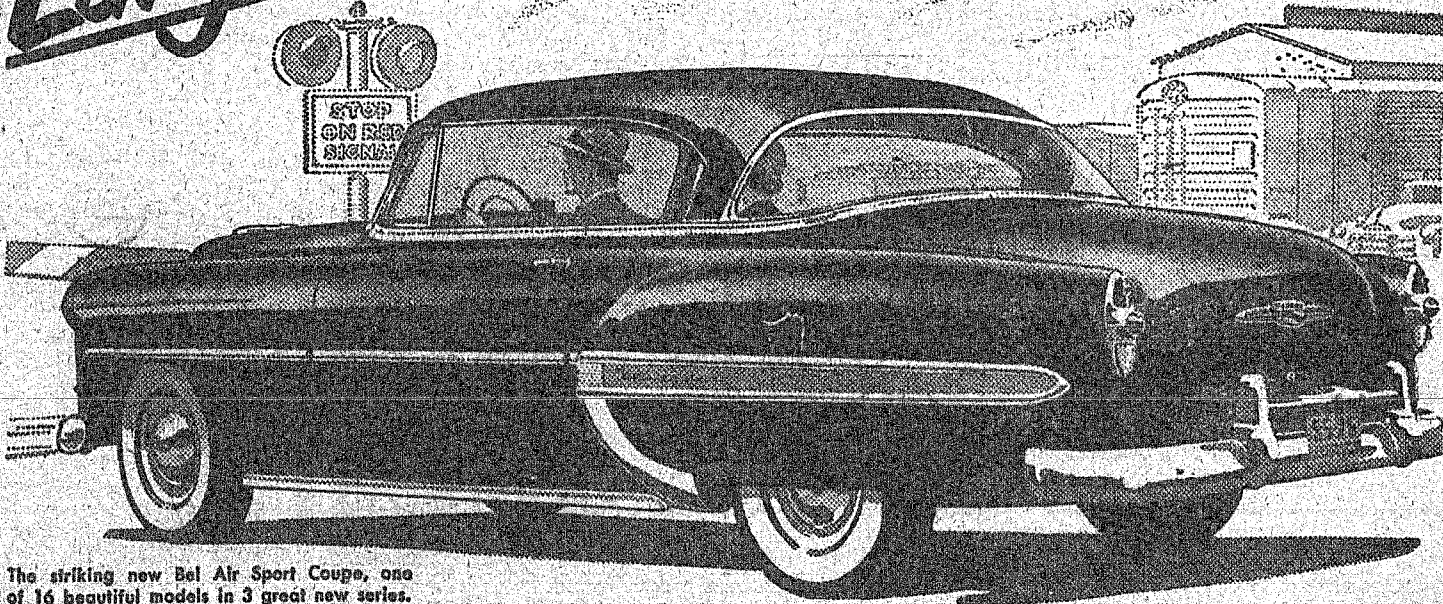

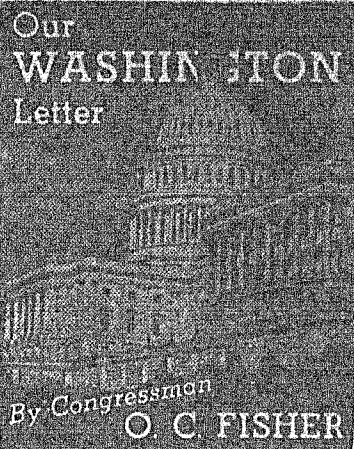

For the fourth time in seven years I voted for a tidelands bill last week. A tidal wave of public support swept the legislation through the House by a whopping 285-to-108 margin. And it looks like a certainty the Senate will follow suit, though with a closer ratio and a slightly different version.

Legislation to vacate the grab of the States' offshore lands was begun shortly before the Supreme Court acted in the California case. The House then passed a bill by a vote of 186-to-67, with the Senate margin being 44-to-34. But President Truman vetoed it.

Then, in 1948 the House again acted, that time by a vote of 257-to-29. The Senate failed to act on that bill and nothing more was done until 1951 when again the House took the initiative and passed a quit-claim bill by a vote of 265-to-109. But again the Senate failed to act.

Last year, by an overwhelming majority of 247-to-89, the House rammed through another bill and the Senate concurred by a vote of 60-to-35. Again Truman vetoed, and a lot of people gloated over their claim that Tidelands legislation was forever dead. The left-wing ADA and the CIO were particularly vocal on the subject.

But a cause is never settled until it is settled right. And so last week the House again confirmed title to the States in their own submerged lands, this time by the 285-to-108 verdict. The Senate is now debating the issue, and it looks like a cinch that at last another bill will go to the White House, and this time will be approved by President Eisenhower.

It is hoped that this legislation will have some effect on the Supreme Court and cause that august body to confine itself in the future to the job of making judicial decisions rather than trying to invade the province of Congress and, in effect, legislating.

So the People May Know

Previously in this series, attention was called to the responsibility of county officials to publish regular financial reports. City officials have the same duty.

Here are two provisions of the Texas statutes describing what the city authorities must do:

"Art. 1001. Cities, Towns and Villages - Publication of receipts and expenditures by city treasurer.

"At the end of every half year he shall cause to be published, at the expense of the city, a statement showing the amount of receipts and expenditures for six months next preceding, and the general condition of the treasury."

"Art. 1023. Cities, Towns and Villages - City council shall publish statement of receipts and expenditures.

"The city council shall, at least ten days before the expiration of each municipal year, cause to be published in a city newspaper a correct and full statement of the receipts and expenditures from the date of the last annual report, together with the sources from which the funds were derived, and showing for what purpose disbursed, the condition of the treasury, together with such information as may be necessary to a full understanding of the financial condition of the city"
